

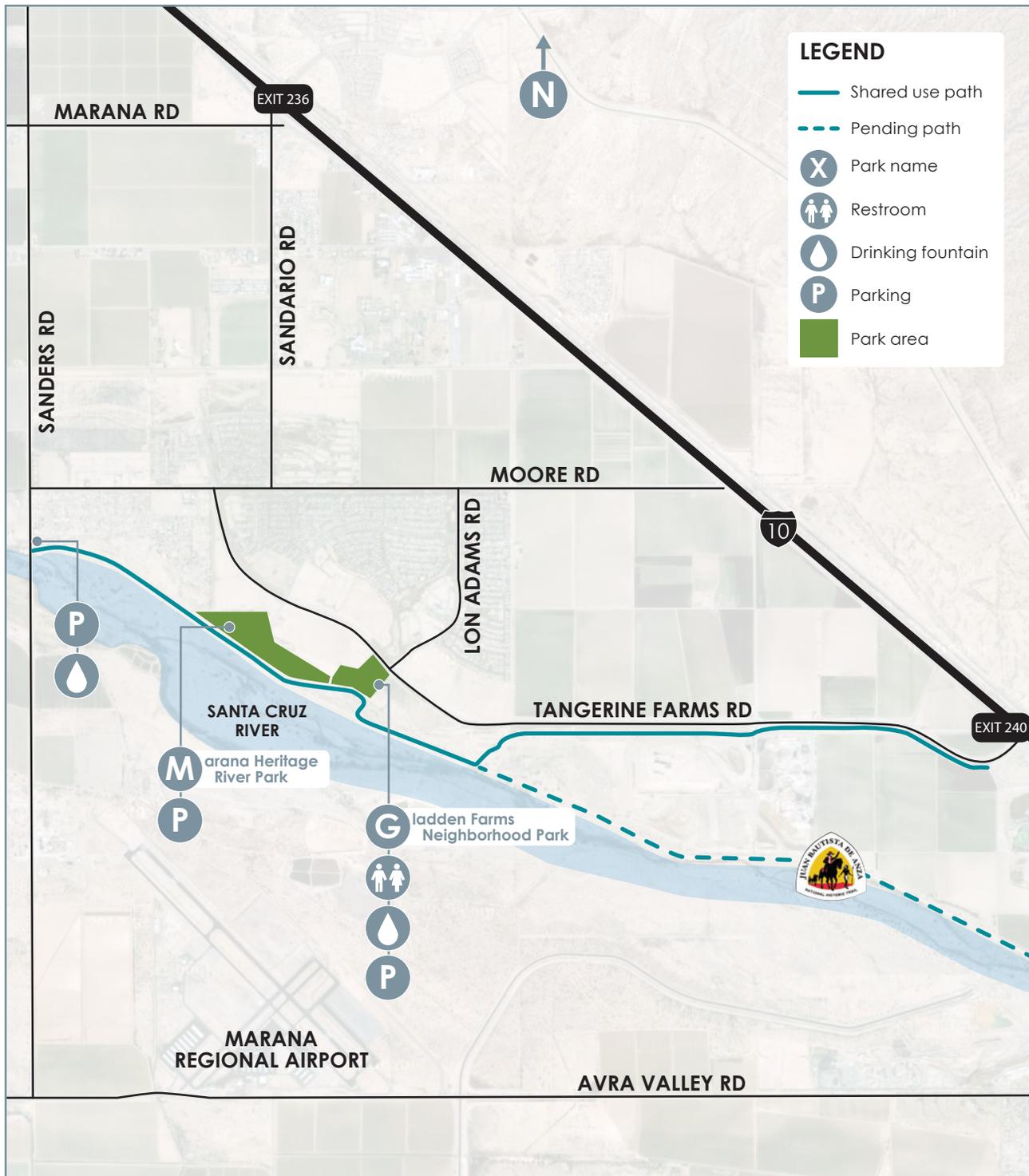


SHARED USE PATH



FOR EVERYONE

The path offers panoramic views of the Tortolita Mountains and “Sombrero Peak” in the Tucson Mountains. Users can enjoy excellent birding, aquatic life and various plants along the desert and river’s edge. The nearby Santa Cruz’s sights and sounds range from a calm river to mild rapids. The shared use path is an excellent chance to exercise outdoors while getting a taste of the views, flora, fauna and history of Marana.

ABOUT THE PATH

Marana's shared use path meanders through both the northern and southern parts of town, parallel to the Santa Cruz River. The path gives users the opportunity to travel a portion of the 1,200-mile route followed by Juan Bautista de Anza. In 1775-76, Anza led more than 240 men, women and children on an overland journey from the frontier of New Spain to settle Alta California. The 9.65 miles of paved path offers users suitable surfaces for walking, running, biking and horseback riding. Amenities include drinking fountains, benches, garden areas and dog waste stations.

RULES OF THE PATH

- Be respectful of all users
- Use lights when dark
- Keep right, unless to pass
- Slower traffic has the right of way
- Use audible warnings when passing
- Obey all trail and road signs
- Do not litter; use trash cans
- Control dogs, scoop all poop
- Use safe speeds at all times
- Do not block path
