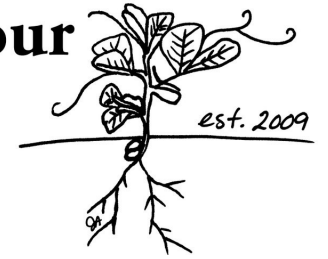

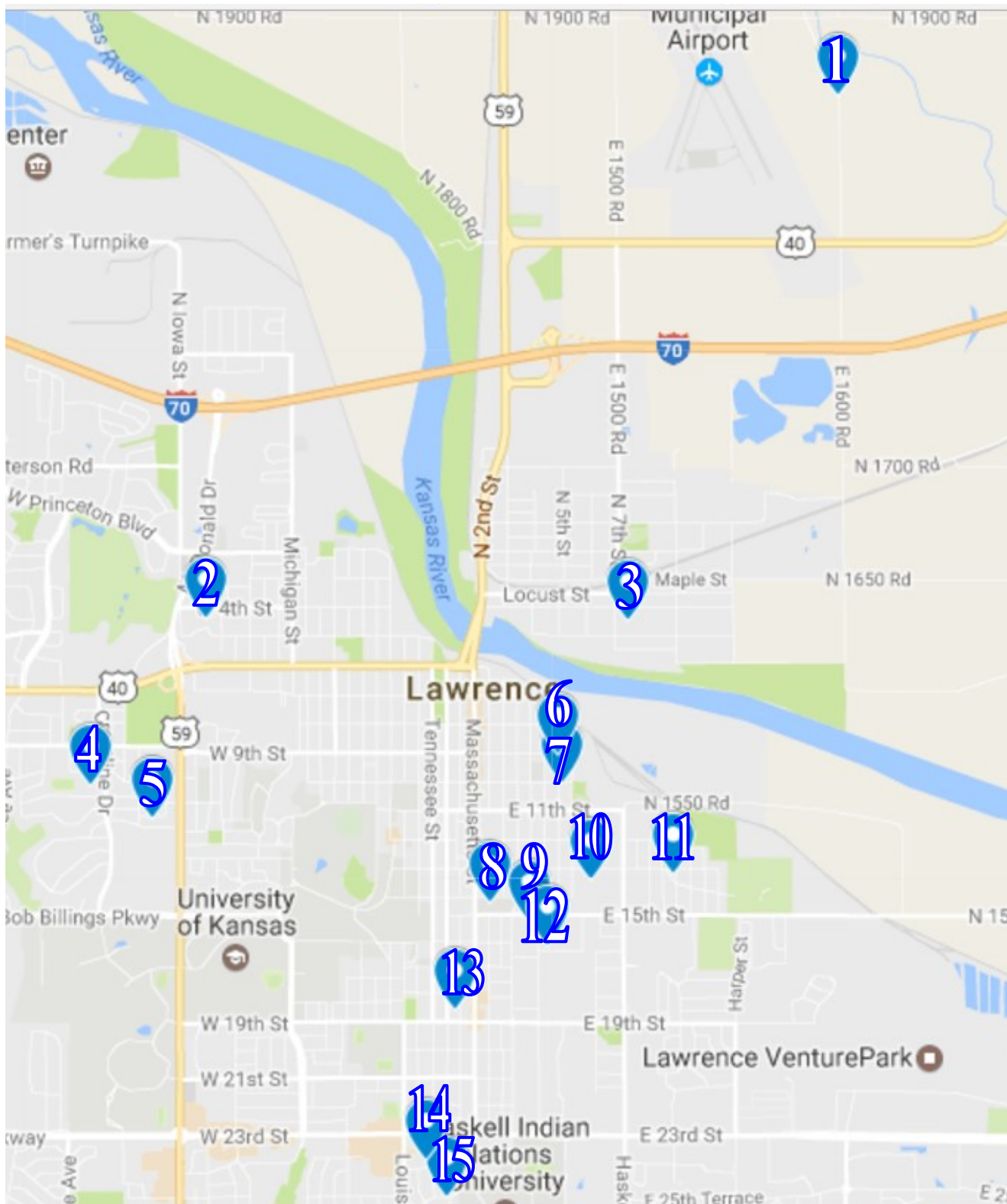

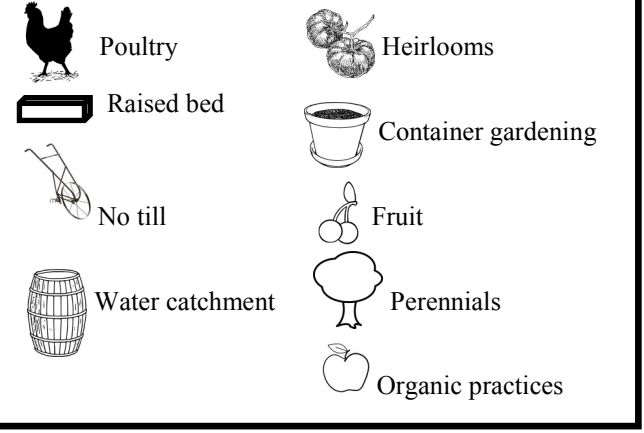

1. KU Student Farm
 1865 E. 1600 Rd.
 Mission: To provide students, faculty and staff the space and opportunity to learn about, experience and experiment with growing their own food; To inspire participants and the community to support local food systems; To encourage a connection with the earth and an appreciation of where food comes from. The University of Kansas Student Farm is a plot of land just north of Lawrence where students, faculty and staff can grow their own food. It's next to the Lawrence Municipal Airport and Prairie Moon Waldorf School, on the grounds of the KU Native Medicinal Plant Research Garden, headed by Dr. Kelly Kindscher.

2. Lowen and Chris Millsbaugh Garden
 1927 Countryside Ln.
 Spring and summer veggies, plus flowers, & medicinal herbs. Experimenting with tighter planting. Terraced beds on a slope; creative fencing.

3. Garden Incubator
 200 N. 7th
 A 1-acre community garden, public discovery garden and micro-farm. Traditional allotment plots, plus a public veggie maze, sensory garden, berry patch, dirt mountain, native plant butterfly garden and burgeoning mini-orchard. Since we encourage people, especially kids, to eat food straight from the plant while visiting, we maintain a strict pesticide-free garden. Always looking to enhance and change the garden based on the use and interests of visitors and participants. Currently working on the installation of a bee hotel and expansion of Dirt Mountain.

4. Growing Food Growing Health
 Located along Crestline between Yale and Harvard. 14,000 sq ft. school garden located on the grounds of West Middle School. Now in its 8th season, yielding over 15,000 lbs of produce to date. Tended by Student Gardeners. Produce is used in the school's salad bar and sold to The Merc Coop to help support the project.

5. Katie and Matt's Garden
 2305 Westdale Rd.
 6-month-old front yard garden with emphasis on low-maintenance, edible perennial crops. Highlights include hardy kiwi vines on a hedge pergola and hugelkultur beds.

6. Eastside Community Garden
 903 Pennsylvania
 A community garden where each members tills a personal plot. In most cases, the use is for food, herbs, and some flowers.

7. Mike Riehm's Garden
 1002 Pennsylvania
 Enter through gate on south side of house. Decades-old garden with raised beds, apple tree, thriving root and cole crops, picket fence, chickens. Also includes microbe-dense compost tea.

8. Central Garden @ Liberty Memorial Central Middle School
 1400 Massachusetts
 Central Garden is a school garden, part of the Farm 2 School program in Lawrence Public Schools. The space is an outdoor classroom as well as a production garden. Each year, over 1,000 student volunteer hours go into growing food to go home with students, be used in the cafeteria, and sold at Cottin's Hardware Farmer's Market. We use organic practices for students to be able to eat a variety of fruits and vegetables straight out of the garden.

9. Sunrise Community Garden
 1501 Learnard Ave.
 In its first year, it is maintained by Sunrise Project volunteers. Open to the public and offers free and culturally appropriate food. Many people in our community have difficulty accessing affordable foods that are culturally traditional and familiar. The Sunrise garden attempts to meet that need.

10. Lawrence Community Orchard
 830 Garfield St.
 From 13th and Delaware, turn south and go one-half block to Garfield; take Garfield east to its end. LCO is a free food park and includes fruit and nut trees, edible and medicinal perennials; demo for edible citriscap. Community effort; all welcome.

11. Forest Floor Permaculture
 1311 Prairie Ave.
 Brook Creek neighborhood. No lawn: a half acre of food production. Specialties: berries, fruit trees, nut trees, groundcovers. Gray water system, rainwater system. Food forest polyculture. Shade gardens.

12. The Yarden
 516 Forrest Ave.
 Backyard food garden, accessed through gate on west side of house. Only sunny part of our backyard jungle. Squirrels and kids love playing all over it :)

13. Cordley School Garden
 1837 Vermont St.
 Established in 2016, this garden engages every Cordley student in the process of growing and eating fresh produce. Throughout the summer, families and friends work in the garden and the harvested produce is shared with the neighborhood. Learn about the school's vermicomposting project and meet some worms!

14. Sowinski Garden
 412 Dakota St.
 Big variety on a small space. Tend to focus on things to can and preserve, and things kids like to steal and munch on. The neighborhood has lots of large trees so as much as possible is crammed into limited light.

15. Kinghouser Montana St. Garden
 2501 Montana St.
 We are growing organic vegetables, herbs, and flowers, Spring through Fall (since 2004). We also have fruit trees, berries, mushroom logs, and feisty chickens. We eat, share, can, freeze, dry, and savor.
