What Happens When You Volunteer and Support Those Who Do?

When mid-Michigan was affected by the dam failures, strangers from everywhere showed up to help. The evident tragedy mobilized a lot of hearts, hands, and wallets. As in other disasters, however, the fickle news cycle and the tug of commerce and comfort drew volunteers away. We are making progress only because Rob Brinks and other RMS volunteers partnered with OPC Disaster Response to help us rebuild. Why should you join RMS and volunteer, even after others have left?

1. We obey, imitate, and serve the Lord by obeying His Word. Jesus was mindful of the physical needs of both his disciples and those who came to hear him (Matthew 15 and John 21). James 2:16 reminds us that it is not enough to wish one another well but to meet physical needs. When we meet even the humblest of needs, we serve our Lord (Matthew 25:40).

2. We build up the body of Christ. In John 13:34, Jesus commands us to love one another and says that the world knows us by that love. In I John 3:17, we are told that compassion for brothers and sisters who have lost their worldly goods is one way of showing God's love.

3. We give encouragement to those afflicted. Satan and our fallen world intend evil for us, but God uses evil for good (Genesis 50:20). When Christians turn evil to good through their good works, God is glorified not only by the help given to those afflicted but also by those who see those good works (Matthew 5:16).

4. We multiply the effect of the work being done. Galatians 6:9-10 warns us against growing weary while doing good. How can we heed the wisdom of Scripture and avoid this weariness? One solution is to remember the mathematics of volunteering. Mathematically speaking, when three volunteers are joined by a fourth, the number of



volunteers rises by 33 percent. But any volunteer can tell you it feels like 50 or 100 percent more. The work goes faster, hearts are happier, and burdens are lighter. One volunteer often feels like more.

5. We do good for ourselves. Scripture doesn't just warn us of the pitfall of weariness in doing good, it promises us a reward when we press through that weariness – a harvest that comes from helping anyone and especially those in the household of faith. Such rewards are in God's Providence, but at least one reward is immediate: God wires us to feel better after helping others.

As a beneficiary of RMS's good work, I encourage you to reach out to Rob and find out how you can help through RMS. You will be surprised by how much good you can do.

This trailer joins two tool trailers that are being used in other areas of the country.
