Human and Animal Connections Strengthened in Lake County

Spay and Stay has received a \$10,000 grant from The Chicago Community Trust. The grant will be used to support Spay and Stay's **Kids & Cats** youth outreach program and other community engagement efforts.

Spay and Stay is a not-for-profit organization offering support, services, and community education for humane feral cat population control in Lake County. Utilizing the highly successful method of Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR), Spay and Stay works in partnership with local veterinarians, municipal governments, and dedicated citizens to actively and humanely reduce the Lake County feral cat population. Through its monthly high-volume spay/neuter clinics, Spay and Stay has sterilized, vaccinated, and microchipped 1620 cats to date.

The Humane Society of the United States has estimated that more than 60 million feral cats exist nationwide. It is further estimated that 15-20 thousand reside in Lake County. Spay and Stay recognizes the serious implications of this problem and strives to address related community public health issues as well as the long-term well-being of these cats.

Through this grant, The Chicago Community Trust is expressing its support of Spay and Stay's humane community work as it underscores the importance of pro-active community outreach to foster a connection between humans and animals. The generous funding from the Trust will

enable Spay and Stay to expand its educational programming geared towards responsible pet ownership, humane treatment of animals, and the importance of spay and neuter practices.

More specifically, Spay and Stay's **Kids and Cats** program has brought exciting hands-on and educational experiences to the children served by Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lake County as well as the Lake County Juvenile Detention Facility, through a feral cat winter shelter building project launched in November 2005. Through this winter shelter project, the children gained understanding and compas-

sion for this underserved and often neglected animal population while they sharpened their reading and hand coordination skills. With the assistance of The Trust, this amazing program will continue this fall.

Spay and Stay is honored by the Trust's support, and will gratefully use the grant to pursue its mission of connecting humans to animals through its successful TNR and community outreach programs.

Views from the E.D.

I was glad to find out recently that the pace at which time seems to be speeding by isn't just a phenomenon of a mellowing baby-boomer. It seems everyone I talk with is feeling the same racing sensation, no matter what their age. Whether this is a by-product of our modern globally oriented and information-packed age or a case of mass amnesia regarding the process of stopping to smell the roses, we could all do with a little slowing down and diversion of our attention. I thought I'd share some ideas on how to help you slow down and divert your attention to the feral and stray cats in our care.

Get ready for winter

If you are a caretaker of a feral colony, it's time to prepare for the winter, which seems to be at our doorstep. If you have a winter shelter already, fill it with fresh straw and make sure it's free of drafts.



Elevate it off the ground so it stays warmer. If you still need a shelter, we have some of the heavy-duty Styrofoam Meowhouses left. All you'll need to do is let us know that you need one, come pick it up, and give it a couple of coats of outdoor paint before you fill it with straw and offer it to your ferals. If you're handy, we also have instructions on our website for building a snug wooden shelter. Maybe you could make an extra shelter and donate it to Spay and Stay so we could make it available for caretakers who may not be able to get one made.

Maybe you'd like to get updated on feral cat issues and the work of Spay and Stay here in Lake County. Maybe you just want to understand some of the terms connected with TNR. We have a brand new website, chock full of news, ideas, and information

Using the web to help more homeless cats

Whether you want to find out how many registered caretakers we have in our program or how to build an inexpensive winter cat shelter, you can find this and much more on Spay and Stay's newly redesigned and informationpacked website.

According to the web's designer, Sandra Kooper, Spay and Stay's new site was created, "to be a work-in-process so it stays fresh and alive with constantly updated information as it brings the latest local and national TNR



news to the reader." It is important for a broadbased audience since it holds information for the TNR novice as well as the seasoned caretaker. A new addition to the site is the **Terminology** page, which defines the language of TNR in an easy-tounderstand and searchable format.

We've also added information just for caretakers, which can be accessed through the **Resource** page. This includes the forms needed to become a registered caretaker, guidelines on proper colony management, helpful tips on dealing with neighborhood nuisance issues, health information on feral cats, information on kitten socialization, and viewpoints on feral cats and predation.

We will keep you updated on TNR news, in addition to making *Feral Cat Focus*, Spay and Stay's quarterly newsletter, available for you to view

online. You can also get all the details on our upcoming events, including access to online ticket purchase through PayPal, event registration forms, if needed, instructions, directions and much more.

We also give you **quick and easy access** to free and low-cost Lake County-based spay neuter programs for your owned pets, as well as links to many No-Kill shelters in our area, just in case you're looking for a pet and can help give a home to a shelter animal.

Lost and found

We have been investigating ways to help people whose cats get out of the house and become lost. We want to reunite these cats with their owners, but, more importantly, we



want to make sure these cats don't end up becoming another homeless cat on the street, possibly adding to the population if they have not been neutered.

We have an **army of registered and trained caretakers** already in place in our communities. If they could be our eyes on the street and give us a description of any new cats that try to join their colonies, with approximate dates of arrival, perhaps we can match up a lost cat with a "found" cat and use our web site as the tool to make these descriptions available to people looking for lost pets. There would be lots of bugs to work out in such a system, but if it could keep even a few lost cats from becoming feral, it would be worth it.

Volunteer's passion and diverse talents benefit the cats

Deb Cassidy has been volunteering with Spay and Stay for almost three years now. She felt the mission of Spay and Stay fit with her strong belief that animals who suffer, especially those who don't have their basic needs met, need help, and that is exactly what Deb, along with an army of volunteer caretakers are doing by having homeless feral and stray cats sterilized and cared for. of her dynamic personality which has come in handy on several occasions. Deb has gone out into the community to help neighbors resolve disputes regarding feral cats. She has a way of really listening to both sides of a problem, and offers solutions that help not only the humans involved in the misunderstanding, but also the cats.

Along with Deb's incredible enthusiasm, she brings creativity, passion, and a non-stop commitment to thinking outside the box when it comes to finding ways to help feral and stray cats. Deb is also a photographer and writer and loves being able to use her skills to spread the word about humane treatment for homeless cats.

The list of ways Deb has combined her passion and skills to help Spay and Stay and our communities' homeless cats is

long and varied. Deb collects donated cat food from Save-A-Pet and other shelters and organizations to distribute to colony caretakers. She has tried her hand at carpentry and built several winter shelters to also give to caretakers who need warm housing for their colony, and constructed a 5 x 5 x 6 foot holding cage for six

ferals that had to be relocated to new colonies. She also helped the new caretakers set up homing cages to help the cats adjust to their new location. Unafraid of getting down-and-dirty, Deb also often finds herself on the streets helping trap and transport cats to spay days.

Those of us who know Deb are aware Deb has also offered her ideas, artistic talent, and energy to help make several of Spay and Stay's fundraisers successful events. However, hands down, Deb admits that her most favorite volunteer duty is participating in Spay and Stay's high-volume spay days. She has been our Recovery Station team leader and oversees the final hands-on work with the cats after surgery so that they are treated and monitored safely.

Deb's view on TNR

Deb feels strongly that, "until there are enough loving homes for every cat, TNR makes perfect sense. I've seen it work. I've seen the lives of ferals improve with TNR." Deb has worked at several shelters and has seen the burden the non-stop flow of kittens coming from unsterilized owned cats, as well as homeless feral and stray cats, has had on these facilities. She is aware that easing the burden felt by these shelters starts with controlling the feral and stray cat population, and that controlling this overpopulation in a humane way not only works better than euthanasia, it makes us better people if we solve this problem in a responsible and compassionate way.

You can do big things as a volunteer

Deb shares that her experience working with Spay and Stay has been very good. "You wouldn't believe the positive energy and support everyone gets from this group. It's a solid, dedicated group eager to welcome new members. It's very exciting to brainstorm new ideas

and come up with solutions to the challenges we face. Things happen very fast here. We have a problem, and then we work on a solution, and then things change—sometimes big things!

Deb also shares that she feels very grateful to have found Spay and Stay at a time when TNR is becoming more and more accepted as a humane and effective method for population control of feral and stray cats. She feels the work she is doing with Spay and Stay is appreciated and directly affects the lives of the cats she is trying to help.
