PASTOR WISMAR'S LETTER OF GREETING

Dear Members and Friends of Holy Cross Lutheran Church,

It is with humility and great joy that I take this opportunity to introduce myself and my family to you as we look forward to being with you in the month ahead. I am excited that the Holy Spirit has led me to accept the call you extended to me to become your pastor and to join together with you in ministry in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. First I'll introduce myself, my lovely wife, Miharu, and then each of our four children in succession: Jorge, Kai, Luke and Mia.

Though I grew up in various places throughout New England, and have lived around the world, I was born at Danbury Hospital – so it seems as though I've never left! My father, the Reverend Dr. Gregory J. Wismar (whom many of you already know), was on his vicarage at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Danbury and he and my mother, Priscilla, had me on August 6, 1970. My first years were very mobile. My mother and father moved back to Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri, to complete my father's studies. My father then graduated in the spring of 1971 and was ordained and installed later that year back at Immanuel in Danbury. After that he served various congregations throughout our New England District: St. Paul's in Naugatuck, Connecticut; Redeemer in Cape Elizabeth (now Gorham), Maine; Messiah in Lynnfield, Massachusetts, and then Christ the King in Newtown, Connecticut.

My father took the call to Newtown in the spring of 1987, which happened to be just before my junior year of high school – the current school year of my oldest son Jorge. (So, in a way, it's history repeating itself!) I had a great experience at Newtown High School and upon graduation I decided to attend our local Concordia College in Bronxville, New York. While there I was a member of the tour choir, the soccer team, the tennis team and various musical plays and productions. While studying at Concordia College, my major was elementary education and upon graduation I was called to teach at Immanuel Lutheran School in Danbury, Connecticut, where I taught sixth, seventh and eighth grade. I taught at Immanuel for three years and then in 1997 I decided to take a teaching position with a company called Nova Group, an English conversation school in Japan. I worked in Tokyo, Japan, for three years as a teacher and administrator and it was there that I met my wife, Miharu. While still living in Japan, my wife and I were blessed with our first son, Jorge, and the three of us together moved to Concordia Seminary in the year 2000. Our years at Concordia Seminary were wonderful years as was my vicarage year that we spent in Cabot, Pennsylvania (former NED president Pastor Jim Kerulainen's younger brother, Barry, was my vicarage supervisor).

Upon graduation in the spring of 2004 I was then installed as pastor of the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in New Fairfield, Connecticut, where I have remained ever since. My ministry at Good Shepherd over these many years has been a great blessing, as has

my ministry to the the Armed Forces. I should also mention that during my seminary years, I decided to become a chaplain candidate in the United States Air Force. After my installation as pastor of Good Shepherd, I officially became a chaplain in the Air Force and was serving as a Reservist at Hanscom AFB in Bedford, Massachusetts. In 2008, I switched

THOUGHTS FROM OUR VACANCY PASTOR

As my vacancy role ends, I urge you to hear the voice of God and rejoice in it

Once a month I visit three men who are incarcerated in three different Connecticut state prisons. During one of my visits one time one of the guys made an interesting comment. I mentioned how God had turned his incarceration into a blessing because it was there in prison where God was finally able to reach him and change him, and he responded, "Oh, it's not like I didn't believe in God before. It's just that finally, in prison, all the other voices and noise that so filled my life were removed, and I was able to listen to His voice. I got a Bible from another guy and started reading and listening to what God said." And, with nothing else to occupy and distract him, listen he did! He is now blessed with a much fuller and clearer understanding of who God is, all He has done for him in Christ, and what God expects of him, and his faith in God has grown greatly.

His words gave me an insight into the importance and opportunity and blessing of gathering in God's house each week in worship. Every week we are given an opportunity to get away from the noise and voices and distractions of the world, which in our day are nearly inescapable, to listen to the quiet and comforting voice of our Savior. His voice is the one most often



heard in the Divine Service, for He speaks to us in the Scripture readings and sermon; in the words of the liturgy, both spoken and sung; and even in many of the hymns we sing. What a blessing to be able to have some quiet time with our God and be comforted by His voice!

PRESIDENT'S JOURNAL

Parsonage upgrades require a Capital Campaign that calls for all of us to participate

Holy Cross families recently received a letter from the Board of Directors announcing a Capital Campaign to fund our parsonage renovations. I don't mind telling you that the Board spent considerable time in serious discussion leading up to our decision to go forward with the campaign. We must take out a loan to achieve the parsonage improvements since we do not have sufficient liquid assets to meet the expected costs. However, our hope with this campaign is to reduce the loan amount and/or meet the repayment schedule.

Your Board realizes the financial obligation being taken on by our congregation to achieve a parsonage of which we can be proud and to which we will be honored to welcome a new pastor and his family as occupants. We are sensitive to the financial situations that our congregational families may be encountering. But we also know that Holy Cross families rise to the occasion when a special need arises.

To be sure, the suggested family commitment is not "chump change." For many of us, the amount requires sacrifice. We may need to make a commitment over a period of time rather than a one-time contribution. We may need to make a lesser commitment, or we may feel able to make a greater commitment. Regardless, the importance of special financial commitments by our congregational families is critical to our future.

Our congregation is at the threshold of a new, deciding chapter of Holy Cross' future. As we emerge from our year-long vacancy and welcome a new shepherd, the potential for Holy Cross is bound only by our own attitudes and our participation. Our future is dependent on our faith, our commitment and the responsibility each of us takes for Holy Cross' future. But all of our members need to hear this message. Please help me convey this sentiment to those members who don't read the newsletter.

THE WRITER WITHIN

Recognizing our new pastor's pace and tempo will help us fall into place with him for a smooth transition. The long wait is nearly over. The process is close to completion. God's will have been sought, prayed for and discerned.

Of course, I'm referring to our wait for a new shepherd at Holy Cross. We have been without one since the end of June 2014, but this newsletter takes us into the month when Pastor Eric Wismar and his family become part of the Holy Cross family. The month of May has been sung about in song, but for what the month brings us in the person of our new pastor, perhaps we should just voice the name of the month in a prayer. A prayer of thanksgiving that in May we can again feel complete and whole as a church and congregation. Hopes and dreams for what we will do in the years ahead can be hoped and dreamed for once more.

That's not to put the entire load of a church's livelihood on the shoulders of a pastor, but there can be no denying that having Pastor Wismar here will be a huge lift for all of us in spirit and mood. And there is no question that we can work with our new leader in the direction he wants to go as well as the way our leaders want to go, moving forward in tandem to achieve great things for our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Make no mistake, we are at the start of Pastor Wismar's time, just as pastors Froehlich and Witschy had their respective times. And in thinking about time, I'm reminded of the huge emphasis placed on tempo, time and pace in the many youtube videos I've watched lately as I learn the violin and see how accomplished violinists perform. Seeing a conductor lead the orchestra is similar to the situation we have with Pastor Wismar arriving. In a way he is our conductor, coming with a tempo and pace he has used in his ministry. It is so important for us to be on the same tempo and time with him, whether it's to make beautiful music or plan a service or put a Bible lesson plan together or

The speed at which Pastor Wismar leads us will undoubtedly be a different pace than his predecessors, and we must recognize that pace and fall in sync with him if we are to succeed in spreading the Gospel among our own members and the Trumbull community.

If we drag or go too quickly (the latter would be a "good" problem), it will take time to recognize that and adjust so we can all go at the same speed. Part of that is being aware that Pastor Wismar will do things differently from his predecessors and there is nothing wrong with that. It would be unusual to have someone who does things exactly the same as the person before him. Letting Pastor Wismar operate in a way he sees best and that allows him to be the most efficient, even if it is different from what we're used to, is healthy and good and part of what happens when a new leader is put in place.

Time and tempo: They will be some of the elements we notice the most with our new pastor as he settles into his position. Let's all strive to be up to tempo and on the right speed, whatever that might be.

SHARING A SOUP RECIPE

"Faux Lobster Bisque" served at our final Lenten Soup Supper was a big hit; here's how to make it
This month Kendra Norman has submitted her recipe for "Faux Lobster Bisque," due to requests she received to share it
with our newsletter audience. Thank you, Kendra, for sharing this recipe with your church family.

For a large pot of soup:

- Sauté at least a cup of chopped onions and at least a cup of chopped celery in some butter. You could use more onion and celery. Cook until partially softened, but not browned, stirring frequently. Keep temperature on medium or less throughout this process.
- Next, add 9 tablespoons of Wondra flour. (Using this type of flour greatly reduces lumps forming in gravies and sauces—I highly recommend it!) Use a whisk to stir it in.
- Add 3 cups each of water and white wine (I used chardonnay). Use a whisk to blend well after each addition.
- Now add 3 tablespoons of "BETTER THAN BOULLION, LOBSTER BASE" (available at Shop Rite, but not Stop & Shop) and 6 tablespoons tomato paste and 3/4 teaspoon of paprika. Keep whisking.
- Open 2 or more packs of LOUIS KEMP LOBSTER DELIGHTS imitation lobster meat. Cut into smaller pieces. Add to the pot. Stir.
- Last, add 6 cups of half and half. Whisk.
- Heat through, being careful not to let the mixture scorch.
- Enjoy!

Notes from Kendra—"This recipe is an amalgamation of the recipe on the outside of the lobster base jar and lobster bisque recipes in <u>Joy of Cooking</u> and <u>Fannie Farmer</u> cookbooks. Since it is a soup, you may certainly vary the amounts per your own taste. I noticed that Fannie Farmer adds carrots, for instance. I didn't use much in the way of spices in this recipe because the lobster base is already spiced."


