The facility also includes a spacious living area with a fireplace and a full kitchen for groups that may like to bring their own food and enjoy teambuilding time preparing their own meals. The Hindu Life group took advantage of this option for one meal while enjoying the remainder of their meals in beautiful Egner Lodge. In addition, towels and linens are provided and WiFi will be installed in the near future. With these accommodations, Cornwall House is an ideal location for educators, team members, and corporations to open new lines of communication and improve interpersonal skills.

Cornwall House is located on PBC's Blairstown Campus, a 264-acre outdoor center nestled between the Appalachian Trail and Delaware Water Gap in Hardwick Township.
