In the early 1950s, Hyde Park, once a solidly middle-class neighborhood, began to decline. In response, the University became a major sponsor of an urban renewal effort for Hyde Park, which profoundly affected both the neighborhood's architecture and street plan.³

The habitual use of language and rules in the execution of institutional projects often obscures the previous social activity embodied in the things and events facilitating those projects. Consequently, individuals come to think of the detailed situations and social order characterizing their project as natural and rather than as humanly created and culturally arbitrary.

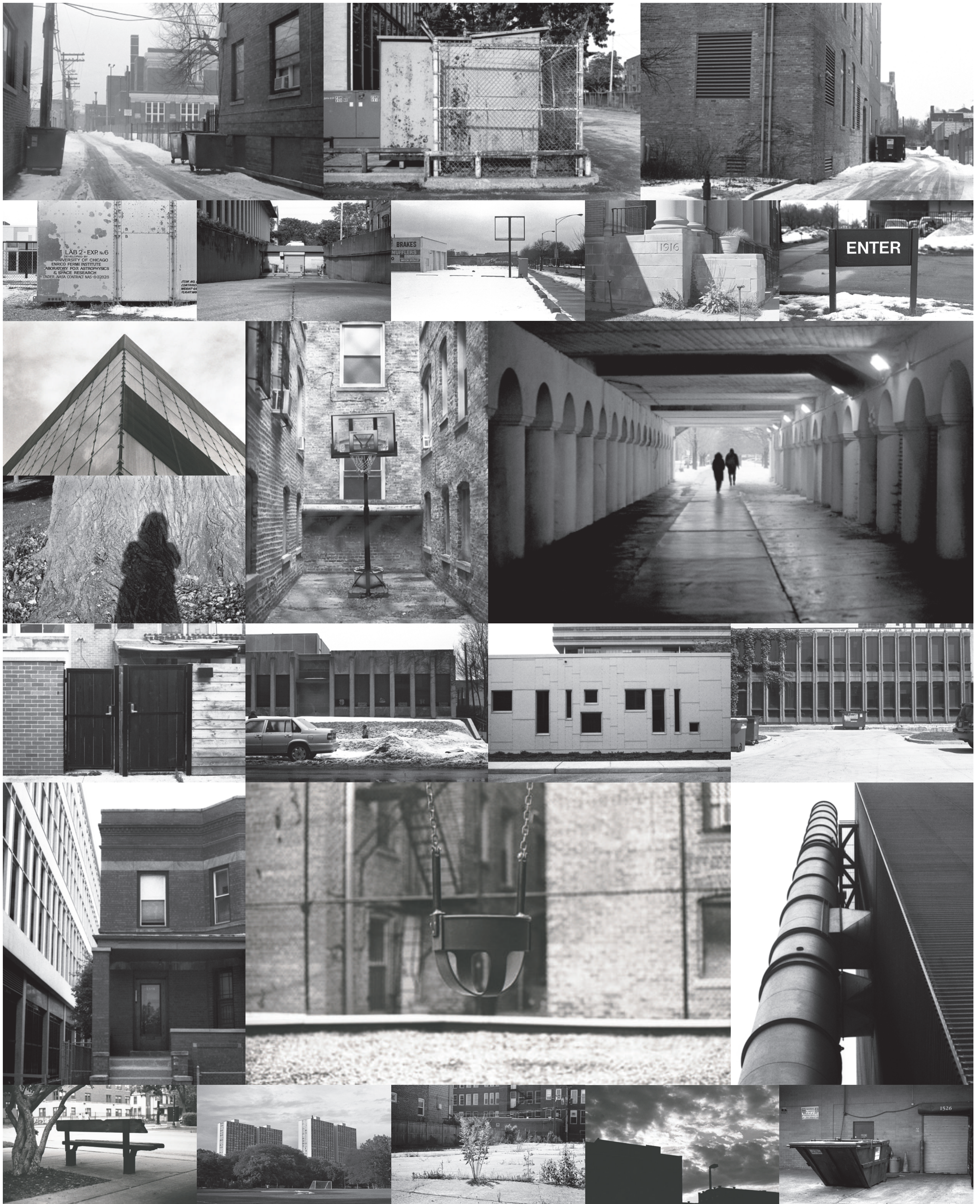
