A Message From Terry

DEAR FAMILY CALLED LPC,

I am sure that by now many of you have heard the news that Amendment 10-A passed in a majority of our presbyteries and will become a part of the polity of the Presbyterian Church (USA). There have been many different reactions to the news across the country as well as within our own Presbytery and even our church. Misunderstanding of the implications has been rampant and as a way to help you understand and digest what this means for us, I have chosen to include the letter written by our Executive Presbyter and Stated Clerk, Dr. Paul Hooker, and sent to all the pastors and clerks of sessions in the Presbytery of St. Augustine on 11 May 2011, the day that the final vote ratified the amendment. It is a thoughtful and thorough explanation. Here now is the letter:

Amendment 10-A changing the text of G-6.0106b of the Book of Order has now received the necessary 87 favorable votes by presbyteries, and will become the polity of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) on 10 July 2011.

This news will be greeted with a variety of reactions. For some, it is the answer to long-offered prayers for change in our church's ordination standards; for others, it is evidence that the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has gravely erred in abandoning what they regard as the clear teachings of Scripture. For many, the news will make relatively little difference in their daily practice as Christians and Presbyterians.

My purpose in writing now, in addition to notifying our ministers and clerks of session of the change, is to remind us all of four very important truths.

First, *the new language does nothing to alter or limit the congregation's right to elect those whom it deems called by God's Spirit to ordained service as deacons or ruling elders.* The new language of G-6.0106b in no way requires a congregation to elect or a session to approve someone whom it does not believe is ready for the ministry to which he or she is elected. Even if that person has been elected as a deacon or ruling elder in another congregation, the current congregation is not bound to elect that person to the same or other service simply on the basis of having already been ordained. This has

always been true of our polity and it remains so.

Second, *the role of the session (for deacons and ruling elders) and the presbytery (for ministers) to examine candidates for readiness for ordained ministry is paramount under the newly amended G-6.0106b.* Sessions and presbyteries must ascertain whether the candidate is a person of strong faith, dedicated discipleship, and love of Jesus Christ as Lord, one whose life is a demonstration of the Christian gospel in the church and the world. As it makes its decision, the session or presbytery is to determine whether it believes the candidate can truthfully affirm and live out the commitments required in the ordination questions. And in making its determination, the session or presbytery is to be guided by its understanding of Scripture and the confessions of the church. Again, this is not a new requirement, but the absence of the much-debated language of fidelity and chastity means that these other standards are more in the foreground.

Third, *this decision marks a moment in which we need to exercise extraordinary pastoral love and sensitivity toward one another.* Anxieties about the future of the church are elevated in some parts of our presbytery fellowship, and among particular individuals within many congregations. It is of great importance that we treat each other with particular love and grace, that we listen carefully to each other's hurts and nurture each other's hopes for a common future. I like the words of the proposed Foundations of Presbyterian Polity, section F-1.0302a:

Because in Christ the Church is one, it strives to be one. To be one with Christ is to be joined with all those whom Christ calls into relationship with him. To be thus joined with one another is to become priests for one another, praying for the world and for one another and sharing the various gifts God has given to each Christian for the benefit of the whole community (Emphasis added).

Now, more than ever, is the time for "becoming priests for one another." We have always sought to do this in our presbytery; I have every confidence and hope that we will do so now as well.

VBS at LPC

Inside Out & Upside Down on Main Street will be here soon. In fact our VBS program will be held June 13 -17 from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. for children ages 3 (potty trained) through those completing 5th grade. Registration began May 1 and can be completed on-line at www.lpcjax.org (look for the VBS theme and click on the link to registration.) Registration forms are also available in the church office. We have limited space, especially in our Preschool VBS, so please register early. All children registered prior to June 6 will be secured a place. Those who register after June 6 will be placed on a wait list and will need confirmation that your son/daughter is enrolled in our program. In addition to learning about GRATITUDE, COMPASSION, FORGIVENESS, GRACE and FAITHFULNESS (our daily themes) through music, drama, crafts, recreation, snacks and Bible Stories, we learn what it means to do mission work. LPC has a strong Outreach Ministry and this year our VBS mission will focus on three areas: HERE (LPC VBS), NEAR (UCOM) and THERE (Solace for the Children). Each day children bring in an offering of money and/or canned goods. The canned goods go to UCOM which is a local food pantry. The money this year will go to Solace for the Children; a program that sponsors children from Afghanistan to come to America to receive desperately needed medical attention. It costs \$3,000 to sponsor one child. Visit www.SolaceForTheChildren.org to learn more about this program. This year there are 16 children staying in our local area and they have been invited to attend our VBS program. You do not need to attend or volunteer at VBS to contribute to our program. Simply write a check and mark "VBS" in the memo. Be specific if you want your donation to go to mission. If you have questions, please contact our VBS Director, Doris York, at 904-993-2117.

Ministry News and Notes-April 19, 2011

Administration & Stewardship:

Expenses were up a little the past month and revenue was flat. We're on track to end the year at \$503,000. Decision made that a budget reforecast was not necessary this quarter, but possible re-forecasting will be discussed at the end of the 2nd quarter. Discussions regarding the preschool and its mission within Lakewood's mission as well as better communication between LPC and the preschool will continue.

Building & Grounds:

Removal and replacement of the siding and repair of the concrete due to the removal of the portico was shared equally by LPC and the Presbytery; approximately \$2,500 each. Benz Hall front concrete walk was removed and replaced with a more user friendly walk. Cost of \$1,795 was covered by the Capital Campaign Fund. The fire pit and landscaping around the

Youth Hut is complete. The cost of the 8x8 concrete pad and the fire pit was covered by a church member. The 4x5 concrete pad poured near the rear exit door on the playground was covered by a church member. The landscaping renovation should be near completion by Easter Sunday with the exception of the front area surrounding the existing sign. This will be completed once the new sign is installed so as not to destroy the new lawn. B&G obtained a bid to remove 6 pine trees that are presenting maintenance and storm hazard issues. The cost was to be covered by two church members, but the idea was voted down in committee due to the issue of removing live trees. A workday is scheduled for 4/16/2011 with plans to address the east side of the Sanctuary and removal of the debris field in the far east parking lot. New cameras have been installed at each exterior door with new desk monitors at a cost of \$5,600 from the Capital Campaign and a generous contribution from Gail Baker. The Youth Hut was also secured at a cost of \$450.

THE NATURE OF EVANGELISM To evangelize is to spread the good news that Jesus Christ died for our sins and was raised from the dead according to the Scriptures, and that as the reigning Lord he now offers the forgiveness of sins and the liberating gifts of the Spirit to all who repent and believe. Our Christian presence in the world is indispensable to evangelism, and so is that kind of dialogue whose purpose is to listen sensitively in order to understand. But evangelism itself is the proclamation of the historical, biblical Christ as Saviour and Lord, with a view to persuading people to come to him personally and so be reconciled to God. In issuing the gospel invitation we have no liberty to conceal the cost of discipleship. Jesus still calls all who would follow him to deny themselves, take up their cross, and identify themselves with his new community. The results of evangelism include obedience to Christ, incorporation into his Church and responsible service in the world. (I Cor. 15:3,4; Acts 2:32-39; John 20:21; I Cor. 1:23; II Cor. 4:5; 5:11,20; Luke 14:25-33; Mark 8:34; Acts 2:40,47; Mark 10:43-45) From The Lausanne Covenant

Fourth, and perhaps most important, let us remember that *the unity of the church rests in our one Lord Jesus Christ, and not in our agreement or unanimity*. We are one because we are bound to each other in Jesus Christ. We belong to each other because Christ has called us, and we belong to him. There will be voices that, in decrying this change in our Book of Order, declare that the time has come to break fellowship with those with whom they cannot agree on this issue. I cannot and do not judge the spirit of those who issue such calls. Surely they cry out from a place of pain and anguish. But I am reminded at the same time of another call, also issued in a moment of pain and anguish. In John 17:21 and 22, Jesus prays to the Father:

I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The glory you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one.

Jesus was under no illusions that his disciples would be in agreement, or even that they would not argue with each other; he had already seen evidence to the contrary on both accounts. But his final plea to the Father was a reminder to his Church ever since that we belong together because we belong to him, and through him to the Father. Whatever our disagreements, surely he prays the same prayer for us.

As always, I am eager to be of help to you, the session, and the congregation as you think through the implications of the change in our ordination standards. I am open to invitations to meet with sessions and/or congregations to discuss these implications. Building Update:

Pricing is being gathered for the rest of the work that is to happen in the Christian Education building. This should be completed by May 1 at which time we will be able to determine what items can be done based on the budget. We are waiting for all of the parts of the sign to arrive and be assembled. The building of the sign should happen right after Easter and should take about 3 weeks to complete.

Christian Education:

The Child Care Protection Policy is in draft form and is to be reviewed by Administration and our insurance company. The goal is to have the final draft ready for discussion at the May Session meeting so that the policy can be in place by June for VBS. Doris York feels called to continue her work as Sunday School Superintendent. Visitor/New Member bags were examined and determined to sufficiently represent childcare/educational opportunities. A full staff of volunteers is in place for VBS, a Youth Hut chaperone has been assigned and Mission priorities have been determined. An offering will be collected and money will be used to: 1) offset the cost of VBS, 2) donate to UCOM and Solace for Children. A good turnout was reported for the initial Legacy Courtyard Brick sale. Katie is gathering photos of graduating Seniors and Scott and Chrissi Griffin are preparing a video/slide show for High School Senior Appreciation day (date TBD.) CE would like to poll the congregation regarding the desire for additional classes for the congregation and local community. Work is being done to develop a poll and a plan to analyze responses.

Communication:

Lent and Easter events and photos were added to the home page. "News" section articles added about Youth Hut dedication, two about Ernst Mueller and the ALS Walk, above-the-fold article about ICARE from the Times-Union. Submitted listing of Holy Week events to the Times-Union. A survey about the directory will be in the May Herald. Provided drafts of the Monument Sign Message Policy and Monument Sign Message Request Form to the pastors on April 4. A groundbreaking was held April 6 for the monument sign to recognize the efforts of Ernst Mueller in helping make the new sign possible through his work assisting with the zoning variance. Attendees were Ernst Mueller, architect Dean Scott, Adair Owen, Terry Lucarelli, Katie Robb and representatives from Breaking Ground. Communication and Evangelism & Church Growth teamed up to develop and mail a postcard publicizing our Holy Week/Easter activities. Approximately 2,000 postcards were mailed in the 32217 and 32207 zip codes. Ministry has reviewed two drafts of the new visitor brochure. We hope to have a final draft to present to Evangelism & Church Growth by April 20.

Congregational Care:

Spotlight Questions and Easter Lilies will be distributed to DOVEs this month. It's been determined we have a sufficient number of Care Visitors at this time. Boxes that will be used for

delivering meals have been decorated by the Sunday School children and will be distributed to the Manna from LPC members. Thank you notes were written to the new volunteers that were recruited for the Hospitality Committee and Manna from LPC at the WN@LPC's Ministry Faire. Brainstorming ideas from the Session Retreat are being discussed including a Bunco night at LPC, outdoor movie night and a Weigh Down Workshop. After reviewing a list generated by the church office, it was decided this was not the best way to identify active members that have not been attending church regularly. Ministry will work with Terry, Katie and Session members to identify these members and cards will be sent to let them know they have been missed.

Evangelism and Church Growth:

Ministry is working on a better method of capturing visitor information. The Monday volunteer will handwrite and scan the information from the previous Sunday to get it to the committee quickly. Twenty-five copies of a special Presbyterians Today were ordered and will be in new member bags. Bill Edwards is running low on supplies and will be researching materials and prices for Visitor Bags.

Family Life:

Church wide picnic is scheduled for Sunday, June 5, following the 11:00 a.m. worship service. We'll use the back parking lot in order to take advantage of the playground equipment and Legacy Courtyard. Suns Night will be May 21. Ministry would like to have one WN@LPC program a month focused on families with young children (i.e. zoo programs, drama skits, music, games, etc.)

Outreach:

We are encouraging LPC members to attend the ICARE Nehemiah Assembly on April 11. 445 meals were served at Sulzbacher Center on January 27 at an approximate cost of \$700. 29 donors registered for the March 27 Blood Drive; 6 were visitors. 501 items have been collected so far for Dignity U Wear. Baked ziti, salad and garlic bread was prepared and served to about 40 students at the recent UNF Campus Ministry dinner. Members of Mueller's Marchers, who participated in the ALS Walk on April 2 have raised over \$9,000 for the cause. Clayton Green has prepared a letter to be sent to the Carden's regarding a reduction in our annual contribution to their support.

Stewardship:

A committee will be formed to come up with a plan for raising revenue, determining education opportunities on how and why to pledge and finding ways to increase membership.

Worship:

Palm Crosses will be available for distribution on Palm Sunday. New Easter banners will be hung in the Sanctuary on Friday, April 22.

Motion made, seconded and carried to adjourn the meeting at 8:01 p.m. with the singing of the Doxology.



ICARE stands for Interfaith Coalition for Action Reconciliation and Empowerment and is an organization of 25 congregations in Duval County, in its 14th year. Combined, our congregations represent more than 15,000 residents from a broad cross-section of the Jacksonville community. ICARE is incorporated in Florida as a non-profit, 501 c (3) tax exempt and politically non-partisan organization.

ICARE's mission is to powerfully address citywide concerns related to issues of justice and fairness by pressing our elected officials and other city leaders on countywide solutions. ICARE is a direct-action organization, not a direct service organization. Every year, each congregation begins with a grassroots listening process involving members of its congregations to talk to one another in small house meetings to identify their greatest community concerns. Then, ICARE holds an assembly where members of congregations vote to prioritize the major concerns that ICARE will focus on during the upcoming year. For example, last year, our congregations prioritized education, crime and homelessness. After the problems are selected, Research Committees are formed, using volunteers from ICARE congregations.

LPC's goal is to turn out 250 members of our congregation (the size of our average worship service) at the annual Nehemiah Assembly, in 2015! This ties into ICARE's goal of having 15,000 people attend in 2015! This would mean people of faith in Jacksonville standing up for justice in a powerful way! Jacksonville turned out 70,000 for a Monster Truck Jam this year. Given this, we certainly we can achieve our goal for justice by 2015!

Our Scriptures tell us to do justice. Doing God's work includes showing faithfulness, mercy and justice. This is a great opportunity to do God's work in seeking justice, using the power of our numbers to push for solutions to community injustices, concerning us all.

"He has showed you, O man, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." Micah 6:8
