

INTRODUCTION



“The whole state must be so well organized that every Whig can be brought to the polls. So divide the country into small districts and appoint in each a committee. Make a perfect list of the voters and ascertain with certainty for whom they will vote... Keep a constant watch on the doubtful voters and have them talked to by those in whom they have the most confidence... On Election Day see that every Whig is brought to the polls.”

-Abraham Lincoln, Letter to a friend, 1840

The basics of precinct organization are the same today as they were when Abraham Lincoln wrote this letter 176 years ago. The advent of new technology and modern media have changed the conduction of campaigns, but the means of achieving victory at the polls remains, at its core, the same; Republican activists talking to their neighbors of the importance of supporting candidates who advocate core Republican principles.

Your job is straightforward: **find voters who support our candidates, make sure they are registered to vote, and make sure they vote.** Whether you are now a Precinct Chair or wish to become one, or simply want to help organize your precinct, this manual is for you to use throughout the year.

The Dallas County Republican Party (DCRP) will support the Precinct Chairs throughout their term in office by providing the timelines, tools, and training needed to succeed.

The Ideal Precinct

The Ideal Precinct has active organization, headed by the Precinct Chair. The Precinct Chair and Block Captains cover every street and work closely together to find Republicans and others who have conservative leanings. The Precinct Chair keeps Block Captains informed, organizes opportunities for them to get together, and invites Republican candidates into the precinct to meet with voters and to provide support from the precinct’s organization. Elected Officials are kept apprised of the precinct’s concerns and respond to the Precinct Chair’s inquiries. The Precinct Chair attends Executive Committee meetings, participates as a voting member, and shares the information gained with the precinct. The precinct organization meets frequently to socialize, plan, and carry out party-building activities. At election time they work hard and passionately to get out the vote for Republican candidates. On election day, Precinct Chairs generally serve as election workers at their local precinct polling location.

PURPOSE

Your Objective:

Maximize Republican votes for every race on the ballot in your Precinct.

Your Goal:

- Identify qualified voters who will support our candidates.
- Identify swing voters and what it will take to persuade them to vote Republican.
- Make sure qualified Republican supporters are registered.
- Make sure qualified Republican supporters vote.
- Be available to staff your Precinct Polling Place as needed.

VOTE GOAL for Precinct # _____: _____

In the days leading to election, Dallas GOP will provide a goal for your specific precinct.



Your Role:

- Organize and lead your precinct to accomplish the above objective and goals.
- Ensure person-to-person, i.e., grassroots, contact within your precinct.



As the **Republican Precinct Chair**, you are the political leader of your neighborhood for Republicans. As your organization's link to the DCRP, you should stay familiar with its strategies and be able to share them with your volunteers. You should learn the dynamics and voting history of your precinct and know what it takes to maximize the Republican vote. The two best free resources for voting history are the GOP Data Center and the Dallas County Elections Department.

PRECINCT CHAIR TIMELINE

Precinct Chairs are elected or appointed to represent their neighborhood. The current term of office for Precinct Chairs is June 2016 through June 2018. Republican Precinct Chairs are tasked with three specific duties to fulfill during their tenure.

MAXIMIZE the Republican vote in their neighborhood.
PARTICIPATE in Executive Committee meetings.
AVAILABLE to serve as an Election Worker.

Effective Precinct Chairs engage their neighbors throughout the year with a variety of activities and opportunities. The following timeline is a general guideline. It is best to determine a method that works well for your precinct.

Continuous Activity

- **Identify Political Affiliation of new residents.** A specific “New Movers” list is available for Precinct Chairs upon request.
- **Register Voters.** A high priority must be greeting new residents to your neighborhood and making sure everyone likely to support Republican candidates is registered to vote. This task is best done by Deputy Voter Registrars. All Precinct Chairs are encouraged to contact the Dallas County Elections Department to become deputized. DallasCountyVotes.org
- **Recruit activists and election workers.** Take a community view of the job at hand. Find other informed and active neighbors to join the cause.
- **Attend Executive Committee meetings.** You are a voting member of the DCRP Executive Committee. Attending meetings will keep you informed and help you build relationships with other Republican leaders. Your presence counts towards a quorum enabling official business to be conducted (the Election Code prohibits proxy voting.) Meetings are usually scheduled for the 3rd Monday of the month.
- **Attend training meetings.** DCRP arranged several training opportunities in 2016. Join the dallasgop.org email list to stay informed of future events.
- **Lead your Precinct Organization.** Stay in touch with your volunteers
- **Inform your constituents** of candidate needs, Republican party and Republican club events, and other opportunities for involvement.



January through March 2018 - PRIMARY SEASON

- **GOTV Canvass for the 2018 Primary Election** (and **May 22 Runoff** if applicable.)
Note: Neither the Election Code nor RPT Rules prohibit a Precinct Chair from endorsing or working for a contested Primary candidate, but some Precinct Chairs prefer to stay neutral during the Primary Season.
- **Work the Polls.** Primary Elections tend to have the highest Republican voter turnout. This will give you the opportunity to meet your constituents personally.
- **Participate in local Convention activity**, including Precinct Convention (TBD) and Senate District Convention (**March 24**)

May through September 2018 - VOTER ID SEASON

- **Organize your Precinct** (see pages 9-10)
- **Canvass the Precinct: Voter ID Walks** (see pages 11-14)
- **Energize Republicans: Get them together** (see page 16)
- **Attend Scheduled Executive Committee Meetings (generally 3rd Monday)**
- **Attend State Convention in San Antonio June 14-16**

October through November 6, 2018 - PEAK CAMPAIGN SEASON

- **Complete GOTV Canvass** (see page 18)
- **Lead DCRP Victory 2018 campaign and GOTV efforts in your precinct.**
- **Be available on Election Day, November 6** to serve as a judge or clerk for your precinct's polling place. Contact elections@dallasgop.org
- **Attend Scheduled Executive Committee Meetings.**

January through November, 2019 - MUNICIPAL SEASON

- **Continue engaging neighbors.** Stay informed about the upcoming Municipal Elections and the Candidates.
- **GOTV Canvass for Municipal Elections.** Connect with candidates and volunteer to help reach your precinct.
- **Be available to serve as an Election Worker.** Municipal Elections are run by the Dallas County Elections Department. Contact them directly at (214) 819-6300
- **Attend Scheduled Executive Committee Meetings.**
- **File the SOS Primary Ballot Application.** All Precinct Chair candidates must file the 2020-2022 term to keep the seat. There is no fee for Precinct Chairs, but all applications must be notarized. DCRP will have free notary services available at regularly scheduled September, October, and November Executive Committee Meetings.

GET ORGANIZED

Familiarize yourself with the precinct.

Travel around your precinct and learn its boundaries and characteristics. Knowing your precinct will help you in dividing responsibilities among Block Captains, planning precinct activities, identifying meeting places, determining methods for canvassing and distributing literature.

Organize the precinct.

As a Precinct Chair, DCRP makes several tools available to aid you as you serve.

1. Map of your precinct available online at DallasCountyVotes.org and by written request to DCRP Headquarters.
2. Registered voters list for your precinct is available with GOP Data Center access. Contact DCRP to request an access login.
3. Digital or hard copy canvassing lists (“walk lists” or “call lists”) providing voter information in street order provided upon request.
4. Sample scripts and talking points for responding to questions are in this guide.
5. All variations of voter registration applications are available at DCRP Headquarters and the Dallas County Elections Department. All Precinct Chairs are encouraged to be Dallas County Deputy Voter Registrars. Details are at DallasCountyVotes.org
6. Volunteer Interest forms are available upon request as a hard copy. Forms should be returned to DCRP. An interactive online form is located at www.DallasGOP.org
7. Yard signs, bumper stickers, and campaign literature as available during peak campaign season.
8. Access to business cards with the official DCRP logo may be purchased for a nominal fee. Contact DCRP for more information. (Precinct Chairs are not required to use the official designed cards. Many retailers provide business card printing services.)

The precinct is the smallest political unit of registered voters. Even so, the typical precinct contains too many voters for one person to work it alone. Recruit volunteers to assist you with canvassing and later with distributing literature.


Begin recruiting a precinct organization by contacting Republicans in your neighborhood that you know, or people with strong Republican voting records. Continue to build the organization over time as you and your team work the precinct. Ideally, you will recruit a Block Captain who lives in or near the particular block assigned to canvass. However, you may certainly use volunteers from outside the precinct if you have family or friends who

wish to help. Do not be reluctant to ask people to help you. That is your job; to ask them to help, to make them feel welcome and important, and to tell them how to do their job.

People will only help if they are asked, and the #1 reason people don't volunteer is because they are never asked to.

DCRP may have email addresses for Republican activists in your precinct or contact information for a local Republican Club. Check with headquarters for this information if it would be useful to you in beginning to build your organization.

Below is a suggested organizational chart:



Note: *The above is one method of organization. Adjust it to accommodate your precinct. The Precinct Captain level may be unnecessary, or you may need more Precinct or Block Captains.*

Meet as necessary with your precinct organization to ensure each volunteer knows his assigned block or area, knows how to perform his duties, and has the necessary tools - particularly the canvass list for the block or area assigned. With GOP Data Center access, you are able to compile lists customized for your precinct and keep a master file. Check in with your team regularly until they have completed their lists and have **personally visited** and spoken with someone at each household. Keep your organization inspired, knowledgeable, and accountable. If any fails to perform, work to find him support or appoint a successor or replacement.

For any canvassing you assign to be done after Labor Day in election years, we suggest giving volunteers two weeks to complete their work and a clear deadline for completing it. Be sure all Voter ID Canvass work is done in time to register new voters so they can vote in Primary and General Elections. Voter Registration forms must be received at the Elections Department 30 days before the election. DallasCountyVotes.org will list deadlines for each election as well as all other important election deadlines.

ENERGIZE THE PRECINCT

Beyond door-to-door canvassing, precinct chairs must energize the precinct in general. Below are some suggestions for keeping the precincts active.

Hold Meet-and-greets.

Hold coffee meetings or yard parties for Republicans. Bringing Republicans together gets them excited, promotes accountability among the grassroots to get our candidates elected, and may produce new volunteers. If possible, arrange for a Republican official or candidate to attend your events.

Event invitations should be sent out about two weeks in advance. Turnout will be higher if you follow up by phone on your invitations. Be clear about your intentions with the event. Inform invitees if the event will be a fundraiser for a candidate.

Prepare a sign-in sheet with spaces for name, phone numbers, and email address. (If a candidate is attending they may want this information as well.) Provide name tags, Volunteer Interest forms, campaign materials, and a basket for donations if appropriate. You may need to ask the first question to get things moving and facilitate discussion.

Make an email distribution list of addresses collected from Precinct Republicans.

Email your constituents regarding upcoming Party events, candidate information, etc.

Host a precinct specific website or Facebook group. For many people today, social media interaction is a daily occurrence. Take advantage of that to post quotes, share posts from DCRP and also Republican candidates and officeholders.

FOLLOW-UP WORK OF THE PRECINCT CHAIR

Register Voters.

A high priority for expanding our base! Must register 30 days before an election to vote. Voter registration applications available at DCRP HQ or the Dallas County Elections Department. Note, you may not directly process Voter Registration applications unless you are a Deputy Voter Registrar. We recommend becoming a Deputy Voter Registrar so you can personally register new voters (requires a trip to Elections Department).

Keep Voter Lists current.

DCRP relies on each Precinct Chair to identify Republicans in the precinct. Please update GOP Data Center or sync data on Advantage or send data to info@dallasgop.org

Connect Voters with applicable DCRP Minority Engagement Directors.

Republican activists who wish to help cultivate Republicans from among specific groups should reach out to DCRP. The Republican Party of Texas has established Engagement Directors for a cohesive effort across the state.

Voter Questions.

Make sure you follow through to provide help or information that was not available during initial conversation.

Undecided Voters.

Keep in touch with undecided voters. Provide literature on GOP candidates. A personal note from the Precinct Chair about our candidates with a sheet comparing the candidates' stances on issues will be helpful to undecided voters.



Willing Election Workers

If a voter has expressed interest in election work, help him make connection with DCRP's Elections Administrator, elections@dallasgop.org or 214-369-9555

New Residents

Welcome new residents to the neighborhood. Introduce yourself as their Republican Precinct Chair. That should start a conversation that you can pursue to determine their political leaning. If they lean Republican, offer to update voter registration for their new location. New Movers lists are available from the Texas GOP quarterly.

HOW TO CANVASS

1. Make contact and have a short, friendly conversation with each voter. If the names on your canvass list are not the correct current resident, get the correct name and phone number if possible.
2. Every survey will have issue identifying questions. This is the most important information we can gather. And is very helpful to share with candidates.
3. When you talk to a Republican supporter or swing voter, ask for phone numbers and email addresses, and note any special interests and/or concerns.
4. When you meet a Republican activist:
 - a. Record email address and phone number(s)
 - b. Record interest in specific volunteer activities and/or working the polls, and relay to DCRP if applicable (use Volunteer Interest form if appropriate.)
 - c. Record willingness to display yard signs.
 - d. Inform them of local Republican Club meetings and upcoming DCRP events.
5. Identify all unregistered Republican supporters and **get them registered.**
6. Note those needing to vote by mail so applications can be quickly sent or delivered.



When the Canvass is completed:

- If using Advantage Mobile, simply Sync data and your done!
- If using paper lists, please manually update records on the Advantage website or appoint a volunteer to manually update records.
- Voter registration cards secured by a Deputy Voter Registrar must be returned to the Dallas County Elections Department by a Registrar within five days of receipt.

When it comes to canvassing, adapt the script provided to suit yourself. Make it natural and easy. Remember to give the other person a chance to talk. LISTEN.

KNOW THE PRECINCT: VOTER ID CANVASS

Your objective is to maximize the Republican vote. You'll be more effective in increasing Republican turnout if you start identifying Republicans through canvassing now. Canvassing is simply connecting with your neighbors individually. The purpose of a Voter ID Canvass is to identify voters and potential voters in your precinct through direct engagement.

Why Canvassing is important

Canvassing is the most accurate method of identifying a person's political leaning. An effective and efficient GOTV (Get Out The Vote) effort is dependent on an accurate and complete Voter ID Canvass. We can turn Republicans out to vote with a GOTV Canvass, but only if we know *who* to turn out.



The Precinct Chair and his organization use canvassing to identify Republicans and like-minded supporters within the precinct. Therefore it is often called “**voter identification**” or “**voter ID.**”

Using Advantage Mobile Voter Contact, your precinct canvass information is shared directly with DCRP and GOP Data Center. This will allow the party to build a real grassroots membership and funding base, as well as an accurate database for communications.

Canvassing Methods

Traditional methods include door-to-door contact (which is best, where permissible) and telephoning. Correspondence, email, and websites are proving to be more effective in some areas, especially in gated communities.

Canvassing in high-density complexes

Rules may disallow knocking on doors in facilities such as apartment buildings. In this case, try organizing an on-site gathering for resident Republicans. If possible, reserve the facility's event room for a coffee or reception. Post notices in appropriate places, such as the community bulletin boards and laundry rooms. Publicize the event in the community's newsletter. Try to find Republicans who have lived in the facility for a long time and may have resident's phone numbers and email addresses for communications. Begin recruiting floor or wing captains from initial participants and build your network.

VOTER ID CANVASS SCRIPT

“Hello, my name is _____. I’m taking a Neighborhood survey. As you know, it is crucial to participate in the election process. I am out today to see if we can count on your support to vote a straight Republican ticket in the next election?”

If NO, thank the survey-taker for their time and say goodbye.

If Republican supporter, continue:

“If you had to choose, what would you say is the number one issue facing Texas?”

Record response. If the voter is stumped, you may suggest the following top 5 issues : Spending and Reducing Debt, Educating our Children, Securing our border and National Security, Repealing Obamacare, and Defending our Second Amendment Rights.

“Is your voter registration up to date with this address? / What about others members of your household?”

Provide voter registration forms. If you are a Deputy Voter Registrar, collect the voter registration card before you leave.

NEVER mention registration to a person who is not interested in supporting Republican candidates.

“Are you interested in becoming more involved in the Republican Party?”

If yes, explore particular interests in volunteering, working the polls, displaying yard signs, joining a Republican club, etc.)

“May I record your email address so Dallas County GOP can send you important information during this important campaign cycle?”

Record information. Precinct Chair or Precinct Captain should send to info@dallasgop.org

Thank them for their time, and move on. Goal is no more than five minutes at any residence.

GET OUT THE VOTE (GOTV)

Expect GOTV activities to include at least one literature drop, at least one canvass, and up to 3 phone calls per Republican household in your precinct. Each contact is purposed to urge them to **vote a straight Republican ticket!**

Remember, GOTV is the most important aspect of your job as a Precinct Chair., If you do not deliver your precinct votes to the polls, then all the media, walking, and canvassing will have been in vain.

THANK YOUR WORKERS! Be sure to thank your workers in writing. Everyone appreciates a handwritten note and it will leave a good impression you can rely upon next election cycle. Be informed of victory celebrations on Election Night and invite your volunteers!

Here is a general GOTV plan for precinct engagement. Adapt it to your needs.

Precinct Chair Duties:

1. Plan GOTV walks beginning before Early Voting opens.
2. Coordinate with the campaign office of candidates for your precinct to maximize all GOTV efforts and arrange for yard sign delivery.
3. Assign Letter Writers, Phone Callers, Block Captains, and other volunteers duties.
4. Prepare a Vote Straight Ticket/Republican/Down Ballot script for Letter Writers.
5. Prepare a list of Republicans that will volunteer to provide transportation to the polls and assign someone to schedule this work

Letter Writers Duties:

1. This is a great opportunity for senior citizens in your precinct that would like to still be involved in the political process. The statistics show that a high percentage of people still look through their mail and even higher rate will open a handwritten note. This is perfect for the straight ticket message.
2. Supply or take donations of stationery and stamps to provide letter writer supplies
3. Letter Writers simply write the pre scripted message on the stationery, address, stamp and mail.
4. Use GOP Data Center lists for names and addresses of Republican voters in the precinct.



GOTV CANVASS PHONE SCRIPT

Your telephone callers should call each voter as often as time allows. Each person already having voted should be stricken from the list. It is best to divide your list and designate one person to manage each section. This will help keep over calling to a minimum. Since you will be calling several times on Election Day, it is best not to name a specific candidate and instead to push for voting for all Republican candidates. The campaigns are usually calling voters as wells.

1 During the first few days of Early Voting, call Republican voters with this message:

PHONE CALLER:

“Hello, Ms. Smith. This is _____, and I am a volunteer with the Dallas County Republican Party. I am calling to remind you that Early Voting for the general election is open from ___ to __. The closest Early Voting location is _____. Please remember to vote straight Republican, as it is the easiest way to support all our Republican candidates.”

Note: Remember to keep your ears open for people willing to help at the polls on election day and communicate this to DCRP headquarters.

2 Three nights leading to Election Day, call from 5:30 PM to 9:00 PM to follow up with:

PHONE CALLER:

“Hello, Mrs. Smith. This is _____. I am calling to remind you to vote in the election on _____. I want to let you know that your polling place is _____. Will you need a ride to the polls? We’ll be glad to have someone call you and make arrangements.”

VOTER: “Yes” or “no.”

Note: There may be other telephone calls being made from the various candidates’ campaign organizations. Do not let this interfere with your GOTV effort.

3 On Election Day, each favorable voter should be called again.

PHONE CALLER: “Mrs. Smith, we’re calling to see if anyone in your household needs assistance in getting to the polls.”

If they have not voted yet, remind them that the polls close at 7:00 PM. If they say they have voted, thank them and hang up.

WALK THE PRECINCT: GOTV CANVASS

Canvassing is the critical duty of the Republican Precinct Organization

It is the privilege of the Precinct Chair and the Republican Precinct Organization to personally meet and know the voters in the area. Visit in person if possible. Go house-to-house and have a short, friendly visit with each voter. Don't argue issues or candidates. You'll lose more votes by saying too much than by saying too little. BE SAFE: Block Workers should travel in pairs.

Purpose GOTV Canvass:

- Identify voters supporting Republican candidates
- Make sure all voters supporting Republican candidates are registered to vote
- Distribute campaign material for Republican candidates
- Locate Republican voters requiring Absentee Ballot Applications
- Pinpoint ideal yard sign locations
- Remind GOP supporters of the importance of voting and of **voting down ballot**

Materials and Supplies to take:

1. Prepared walk list for assigned area, in order by street address.
2. Map for Block Workers especially if they do not live in the area.
3. Instruction sheet with script.
4. Voter registration cards.
5. Times and locations for Early Voting and Election Day.
6. Ballot-by-mail applications and knowledge of filing deadlines.
7. Dallas GOP Volunteer Interest Forms
8. Campaign materials, including bumper stickers.

Canvassing Tips

- Engage neighbors in the late afternoon and early evening on weekdays and early afternoon on Sunday. These are the optimal times for canvassing.
- Work with another Republican. Knock on doors together, work opposite sides of the street, or "leap-frog" around each other as you work the street.
- Be prepared with a script, list, clipboard, paper, and a few pens to take notes during or immediately after each visit.
- Remember, you are representing Republicans in appearance and behavior. Hats and sunglasses are discouraged and lower the door open rate. Smile and be pleasant.
- Listen. Don't argue. You are not trying to convert anyone at this point, yet be ready to persuade others by being up on your facts.

GOTV CANVASS WALK SCRIPT

1. Execute at least one canvass with candidate literature before Early Voting begins
2. Complete at least on literature drop with Election times, dates, and location

- The Second Amendment acts as a safeguard to the power of the federal government

Tax Reform

- Lower the Burden: Tax relief would help middle class families and small businesses
- Simplify Tax Code: The tax code has increased so much in length and complexity that hundreds of instruction pages are necessary to file even the most basic tax returns
- Economic Growth: The U.S. has the highest corporate tax rate among advanced economies, resulting in businesses leaving for countries with better tax codes
