What We Do for You

In addition to hosting workshops and events throughout the year, the CTE offers a variety of services for instructors and students.



All instructors

CTE staff are available for **teaching consultations** for anyone who is teaching a class at Rice. Instructors can schedule an appointment to discuss any aspect of their teaching, such as syllabus construction, exam design, and classroom management. We also offer **classroom observations** for instructors who wish to receive detailed, formative feedback about their teaching and **Small Group Instructional Diagnoses** to collect anonymous feedback from students about a course. Faculty

We offer workshops and seminars throughout the academic year for faculty to discuss new developments in the field of teaching and learning. CTE staff are available to meet with individuals and departments to design specialized programs and to consult on a wide range of pedagogical issues. Finally, we offer programming for new faculty in conjunction with the Office of Faculty Development. As part of this new series, we met once a month in the fall to discuss James Lang's *On Course: A Week-by-Week Guide to Your First Semester of College Teaching*.

Graduate students and postdoctoral scholars

The CTE sponsors a variety of **TEACH Workshops** for graduate students and postdocs that are designed to focus on innovative, transformational techniques to enhance student learning. Participation in eight of these workshops will earn you a teaching certificate that can be noted on your CV.
