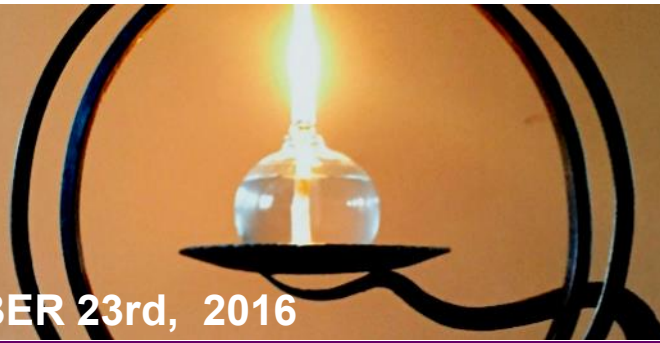

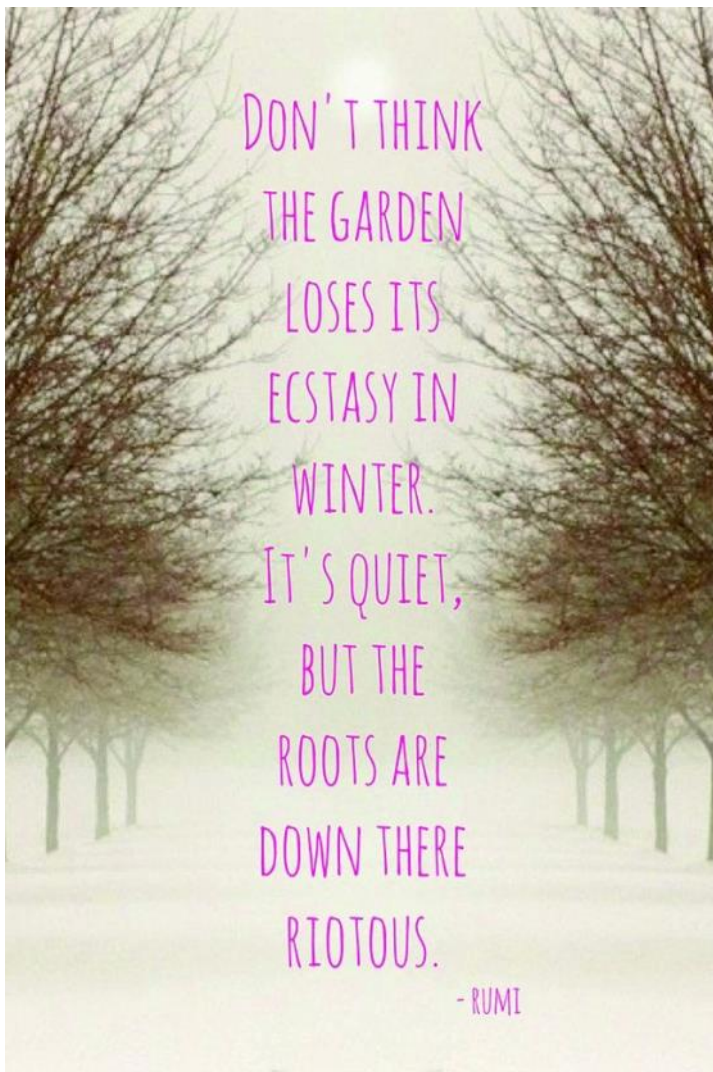
THE MEANING OF THE MANGER

The Work of Christmas, Reading #615 in *Singing the Living Tradition*

*When the song of angels is stilled,
When the star in the sky is gone,
When the kings and princes are home,
When the shepherds are back with their flock,
The work of Christmas begins:
to find the lost,
to heal the broken,
to feed the hungry,
to release the prisoner,
to rebuild the nations,
to bring peace among the people,
to make music in the heart.*

Howard Thurman was a black professor of religion who spent his life engaged in the real work of Christmas as he explained in his poem above. He co-founded the first integrated, multi-cultural church in the USA. His 1949 book *Jesus and the Disinherited* inspired the nonviolent civil rights movement in the US and throughout the world. Dr. Thurmond died in 1981.

ON BECOMING AN ALLY

Thanks to the many who stayed after our Congregational Meeting on December 11 for a discussion about how UUTC can better be an ally for people at risk in our community. And a special thanks to the 32 people who shared their views, as well as to all for listening respectfully.

One of the issues discussed was whether to fly a Rainbow flag at UUTC. Three people spoke strongly in favor of doing so, and nine spoke against it. Concerns of the nine ranged from the fear that a flag would make us a target for extremists in the community to a belief that there are kinder, gentler ways to create the diverse, accepting world that we seek. Some believe that a Rainbow flag is an in-your-face symbol – consider how it feels to see the Confederate flag flying – which could impede conversation in the community and potentially increase the risk of LGBTQ people.

However, there was clear consensus that we need to become a more visible ally to marginalized people, especially the LGBTQ community. Two immediate recommended steps were: (1) to paint an easily-seen rainbow on (or affix one to) our sign, and (2) make our public communications explicit, since “welcoming” as UUs intend the word is not understood outside of our community. The Board heard these concerns and approved both those steps at its meeting on December 20.

Another strong thread was the desire to support young people. This effort could include offering a strong OWL (Our Whole Lives) program. (OWL is a comprehensive UU curricula for sexuality education. Heather Layton is a qualified OWL leader, but to offer the program we need to recruit and train a male leader as well.) Supporting young people also includes reaching out to students of all ages in the community, and becoming a known safe haven for them.

Some other ideas that came out of the forum were: to install a Wayside Pulpit (an electronic signboard with changing messages to reflect the diverse and life-affirming beliefs of our congregation), to develop UUTC literature to leave at the Chamber of Commerce and other locations, to start a “Church Across the Street” or “All Are Welcome” campaign, to act in concert with like-minded churches and community groups.

The forum discussion was a first step. It was recorded and you can find and listen to it by going to uutc.org, clicking on “Get to Know Us” at the top of the page, choosing “Our Leaders and Staff” from the drop-down menu, and selecting “Board” at the bottom of the page.
