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MONUMENTAL DEDICATION

Daniel Boone Restored, Unveiled & Re-Hidden

On June 4, exactly 80 years to the day after its original dedication by the Western High School History Club, the restored Daniel Boone monument was rededicated and unveiled on the grounds of Duke Ellington School of the Arts. The restored monument houses two brand-new plaques. The larger one is an exact replica of the original plaque presented to Western High School on May 11, 1926, just 3 years after the start of the Burleith development by Shannon and Luchs. The smaller plaque, an updated version of the original, describes the monument's history and restoration.

Since the restoration, the monument has generated a number of comments from passersby, some who fondly remember the original monument before its two plaques

A number of significant events have happened in the past several months. The **restored Daniel Boone monument** was dedicated on June 4 at a ceremony on the grounds of Duke Ellington School of the Arts. Many thanks to Ross Schipper, the architect of this effort, and his team for all of their hard work.

More than 100 people attended our **wonderful annual picnic** on June 21 at Whitehaven Park. We were thrilled by the turnout, which included our colleagues from GU, ANC 2E and city council leaders, and neighbors from Foxhall and Georgetown. BCA board member Kay Twomey orchestrated this fun event with her customary flair.

The **signing of the agreement** (see sidebar) between Duke Ellington and the surrounding communities took place on August 1 on the front lawn of the school. ANC 2E commissioner Ed Solomon is chairing an **Ellington construction committee** made up of residents who live near the school. Representing Burleith are Nan Coughlin (nan.coughlin@mac.com), Dan Herlihy (dan_herlihy@yahoo.com), Ed Ohl (edohl70@gmail.com), and Lesli Mangeri.

The BCA thanks these Burleithians for agreeing to sit on this important committee. (You may contact them via email.) The first meeting was held on August 28 and attended by Burleith's four members and representatives from the construction group GCS/Sigal, DC Department of General Services, Georgetown, and the Cloisters. Issues raised included parking and current barriers on R Street; truck entrances, exits, and routes; truck beeping; dust control; and the need for a construction schedule. Construction hours are 7 am to 7 pm, with work underway Monday through Saturday. The construction group pledged to work closely with the community and to resolve issues as quickly as possible. The committee's community members will act as gatekeepers for the neighborhood. A community meeting will be held in the near future to report on progress.

The BCA board has begun the challenging but exciting work of creating a **new website** with the help of board members Linda Brooks, Ann Carper, and Rich Field and BCA webmaster Ross Schipper. William Nutt, a new Burleith neighbor who works in website design, development, and marketing, has generously agreed to advise us. We plan to launch the new site in time for the BCA annual meeting in November. Stay tuned.

As we resume our work, school, and retirement routines, I wish everyone a pleasant fall and invite your views on any issues that affect life in Burleith.

On August 1, Duke Ellington School of the Arts and the neighboring community signed an agreement that addresses uses of a proposed rooftop space at the renovated school and other issues of mutual concern. The agreement covers use of a designated rooftop space for some teaching and possibly other activities, under agreed-upon conditions that include sound limitations (no audible sound beyond the school property line) and the maximum number of participants (45 students plus teachers for rooftop teaching).

The agreement also created the Ellington Community Partnership (ECP), which will provide a collegial forum to address rooftop and other possible issues, such as parking during performances. Co-chaired by Ellington head of school John Payne and a community member selected by ANC 2E, the ECP will draw members from Ellington and the surrounding community. The agreement is available on the Department of General Services website.

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School Boundaries Update

On August 21, Mayor Vincent Gray authorized boundary changes to go into effect for the 2015–16 school year. Some of the more exotic proposals (choice sets) appear to have been scrapped and the traditional model of geographically assigned schools from elementary to secondary has been maintained. Nevertheless, more than one third of DCPS students live in re-zoned areas.

Residents of Burleith and Hillandale have been re-zoned to Hyde-Addison ES in Georgetown (3219 O Street, NW) and out of Stoddert ES in Glover Park (4001 Calvert Street, NW), which has been the assigned elementary school for approximately 25 years. Hardy MS and Wilson HS will remain the middle and high school options. Children currently at Stoddert would remain. Curiously, several other neighborhoods presently in the Key ES boundary were originally slated to move into the Hyde-Addison boundary to increase the latter's catchment area. All of these proposed changes have been dropped—only Burleith-Hillandale will be moved.

A BCA survey in the spring showed strong support to keep Burleith in the Stoddert boundary, a position that was also endorsed by a June 2014 ANC 2E motion. Academically, Stoddert is one of the strongest

DCPS elementary schools and has a high number of in-boundary students. Stoddert, however, is currently over-crowded. Beautifully renovated in 2010 to accommodate 320 students, it is projected to have approximately 100 more than that this school year. Over the summer, DCPS installed 6 temporary classrooms in the parking lot to alleviate the space constraint (reducing parking from 40 to 10 spots).

There is still some uncertainty about the changes. First, because of the renovation of the Hyde-Addison building, the changes for Burleith would not occur until at least the 2016–17 school year (and there could be further delays). Second, Muriel Bowser and David Catania, two leading candidates in the November 4 mayoral election, have both said they would like to slow down the process. On August 26, Bowser even stated that she opposes the plan as it is currently configured.

In sum, the situation is still in flux and there could be more modifications before the changes take effect. The BCA is closely monitoring the situation and, as always, would love to hear from you via bca@burleith.org. (Please put "School boundaries" in the subject line.)

Cloisters of Georgetown. The ECP will be co-chaired by John Payne, the new head of school at Ellington. John assumes this role after 20 years as the school's dean of students and may be reached at John.payne2@dc.go.

The resolution of the use of the rooftop design element was a compromise between two competing, but equally legitimate interests: the interests of nearby residents in the quiet enjoyment of their homes and Ellington's interest in making the best use of its renovated facility for the benefit of Ellington students. The compromise required Ellington to agree to strict limitations on what use can be made of the rooftop, and the times such uses are permitted. Ellington intends to abide by the commitments made in the agreement. However, in reaching this compromise, Ellington representatives believed—and believe still—that a broader array of uses could be made of the rooftop without disturbing the surrounding neighbors. We look forward to engaging in discussions with the ECP to persuade the group that the quiet enjoyment of neighboring residents will not be jeopardized by relaxing the restrictions on rooftop uses.

In the near term, the focus of the neighborhood groups and Ellington will be elsewhere. Local residents will understandably be interested in how the construction is carried out and what impacts there will be on the community. Fortunately, the Department of General Services (DGS) has extensive experience

with managing school renovations and, in conjunction with construction contractor GCS-Sigal, LLC, is expected to address community impact issues. As for Ellington, we will have our hands full with managing the challenges of two locations in the Shaw neighborhood, one for academics and one for the arts, separated by several blocks. We hope to make the most of our temporary location and continue to meet the needs of Ellington students.

We should not let these immediate concerns delay the initiation of the ECP, however. We are ready to discuss a date for an inaugural meeting this fall in order to set the structure for future talks. While substantive discussions on some operational issues may have to await Ellington's return to the neighborhood, it is important to get the partnership off to a good start.

In the meantime, Ellington invites our neighbors to events that are being planned for the upcoming school year. We will provide an update on those events later in the year, and we hope you will be able to join us from time to time. We will be working hard to preserve the high standards of one of the premier arts education high schools in the country and to maintain strong ties to our friends and neighbors in Burleith, Georgetown, and the Cloisters.

A Great Start to the New School Year

On August 25, an outstanding staff was more than ready to welcome this year's Hardy Middle School (HMS) students back to class. This year promises to be a refreshing and brilliant time thanks to the summer-long efforts of the "Hardy Family" of teachers, administrative team, front office, and parent volunteers. HMS had a wonderful first week. After the first day, enrollment was already at 90 percent! Along with our partnership with the NOAA Center for Atmospheric Sciences, our science department is getting an infusion of major STEM action with Project Lead The Way coursework.

Next month we will celebrate World Space Week (October 6–10), Family Science Night in partnership with the Georgetown Department of Neuroscience (October 22), and our Second Annual Trick-or-Treat Street (October 30). The monument once again honors an icon of our nation's history and stands as a symbol of the pioneer spirit of discovery.

In addition, it could not have been accomplished without help from Catherine Hoffmann (curator of the Davidson County Historical Museum, in NC, which loaned an original Boone plaque used in the replication process), Clayton "Corky" Gray (a gifted fiberglass artisan

disappeared and some who had wondered about the significance of the barren four-ton granite monolith sitting on the southeast corner of the Ellington campus. The restored monument is currently hidden from view by a large wooden fence erected as part of Ellington's modernization, an effort that should take about two years. Perhaps the fence will be removed and the monument will once again be unveiled in time for the 90th anniversary of the original plaque's presentation.

A project of the Burleith History Group, the Daniel Boone monument restoration received generous financial support from the Burleith Community Fund and the Western High School Alumni Association. In

Restaurant Review: Dumplings & Beyond

Our neighborhood Far Eastern restaurants have been a-changing. Sushi-Ko, with its innovative red wine program accompanying Japanese dishes, closed last year. We'll still be able to dine on Chef Koji Terano's cooking when he opens two Japanese restaurants in Georgetown next spring. In the meantime, the Sushi-Ko space is occupied by Sushi-Keiko.

Shanghai Lounge Asian Fusion & Bar has change management and menus. It has broadened its menu to include ramen and a greater variety of dishes. The restaurant's dumplings continue to be delicate and delicious, and its scallion pancake is excellent.

Dumplings & Beyond has done more than change its menu. Since last spring, the restaurant, formerly Shanghai Tea House, has been under new ownership as well as management. The restaurant is located up one flight of outdoor stairs. The space is narrow and spare. Service is prompt and very courteous.

As the name suggests, Dumplings & Beyond specializes in "hand crafted" dumplings. The dumplings come in portions of 10 pieces priced at \$8.95 or \$9.50, depending on the ingredients. They are prepared with different meat and vegetable fillings, such as beef and onion, shrimp and chives, pork and Napa cabbage, or with a purely vegetarian filling.

We tried the pork and chive dumplings and found them a bit on the doughy side, although the filling was tasty. Pan fried dumplings, on the other hand, are very good. Unlike the hand-crafted round dumplings, the pan fried dumplings are half-moon shaped, lighter, and more fragrant. They come six to an order for \$6.50.

The same applies to the appetizer of scallion pancakes. While the version at Dumplings & Beyond is flavorful, the pancakes are thick, heavy, and somewhat greasy.

Aside from the usual egg drop and hot and sour soups, the restaurant prepares several soups to be shared by the table.

Main courses are the standard Chinese menu items, ranging from ginger scallion shrimp or scallops to General Tso's orange chicken. Some more unusual dishes are chili chicken, Sichuan spicy beef or fish boil, meatball casserole, and scrambled egg and tomato. The Mongolian stir-fried beef was disappointing. The beef was tough and the dish was spicy in part, while other parts were bland.

Lack of flavor was also a problem with a dish of house special rice noodles. A mound of thin rice noodles is topped with slivers of chicken, beef, green beans, carrots, bean sprouts, egg, and onions. No spices, sauce, or flavoring are added. Apparently, what makes the dish "house special," is the mixture of meats and vegetables. As in the Mongolian beef dish, the bits of beef were tough.

The restaurant has a Monday-to-Friday lunch special of such dishes as sesame chicken, Kung Pao chicken, or lo mein for \$7.95. Dishes are served with hot and sour soup and white rice.

Dumplings & Beyond does not have a wine or liquor license and is not optimistic about obtaining one in the near future. Various teas and sodas are available. It offers delivery within a 3-mile radius with a \$25 minimum order.
