POSITION SUMMARY

In partnership with the Confluence Environmental Center, AmeriCorps Program and PCC, the Member's goal is to establish and support institutional systems to get healthy food, including fresh produce, to students with low-income and their families. Additionally, they will serve to bring awareness of food insecurity and develop leadership to address these systemic conditions. The Member's time with PCC will be split into 3 complimentary parts, related to food insecurity for PCC students.

- 1. The Member will address underlying components of systemic food insecurity at PCC and create meaningful change by helping instructors integrate food security topics into curriculum, developing educational programs, and supporting student initiatives (25%).
- 2. Support students in need through collaboration with PCC resources, and external resources like Oregon Food Bank and Partners for Hunger Free Oregon (30%).

3. Develop and lead educational activities that utilize Portland Community College's well established Learning Gardens, focusing on both food production and food growing education (25%).

Additionally, the Member will participate in Confluence led leadership development activities which include: Leadership Development Series, completing a Change Agent Project, team meetings, National Service events and other self-directed development opportunities (20%).

ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS (to include, but not limited to):

- Facilitate daily Learning Garden activities such as propagation, planting, maintenance, harvesting food, work parties, and events. This includes remote delivery via Zoom.
- Lead education of growing food, healthy eating and cooking, and personal health by leading outreach activities such as tours and workshops with emphasis on engaging populations in need.
- Serve to create more accessible and equitable garden spaces.
- Design and create outreach materials and weekly newsletter items to market and publicize Learning Garden events and initiatives.
- Recruit a diverse community of faculty and students to become leaders and change agents for their PCC communities around food security.
- Collaborate with PCC stakeholders including other campuses' Learning Gardens, PCC faculty, Childcare Center, the Associated Students of PCC, Women's Resource Center, and Multicultural Center to engage and serve nontraditional and untapped student populations on campus.
- Manage, coordinate, and track ongoing data related to food production, compost, volunteer hours and other projects.
- Complete and submit all necessary paperwork and reports in a timely manner; attend and complete all training and service requirements; wear Confluence uniform and/or appropriate identifiers and required safety gear while performing service or attending official events.

POSITION REQUIREMENTS

- Ability to serve remotely and engage audiences through remote tools.
- Excellent organization skills
- Ability and willingness to communicate in a positive, professional manner with a wide range of stakeholders, including students, staff, and college organizations.
- Joyfully serve in the inclement weather; ability to dig, kneel, and lift 40 pounds.
- Willingness/openness to learn about and discuss racial equity and social justice issues.
- Ability to serve independently or as part of a diverse team.
- Regular and reliable attendance and dependability.
- AmeriCorps Members must be: 18 years of age or older at beginning of service term; U.S. citizen, national or lawful
 permanent resident; in possession of a high school diploma or equivalent, or commit to earning one prior to
 receiving education award; able to commit to the full term of service; able to successfully pass a fingerprint criminal
 history background check and satisfactory report from the National Sex Offender Public Website (NSOPW) prior to
 the start of the position.

PREFERRED QUALIFICATIONS

- Attendance at a community college and an Associate's or Bachelor's degree.
- Hands-on experience growing food in a medium-scale garden environment and sustainability background.
- Experience working with issues of food insecurity, diverse cultural populations, people of color, immigrant or refugee populations, or those with limited economic resources.
- Experience planning college level lessons and curriculum.
