LIVING OUR FAITH

Another year of pandemic saw the church continue to adapt to the evolving world of technology. With online streaming platforms serving congregations for the better part of two years, hybrid-styled worship services, meetings and conventions have quickly become the norm, seeing what will likely be an ongoing shift in participation to both virtual and in-person attendance.

Much like that of last year, 2022 provided similar challenges as the world continued to overcome various hurdles related to the COVID-19 pandemic. With worship and larger-scale events remaining online in 2021 for the majority of congregations across the ELCIC, 2022 saw the return of safe, in-person gatherings.

Bible camps, fundraisers, board meetings and Sunday worship services began to work their way back into the fold.

Technology such as Zoom, YouTube and Box has allowed us to remain a tight-knit community. Bishops have been able to meet more regularly, while Anglican and Lutheran staff have consistently tuned in, working closely on shared areas of work. National and Synod treasurers have met monthly, helping sift through the available government support. We have been able to remain working closely with our partners.

Amid the many questions, we have found ways to continue gathering together as a church In Mission for Others.

The 2022 ELCIC National Convention: online edition

The National Convention of the ELCIC met online, July 15-16, 2022 during three, three-hour sessions under the theme Let There be Greening. "This is our first-ever online convention. This

year we will only be doing the necessary business that we are legally required to do," National Bishop Susan Johnson wrote in her greeting in the Bulletin of Reports.

National Church Council reported that it had approved a new ELCIC vision statement: "God's grace and unconditional love calls us to be a diverse, inclusive community that celebrates all and upholds life-giving relationships." Further work will be done to communicate this broadly and develop this statement into a new

tagline, replacing the current In Mission for Others tagline.

In her address, Bishop Johnson acknowledged the harms that members of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community have experienced in the church. "Today I apologize to the members of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community for the ways that we have not lived up to our commitments and to the ways we have treated you in the past and even now," she said.

Bishop Johnson acknowledged the times members of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community did not receive welcome, had been denied sacraments, vocation, marriage rights, and when proper gender identity had not been affirmed. She made it clear that the entire church had much work to do in the areas of acceptance and affirmation.

In the near future, the special 2023 convention in Calgary, AB, will see the reports and recommendations of The Task Force on Addressing Homophobia, Biphobia and Transphobia, The Task Force on Addressing Ableism, and The Task Force on Addressing Racism, White Supremacy, and issues of Racial Injustice.

Fun in the sun at Bible camp in Standard, AB

For 22 children in Standard, AB., the hopes of attending summer Bible camp became a reality. Through some hard work, fundraising, and the "campership" program, the congregation of Nazareth was able to see each of the 22 children that applied for camp live out their hopes, whether they were members of Nazareth or not.

The program saw the congregation and camp hopefuls raise funds primarily through a bike-a-thon in June—which in turn paid the way for children in Standard who wanted to attend the summer Bible camp. The children who were given camperships were asked to help raise funds through the bike-a-thon.

Rev. Kate Zaiser, who was fortunate enough to be the camp chaplain for one of the weeks the Standard kids went to camp, said it was amazing how "normal" the whole week was.

"Everyone was rapid-tested upon arrival, and then they ran the camp as usual," Zaiser said. "For one activity, we all stood in a circle holding hands, and I couldn't help marveling at how surprising and wonderful it felt to be in contact with other people again. And even more importantly, the kids all had a blast, and a return to what childhood is supposed to be like."

With a waning youth membership at one Coquitlam, B.C. Anglican congregation came the support of the local Lutheran church, located just down the street. The combination of the two youth groups was both a logical and necessary step. St. Laurence Anglican Church had staff but few teenagers, while Good Shepherd Lutheran had teenagers but no leaders. Just before the pandemic hit, the two congregations decided to merge youth ministry under the name ignYte.

"This really did feel like it emerged very organically and the spirit was in it," said Jason Wood, minister of youth and families at St. Laurence. "We had a need, and they had a need and because of that similarity and because of our context, it was a natural fit."

Formalized with the 2001 Waterloo Declaration, the relationship between the ELCIC and the Anglican Church of Canada has resulted in many levels of co-operation and collaboration between the two denominations, much like that of the partnership between Good Shepherd and St. Laurence. Now 20 years into the partnership, congregations and denominational leaders continue to discover new ways to work together, pursing common goals.

The Urban continues the work outside its doors

Lutheran Urban Ministry Corp. (the Urban) is a partner ministry of the Manitoban/Northwestern Ontario Synod. And over the past two years, it has shifted its practice from inviting locals to friendly visits/sharing circles over coffee and lunches in the narthex of Lutheran Church of the Cross to a new socially-distanced delivery method.

The Urban's bagged meal program has resulted in approximately 1,000 bagged meals per month, four times a week distributed outside the door since mid-March 2020. The overwhelming enthusiasm, love and support from the Urban's meal teams indicate the success of the program far after the pandemic's end.

The Urban is a ministry standing with Winnipeg's urban community to support physical, mental and spiritual needs. Its sharing circles, worship services and a planned drop-in for women (with children too) feed the greatest hunger, even more than the food for the body.

Despite the ongoing pandemic, the Urban continues to thrive thanks in large part to its volunteers, donors and leaders, who have made what could have been a disappointing closure into another COVID success story.

Lutheran youth aim to tackle climate change head-on

It is no secret that the climate crisis has become a major worldly concern over the past number of years. With a heightened awareness of climate change—stemming from major hurricanes, extreme heat domes,

droughts and major floods —leaders from across the ELCIC have found ways to lessen their carbon footprint, while other have been able to help raise awareness of the ongoing battle.

In expressing their concerns, the ELCIC's national and synodical bishops called the Canadian government to action on reducing greenhouse emissions, while mitigating the dire impacts of climate change. "As Christians, we are called to care for the whole of creation and to be responsible to our neighbours and communities," National Bishop Susan Johnson wrote in her letter.

One young Eastern Synod member living out Bishop Johnson's call to care for creation is circumpolar climate scientist Katarina Kuhnert, who has spent the past year working north of the Arctic Circle focusing on ecosystem changes in the region.

"Climate change is an intersectional and an inter-generational issue, and we need to respond in a diversity of ways across generations," Kuhnert says. "This affects everyone from youth and children to adults, elders and leaders in the church. The potential for challenges of the current climate crisis impacts so many elements in our lives. When we hold the burdens of challenge and change together they become a little bit lighter."

Augustana Evangelical Lutheran Church Annual General Meeting Minutes (DRAFT) March 6, 2022

Location: Zoom **Attendance:** 36 Members, 1 Non-Voting Participant

1. Call to Order and Opening Devotions

Pastor Marilyn called the meeting to order at 1:14 pm, beginning with the opening devotions shared onscreen so that attendees could easily participate. Church Council Chairperson, Dawn Ingram then assumed the chair.

2. Adoption of Agenda

Change: 8.2 should read "Motion to appoint the auditors for 2022"

AGM_2022_1: MSC (Gord Morley/Greg Fowlie-Neufeld): That the agenda be adopted as amended.

3. Minutes

- **3.1.** Acceptance of Minutes from Annual General Meeting March **21, 2021** Change: "Christian Children's Fund is now Children Believe."
 - 7.3 Correct spelling of Pat Blakley and Josh and Gabi Lindenbach's names (check for these errors throughout the document).
 - 7.4 Correct spelling of treasurer, Correct Canadian Wage Subsidy to "Canadian Emergency Wage Subsidy". Note this subsidy began at 75% of workers wages, but the percentage decreased over time. The last sentence should read "church" not churches.

AGM_2022_2: MSC (Rose Ingram/Gayle Dixon): That the minutes of the AGM of March 21, 2021 be adopted as amended.

4. Business Arising from the Minutes

Questions were raised around two items from last year's AGM meeting minutes.

- 1) Had church council investigated if we wanted to continue with the same auditors for the coming year? Council has not yet sought quotes from other firms and established if there is a more competitive option around having our financial statements audited so for the coming year, we plan to use the same auditors, and this will go back to church council for further consideration.
- 2) There was conversation at the 2021 AGM about creating a permanent nominating committee, because contacting and recruiting for church council requires a specific skill set that not every council member has. This year council had those leaving council form the nominating committee. Further conversation will happen at council around the creation of a permanent nominating committee.

5. Appointment of Scrutineers

AGM_2022_3: MSC (Gord Morley/Pat Blakley): That Mik Bickis and Larry Trenouth be appointed as scrutineers.

6. Recognition of committees, volunteers and outgoing Council Members

Both Chairperson Dawn and Pastor Marilyn acknowledged Joey Lafrance and Faith Rohrbough for their commitment to church council. Carol Kostiuk (parish nurse) and Tammy Schumaker (custodian) who retired in the last year were also acknowledged. Gord Morley was also thanked for his experience and expertise in helping to keep the church building in good shape. The committees of the church were thanked for their involvement in the operation of the church. It was noted that the list of committee members for the ELW was incomplete in the AGM reports document, the complete list of committee members will be sent to Lorene so the committee list can be updated.

7. REPORTS

7.1. Pastor

Pastor Marilyn highlighted her appreciation for the patience and kindness that the congregation has continued to show throughout the year as COVID continues to be part of our lives. She noted that Augustana is missing the presence of a parish nurse and it will be challenging to fill that position but that there remains a commitment to finding a new parish nurse, hopefully soon. Pastor Marilyn also noted that this year's word for the congregation is courage.

7.2. Choir Director

There was a thank-you given to the choir for enhancing worship this past year.

7.3. Reports from all committees on Mission and Management of the Church.

Worship:

Worship: No further report.

Altar Guild: Lynda Stauffer was thanked for her work in making sure the vestments are seasonally appropriate and setting up the church space for services.

Learning:

Sunday School: No further report.

Reconciling in Christ: Margareth Peterson indicated that the RIC committee has, like many other committees of the church, been challenged by the COVID-19 pandemic. Margareth also indicated that she is ready to step back from the chair role in the RIC committee and so there will be a need for a new chair and consideration of the future of RIC. Monica Johnson indicated her support for the RIC committee. Margareth was thanked for her work on the RIC committee.

ELW: No further report

Witness/Service:

Social Ministry: Jim and Tannis Sharp indicated that they are looking for someone to take over the coordination of supplies for Queen Elizabeth School.

Heather Kleiner also raised the need for additional support and new leadership for the social ministry projects she has been involved with. She also noted that one of the major projects that social ministry has been able to undertake during the pandemic has been the creation of layettes which have been distributed both locally and oversees.

Health Cabinet: No further report.

Augustana and NEST Working Together: No further report, however, excitement was expressed about the fact the Iqbal family will be coming to Canada in the coming months.

Support:

SE7C - **Saskatoon ELCIC 7 Churches**: See written report. A brief conversation was held about the SE7C lack of meetings and about how all SE7C churches have been faced with challenges.

7.4. Finance:

It was noted that the rent from the 1209 property is currently providing support for the operation of the church (historically it has provided the emergency/large project funds). This is not ideal. It was noted that we need to consider how we move forward as a church.

8. NEW BUSINESS

8.1 Motions from Council

8.1.1 Proposed budget for 2022

Heather Ward began by thanking Larry Trenouth, Monica Johnson and Karen Wallace for their help in creating the 2022 budget. Heather further contextualized the budget in another year of uncertainty around what will happen with COVID and larger services that are often a significant source of income. The offering numbers are based on an average of past years' offerings and attempted to be realistic to what Augustana could actually expect to see. Item lines like building maintenance are somewhat uncertain and as much as possible are forecast based on worst case scenarios. The budget presented is a significantly deficit one and this was not done lightly but did represent what seemed realistic for the coming year.

A question was raised about the difference between having the church financial information audited versus reviewed. It was indicated that having a review of the financial statements would likely be slightly cheaper but likely did not represent a significant cost savings (particularly because everything is set up for an audit of the church financials). Also of note is that the cost listed in that budget line represents both the cost for the audit and accounting over the year. Monica indicated a correction to the budget, that what is being paid out to charities and what is coming in should be the same value because Augustana is acting as a convenient way for people to donate to other charities.

A question was raised about the cost of insurance, and it was indicated that these costs and the appropriateness of our policy is reviewed annually when the policy is renewed. It was noted that the insurance costs were budgeted high this year as it is expected that insurance will increase significantly.

A question was raised about how little the choir director is paid relative to the musicians. It was noted that the choir director is also a church musician, and musicians are paid per service. It was agreed that it would be ideal to be able to pay our choir director more for the amazing work she does, and as a congregation we don't want to lose our choir director or church musicians as they bring so much to the services. It also must be acknowledged that this is a deficit budget so it is not ideal to add to the budget.

The budget committee was commended for increasing the amount given to the wider church in this budget as that was seen as important. The fact of the deficit budget and that this is not sustainable for the long term was raised. This led to some questions around, Where we are as a church and how we can move forward with a vision for our mission? What do we as a church value, so we can align our financial priorities with our values?

Heather asked the question is this a budget we want to accept for this year, knowing that we have work to do regarding how we move forward? As a congregation and as church council we will need to consider how to establish what is next, but this is a further conversation to the budget.

AGM_2022_6: MSC (Heather Ward/Karen Wallace): That the 2022 budget be adopted as presented.

8.2 Appointment of auditors/reviewers for 2022

AGM_2022_7: MSC (Echo Fettes/Gayle Dixon): That Heagy LLP be appointed as auditors for 2022.

8.3 Nominating Committee Report

The nominating committee was unsuccessful in finding new council members so a call for nominations from the floor was placed. The following people were nominated from the floor: Shelley Apolonia, Bryan Tastad, Sandra Cey and Monica Johnson. All declined the nomination. There were no additional nominations.

8.4 Election of Council members

Due to a lack of nominations, no one was elected to council. It becomes the role of the current council to continue to work to fill the open positions.

8.5 Election of Nominating Committee for the AGM in 2023

Council is to further consider having a permanent committee. At this point those leaving council next year will be responsible for finding new council members.

9. Other Business:

9.1. Forward Planning

Pastor Marilyn raised a question around forward planning. She will be seeking information on what the congregation would like the process to look like because the process can be as important as the outcome itself.

Conversation was had about how best to hold further conversations. Zoom was discussed as having advantages in some contexts but may feel too impersonal for deeper conversations about what matters to congregation members and what it is most important to maintain, especially in the context of emotion laden conversations. It was noted that small group conversations might be most helpful in eliciting values and what is important to Augustana's congregation.

It was noted that not all options could be considered in isolation from other churches within the city as one option might be the merging of congregations. It was seen as important to engage all possibilities. Another idea raised was the creative use of church space (such as with a daycare that would use space during the week during the day). Keeping an eye on what the seminary is doing might also be worthwhile because they are also creatively considering the future of the church broadly.

It was suggested that a working group to lead this process might be helpful in structuring and considering these larger questions. This was supported by those in attendance because it is difficult to have nuanced conversations with larger groups and leadership is important to the success of this planning/thinking. Gord Morley expressed interest in

being involved in this leadership group. Echo was willing to consider but not commit to being part of this leadership group.

It was raised that despite the challenges of the last two years Augustana has done okay and as such this next phase of consideration can be approached from a place of having been adaptable and successful in the changes and challenges of a global pandemic.

In terms of next steps, it was suggested that Council create a working group to consider the future and vision of the church.

AGM_2022_7: MSC (Mik Bickis/Heather Ward): That the congregation recommends Augustana church council strike a working group on the vision for and future of the church.

10. Closing Devotions and Adjournment

Pastor Marilyn led the closing devotion with the text on the screen to facilitate attendee participation.

Chairperson Dawn Ingram declared the meeting adjourned at 2:41 pm.

Council members' service is limited to a maximum of two consecutive 3 year terms before they are required to take a leave from service.

Notes:

Of the council members ending their terms at this 2022 annual meeting:

- Katie Ottley has served 1 consecutive three-year term and is eligible for re-election for 1, 2, or 3 years if she so chooses;
- Up to 4 new council members are needed.
- The Nominating Committee for the AGM in 2024 may be formed by those leaving council, or the current council who will seek candidates to fill at least 2 three-year terms and 2 two year terms.

Church Council Chair's Report

Augustana Church Family:

As we reflect back on this past year, we can be very proud of all that Augustana has achieved. We had in person services, and we relaxed the covid restrictions, but we are still encouraging people to wear masks. Covid is not going away anytime soon, but we can be diligent in keeping up with our vaccines as they become available, and we have shown that we can adapt to any changes that come our way.

We had our annual garage sale in May. We also were able to have the Jazz service on July 3 in connection with the Saskatoon Jazz Festival. There was also the construction on 7th Street over the summer to improve the infrastructure and get rid of our lead pipes.

In September, we were a part of the Broadway Street Fair again. We saw the arrival of Nadia, Ibrahim and their two children from Syria via Lebanon, after being separated from her family for seven years. Each of these people, dedicated members of Augustana, even more dedicated council members, have pulled together this past year. We had meetings, emails with the Bishop, meetings during the summer, reports to make, a call committee to form, congregational profile to update, duties of church council to comprise, a budget to prepare, and many, many other duties that needed to be done to keep our church going. We work well together and I am sorry to see the 2022 church council come to an end. I have been honoured to serve on church council these past six years, the last three as your church council chairperson. I have learned a lot.

What the future holds for Augustana, in my opinion, could be bright. We do so many things in the community to help others; you need to read the congregational profile. The list is long. As our congregation ages, we need younger people (75 and younger), to step up and start to get involved to take the burden off those who have been doing it for so long. Choir Director's Report

Challenged by the emergence of the Omicron variant at the start of the New Year, the Choir drew on know-how acquired earlier in the pandemic --along with some Spirit-led creativity--in order to continue singing safely. We shifted back to on-line rehearsals through January and February. During this period the singers remotely prepared a few anthems which were included in the livestream. We also got to work on a short "cantata" planned for Passion Sunday: multiple choral selections reflecting on the last days of Jesus were chosen from various sources and woven into the Passion Narrative in consultation with Pastor Marilyn. The music was chosen in part because it could be adapted for either a small or larger group of singers, which was important due to the uncertainty of the times; we hoped and planned to sing it "live" but there was also the possibility it would be recorded instead. Choir members picked up their music in January in order to work at home, and rehearsal tracks were made available to assist with their preparation. The cantata project offered a satisfying challenge and enough variety to fill those uncertain winter weeks, and seeing each others' faces on the computer screen helped keep us connected and hopeful.

Choir members (up to four per Sunday) signed up to sing in small groups to lead hymn- and liturgy-singing in Augustana's streamed services, which from early January to mid-March were open only to worship leaders. Hymn numbers were sent out in advance, and for a while we also met for a 10 a.m. rehearsal. Singers were masked and distanced, and the microphones positioned to ensure our voices would be captured on the broadcast. Several choristers also served as cantors.

Augustana opened its doors to in-person worship on March 27 and at this time remote recording of choir music effectively ceased. We were able to resume in-person rehearsals on Thursday, March 17. We determined that the sanctuary was a safer space than the Fellowship Hall, and our rehearsals have taken place there ever since. Windows were kept open when possible and we maintained our practice of masking. This all took getting used to, but the consensus was that rehearsals were working quite well. The cantata was performed live, in-person and before a live congregation on Sunday, April 10.

Our in-person Easter anthem (April 17) "This is the Day" was sung with exceptional gusto, as we had not been able to sing live on Easter Sunday for a few years! We continued to offer anthems through the Easter Season and presented a couple of unique songs at the Festival of Pentecost.

Fall of 2022 was busy for the choir, which was involved in Pastor Marilyn's Farewell service as well as Pastor Kirk's installation as interim pastor. The choir sang an anthem on each of the Sundays in Advent, as well as on Christmas Eve. We also assisted in the introduction of new hymns from *All Creation Sings*, the latest supplement to our Evangelical Lutheran Worship.

A special word of thanks to Mik Bickis for occasionally directing the choir, Anna-Marie Skogsrud for musical support, our soloists, cantors and instrumentalists for enhancing our worship, our technical people for all their assistance and Pastors Marilyn and Kirk for their musical and spiritual support.

Saskatchewan Synod Insert for 2022 Congregational Annual Reports Year-end letter from Bishop Sid Haugen

Dear partners in the Gospel,

Again, this year, before reporting on 2022, I would like to take a moment review the role of the synod and the role of congregations.

Congregations or faith communities are the core of our church. At the congregational level, the Word is preached, the sacraments are shared, and service to the world is carried out. At the congregational level 'the rubber hits the road' for our church. The word synod comes from the from the Greek words *sun* (with) and *hodos* (road). A synod is those who are literally 'with each other on the road.' By 'Saskatchewan Synod' we mean **all** the congregations and related ministries that walk together in Saskatchewan and NW Manitoba. Congregations though remarkably independent bodies, gather themselves into synods for two reasons: 1. to accomplish things an individual congregation could not and 2. to take care of other congregations who may need the support offered by the synod.

Saskatchewan Synod Convention, by constitution, elects a Synod council to be the governing body of the synod of congregations and elects a Bishop to serve as the synod's lead pastor and chief executive officer.

How does the synod of congregations resource that synod leadership? Remarkably, financial giving to ensure leadership for our synod is determined freely and independently by each congregation. Each congregation contributes to the synod balancing their own resources with their strong sense of call to provide support for the synod: for congregations in need, for our national church, for our seminary.

Report on 2022

This report briefly addresses two items:

- 1. the benevolence received by synod leadership in 2022 from the synod of congregations
- 2. how synod leadership has worked with that benevolence.

Benevolence received from synod congregations in 2022

Rather than speaking directly to this, I'm inserting here a paragraph provided by our finance manager: Congregational benevolence to Synod in 2022 was \$412,139, only 91.6% of a deficit budget and 4% behind the previous year of 2021. This means we are operating at more of a loss than budgeted. While median giving returned post-pandemic, the number of congregations sending benevolence is dropping. For 2023, we have budgeted only a partial return to pre-pandemic support, even though the full amount of 2019 benevolence, \$500,000, is needed to sustain synod operations. We anticipate an operating loss, even if benevolence increases in 2023 over 2022, to maintain services and our commitments to the national church and the seminary. We hope for a return to balanced budgets in 2024.

How Synod leadership has worked with the benevolence received from synod congregations in 2022 Synod council continued to "pay it forward" by contributing as 'first fruits' ('off the top') 35% of congregational benevolence to support key partners in ministry: 20% to the ministry of our National Church; 15% to Lutheran Theological Seminary, our seminary in Saskatoon.

Synod council approved a budget for the work of the Bishop's office. The Bishop's office employs a total of 2.5 full time equivalents to support the administrative and pastoral work of the Bishop in supporting our synod of 100 congregations, 3 synod ministries, and 125 rostered ministers (about half of which are retired).

- The Administrative Team at our Saskatoon office consists of a .75-time office manager, a .5-time executive assistant, and a .25-time finance manager. The administrative team at the office in Saskatoon continues to develop communication channels for our synod council and committees, congregations, ministries and rostered ministers as well as assisting them in administrative and financial matters. The synod website, Share point sites, synod leadership email distribution lists, SaskSynod News, and video conferencing are key tools for their work.
- The Pastoral Team supports congregations, ministries and rostered ministers 'on the road'. Through 2021 the pastoral team consisted of a full-time Bishop and two .25 time Assistants to the Bishop. With the retirement of our part time assistants in early 2022, Synod council approved the Bishop's request for a full-time assistant to the Bishop. Rev. Dr. Ali Tote accepted the call to serve and came on staff in May. The position is made possible through a designated fund rather than being supported by general benevolence. Since coming on staff, Pastor Ali has further extended the pastoral team's role of providing care and direction for congregations, ministries and rostered ministers in our synod. We walk beside faith communities facing difficult questions. How do congregations access leadership when they no longer have the resources to call even a part-time minister? How will the church identify and support church leaders with a deepening shortage of rostered ministers? How do we better share the ministers we have on the roster? How do we train and engage and provide mentoring for Lay Ministry Leaders? Approaches to these questions will be appearing in 2023.

Closing words

So here we stand. It is hard to believe that almost 3 years ago the prime minister went on television to tell us, basically: 'there is a wolf at the door—don't leave the house!' Since then, we have travelled a bumpy road. From shockingly closed church doors to difficult limited meetings of just a few people (meetings without singing and without communion), through the seemingly endless process of relaxing and reestablishing restrictions. It has been exhausting! As we come to this time when pandemic restrictions are largely lifted, the weariness is showing in our communities. While we learned much during the pandemic (about online worship, financing through direct debit and much more), we lost so much momentum. But I do believe that, gradually, step by step, week by week, as we 'do what we do', as we follow our calling from our gracious God, we are making our way back to life. We know that God has seen the church through much more difficult times than this. And here we stand.

What does the future look like? None of us can say with certainty. But God is good. So, I invite you, again, as people of faith, to enter 2023 placing the work of our whole synod and ourselves in God's hands in this familiar prayer:

You have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown.

Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

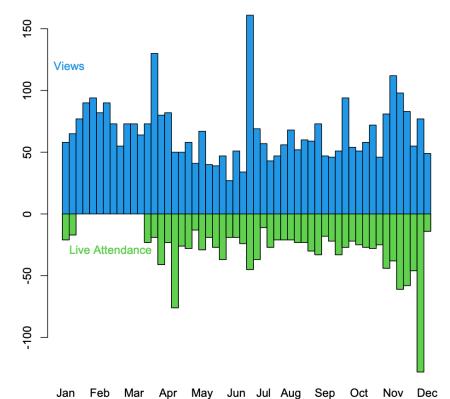

Worship Committee Report

The Worship Committee met five times during 2022, all meetings by Zoom. The members are Pat Blakley, Mik Bickis, Deborah Buck, Katie Ottley, Anna-Marie Skogsrud, Ashley Smith, as well as the Pastor and church administrator Lorene Jewitt. The year presented several challenges for the committee to deal with.

After having resumed live worship in the previous year on account of reduced risk due of Covid-19 transmission, a surge of the new Omicron variant in Saskatoon caused us to reconsider this practice. After consultation with the Health Cabinet and Synod advisors, live services were suspended from January 15th until March 20th. During this period, attendance was restricted to those involved in producing the live stream: pastor, lector, musicians, technical crew, and a few choir members to support singing. Services were live-streamed over YouTube at the regular worship time. Once live services were resumed, worshippers were requested to pre-register so

that the congregation size could be limited 20 people. As restrictions were reduced, gradually the requirement for pre-registration was eventually lifted, but for a while people were required to sign in when entering so that records of attendees could be Once kept. live services were resumed, communion was celebrated on the first Sunday of every month. Two services were held on Easter Sunday and Christmas Eve to reduce the number of attendees at each service. Communion was also celebrated on the first service of Easter. During December, communion was

celebrated every Sunday (one of which was Christmas Day), with the intention to have communion twice a month thereafter.

Pastor Marilyn had to take medical leave following Easter Sunday, and has not been able to return to work. However, regular worship continued uninterrupted with the help of a number of supply preachers, lay leaders, and recorded sermons. During this time, choice of hymns was assigned to the musicians. Pastor Michael Diegel was able to provide leadership for many of the services, but we also had guest preachers Greg Fowlie-Neufeld, Kristin Soveran, Hugh Farmer, Ken Neumann, Alexa Wallace, and Ann Salmon. Pat Blakley, Ruth Zuk, Katie Ottley, and Larry Trenouth provided lay leadership for services with pre-recorded sermons given by Pastor Lyle McKenzie, Pastor Prema Samuel, Deacon Michelle Collins, and Bishop Michael Pryse. Subsequently Pastor Kirk Tastad was hired as Interim Pastor, who has been presiding at our worship since the first Sunday of Advent. He was installed by Bishop Sid Haugen at a service on December 11.

The organ started showing quirks during the spring, so Brian Thompson of Thompson Organ Sales was asked to come by and do some checking and tune-ups. Several problems were fixed but it took a couple of other visits to get everything in order. The speaker covers are showing the effects of time which is affecting the sound quality. Mr. Thompson recommended that they be replaced, and we have entered an item in the budget to finance this repair.

In line with Augustana's tradition of variety, worship followed several musical settings. Settings 4 and 3 were used during Epiphany season, Lent, and Easter. From Pentecost through to September a pared-down liturgy was used, taking the music from Setting 7 when communion was celebrated. Setting 1 was begun in September changing to Setting 5 for Advent up to Epiphany. On April 10 (Palm/Passion Sunday) in place of a regular liturgy the choir presented a cantata assembled from various appropriate anthems by our able director Deborah Buck. Good Friday was marked with a Tenebrae service. On July 3, we revived a long-standing Augustana tradition of a jazz liturgy, led by Sheldon Corbett, Glen Enns, Kim Salkeld, Bruce Wilkinson, and special surprise guest trumpeter and composer Pastor David Hunter.

A number of hymns from the supplement *All Creation Sings,* which was purchased last year, were performed as choir anthems or sung as congregational hymns. Purchase of sufficiently many copies for congregational use was requested in the upcoming budget. A theme of "Generation to Generation" was woven through the services of Advent, using resources from a group called "A Sanctified Art". During this season we also had a hands-on project for members of all ages to colouring panels to be progressively mounted on the altar.

Our worship services involved may people to whom we owe our gratitude. First, we want to thank Pastor Marilyn and Pastor Kirk, as well as our supply preachers for their leadership and inspiring messages. Musical leadership on piano and organ was provided by our talent team of Mik Bickis, Deborah Buck, and Anna-Marie Skogsrud. Anthems were frequently provided by the choir, ably directed by Deborah Buck. During a time of few in-person worshippers, the choir's strong voices also supported congregational singing. We also thank Aaron Bueckert, Cherie Jarock, Elsa and

Hannah Lissel-DeCorby for further musical enrichment at special services. Thanks are also due to the many readers, cantors, communion assistants, and ushers, as well as the Altar Guild, who together ensured that all things ran smoothly. And special thanks to our technical team: Michael Diegel, Greg Fowlie-Neufeld, Katie Ottley, Bryan Tastad, and Karen Wallace for ensuring that even those unable to be present in our sanctuary are still able to worship with us.

Our opportunities for outreach and service in 2022, although curtailed due to Covid-19, included:

- knitting/crocheting mittens and other knitted articles for distribution to Haven Kids' House (formerly Crisis Nursery), Interval House and the Salvation Army.

In 2022, we financially supported LAMP (Lutheran Association of Missionary Pilots) Canada, LuMinHos, Camp Kinasao, the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Canadian Lutheran World Relief, Lutheran Campus Ministry, our adopted child, Abdoul Ousmane Singbeogo, a ten-year old boy from Burkina Faso (West African Interior), Primates World Relief and Development Fund, On Eagles Wings, the Salvation Army and General Ministry (Augustana). Social Ministry Report

The world continues to be in turmoil, but Augustana, as a caring and giving community, is continuing the social ministry that makes a difference in not only our own community but the world at large.

The following is an overview of the projects and ways we have contributed this year.

QUEEN ELIZABETH SCHOOL

The Queen Elizabeth School supply project went ahead again this fall. Thank you to all who contributed school supplies, gently used winter clothing and monetary gifts. With a portion of the monetary gift, the school purchased hot chocolate and Christmas cookies for a treat after a morning of games and team building. Principal Janna Leel, in her thank you letter, commented "if you have never had the opportunity to watch a room full of kids, laughing together and sharing time over hot chocolate and cookies, you need to try it". The remaining funds will be used for the school's breakfast program – the balance to provide for a week of breakfasts for the students who access the program.

BABY ITEMS

In the absence of the CLWR layette program, which has been discontinued for now, new and gently used baby items were sewn, collected and distributed to the following organizations:

Health Cabinet Report

2022 was another challenging year for the Health Cabinet but relief was in sight. We started out the year doing Zoom meetings and in September we began in person meetings for those who felt comfortable in attending.

In the Spring the Health Cabinet participated in the decisions made to allow for a safe return to in person church services.

Our AED was outdated, and it was replaced in September. Unfortunately, our recruitment for CPR classes was poor in October and we have had to postpone our class until the spring of 2023. A new date will be set and announced soon.

A Parish Nurse has not been found yet but we are still hoping to fill that position.

Our Christmas Hamper campaign was successful again this year with your generous donations! \$1575 was raised and this allowed us to provide 17 families with a grocery voucher for Christmas. THANK YOU!

Our Health Cabinet membership has begun to decrease. We wish to acknowledge Alice Hamp for her many years in helping with Augustana's ministry. We also wish to acknowledge Eileen Carlson for her years in helping to establish the Health Cabinet and then again for the past few years since she came back to share her experience and knowledge with us.

We would welcome anyone who would be interested in helping with our committee – no medical experience is necessary.

Augustana and NEST: Working Together

Thank you to the congregation of Augustana Lutheran for your continued support of Nest! During 2022, members of Augustana came out and supported our Nest Equinox Supper on March 20, and many of you returned for our Garden Tours in July.

Nest welcomed 28 people this past year, setting a new record for arrivals. Our Sudanese family in Egypt with relatives in Saskatoon arrived on March 31. The Iqbal family, Pakistani Christians in Thailand, waited six years to get to Saskatoon. They finally arrived on July 28. Another Sudanese family, who waited in Israel for four years for their application to be processed, arrived in Saskatoon on October 19. We also welcomed many Afghan refugee families who came in through the Canadian government's Operation Afghan Safety Program. Human rights activist Maria Reha and her two adult sons arrived in May after eight months, Maryam Rajaee, her husband Yousuf and their two little girls arrived in August (after only four months), Afghan prosecutor Rohi Rasa and her husband Mojeeb also arrived in August after only 4 months.) Last by not least, our Syrian family waiting in Lebanon since 2018 arrived in September.

ARRIVAL OF THE ALHAMAD/ABDULWAHEED FAMILY



The family of Nadia Alhamad, Ibrahim Abdulwaheed and their children Rahma and Mohamad arrived safely in Saskatoon on September 22, 2022. It was a very happy reunion.

Zahra, Nadia's mother, had not seen her daughter since 2016 when Zahra and her other five children came to Canada as refugees from Syria. And Zahra had never seen her grandchildren Rahma (5) and Mohamad (who will turn 1 in

April, 2023) so there were lots of tears, hugs, and delight in the little ones.



Since arriving in Saskatoon, Nadia and Ibrahim rented and furnished an apartment, received medical care and started Rahma in kindergarten. Ibrahim began taking English classes at the Global Gathering Place and Nadia will start classes in the New Year.

Augustana/Nest got involved in the process of bringing this family to Canada in 2018. The Sponsorship Agreement Holder is the Anglican Diocese of Saskatoon, the Community Group is Nest Saskatoon and the co-sponsors are Zahra's family and Augustana. Thanks to Augustana members for your strong support for the family and to the following who serve on the Settlement Team: Jane and Mik Bickis, Marilyn Fowlie-Neufeld, Monica Johnson, Heather Kleiner, Margareth Peterson, Noreen Donald and Bryan Tastad, and Heather Ward.

SE7C - Saskatoon ELCIC 7 Churches

In 2019, the seven ELCIC churches in Saskatoon—Augustana, Good Shepherd, King of Glory, Redeemer, Resurrection, Trinity, and Zion—formed a group to enhance collaboration and communication between congregations.

Unfortunately since the start of the pandemic, there have been no follow-up meetings of the SE7C group. However, the administrative staff of the SE7C have had a couple of lunch gatherings: one in June of 2022 and one this past January.

The 7 churches are also sharing Lenten services in 2023, so this group may be meeting again soon.

Property Care Report

In 2022 a number of building maintenance issues for 1201 and 1209 Broadway Aveneue were addressed. Highlights of these are listed below:

- Annual furnace inspections (December) and fire extinguishers inspections (October) were performed by contractors for the church. A furnace inspection was also carried out for the rental property in October.
- There was a sewer blockage caused by tree roots which required a contractor to clear. This issue should now be resolved with the new lines installed by the City of Saskatoon. The City of Saskatoon replaced the main sewer lines in the entire neighbourhood and the church required a temporary water supply for most of the summer. As a result, the underground water sprinklers were not available to water the grass. **A discussion as to the future of the lawn is required as the grass has become thin and a large number of weeds now dominate the lawn.
- Snow removal (All View Lawn Care), lawn mowing (JDM Lawn Care), and aeration was performed by a contractor. (Thanks to Joey Lafrance who coordinated this).
- A number of fluorescent lighting fixtures failed in the basement main gathering area in the church. A total of 7 ballasts were removed and replaced with T8 replacement tubes. As ballasts fail, the plan is to continue replacing ballasts with T8 LED Tubes. This means that these fixtures can NO LONGER USE Fluorescent tubes. (A sticker indicating No Ballast has been put inside each fixture). The church has a supply of fluorescent bulbs which will continue to be used in existing fixtures that contain a ballast.
- The basement hall floor was waxed in March. A quote was provided for the upstairs but this was not done at that time.
- The faucets in the 1209 kitchen sink upstairs rental were replaced by Merv Johnson. The stove was replaced (with a used one) in the upstairs 1209 suite and the dryer for rental property was also replaced (used one) in January 2023. There is worked plan to refinish the tub in the upstairs suite of 1209 in the spring/summer of 2023.
- Heavy rain events in the summer resulted in flooding in the Sunday School classrooms and the
 nurse's office on the south side of the church. The carpeting was removed and air dried outside
 and returned to the rooms. The carpets were soaked and Merv mopped up about 20 litres of
 water and ran the fan for 3 days to ventilate the area. It is believed the eavestroughs were
 overrun in the rapid downpours.
- SaskEnergy has indicated they will be replacing the gas lines to both the church and 1209 in 2023 and the documents and authorization have been completed.

Congregational Treasurer Report

As with everything else in our Church Life, this past financial year has been one of uncertainty. With regret, we said good-bye to Pastor Marilyn and supported her through the long term disability application process. Pulpit supply participants, along with lay leaders and our musicians, led us in worship until the arrival of Pastor Kirk, our interim Pastor.

An ongoing change in our Congregational Life has been the retirement of our Parish Nurse Carol Kostiuk. The Health Cabinet has continued the search for a Parish Nurse, but two factors, no partnering parishes and the lack of available Parish Nurses, has resulted in the ongoing vacancy in this role. Each of these events resulted in a deviation of the proposed budget for 2022.

Despite the return of the Jazz service and in person Christmas services, giving was down this past year. The proposed deficit budget is reflective of our uncertain and changing times. Budget preparations for 2023 continued to be defined by uncertainty.

The work of the Call Committee is well underway in the search for our next Pastor. The implications for the budget are unknown. The Synod has recommended an 8% wage increase for all salaried employees and this has been included in the budget. The Finance Committee and Council have recommended a similar increase for our contracted employees as well.

There is opportunity to use some of the special funds to offset items in the budget. This could include ICHM membership from the Parish Nursing Fund, support for CLAY from the Youth Fund, a contribution to the Seminary from the Intern fund, and a contribution to building repairs from the 1209 restricted fund. We recognize the effect of inflation on all of us - the increase costs of maintaining the Church Building and potential decrease of charitable giving will impact on the proposed budget.

The proposed budget is our best estimate of what we can expect in regards to cost and income if we continue as we are. The pandemic has brought about many changes - including how we worship, who participates in worship and giving. In the coming year, Church Council and Congregational discussions will provide opportunity to review our financial priorities and the potential for increased revenue.

I would like to thank the Finance Committee, Monica Johnson, Larry Trenouth, and Karen Wallace for participating in 2023 budget proposal. A special thank you to Monica Johnson for maintaining Augustana's financial accounts.

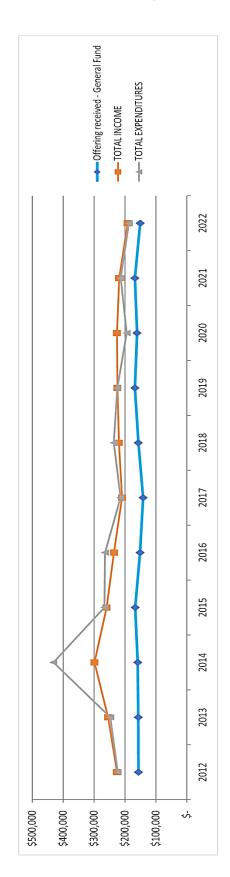
