

UPCOMING 2020 ELECTION DATES

August 4, 2020:

Primary Election

- Federal Offices
- State Offices
- County Offices
- Municipal Offices (Non-Partisan)

November 3, 2020:

General Election



INDEPENDENT VOTER ELIGIBILITY

Independent voters can vote in the **August 4, 2020 PRIMARY ELECTION.**

Independent voters wishing to vote by mail must request an early ballot from the Pima County Recorder.

Independent voters wishing to vote at their polling location need only pick a ballot of their choice at the sign-in table.

Ballot Choices:

- Republican Ballot
- Democratic Ballot
- Green Party Ballot
- Municipal Only Ballot

*All municipal offices will appear on each partisan ballot.
Requesting a specific partisan ballot will not change
the registration of an Independent Voter.*

WHAT'S ON THE TOWN OF MARANA BALLOT?

PROPOSITION 1

Make Marana 2040 General Plan Proposition

If approved by the voters, the Make Marana 2040 General Plan will become the guiding policy document for Town decision makers. Should the voters not approve this Plan, the current General Plan will remain in effect until the Town prepares a new General Plan that the voters approve.

PROPOSITION 2

Alternative Expenditure Limitation Proposition – Home Rule

Background – The Arizona Constitution and Arizona Revised Statutes impose an annual expenditure limitation on Arizona cities and towns. Article IX of the Arizona Constitution also allows for a city or town to adopt a local alternative expenditure limitation, or Home Rule Option, with the approval of the majority of the qualified voters of the city or town.

WHAT'S ON THE TOWN OF MARANA BALLOT?

PROPOSITION 2

State-Imposed Limitation – *What is it?*

- A 1980's, formula-based expenditure limitation.
- The limit grows each year based on population and inflation.
- Spending limit **does not** take into consideration service levels or needs placed on growing communities.
- Assumes our service level is the same.

WHAT'S ON THE TOWN OF MARANA BALLOT?

State Imposed Limitation Example

Fiscal Year	1979-80 Base Limit	x	Population Factor	x	Inflation Factor	=	Preliminary State-Imposed Expenditure Limitation
2020-21	\$ 202,239	x	34.6126	x	3.1398	=	\$ 21,978,370

Fiscal Year	Prior Fiscal Year Population	/	1978 Population	=	Population Factor
2021-22	49,323	/	1,425	=	34.6126

FY2019-20 General Fund only \$46.8M

WHAT'S ON THE TOWN OF MARANA BALLOT?

PROPOSITION 2

Alternative Expenditure Limitation Proposition – Home Rule

- Town creates a local spending limit as part of the annual, public budgeting process.
- Annual expenditure limit based sound budgetary practices and available revenues.
- Elected officials set spending limit based on local priorities and service level requirements.
- Option is effective for four years.
- Current option is in effect through June 2021.
- An extension will be sent to the voters in the Primary Election on August 4, 2020.



WHAT IS THE ALTERNATIVE EXPENDITURE LIMITATION, OR “HOME RULE”?

YES

A vote of “Yes” allows Marana to set its own budget and continue to provide public services at the current levels.

NO

A vote of “No” will require Marana to cut its budget by more than \$50 million. This will reduce all Town services.

Last Day to request a ballot by mail


July 29, 2020:
