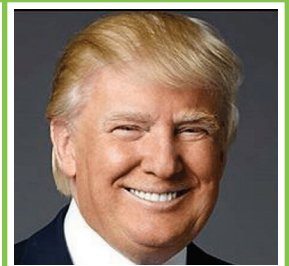

About the Amendment:

If the amendment passes, a 16-member salary council would be formed to decide legislator pay every two years. The governor and the Minnesota Supreme Court chief justice would pick the members of the council. The members would be split evenly between the two major parties. The following people would be excluded from the committee: past and present legislators and their spouses, lobbyists, judges, and state employees.

✓ Proponents:

Legislators cannot be objective when it comes to setting their own salaries and therefore a council should be established to decide legislator pay.

✓ Opponents:

This amendment would put pay raises in the hands of a third party, making it easier to increase legislators' salaries and reduce legislator accountability to taxpayers.
