



You'll Grow Out of It by Jessi Klein- Grand Central- 978-1-4555-3118-9- HC- \$31.50-


Britt-Marie Was Here by Fredrik Backman- Sceptre- 978-1-4736-1720-9- HC- \$32.99-


The Conjoined by Jen Sookfong Lee  - ECW Press- 978-1-77041-284-2- TPB- \$18.95-


Today Will Be Different by Maria Semple- Little, Brown- 978-0-316-40343-6- HC- \$35.00-


Harmless Like You by Rowan Hisayo Buchanan- Sceptre- 978-1-4736-3832-7- HC- \$32.99-




Truevine by Beth Macy- Little, Brown- 978-0-316-33754-0- HC- \$36.50- History- 432 pp.- October 2016




