<b>How should the city engage the community to ensure that the scope and details of future new development projects in Poway are communicated clearly to residents?</b>	As a current councilmember, I strive to be as available and responsive to residents as possible. I encourage residents to reach out with any questions or concerns, no matter how small or large. We also have to be proactive in engaging the community on new projects. Their input is invaluable. The use of social media tools to publicize community meetings and upcoming projects is crucial. Most people these days are checking Facebook before they are reading a newspaper or checking the city's website.	This is one of the biggest struggles while on the campaign trail that I have learned, we need more than just the Chieftain. I am having to make residents aware of the development first to then be able to discuss the details. Maybe having one or two representatives from 50 precincts to attend a televised and archived town hall or workshop for future development projects and report back with a one pager to share via driveway meet up, email blast, Next Door or Facebook post.	First and foremost we need open lines of communication. Tell the truth at all cost because it always comes out sooner than later. Have forums to educate the public but in a way that we all can understand it. The people of Poway are very smart, do not take them for granted. Have Q and A sessions with the city officials and keep them informed even if a mistake were made. Finally give them the respect they deserve, we work for them help them understand if they don't know the answer.
<b>Two plans are being considered for the new Poway Community Center: a. an 18,450 sq ft "hybrid" design for an est. \$11.8 million with one large meeting room, five classrooms, restrooms, office space, and kitchen; b. a 22,587 sq ft "hybrid-plus" est. at \$13.4 million which adds a second meeting room and classroom. Which best fits the city's budget and the community's needs, and why?</b>	It is very important that the council sees beyond our current needs and into the future. With the implementation of the Poway Road Specific Plan, higher density housing will be built within walking distance of the Community Center and it will become an even greater resource for families. I would have to fully consider the funding plan for the larger design before making a decision, but it's important to note that the costs to expand the center later on will be more than the current estimates.	With this framework I am forced to choose the hybrid-plus, we will need a larger facility than even this to meet our current community needs let alone the current projection of population growth in our town center. As for our funding short fall, some future developers have shown interest in donating, to receive credit for a "community benefit" towards their development. In addition, since this is identified as an emergency shelter, we should look into FEMA's Preparedness Grant as well.	Well I haven't had the pleasure to go deep into the city's budget and analyze it. From what I have been told and read about this project. They are trying to make this happen for people and the seniors of Poway. My opinion a new center done correctly can be a big revenue maker by having events, renting hall out for weddings, birthdays etc. This answer can be answered much better when I have been elected and have a better look at the \$\$\$\$. In short I would be leaning towards the larger of the two.
