Background: Data taken in the US in 2018 revealed that SS2,830 people were experiencing homelessness in a single night. This is about 17 of every 10,000 people. 67% of these are individuals while the remaining 33% are families with children. Youth (individuals who are under 25) living on their own without parents make up 7% of the total homeless population. {Reference: "State of Homelessness."  - a. After the story, ask your child <u>these questions</u>.
- 2. Book 2: <u>You, Me, and Empathy</u> by Jayneen Sanders, Illustrated by Sofia Cordoso a. This book has excellent discussion questions on each page of the book!
