General Rules and Regulations

Entries in Exhibit Hall and Livestock Show

- All entry forms due at the fair office by 4 pm on the Monday prior to the Fair.
- **Online entries** due by Noon on Tuesday the week of the fair.
- Only entries with Spencerville Agricultural Society Entry Tags will be accepted.
- Exhibitors wishing to have entry tags sent to them should enclose a self-addressed sufficiently stamped envelope with their entry form allowing time for return mail delivery.
- All Exhibitors must obtain an Exhibitor's number from the Secretary (phone, email or in person)
- All Exhibitors excluding Churches, 4-H and Junior Work and Special Needs pay \$10.00 Exhibitor Fee to the Spencerville Agricultural Society for the current year.
- All Exhibitors to have paid an Exhibitor Fee before exhibiting articles.
- HST is included in all Exhibitor Fees and Fair shares.
- Prize money to be divided equally in the case of a tie.
- Any persons who shall interfere with the Judges while in the discharge of their duties, or who shall afterwards, on the premises of the Society, use any contemptuous or abusive language to any Judge in consequence of any award made by him, or any person willfully violating any of the rules of this Society, shall forfeit his right to any premiums to which he might otherwise be entitled. Judges are requested to report such to the Secretary.
- Prize money to be mailed after the Fair.
- Cheques will not be issued for prize money under \$2.00.
- All cheques issued by the Spencerville Agricultural Society must be presented at a bank on or before the end of the current year or the prize money will be forfeited.
- Online entry is available at www.spencervillefair.ca.
- Exhibitor Fees for next year will **NOT** be retained from an Exhibitor's winnings.
- Fair share 20% off all prize money except for Junior Work.

Exhibit Hall

- All exhibits must be brought in between 6 pm to 9 pm on Wednesday night before the Fair opens or Thursday morning between 8 am and 10 am.
- Judging commences Thursday of the Fair at 10:00 am sharp.
- Exhibit building will close Sunday 4:00 pm allowing time for Directors to dismantle and collect exhibits.
- Exhibit building will reopen Sunday at 4:30 pm for Exhibitors to collect their exhibits.
- No exhibits shall be removed until after Sunday 4:30 pm - No Exceptions.
- Unclaimed exhibits will become property of the Fair Board after Sunday 6 pm.
- All exhibits must be owned and registered in the name of the Exhibitor and not the name of their business or farm.
- All produce must be raised by the Exhibitor and be this year's production.
- All articles must be the bona fide property of the Exhibitor in whose name they are entered.
- No exhibitor may enter more than one item in a section.
- No smoking in the exhibit hall.

General Rules and Regulations - cont'd

Livestock

- All Exhibits must be owned and registered in the name of the exhibitor and not the name of their business or farm unless stated otherwise in the class.
- All animals must be the bona fide property of the member in whose name they are entered.
- The ownership of animals as well as the ages of all animals must be sworn, if required by any Director.
- Under no circumstances should an animal exhibiting signs of transmittable disease be taken to the Spencerville Fair. The show committee and other Fair officials have the right to refuse entry of any animal showing signs of an infectious skin disease (e.g. warts, ringworm). If a vet check is required, it will be at the expense of the exhibitor.
- **ANY livestock (dairy or beef cattle, sheep) that does not have the required intact/undamaged CFIA tag or identifier will not be allowed entry to our Fair grounds and must leave immediately.**
- Exhibitors of livestock must have their own liability insurance of \$2,000,000.00.
- No animal will be allowed to compete for more than one prize in any class except for a special prize.
- Animals must not compete in any class except that set apart for them.
- No exhibitor will be allowed more than two entries in any horse section.
- No Poultry and Small Animal exhibits shall be removed from the grounds until after Sunday 4:30 pm. No exceptions.
- Absolutely no late entries the day of the show.
- All livestock Exhibitors report to and enter at Livestock Gate # 1. Parking is available.
- Horses must be on the grounds by 9 am unless otherwise stated.
- All animals must be secured from running at large on the Fair grounds.
- No smoking in any of the barns and arena.
- No livestock passes will be issued - on the day of the livestock show names of registered exhibitors will be present at the livestock gate and used to provide entrance to the fair grounds
- Number of included entrances to the Fair ground is reflected by the number of livestock present in the trailer/truck.
Cattle – one admission for 1 to 4 animals; one admission for each additional 4 animals.
Goats and Sheep - one admission for 1 to 8 animals; one admission for each additional 8 animals.
Light horses – two admissions for 1 or 2 animals; one admission for each additional 2 animals up to maximum of four admissions.
Heavy horses – three admissions for 1 or 2 animals; one admission each additional animal up to maximum of six admissions.
Poultry and Small Animals – one admission for 15 or more entries.

Project Competitions (Individual)

Information for Exhibitors:

- Open to any 4-H Club in Grenville County that has formed since September 2018 to present
- All exhibits must be Club Exhibits and must include the name of the exhibit and the name of the club and include the Canadian 4-H emblem anywhere on the front of the exhibit.
- Club members will prepare and place the exhibits under the direction of club leaders
- Approximately 1.5 meters of table space will be allowed for each club exhibit
- All entries must be the original work of the 4-H Member
- Exhibits and entries must be placed in the hall no later than 10:00 am Thursday September 8, 2023
- No exhibits to be removed from exhibit building before 4:30 pm Sunday
- Prize money will only be paid to worthy entries
- Please see General Rules and Regulations page 7 & 8.

Prize Money: 1st: \$5; 2nd Place: \$4; 3rd Place: \$3

Members from any of the 4-H clubs formed since September of the previous year may enter.

Junior 4-H Members 9 – 14 years

Senior 4-H Members 15 – 21 years

Poster Competition:

1. A Bristol board sized poster (22" x 28") on any topic relating to a project taken in the past year (livestock or life skills). Only one poster per project completed.
2. Member's name and age as of January 1st **MUST** be written on back of poster.
3. All posters **MUST** include the Canadian 4-H emblem and have a title.
4. A "**Me**" poster must include a collection of photos/pictures and a **TYPEWRITTEN** one-page (8 ½ x 11") article telling about yourself.
5. Poster of Photography must include a collection of 8 – 10 photos of "**YOUR CLUB IN ACTION**" mounted and labelled.

Club Projects:

1. An object made or a display, on any topic relating to a completed project
2. A project book related to any 4-H project completed during the club year.
NOTE: a project book is a standard size 1" binder or duo-tang.
3. Baking products are to be displayed on a small disposable plate or inserted in a zip top plastic bag. Recipe included on a small recipe card and attached to all baking products.

For further information, contact your club leader.

Suitable posters and exhibits will be taken to Regional Competition where they fit the criteria stipulated by the Regional Championship Show Committee by a 4-H Leader.

- **Online entries** due by Noon on Tuesday the week of the fair.
- ALL WORK MUST BE DONE BY THE CHILD UNLESS OTHERWISE STATED.
- Items to exhibit must be brought in between 6 pm & 9 pm Wednesday night September 6, or Thursday morning September 7 between 8 am and 10 am.
- Sunday: Exhibit Hall closes at 4 pm to prepare for pickup of exhibits.
- No exhibits to be removed from exhibit building before Sunday 4:30 pm.
- Each entry must not be previously entered.
- No student may enter more than one object per section.
- Food - All food should be covered with transparent wrap and displayed on disposable plates. Be sure you have the correct number of items in your entry. All decorations must be edible
- Vegetables - Be sure to have the correct number of items in each entry. Consider uniformity, size, colour, and trueness to shape when selecting your vegetables.
- Fair share exempts for all Junior Work.

Please read section descriptions carefully, the judges are obligated to judge accordingly. If the entered item doesn't fit the description it cannot be judged. (i.e. painting vs. drawing or teddy bear vs. any stuffed toy).

Class 1 - Preschool (under 4 yrs.)

Sections:

1. Decorated sugar cookies (3) – decorations done by child unassisted (only decorating judged)

Melt the marshmallows and butter in the microwave for 1 ½ min. or completely melted, stirring halfway through. 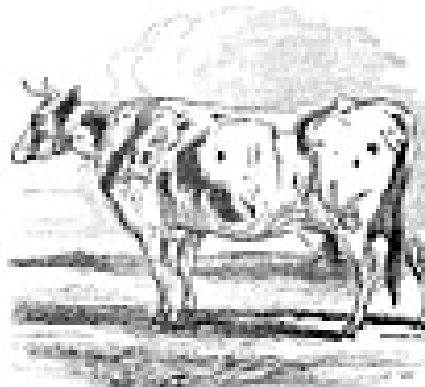

Then lead their horse to the finish line carrying the apple in their mouth. Exhibitors from sections 4 and 5 may enter this class. (Handler allowed but must not have contact with horse.
17. Musical Mats: 12 and Under – Elimination (one mat less than the horses) contestants circle the ring, riding to music. As the music stops contestants stop, dismount and race for a mat. Entrants in this class must be able to control horse without assistance.
18. Musical Mats: 13 and Over – Elimination (one mat less than the horses) contestants circle the ring, riding to music. As the music stops contestants stop, dismount and race for a mat. Entrants in this class must be able to control horse without assistance.
19. Sit-a-Buck: - Open – Elimination (saddles not to be used). Exhibitors hold a disk resembling a large coin under their leg and ride to the Judge's calls. As the disks fall the rider is eliminated.

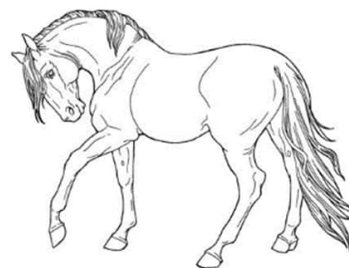
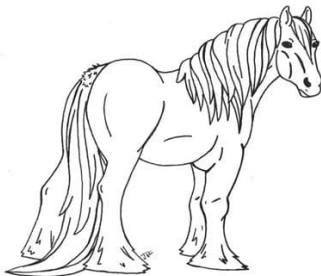

- All entry forms due at the fair office by 4 pm on the Monday prior to the Fair.
- **Online entries** due by Noon on Tuesday the week of the fair.
- Fair share 20% off all prize money
- Entry sheets must show the owner's name and address in full; the animals name, registration number and exact age: and the names and registration numbers of the animal's sire and dam. Registration numbers must be included, or the entry will be refused.
- All purebred animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor on or before the closing date for entry.
- Entries cannot be changed after the closing date. However, up to the time of showing, substitution of entries will be accepted where animals become unfit to show. Substitution means the replacement of another animal in the same section.
- Open to all sheep producers.
- A farm or breeding unit may make one entry per section and may choose two sections in which to make two entries. All sheep, whether owned by one person or more than one person individually or jointly, which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit.
- A valid health certificate issued after June 1st this year must be available at all times.
- All Exhibitors must follow dress code for single classes: black pants, white shirt.
- Sheep shown in the purebred classes must bear proper identification marks and may be examined at any time.
- All purebred sheep must be identified by tattoo.
- All Breeds except Leicesters and North Country Cheviots must be shown with less than one inch of fleece.
- Any class with only one breeder entered, will be transferred to the "All breeds" class
- To comply with the Canadian Sheep Identification Program all sheep and lambs must be tagged with the C.S.I.P. ear tag. Any animal without this tag will be barred from showing and must be removed from the exhibition building.
- Junior Show to take place at 1:00 pm. Limited to 15 children under the age of 14.
- For full prize money, there must be two exhibitors and twelve animals per breed.
