# Oathall Year 8's taste success

A team of six Oathall Community College students won the prize for 'Best Idea' at the 'Business & Enterprise Day' at Oakmeeds Community College after impressing judges that included the Manager from Sainsburys in Haywards Heath, with their entrepreneurial skills and culinary creativity.

They and five other Mid Sussex schools battled it out to come up with an idea for a brand new product for 9 to 12 year olds.

Oathall Community College had Jasper Ryan-Cater, Hannah Blackholly, Charlotte Childs, Josh Freeman, Issy Munster and Adam Hall representing them in the form of 'The Brainwaye Team'.

The teams had to demonstrate organization, research, team work, communications, accountancy and presentation skills.

The product had to be 'Good value', 'Healthy', 'Locally sourced' and as environmentally friendly in it's production as possible.

It also had to meet all Sainsbury's quality standards and adhere to all of their product criteria.

Their winning product was 'N R G Bar' a triangular, milk chocolate bar with four triangular segments. It's made up of honey, oats, blueberries and milk chocolate chips. It comes singularly or in packs of 5.

The 'Brainwave Team' chose milk chocolate because although white chocolate was the first choice as an attractive combination with the blueberries they knew that a lot of white chocolate is made using animal fat and the cocoa in the milk chocolate could be sourced as a Fairtrade ingredient and would be great for vegetarians.

John Dowling, the Manager from Sainsbury's in Haywards Heath said, "we based our decision on the judges comments and feedback and it was unanimous".



Sorry! You missed out on this offer by 100 years as that was the rate in 1911, well 10/6d as it was called then.

Recently discovered bowls club records gave us an insight into the early days of this village club. In 1904 permission was obtained from the council to use an area of the common for the purpose of bowls. This was conditional on it having a "slight wire fence" around it which could be taken away as and when required.

By 1911 Lindfield had 34 paid up members, we have their names, the original lists of Officers, their fixtures and even the results. Matches included games against Horsham, Newhaven, Worthing, Crawley and Uckfield which still appear in our 2011 fixture book.

In Helena Hall's book she mentions a photograph of the members in 1914 donated to the club by Mr J.W. Driver. This photograph also still exists and is displayed in our newly refurbished clubhouse.





I'll never forget my first day at school - that feeling of excitement, but also fear of the unknown.

So when I was invited back to Lindfield Primary I jumped at the chance to relive that first school day.

When the big day arrived I got up in the morning, packed my bag, and for the first time in several years, I went to school.

My day began when I was dropped off in the car park by my Dad with all the other pupils. That brought back memories, and I didn't even shed a tear!

In the school reception, the first familiar face was that of teaching assistant, Mrs Burlong, who recognised me straight away. I was also met with several 'haven't you growns?!' from a number of other teachers I remembered well.

Then Mr White (or Bob) appeared. I could never call him Bob- he's Mr White, in my day a year 6 teacher and now the headmaster of the school.

I was introduced to Mrs Elson who was to look after me during my school day. Her role as Learning Mentor is to support children with emotional and social needs.

I was shown to the year 2 classrooms to sit in on Olive class, taught by Miss Bryars. I remembered the classroom well from my year 2 days with Mrs Dew, one of my favourite teachers ever. (In those days it was called Blue class!)

Mrs Elson and I crept in while all the children were sitting around the whiteboard, keenly listening to Miss Bryars. They were learning multiplication. The interactive whiteboards were new to me, but now every classroom has one.

The classroom was just as colourful as I remembered from my time at Lindfield Primary. Every inch of wall was

covered with posters, worksheets, pictures, numbers and the alphabet.

The children moved to their tables to do the maths worksheets, and were chatting lots (though they weren't meant to be!). The atmosphere was bustling and exciting, which was lovely to be a part of once again. The children were so keen to finish each sheet; they were rushing up to the front to have their sums ticked, and soon a long line formed.

Every child seemed happy and excited to be at school; enthusiastic, keen to please and to finish!

It was clear that they adore Mrs Elson, who works her way around the classes dipping into lessons to help out and offer every child the opportunity to have a chat should they want to. It's a service that's crucial to the modern school, and after talking to Mrs Elson about her role, I hope that more schools can provide a similar resource.

Soon enough a line had formed in front of me, and I suddenly became a worksheet marker! After work sheets, the children were asked to do 'quiet reading-' a term I definitely remember, as I used to love sitting in the reading corner.

Soon it was break time and all the children ran out of the classroom to play, and I was allowed to visit the staff room. What a privilege! I was never allowed in there back in my school days; it was a room always approached with caution.

After break I was treated to a tour of the junior playground and the field. The school is lucky to have a 'Trim Trail' a piece of assault-course/climbing frame equipment, donated by Barratt Homes and the Lindfield Primary PTA. The trim trail provides a great way for kids to exercise at school while playing with their friends.

The school is also introducing a new scheme called 'Forest Schools.' Mrs Elson is set to co-ordinate the lessons after spending a week learning basic woodland survival skills. She currently runs sessions for children in the small woodland area, teaching them essential skills, such as how to make a small fire, heating water to make a hot chocolate and fun things like how to carve a bracelet from wood while sitting around a camp fire. Mrs Elson hopes to open the scheme to all children at the school. It showed me how things have really changed - in my day if you wandered into the woods you were in big trouble!

Next I visited year 6 where I met Mrs Anscombe's class. Three of the pupils already had some work to show me and I was so impressed by what I saw!

Lucas Foreman showed me some work on shadows he had been doing for his SAT's revision. With an immaculately drawn graph and photos too, he explained about the experiment he and his class had conducted.

Francesca Weekes showed me some writing she had done about a monster, and described to me a revision trick known as VCOP. If I remember rightly that stands for vocabulary, connectives, opening and punctuation!

Finally, I was shown a fantastic storybook by John Moore that he had not only written, but designed the cover for as well, complete with an 'about the author' section.

I then moved to a table where children were working on maths. A pupil called Dina helped me to remember my square numbers which I had forgotten all about-very "I wish I could have appreciated primary school more when I was a kid."



kind of her, especially as I had taken her seat!

Mrs Elson and I moved down to the year 3 classrooms next. Everybody was busy painting Tutankhamun pictures, which were great!

The year 5's were also doing SAT'S practice, with Ms Crosbie, working on shapes and 'how many degrees in a...' I sat there hoping she wouldn't ask me for the answer!

After lunch, I went with Mrs Elson to meet the reception classes. There are now 3 classes of around 25 children in reception at Lindfield, as the school is so popular.

Visiting the reception classes was the highlight of my day. Though it was over 15 years ago that I was in reception, being in the classroom brought all the memories flooding back.

Each classroom had its own incubator and eggs, and the children were so excited about the prospect of baby chicks hatching in time for Easter.

To reception children, school is all about having fun with dance lessons, reading, PE and playing in the playground. I sat and watched a rather intense game of 'What's the time Mr Wolf?'

Everyone seemed so happy - hugging and helping each other, and so full of energy! Every child I asked said they loved their teacher – you can't get much higher praise than that!

I was surprised when school ended just before 3 o'clock, being so used to working 9 to 5. I expected to feel glad to be allowed home early, but in fact-I didn't want to go home!

Looking back, if there's one thing I wish I could have done, it's to have appreciated primary school morethere were days when I thought it was a chore, but it seems like a walk in the park now!

Forget crying at the school gates - I enjoyed going back to school so much, I hope Lindfield Primary will invite me again soon.

#### **Lasting Power of Attorney**

For many years it has been possible to sign a Power of Attorney giving others (your Attorneys) power to manage your financial affairs in the event of mental incapacity.

The law has now changed so that you can sign a separate Power of Attorney naming people to make important decisions about your personal care and welfare if you become unable to do so for yourself. This can include decisions about medical treatment.

Some people may worry how they would be looked after if they become old or unable to look after themselves. Others may worry where they would live, or whether there might be disputes among their relatives about their care and treatment.

The new Welfare Power of Attorney allows you to give detailed instructions about all these matters. You can name one or more trusted relatives or friends who would have authority to look after your welfare, if you become unable to make decisions for yourself.

Anyone acting as your Attorney is legally obliged to act in your best interests at all times. They must also observe the principles of the new Mental Capacity Act and follow a Code of Conduct. These are designed to protect your rights and to ensure that decisions are always made in your best interests after consulting you whenever possible.

The new Welfare Power of Attorney will be important and helpful for many people. We recommend you give it careful thought, and will be happy to advise as required.

# What's new?

#### **HOME FRONT**

Spring has sprung in the world of interiors when Design Centre Chelsea Harbour resplendent in new collections and abundant hyacinths opens its doors for Design Week. From 13th to 18th March the Design Centre is packed to the gills with all that's new in fabric and wallpaper, show rooms bursting at the seams with nibbles and refreshments to tempt you to linger and the reps, usually out on the road, are braced for over a week of intensive fabric chat.

It's full on and almost too much of a feast for the senses to see everything so this year I focused on my favourite suppliers and had a good nose around to see what was new. I was struck this year by the amount of colour everywhere. Almost all collections are stepping out of the comfort zone of neutrals and proudly showing off vibrant colours and confident patterns and weaves. There is a lot of blue around; Zinc a new member of the Romo family has launched its Miami collection this spring - a mixture of stunning blues and emerald greens, patterns and plains. There has been a long association with ecclesiastical art in Lindfield. In the late 1800s Charles Kempe, of Old Place, was renowned for his design and manufacturer of stained glass windows and church furniture. Over a hundred years later another master craftsman is living and working in our midst. Working out of a small studio in his home in Lindfield, Michael Coles designs and makes contemporary stained glass windows that are admired by millions around the globe.

For as long as he can remember, Michael had always wanted to be an artist. He recalls with fondness his earliest memories of his passion for sketching. "I was once in trouble for drawing on some gift wrap paper that my mother had to return to a shop. She explained to the assistant 'We just can't stop him drawing', to which the response was to give me even more paper to draw on as I was only a toddler and they had mistaken my drawings for those of my older siblings!" He also very clearly recalls his decision to become a stained glass artist at the age of 10 when his father took him on a visit to St George's Chapel at Windsor Castle. He left school as soon as he could and was accepted at the Hammersmith School of Art where he studied a range of art disciplines, including mural painting, before going on to the Royal College of Art where he specialised in stained glass for three years. It was during his time here that he was commissioned to design his first windows.

"I've always loved studying history of art too and stained glass has strong historical connections" explains Michael, "the techniques and tools used in stained glass are almost the same now as they were in the early 13th century. The last significant change in the method was in the 14th century when glass was stained." The windows that he designs have a very distinctive style, often containing icons or historical figures that have been researched in great detail in order to capture their essence and produce a new piece of history itself. When his local church in London was celebrating its Saints' Day, he painted a picture of St Barnabas on card for them to display. A visiting clergyman liked it so much that he asked him to paint a permanent one at his church in Wandsworth and so Michael began to develop the icons in his work.

Before moving to Lindfield five years ago, Michael lived and worked in London, although his work gave him opportunities to travel around the country as well as overseas. His windows can be seen in the oldest church in the City of London, All Hallows by the Tower, as well as in churches, art galleries and museums in New York, Malaysia, South Africa and San Francisco.

Back at his Lindfield studio Michael completes all his designs to scale. Each inch on paper represents a foot of window and he produces detailed designs in pencil and





cannot be described merely as a sketch. A few years ago he thought that he would have to retire as his eyesight was deteriorating and his work requires great intricacy and detail. He underwent surgery to remove cataracts and since then, his sight has improved so much that he no longer needs the glasses that he has worn for most of his life. Once the client has approved the design, then a full sized 'cartoon' is drawn in pencil onto paper which forms the template for the actual window. These days Michael often uses colleagues from around the country to make up the windows, but he still works on some projects in his studio. An 11ft x 2ft window can take as long as six months to make, but once installed has a life of around 1000 years if looked after properly. The lead work however needs to be renewed every 120 years or so. The glass that he uses is hand-made and each piece a work of art in itself, with subtle textures and varying tones of colour running through it. Not only is each piece of glass cut to fit into the jigsaw that makes up the window, but detail and shading is added by etching into glass that is laminated with colour. The lead that holds the pieces together is soft and pliable so needs to soldered together and then cemented with putty to ensure it is waterproof. The finished window is then transported to its location and fitted into its new home. "I used to fit the windows myself, but there came a time when I decided that

watercolour that can be easily scaled up. They show each piece of glass and lead, so

spending time up ladders in freezing temperatures wasn't for me!" laughs Michael.

As an expert in his field, he has been a consultant to Historic Buildings committees.

"I was once consulted on a window in Sheffield Cathedral which was thought to have been a 14th century Spanish window. Unfortunately after much research I had to break the news that it was only made in the 1850s and had come no further than London!" he shares. But it is the sketching and researching people that he loves. "Stained glass has such a strong connection with history and windows often tell a story or depict people who have played a significant role in the history of a building or place" he explains.

Since moving to Lindfield Michael has branched out into church embroidery design and one of his pieces "The Holy Trinity Banner" contains beautifully detailed buildings from Horsham. With access to a state of the art computerised sewing machine, the banner which would previously have taken years to make, was produced in a matter of months and is now on permanent display in the Horsham church.

"I feel that in a way I'm bringing stained glass back to the village and Lindfield is a fantastic place to be an artist with our very own art shop on the door step." Michael is currently working on designs for a window in a church not too far from here so watch this space!







## I Think I Love You Alison Pearson

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Chick Lit can be given a bad name. However, Alison Pearson's amusing and thoughtful novel reminds me of the best of Austen - she shows a warmth to her characters and even in a seemingly small story, some truths about love and human existence are shared. In 1974, Petra and Sharon are two South Wales girls whose obsession with the teenage idol David Cassidy helps them survive the early years of secondary school. Meanwhile in London, a young graduate reporter called Bill is helping develop the myths associated with the pop star by his work on the fan magazine devoted to him. He is, unknowingly, writing the Bible for the two girls' obsession. Fast forward twenty five years and the two girls have grown into thirty something women. Petra has a daughter called Molly and a husband whose less than grown up approach to matters of the heart leads to him moving out with his mistress. Sharon has never quite achieved all she would and has had the pain of seeing Petra's success as a cellist. Their friendship suffers, until a death brings Petra back to Wales. Their lives seem confusing and shapeless. Then suddenly, they are offered the chance to meet David Cassidy. Arranged by Bill, who is now a senior editor on a whole chain of magazines, this encounter does help them to think about what was and what could be. The story is even more touching in that Alison Pearson was a Cassidy obsessive, and the paperback contains her interview with him when she was working for 'The Sunday Times' in 2004. So are the follies of our youth worth holding onto? They often are vital to shaping who we are - for good and ill. This book will help you think about your own youth and its oddities. If you need an absorbing read for a journey or a forth coming holiday, then this will both entertain and make you reflect on the ups and downs of life.









#### SWEET RED CABBAGE

Serves 2 (may be gently reheated)

Cook a thinly sliced medium-sized onion in a knob of butter over low heat until soft but not browned. Stir in 25g soft brown sugar, pinch ground cloves, 50ml apple juice (or water) and 3 tbsp cider vinegar. Finely shred a small red cabbage (about 225g) discarding the core and any thick ribs. Stir into the onions along with 1 peeled, cored and sliced medium-sized Bramley apple, a small handful of sultanas and seasoning. Cover and cook over very low heat until tender, stirring once or twice. Alternatively transfer to a casserole and pop into the hot oven when cooking the roast. Delicious with roast pork or pork sausages.

#### GRATIN OF SQUASH AND APPLE

Serves 2

Preheat the oven to 200°c. Thinly slice a medium-sized onion and gently cook with a little butter until just soft but not brown. Halve and peel a small Butternut squash, discarding the seeds and stringy centre. Cut into thin slices. Peel, core and thinly slice a medium-sized Bramley apple into a bowl. Add 2tsp plain flour and seasoning and toss until coated. Layer the squash and apple in a shallow casserole, spoon the onion on top and pour over 50ml vegetable stock. Cover and cook for 20 min. Meanwhile combine a generous handful of fresh breadcrumbs with a little melted butter and grated Cheddar cheese. Sprinkle over the onions and continue to cook, uncovered, until soft throughout and golden brown. Try this with a grilled gammon steak.

The Bramley apples we know today can all be traced back to a tree which grew from some pips planted by a little girl called Mary Ann Brailsford in her garden in Southwell, Nottinghamshire. Over 200 years later, the original tree is still bearing fruit. Nicknamed "The King of Covent Garden" by the wholesale market, the Bramley is today a £50 million industry with the main orchards in Kent, East Anglia and the West Midlands. If you are fortunate to have a Bramley apple tree in your garden you truly have a piece of history growing there. Bramleys have a high acidic content so the sharp fruity taste comes through whatever other flavourings are added to it, in both sweet and savoury recipes.

#### STREUSAL APPLE PIE

#### Serves 4-6

Preheat the oven 200°c. Line a 23cm pieplate with shortcrust pastry (homemade or bought) and chill. Soak a small handful of raisins in hot water for a few minutes to plump them up, then drain. Peel, core and slice 700g Bramley apples. Combine 50g caster sugar with 1 tbsp cornflour. Layer the apple slices in the pastry shell with the raisins and sugar/cornflour. Rub 75g soft butter into 100g plain flour then add 50g soft brown sugar and 50g toasted chopped nuts (hazel, almond or pine) and a pinch of cinnamon. Spoon over the apples and press down lightly. Bake for about 40 min, lowering the temperature to 180°c if browning too quickly. Test the apples with a knife to make sure they are tender. Best served at room temperature, with a little icing sugar sifted over the top for a pretty finish.

#### HONEYED APPLE CRUNCH

#### Serves 4

Gently cook 450g Bramley apples (peeled, cored and sliced) with 3tbsp orange juice, 3tbsp clear honey and a pinch of cinnamon until a smooth puree, stirring once or twice. Spoon into individual glasses. Serve warm or chilled, topped with crunchy muesli-type cereal and yogurt.
