### **Art and Ornamentation**

In the past, the relevance of a library was often determined solely by what you found inside the walls. At Slover Library, the structure is at once stunning and architecturally significant, beginning with the outside. A new six-story glass and steel structure sits between and connects to the 19th century-built Seaboard Building and the 20th century-built Selden Arcade. This is, quite honestly, public art worthy of trip in itself. At the top of the new building is art resembling an open book. The Seaboard Building has been masterfully restored and lit, while both the interior and exterior of Slover feature ornamentation by the renowned Kent Bloomer.

### **Technology**

Dust off your notion of libraries as old and stodgy. Slover Library is one of the most technologically advanced libraries in Virginia, patterned after some of the most amazing in the country. The entire building is wired, with Wi-Fi everywhere as well as a digital way-finding system. The public is free to use the computer labs for work and training, search historical documents through digital archives, reserve meeting space, even test your skills in a video gaming room.

### **History at your Fingertips**

There are no rides at Slover Library, but oh the places you can go from here. The Seargeant Memorial Collection, including hundreds of thousands of scanned items from our long ago past, contains the largest repository of this region's history in the world. Want to search your long-passed relatives? You can do that. Curious about baseball in the '40s, music in the '70s or what Norfolk looked like in 1907? You can find all that, too. Just make your way to the 3rd floor to the reading room and wall-mounted touchscreens.

### **Fun for all Ages**

There is no age limit on fun or curiosity, so there's something here for everyone here. The new building devotes an entire floor to children with books and a Playscape for the very young and, for the progressively older, a KidZone, pre-teen area and Teens space. Depending on age and interests, visitors can explore an art studio, computer lab, study areas, gaming room and more.
