

Our new book, "Escaping the Housing Trap: The Strong Towns Response to the Housing Crisis," was released in April 2024. It quickly topped multiple bestseller lists and garnered positive reviews in a variety of publications. The Housing Trap Tour reached communities across the country with a vital Strong Towns message about how to address today's housing crisis through bottom-up action and incremental change.

Program Highlight

The Crash Analysis Studio

The Crash Analysis Studio demonstrates a model for learning from traffic crashes and preventing future harm.

In 2024, Strong Towns consolidated the findings from 18 cities whose residents adopted this model into a national report.

Highlights included:

- ▶ The participation of the Vision Zero Network, Transportation For America, Toole Design and the city of Hoboken in the report's release.
- ▶ Over 500 people in attendance, from press partners to elected city officials.





2025 Preview

The year ahead offers opportunities for members to lead their communities toward a stronger future. Here's what to look forward to in 2025:

- ▶ National Gathering in Providence, RI: We will provide an opportunity to connect with members, experts and advocates in a historic setting.
- ▶ Housing Toolkits: We aim to release three implementation toolkits that support the book "Escaping the Housing Trap," with the first available to members in February.
- Crash Analysis Studio Expansion: In 2025, we aim to bring the Crash Analysis Studio model into the communities that need it most, both by partnering with cities and Local Conversations who are ready to start their own Studios and by continuing to run our demonstrations.
- ▶ **Strengthening Local Conversations:** We aim to provide enhanced support and resources for grassroots leaders driving change.
- ▶ **Amplifying Member Stories:** We will make an amplified commitment to sharing success stories across platforms to inspire and inform others.
- ▶ Membership Growth Goal: We aim to reach 8,500 members a 50% net increase to strengthen the movement and expand our impact. This ambitious commitment highlights the central role of membership in achieving our mission and driving the outcomes we strive for.
