Threats or actual incidents of violence are a tragic reality of daily life in schools. In order to solve this problem, we must analyze and understand what is actually happening. It is critical to stop speculating, relying on "expert impressions" or utilizing outdated information and anecdotes when examining issues of violence in schools. Instead, we must objectively and factually determine the nature, scope and severity of the problem.

The Educator's School Safety Network's research on school violence has two important purposes:

1. To provide the educational and law enforcement communities with the most current data and analysis available on the frequency, severity, scope, and nature of violence incidents in schools.
2. To provide school and law enforcement responders with an overview and understanding of the critical trends and warning signs that have emerged from our on-going analysis of current and past incidents.

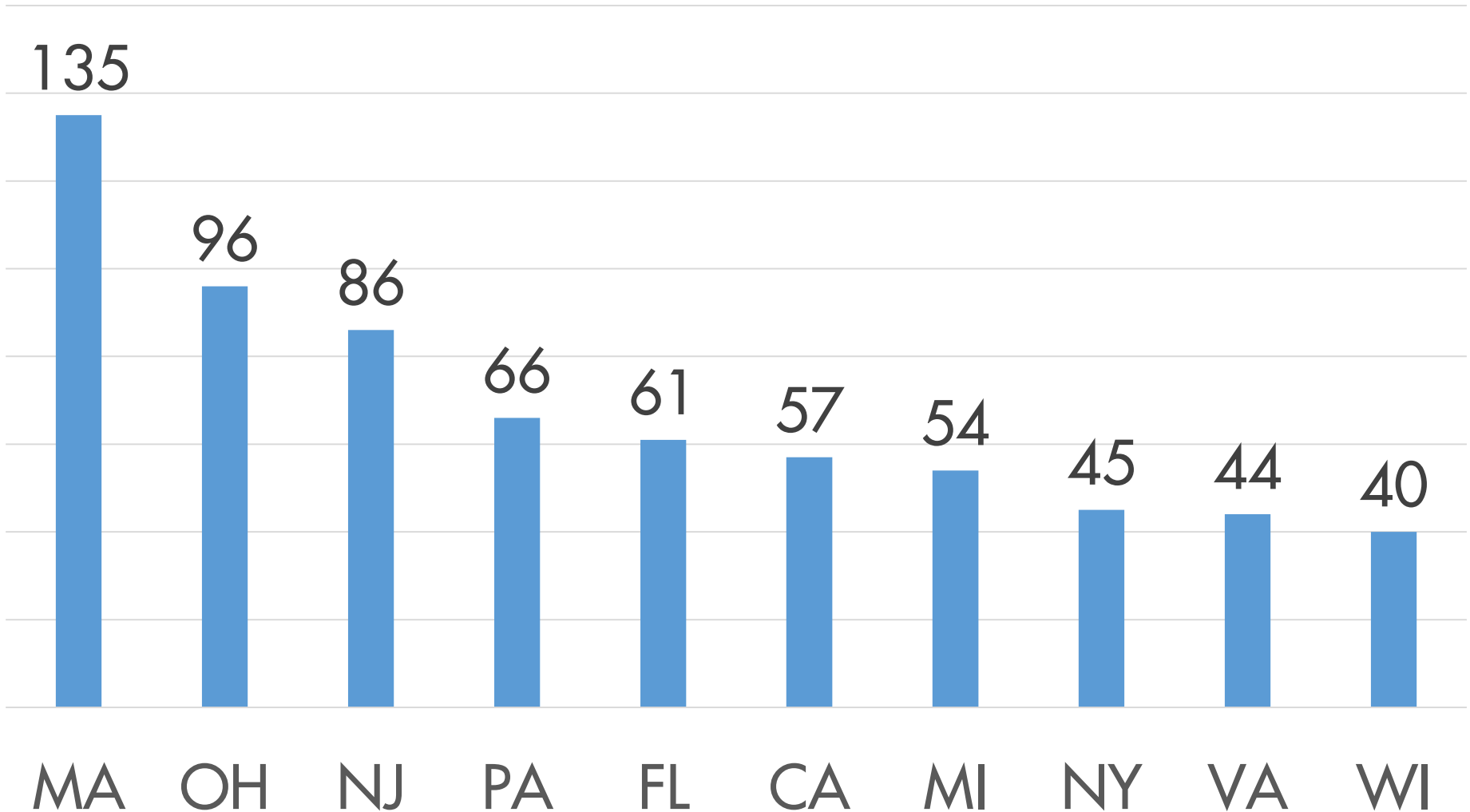

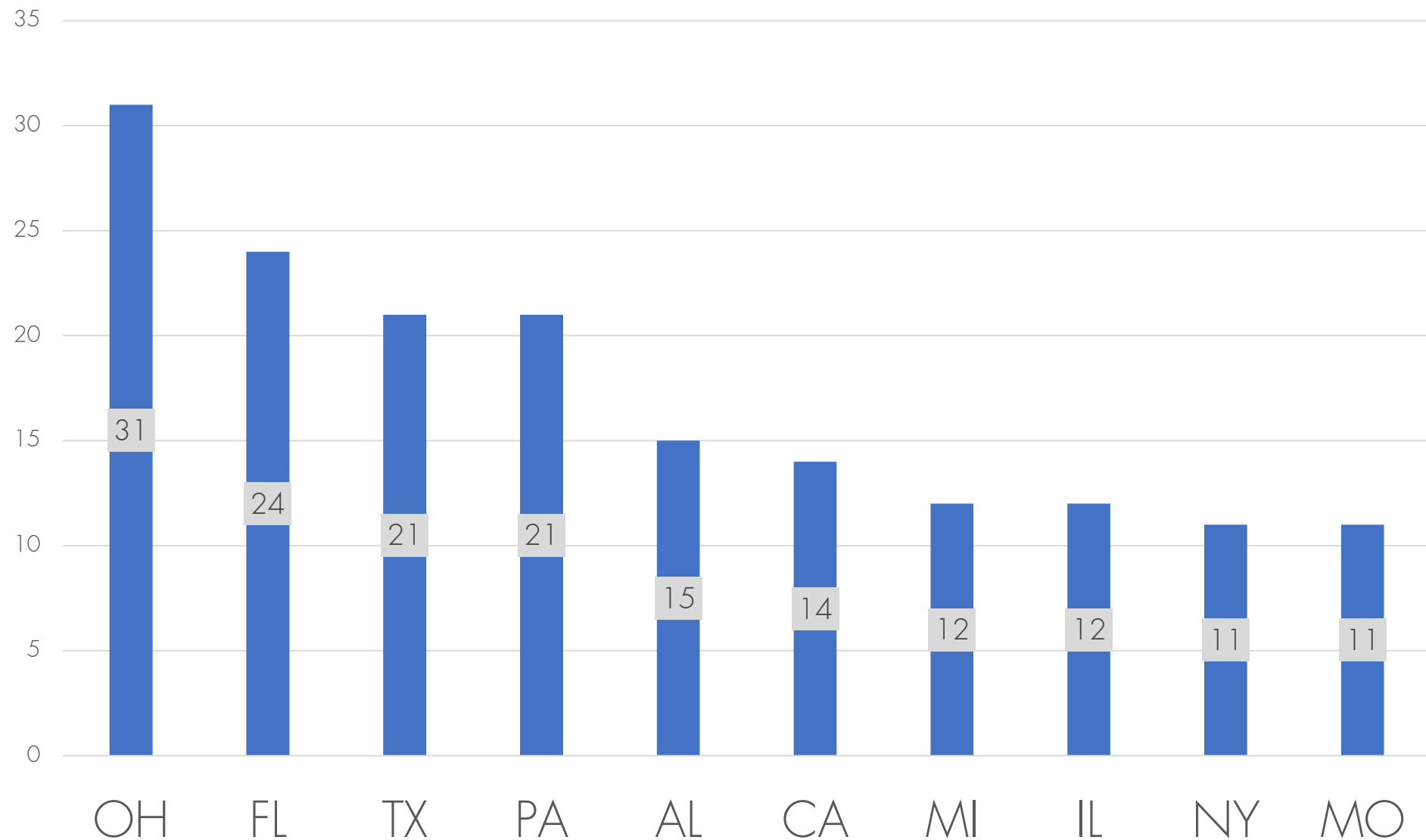
Bomb Incidents by State/Territory

School-based Violent Incidents and Threats:

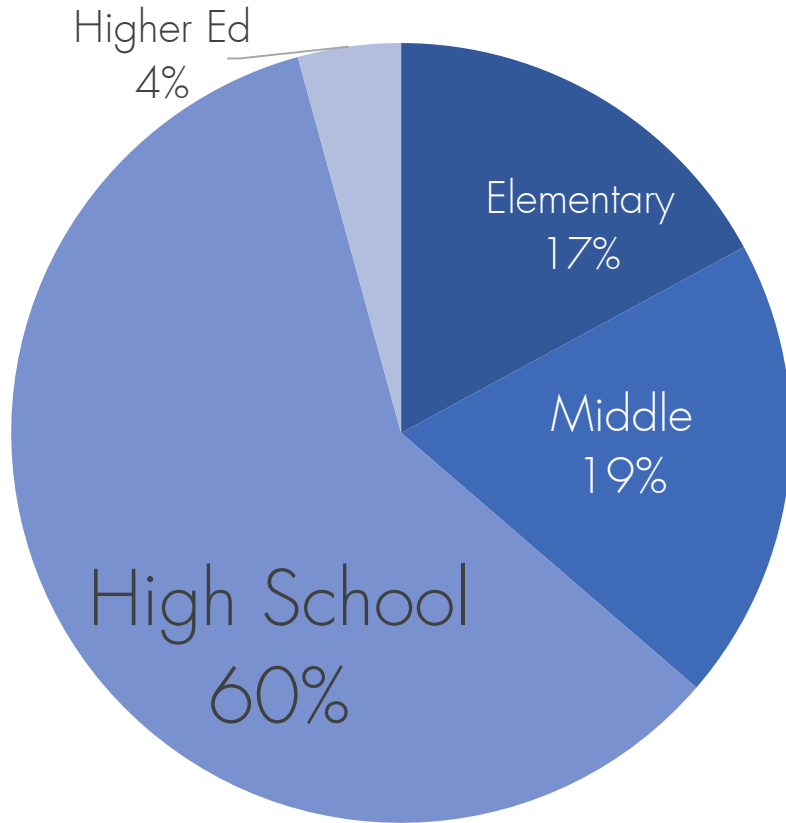
'16-'17 school year up through September



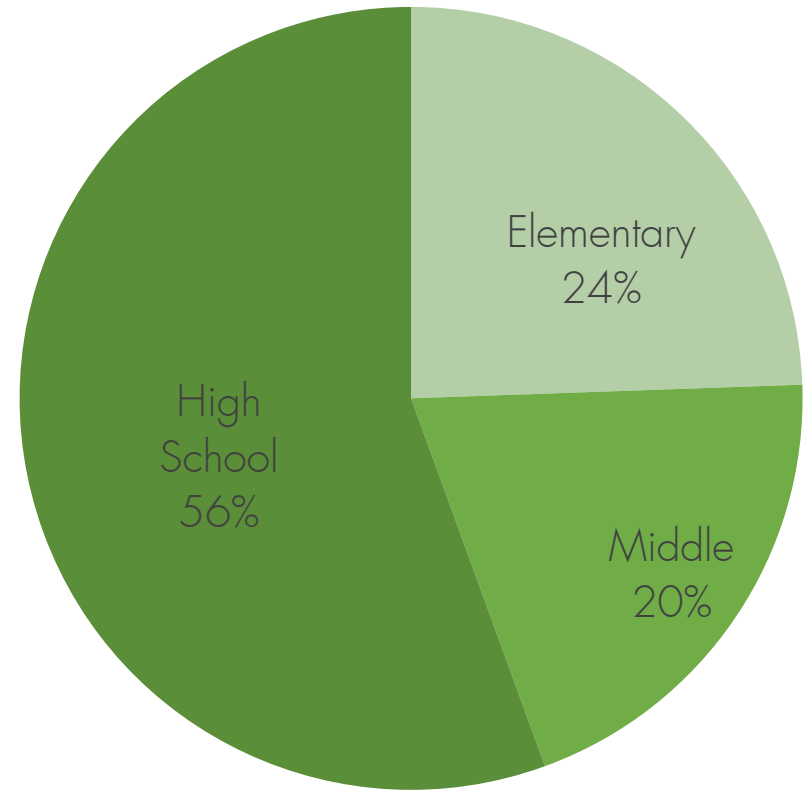
Schools Affected by violent incidents:

All U.S.



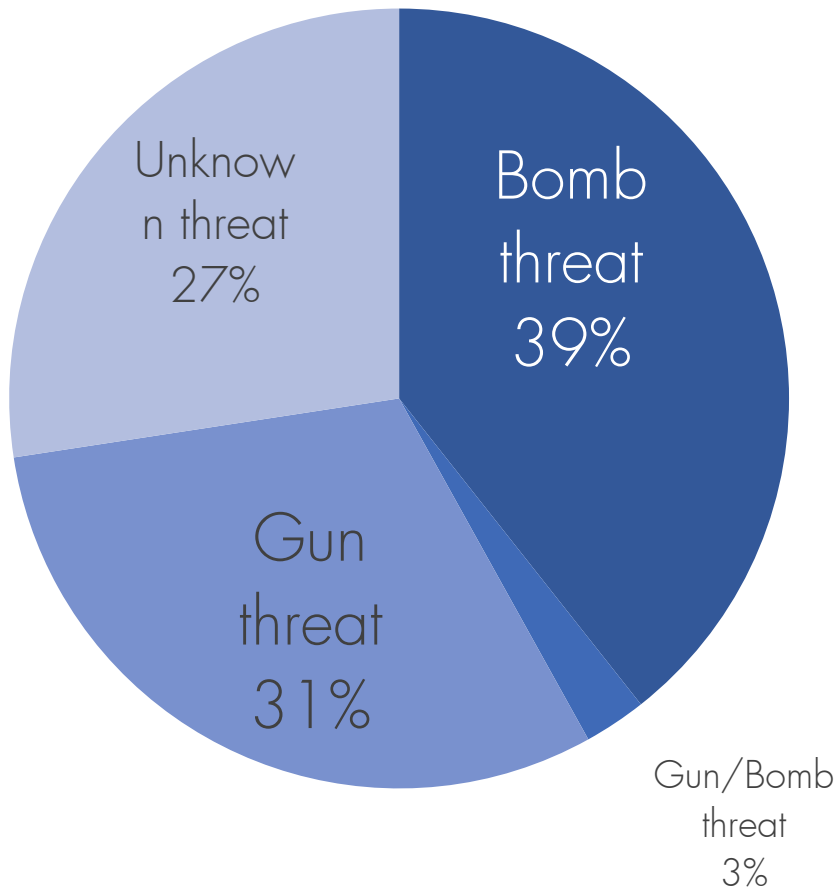

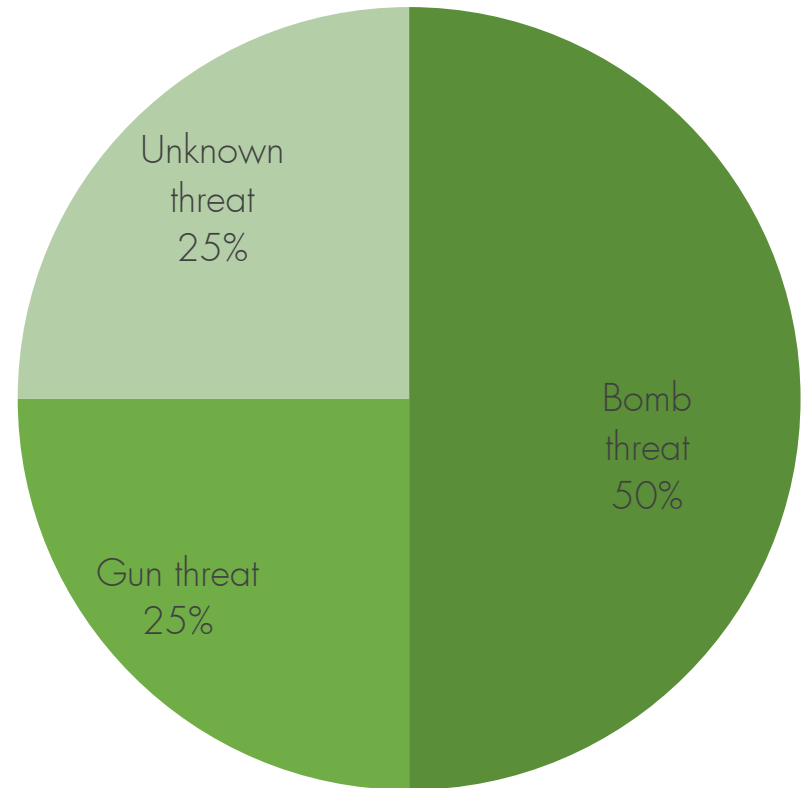
Types of Threats:

All U.S.



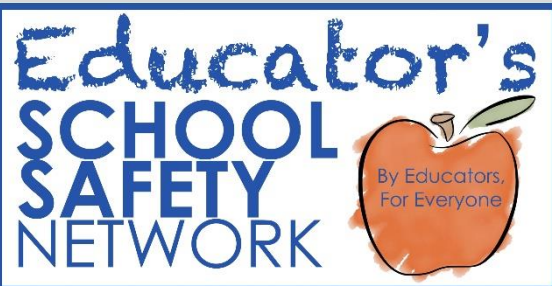
