Rules and Regulations:

Intending exhibitors are particularly requested to read these regulations as they will be strictly enforced.

1. Entries in writing, which must be on the Society's printed form, must be lodged with the Secretary before 4pm

Thursday 3rd March 2016

2. Any official acting on behalf of the A. & P. Society will have the power to accept late entries under special conditions.

3. All exhibits must be bona-fide property of the exhibitors at the time of entry, except where otherwise stated. Exhibitors of stock will furnish full particulars as to Age, Pedigree and Breeder's Name (where name is known) and such other information as the Committee may demand.

4. Proven willful misrepresentation of Exhibits will not merely forfeit the prize, but will render the Exhibitor liable to be disqualified from exhibiting at future shows of the Society. The onus of proof of the bona fides of Exhibitors will rest upon the Exhibitor.

5. The subscription fee for Members shall be \$18.00 which will admit one Member and one Guest or one Member and his/her immediate family (wife/ husband and children up to 12 years). Subscription fee for Single Members shall be \$10.00 and will admit one person only.

6. Entry fees \$1.00 per entry for the first 10 entries. All entries thereafter free. Horse and cattle entry fees as stated in the appropriate sections.

7. All Exhibits must be on the ground by 9:30am on the day of the Show. Pavilion Exhibits will also be received on the afternoon of the day preceding the Show up to 3:00pm

8. The Judge's awards must be copied correctly into a register for that purpose. The Committee having the power to make such alterations or additions to them as they may see expedient. No Exhibitor shall have any claim to any prize until the same is finally awarded by the Committee and no exhibitor shall under any circumstances have the right of action of law suit for any prize.

9. Should there be any reasonable suspect that an exhibit is either diseased or dangerous, then the Committee reserves the right of ordering its removal from, and/or refusing admission to the Show ground.

10. The Society will not be responsible for any accident that may be caused through, or by any exhibit. Each exhibitor shall hold the Society blameless, arising from any accident, loss or damage or non- delivery of any Exhibit.

11. The Judges are empowered to withhold prizes in any section where the exhibits are unworthy.

12. Protests with \$50.00 deposit, which may be forfeited if the protest deemed frivolous, must be lodged with the Secretary before 4:30pm on the day of the Show, to be dealt with by the Committee.

13. Exhibits shall not be removed before 4pm on the day of the Show, except as the Committee may direct.

14. The Committee will give every possible facility to Exhibitors and every care shall be taken of exhibits, but no responsibility will be incurred by the Society.

15. No tents, booths or hawkers will be allowed on the ground without permission of the Secretary, and no person shall make any collection on the Show Ground for any object, except with the written consent of the President.

16. The Committee reserves the right to alter or omit any item from the program, and also to postpone or alter dates of, or to cancel the Show, should same become necessary, and the Committee incurs no responsibility or liability by reason of such action.

17. All yearling prize winners to be lead in Grand Parade.

18. All cheques to be presented before 31st March 2016

19. Pavilion prize money shall be available at the Secretary's Office on Show Day. It may be collected from 4:00pm onwards.

20. The Society shall be under no obligation to forward any prize money not collected on Show Day.

21. Prize money not claimed within 7 days of Show will be forfeited.

22. A Public Liability Insurance fee of \$12.00 is payable by all occupiers of trade space who do not have their own insurance cover. Entry fee in animal classes includes the insurance levy.

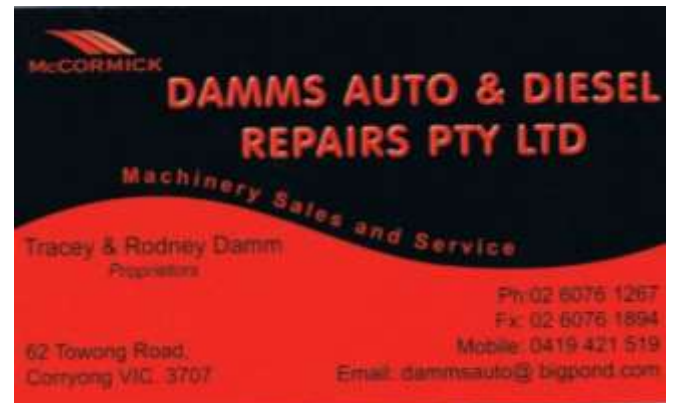

Horse Events

Regulations

1. Competitors taking part in any Show Competitions do so at their own risk.
2. The Society cannot accept responsibility if the judging happens to conflict with one or more classes of events. Judging will be in the order it appears in the Schedule.
3. Competitors will not be permitted to compete unless entry ticket is produced.
4. No entry allowed to enter inner ring after commencement of judging
5. Random swabbing may take place.
6. Medication control may take place in accordance with the Equestrian Australia Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Regulations (first edition effective 5th of April 2010 and updates) and they Equestrian Australia Medication Control System and Swabbing Policy (1st of January 2015).
7. The Official Measuring Steward will be available on request.
8. Breeding year dates from 1st August.
9. A competitor receiving a championship in any one ring is ineligible from competing in any other ring.
10. Show hunters are ponies, Galloways and hacks with more substance than the modern riding pony and show hack but still maintaining quality. They are expected to move freely at all paces. Show hunters are at any time expected to gallop for the judge. Show Hunters are not expected to jump
11. Competitors not parading will forfeit their prize money and championship award and their performance will not be recorded with the E.F.A or R.A.S

Any rider under the age of 18 years, riding a horse at an EFA or affiliated event, must wear protective headgear to the current Australian, European or American Standard. The retaining hardness must be secured and fastened at all times.

Riders without approved head gear shall be ineligible to compete until rectified. This rule applies to all events, not just under age competition.

Entry fee includes Insurance Levy to cover exhibitors for Public Liability Insurance. Exhibitors must complete Insurance Form and Privacy Statement before competing.

VAS Ltd Rich Fruit Cake Competition

Here's what you need:

250g sultanas

250g chopped raisins

250g currants

125g chopped mixed peel

90g chopped red glace cherries

90g chopped blanched almonds

1/3 cup sherry or brandy

250g plain flour

60g self-raising flour

¼ teaspoon grated nutmeg

½ teaspoon ginger

½ teaspoon ground cloves

250g butter

250g soft brown sugar

½ teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind

½ teaspoon almond essence

½ teaspoon vanilla essence

4 large eggs.

Here's what you do:

Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately with the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.

Place the mixture into prepared tin 20cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3 ½- 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Hot tip:

To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size, it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4 or 6 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3 or 4 pieces.

Fruit cakes to be presented on foil covered board.

VAS Ltd Boiled Fruit Cake Junior Competition

Entrants 18 years and under on day of show. The following recipe is compulsory for all entrants

Ingredients

375g Mixed Fruit

1 teaspoon mixed spice

125g butter

½ teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

2 tablespoons of marmalade

1 cup plain flour
¾ cup brown sugar
½ cup water
½ cup sherry
2 eggs lightly beaten
1 cup self raising flour
¼ teaspoon salt

Method

Place the mixed fruit, sugar, spice, water and butter in a large saucepan and bring to boil.

Simmer gently for 3 minutes, then remove from stove, add bicarb soda and allow to cool.

Add sherry, eggs and marmalade, mixing well.

Fold in the sifted dry ingredients then place in a greased and lined 20cm round cake tin.

Bake in a moderately slow oven for 1.5 hours or until cooked when tested.

This recipe is to be used for Section SC Class 28.

Preheat oven to 170°C (a moderate oven). Grease a 20cm (base) round cake pan lightly with oil, and line with non-stick baking paper. Peel and grate the carrots, and set aside.

Sift the flours, bicarbonate of soda and cinnamon into a large bowl.

Put the brown sugar, oil, golden syrup, eggs and vanilla into a separate bowl. Use a balloon whisk to mix until combined.

Pour the oil mixture into the dry ingredients. Use a wooden spoon to stir gently until just combined.

Stir in the grated carrot and walnuts.

Pour the mixture into the pan and bake for 1 hour. Set aside for 5 minutes, before turning out onto a wire rack to cool completely.

1 cup coarsely grated carrot
Cup canola oil
¾ cup orange juice

Method

Heat oven to 190°C (moderately hot)

Line and spray a 12 hole muffin pan with large paper cases

Sift dry ingredients into a large bowl; stir in dates, carrots. Then add the combined marmalade, oil, eggs, juice and milk. Mix until just combined.

Spoon mixture evenly into prepared pan holes.

Cook for 20 minutes. To test muffins are cooked, insert cake skewer, if it comes out clean the muffins are ready.

Stand muffins in pan for 5 minutes then turn out onto wire rack to cool.
