

Agent Woltz told Mr. Fleming that the witnesses interviewed were questioned particularly as to visits paid DILLINGER while he was incarcerated in the Crown Point Jail, by Attorney Piquett, and that none of the witnesses seemed to think that anyone had had a chance to slip DILLINGER a gun. Agent Woltz exhibited these statements to United States Attorney Fleming, and only asked Mr. Fleming for his opinion in this case, and at this time Mr. Fleming stated that the evidence uncovered did not reveal any Federal violations and that there could be no prosecution. Prior to this statement, Agent Woltz had asked Attorney Fleming if there was any further investigation which he desired, or if there was anything that he wished to be done, and he stated that he did not care to have the Bureau do anything further in connection with this case.

Agent Woltz, when asked by United States Attorney Fleming, if he, Fleming, would make a statement to the Press, how would the Bureau feel about it, Agent Woltz stated that so far as Agents of the Bureau were concerned, they could not at any time make any statements to newspapers or for publicity purposes, and that any statement given out, would be made by the Attorney General.
