Following her journey from Colombia to her position as the leader of a national movement, we see how Angy's courage and strength inspires those around her. Her bravery allows her to share her story of sexual abuse, a common experience among undocumented people. This touching film showcases the reality that millions of undocumented people face in America and the potential consequences if the truth about them is discovered.

Zaatari is home to 130,000 Syrians fleeing violence and war, and children make up half the camp's population. PRISON DOGS (2016) TORONTO PREMIERE

Filmmaker: Geeta Gandbhir & Perri Peltz // In Focus: USA // 94 Min

This film chronicles five inmates in the remarkable "Puppies Behind Bars" program - where hardened New York convicts raise and train service dogs for up to three years. Living with the puppies 24/7, the inmates teach the dogs 99 commands, after which the dogs go on to help war veterans with PTSD. This film follows both the inmates' daily struggles in prison as well as the veterans who have returned from combat trying to find a way back to their old lives. A story of love, loss, rehabilitation and redemption, *Prison Dogs* is a true testament to the power of second chances and the fact that rehabilitation is possible for those society deems impossible to save.

UNVEILED: THE KOHISTAN VIDEO SCANDAL (2016) WORLD PREMIERE

Filmmaker: Brishkay Ahmed // In Focus: Pakistan // 86 Min

In a remote village in Northern Pakistan, a cellphone video emerged depicting a group of women clapping and singing, and men dancing. Rumors start to swirl that the young women were put to death by their local Jirga (a traditional quasi-legal council) for the shame brought to their families. Frustrated by stalled official investigations, journalist Haseeb Khawaja dives into the story to determine the true fate of the young people involved. Brishkay Ahmed's gripping film is a remarkable and harrowing journey into this violent collision of cultures, technology, and tradition.


