

Tender Care Actions over Past Week

Minimize interaction – Social distancing, hand washing and masks are critical. Colorado is on increase 444/day, Larimer County also increasing daily with Variance at risk - slides 11, 12, 13 and 14.

Testing is available in all counties. CDC put out new guidelines for discontinuing isolation using both Time and Testing – slides 5,6,7 and 8.

Masks, social distancing and handwashing are central concepts to managing protection from virus. Mask mandate in place across state starting 07/17. For everyone over age 11. Effective until mid August. Use a headband with buttons to reduce ear tension – slide 10.

Risk assessment and notification – Temperature assessment in all homes. Consider purchasing eye protection that is comfortable for your own use. Prepare for Fall.


Home care nursing families Private Duty Nursing (PDN) homes- Cases on hold. School districts have not established Fall schedule. Parents continue to restrict staff to 'TCPS' only, not employed at medical centers.

United States at the 4 month mark

- 3.5 million confirmed COVID-19 cases, according to Johns Hopkins University, one in 100 Americans testing positive for the virus
- The COVID Tracking Project reported on July 16, a record number of 71,229 new cases in the U.S.
- Florida recently hit a record of 15,000 cases in one day.
- Arizona's seven-day average test positivity rate hit almost 25%.
- New York was under a stay-at-home order from late March through early June and is going through a slow, phased reopening, with each region having to meet infection gating criteria.
- Earlier in July, Connecticut reported zero coronavirus deaths for the first time since March.
- According to the COVID Tracking Project, on July 16, states reported a total of 977 deaths, which is the highest it's been since May 29.
 Patients hospitalized with COVID-19 also rose to levels that haven't been seen since April 23.



CDC Changes Guidelines

- For Persons Who have NOT had COVID-19 Symptoms but Tested Positive and are Under Isolation. There are now 2 options, Time and Test based strategies to discontinue isolation.

- Symptom-based criteria were modified as follows:
 - Changed from "at least 72 hours" to "at least 24 hours" have passed since last fever without the use of fever-reducing medications
 - Changed from "improvement in respiratory symptoms" to "improvement in symptoms" to address expanding list of symptoms associated with COVID-19.



Persons with laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 who have not had any symptoms - TEST Based

Can discontinue isolation when:

- Negative results of an FDA Emergency Use Authorized COVID-19 molecular assay for detection of SARS-CoV-2 RNA from at least two consecutive respiratory specimens collected ≥24 hours apart (total of two negative specimens).

Persons with laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 who have not had any symptoms – TIME based

Can discontinue isolation when:

- At least 10 days have passed since the date of their first positive COVID-19 diagnostic test assuming they have not subsequently developed symptoms since their positive test. If they develop symptoms, then the symptombased or test-based strategy should be used.

For Tender Care Staff in direct client contact

- For certain populations, a longer timeframe after recovery may be desired to minimize the chance of prolonged shedding of replication-competent virus. Such persons include:
 - healthcare personnel in close contact with vulnerable persons at high-risk for illness and death if those persons get COVID-19


Larimer County – cases on increase


- Larimer County 23 new cases July 18, 2020
- Since July 4, Larimer has reported 263 new cases. On three days -- July 12, 15 and 16 -- the new cases were more than 30.
- LCPH indicated contract tracing showed much of the spread was connected to large gatherings.
- Variance is at risk due to increase in cases

ANALYSIS: COUNTIES WITH & WITHOUT ORDERS

Survey	Metric	Counties with No Mask Order	Counties w/ Some Mask Order
R&SP Survey (May 15 - Jun 7)	Mask-Wearing	67%	83%
CDPHE Survey (Jun 15 - Jun 25)	Mask-Wearing	49%	57%
	Maintaining 6-Feet	80%	83%

Both surveys show higher rates of mask-wearing in counties with mask orders (16% and 8% higher)

ANALYSIS: COVID-19 SPREAD

From May 20 to June 3		
Counties with full mask orders:	-20% COVID-19 Growth	
Counties where some cities have mask orders:	-37% COVID-19 Growth	
Other Counties	+15% COVID-19 Growth	

From June 19 to July 3	
Counties with full mask orders:	+27% COVID-19 Growth
Counties where some cities have mask orders:	+48% COVID-19 Growth
Other Counties	+49% COVID-19 Growth



Testing

- Colorado's "positivity rate" is about 4%, which means that about 4% of all tests come back positive.
- World Health Organization
 (WHO)'s goal is for states to have a positivity rate of less than 5%.
 The more we test, the more we can make informed decisions. Get tested 7 days after you may have been exposed or if you have symptoms.






Colorado COVID Symptom Support tool







