## SCVC Fall Tour to Sturgeon's Mill by Glenn Wildman and Steve Bartolomei

This is a first for me as the Editor – two articles, yes two, were submitted for one tour. One by Glenn Wildman and the other by Steve Bartolomei. Obviously I'm very pleased with this and thank them both for taking the time to write their articles. I've combined the two and hope you all enjoy their story.

THERE IS NO SUCH THING AS FRIDAY LIGHT!

On Friday morning October 9th, a picture perfect day for our departure, 34 member families and 22 model A's met at the Rancho Shopping center in Los Altos. Our final destination was the Best Western Inn in Rohnert Park. Our path took us up the Great Highway giving us a beautiful view of the of the ocean when the fog was not blocking the view. The Beach Chalet restaurant made a perfect stopping point for a bathroom break and brake adjustment before a trip up and down some of the hills of San Francisco. Next came a quick trip across the Golden Gate Bridge, followed by a stop at the rest stop at the North end of the bridge. Those that stopped were able to see the Navy ships assembling for the Parade of Ships to take place later as part of the Fleet Week festivities. We continued up Highway 1 to Olema which is a great Model A road and the views of the Marin Coast did not disappoint. We arrived at Point Reyes for lunch and to stretch our legs. A few of us headed west to the Point

Reyes visitor center where we enjoyed our lunch. After lunch, we took a walk on the Earthquake Trail which includes a section of fence that crosses the San Andreas fault. One side of the fence shifted 16 feet during the 1906 quake. After lunch we stopped at the Cowgirl Creamery in Point Reyes Station for some very nice ice cream. From there, we continued our trip North on Highway 1 until we turned East to Rohnert Park. After everyone had a chance to get checked in, we all gathered at the pool for the touring buddy happy hour, to enjoy the usual snack fare and talk about the various experiences from the day's journey Saturday Morning began badly for me (Steve) when my Town Sedan decide it did not want to start. Luckily Rob Keefe offered seats to my wife and I. The A's took off on a back roads tour to the mill. The signs were in unusual places for us city folks and there were a few U-turns but overall the trip to Sturgeons Mill in Sebastopol was relatively uneventful. When we arrived at the mill it was in full operation and ready for our tours. We lined up our vehicles in one corner of the parking lot for pictures and headed in to visit the mill. This weekend was the last of four weekends in 2015 which included actual demonstrations of the mill in operation. Volunteers run the mill, cutting logs provided by customers and they take a portion of the wood which they sell to help fund the maintenance and restoration of the mill. The two huge saw blades can cut logs more than three feet in diameter. The volunteers also lead tours of the mill, steam engines and other interesting areas on the property. One important thing to know if you visit the mill, is where and when they blow the steam whistles. You don't want to be 10 feet away (like I was) when one of them goes off. A blacksmith was on site producing and selling items he crafted. Lunch at the mill gave everyone a chance to get back together after seeing all that the mill had to offer and enjoy food and good conversation.

When our time at the mill was up, our host, Steve Lewis from Sonoma A's, handed out 2 sets of maps for the Mystery Tour including clues that required careful attention to be paid to your surroundings as we wound our way through Sebastopol. There were A's coming and going in all directions with the highlight of the tour being the Metal Sculptures on Florence Ave. The tour included a walking tour to visit the of the sculptures which included a mermaid, a surfer, and batman, as well as a truck, fire engine, boat and many others. The mystery tour ended at the Lewis's home for snacks and a gathering with members of the Sonoma A's and the Marin A's. One of the most interesting (and tasty) snacks were cookies with a chocolate Ford logo on top. It was the miracle of the loaves and fishes in grand fashion. Once everyone had returned from the tour, the mystery tour questions were graded and we ended up with a tie, Nora Elderton and Ben Lehrfeld each answered all but three questions correctly. Nora won a calendar and Ben received a metal sign. After a fun filled tour and get together, we returned to the hotel where It seemed like most folks went in search of ice cream instead of dinner. Myself (Steve) with the help of Pat Lovejoy, were able to get my car running with just an adjustment of the points and a replacement distributor rotor.

On Sunday everyone headed home, hopefully without incident. I (Steve) had a small bit of excitement just after exiting the freeway. The Department of Transportation has not been spending all of its money correctly.

MAFFI/MAFCA: Chuck Christensen said the MAFFI Model A Ford Museum has met its goal of receiving \$500,000 in donations for its endowment fund, but this fund can be increased with additional donations.

Sunshine: Peggy Kopf said Liz Bueno is doing OK after her recent illness and is resting in Hawaii. Linda Nicholson's mother is doing OK. Ted Kafer had knee replacement surgery and is doing well. Jean Hawkins had shoulder surgery and is OK.
