WISMAR'S WISDOM

Dear Members and Friends of Holy Cross,

As our journey together through God's Master Plan and our salvation story continues, we finally arrive at the New Testament, which, of course, begins with the **four Gospels** – Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. For readers today, these four Gospels may seem much like biographies. However, it is important for us to know that a Gospel is more than an account of a person's life and achievements. With the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, the evangelists wrote the Gospels to persuade the reader that Jesus is the Christ, God's Son, who came to save sinners. They prepared their accounts with this goal in mind. Although they focused on what happened, they wanted to illustrate why Jesus was born, lived, died and rose again, even while they told the story. The evangelists commonly cited passages from the Old Testament to demonstrate how Jesus fulfilled the prophecies about the coming Messiah.

Differences in the order and style of the Gospels came about because the evangelists were writing to speak to different audiences. For this reason, each Gospel has a different perspective and emphasis that should be respected for its own unique, faith-filled testimony. I would like to share with you just briefly some of the emphases you will find in each of the four Gospels and some of the blessings that await you as you read through them:

In **Matthew's Gospel** (*symbolized by the wing man*) Jesus is seen as the long-awaited Messiah, who:

- Fulfills God's promises to His Old Testament people;
- Teaches about God's Kingdom and His will for those who follow Him;
- Dies for our sins and, after He has risen again, sends out His followers to tell the Good News to all people.

As you read though the Gospel according to Matthew, rejoice especially in the very full accounting he gives of Jesus' teachings. His five discourses record more of Jesus' parables and sayings than are recorded by Mark and Luke. Also take special note of the promise that Christ is coming again to reign eternally. As you face struggles, dwell on this sure and certain hope in your Savior.

In **Mark's Gospel** (*symbolized by the winged lion*) Jesus is the strong deliverer sent by God, who:

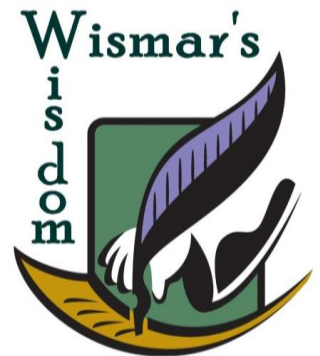
- Has power and authority over sickness, nature, demons and death;
- Dies to set us free from sin, and conquers death by rising triumphantly on the third day.

As you read Mark's account of Jesus' ministry and passion, take special note of the emphasis on discipleship and faith. Jesus tells His followers that He will suffer and will ransom them. They, too, will face suffering on account of Him and the Gospel. Yet, through repentance and faith, they will inherit eternal life. When you face difficulty, cry out, "*I believe; help my unbelief!*" (9:24). The Son of God, who ransomed you from the bondage of sin and death, will hear you in compassion and have mercy.

In **Luke's Gospel** (*symbolized by the winged ox*) Jesus is portrayed as the living Savior of all, who:

- Reaches out to help the troubled and outcast;
- Teaches about His Father's love and forgiveness;
- Lays down His life for sinners, and rises again to show that He has won the victory.

As you read Luke's carefully researched account of Jesus' life, consider yourself on a journey with Luke to learn more about Jesus of Nazareth, whose body, crucified for the forgiveness of our sins, becomes the temple of the living God.

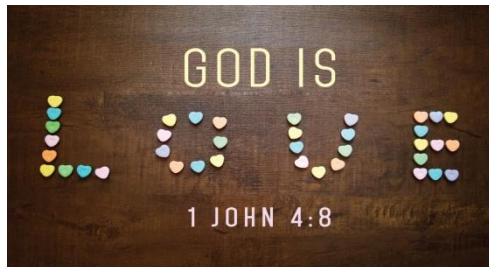

- Conquers death so that all who believe in Him may be His friends forever.

John’s Gospel focuses beautifully on both the promise of everlasting life and the bodily resurrection of those who trust in Jesus. As you study the words of Jesus as recorded by John, take comfort in His many great and precious promises to you. His words are spirit, and they are life! Just as the disciples reflected for years on Jesus’ simple, yet profound words, commit His words to heart, consider them with hope, and grow by them. 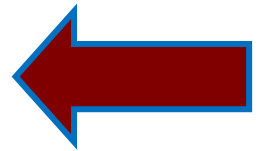
Plan to attend this fourth annual family fellowship event

March 2: “Proclaim”

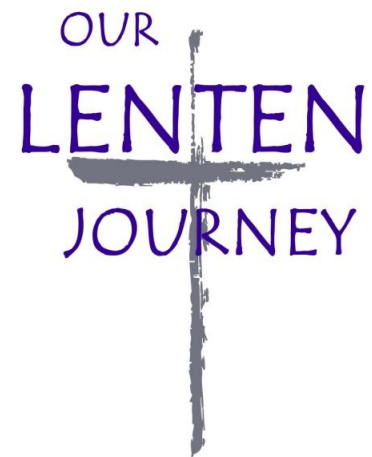

2016 ANNUAL MEETING REVIEW

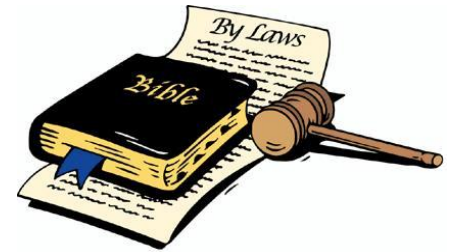
Members step up to fill vacant officer spots, budget approved with hope for funds to fill income gap

Of the nearly 60 annual meetings in Holy Cross' history, the one held on January 31, 2016, in the Froehlich Fellowship Hall had the usual assortment of recognizing great moments from the previous year while putting forth hopes and dreams and leaps of faith for the upcoming one. The meeting was the first annual gathering at Holy Cross for our new shepherd Pastor Wismar, and he was joined by 67 other attendees when the meeting was called to order at 12:20 p.m.

In early agenda items, Pastor Wismar spoke a prayer and then the hymn, "Gracious God, You Send Great Blessings," was sung. John Rosen was introduced as parliamentarian by president Kerry Geffert, the 2015 Annual Meeting Minutes were approved with amendments, and Mr. Geffert read through a long list of commission highlights, all of which can be found in the soon-to-be-released Annual Report and won't be itemized in this review.

Pastor Wismar's comments were moved to the first third of the agenda, and he remarked on how blessed he feels to be with Holy Cross after his first half-year here, which has included his Journey through Scripture sermon and Bible study focus. Going forward his desire is to have everyone strengthen their relationships: with God, with each other and with the community. "I am grateful to having been called to be at Holy Cross," he said, while also echoing the same reassuring tone spoken by outgoing pastor Emil Witschy that "God keeps His promises, all will be well. To God be the glory, amen."

The election of officers was perhaps the meeting's crescendo. A slate of officers that was presented with three of seven positions vacant was soon filled up as fast as the Nos. 4 & 5 trains heading to downtown Manhattan during morning rush-hour. In quick order, Jim Atkinson (Discipleship), Hugh Hughes (Shepherd) and Pat Deloge (Education) were nominated for empty slots. Along with returning officers Geffert (President), Michele Vichiola Van Wart (Vice-President), Andrew Struzik (Financial Secretary) and Lydia Struzik (Worship), the group was unanimously elected by a show of hands. With Jon Halls having taken over as Evangelism



Director in November, the lone Board position still open is Social Ministry, which will be part of the 2017 annual meeting elections. Outgoing Board members to be recognized include Donna Bogen (Discipleship), Tina Batoh (Education) and Gary Messerschmitt (Shepherd). John Anantharaj moves into the position as Head Shepherd for 2016.

The financial focus was next up, and Mr. Struzik lauded members for reversing a poor first half of 2015 with a strong second half, saying it was "a good year overall," resulting in a surplus of \$8,607.36 of income over expenses. A huge factor for the surplus was income of \$148,754 from a major maintenance loan for the parsonage renovation and \$86,054.04 in Share the Hope offerings intended to pay down the loan. But Mr. Struzik noted that regular weekly offerings were below budget, and just 34 percent of member families contributed to the Parsonage Renovation Campaign. He urged that we "must maintain momentum into 2016 as we enter in a positive position, with much improvement completed over the past year....Everyone must commit to looking within their own situation, and decide what is the most a family can do." Treasurer Greg Dowling, who had said in his report that the church had "managed expenses well" in 2015, presented a church budget with proposed income and expense amounts of \$317,835.29. The income amount included what he described as a "plug number" of \$30,485.29 in a budget-deficit reduction line item, which turned what was a shortfall to meet budget into a break-even budget. If anything, the budget-leveling device is a prayer to God that He will provide the income Holy Cross needs to avoid a financial shortage, and it's a challenge to members who don't give or hardly support the church through their financial blessings to give back to God for all that He has done for them. Both the church and preschool budgets (proposed income of \$203,512 versus expenses of \$203,550.55) were passed by a show of hands.

The next agenda item was a set of amendments to the church bylaws, which as explained would allow for the use of electronic communication to notify members of meetings and to conduct Board business. The amendments passed. That was followed by the nomination of present synod president Matthew Harrison to that same position at the synod convention later this year in July at Milwaukee.

In a session open for congregational comments, Mary Schrock thanked Donna DiLalla and Sherry Duff-Schiavone for their work on the church pictorial directory; Kim Atkinson thanked the youth group for its babysitting services during the meeting; Diane Dietman recognized Mary Schrock for her work on worship schedules; Dan Senft recognized charter member Bob Killian for his attendance in worship and annual meetings; and Ms. Duff-Schiavone said a thank you to the anonymous members who helped front the parsonage renovation money until the loan money came through. After the singing of the doxology, the meeting was adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

However, Costco won't accept the card, so Don met us at BJ's to do the shopping. As we arrived at St. John's on the afternoon of January 5, all the cooking volunteers were there to help unload the vehicle. Lorraine Finch, Helen and Jon Harper (Grace-Stratford), Diane Hintz Schyhol (Grace-Stratford), Nancy Sabol and Miharu Wismar made short work of those tasks. Later a perfect amount of servers arrived: Anna Mae Berger, Kerry Geffert, Jim Leslie, Sherry Duff-Schiavone, Mary Schrock and Pastor Eric Wismar. It had been cold all day and a lot of people arrived. We served a total of 130 meals. Some "rich" poignant comments (in italics) were heard by our servers:

- *"I'm happy to be in here where it's warm."* (Did you work outside today?) *"No I didn't work, I sleep outside."*
- *"I hope there's seconds. I'm sooooo hungry."*
- (From a small boy about 6 years old): *"OOOOOO! I love ham!"*
- *One man asked for a list of places where he could sleep.* In response, the director of St. John's Community Suppers found some telephone numbers for him.



Holy Cross is responsible for buying the food, preparing and serving the meal on the first Tuesday of the month at St. John's Episcopal. The next community supper for which Holy Cross is responsible for cooking and serving is on Tuesday, February 2. A sign-up sheet is on the narthex table for volunteers to indicate if they will prepare/cook or serve.
