

The 66th General Service Conference Comes to A Close

From the SENY Delegate - Panel 65

The 2016 General Service Conference has come to a close. It was a week-long process in which much was accomplished, after many long days. Committee work started the week off, followed by the Feasibility Study (for most members, this occurred at Conference; while for a few others it was conducted at the Mt. Sinai-Roosevelt Emergency Room), regional elections, committee report-backs and eleven floor actions. Thursday evening concluded after 10 pm, and Friday's closing session concluded around 9:15 pm with the Panel 65 Delegates saying their goodbyes.

In terms of the items on the Delegate's Questionnaire considered by area groups:

- the Literature Committee took no action on the "plain language" Big Book item, and it did not come out of committee for a vote;
- regarding the pamphlets *Young People and A.A.* and *Twelve Traditions Illustrated,* consensus was reached by substantial unanimity to update these publications;
- the term "special needs" was removed from the name of the corresponding Conference committee by substantial unanimity; the new name for the committee will be the "Conference Committee on Treatment/Accessibilities."

Group contributions continue to decline--an alarming trend--dropping from 41.6% in 2014 to 40.3% in 2015. A complete Conference report will be given at the post-Conference assembly on June 11th in Manhattan (see the back of *The Link* for location and start time).

The 2016 Conference approved the theme "Supporting Our Future" for the 2017 Conference.

A delegate from another area asked me to sum up this year's Conference experience in one word. My response was: "intense."

It was truly a most rewarding and exhilarating experience.



Keeping You In The Loop: Area Inventory Progress Report - April 7, 2016 update From Rick W., Area Chair

SENY conducted its Area Inventory in November 2015 and area officers created 26 action items to address needs. Our goal is to provide the body ongoing updates on our progress. We delivered updates 3/7 at a Committee meeting, 4/9 at an assembly AND are keeping it updated in real time on our website at asseny.org/inventory. We will provide two more printed updates before the end of the year.

[IN PROGRESS] SENY will develop and distribute to county DCMCs a one-sheet information piece that can be distributed to GSRs to help counties promote the importance of attendance at area assemblies and what the GSRs role is in an area assembly.

[IN PROGRESS] SENY will recommend to the Service Sponsorship chair that the orientations for new DCMs & GSRs be split up so as to provide clarity on a specific position, and will create a suggested framework for the Service Sponsorship chair to build upon.

[COMPLETED / IN PROGRESS] We have re-imagined our morning workshop structure at assemblies, taking it from five workshops each assembly to three. The three workshops will be: "GSR Forum-Q&A", "Newcomers to Service" and "GSR Orientation."

[IN PROGRESS] In an effort to provide more value to our members, we are creating informal interaction opportunities in the form of round-tables during the lunch break at each assembly where members can come together on a specific topic and discuss it over lunch.

[COMPLETED] SENY leadership will do a better job in encouraging counties hosting area assemblies to choose locations closer to public transportation and to address A/SN needs; we will update the Assembly Planning Toolkit distributed to county DCMCs to include this information.

[COMPLETED] We are rethinking the information that's being reported at assemblies. We will include reporting from area committee chairs as well as DCMCs at all assemblies except Conference-related assemblies.

[COMPLETED] We have added a service position titled "Spiritual Timekeeper" for each assembly and committee meeting to help address time management concerns.

[COMPLETED] SENY feels scheduling is always a concern and we feel like we do a pretty good job scheduling our events. However, The area chair will recommend to the Agenda chair that SENY not list non-SENY events on its website if they fall on the same date as a SENY event.

[COMPLETED / IN PROGRESS] Our area registrar is working with Hispanic members of the area to do a better job of translating minutes from our meetings for distribution. We will be working to develop a strategy for improving translatiion of our email communications for our Spanish-speaking membership. Our registrar is also changing our database schema to incorporate language preference to better accommodate linguistics needs.

[COMPLETED / ONGOING] SENY is committed in doing a better job in engaging young people in AA in the general service structure and will continue to take actions towards furthering connection between the two groups.

[IN PROGRESS] SENY is researching development of a new event with a working title of ALL-COUNTY WORKSHOP that would be similar to something like "Taking SENY on the Road." An event of this nature would be an opportunity to cluster all districts in a county together for a service workshop that we hope would help in engaging area members in new ways, and promote greater unity and interest in service.

[COMPLETED] SENY is committed to doing a better job on highlighting the importance of service sponsorship. The area is looking at things like adding a visual indicator to name badges at area assemblies identifying those who are interested in BEING a service sponsor to help easily identify them to those NEEDING a service sponsor. SENY is also considering developing an "assembly buddy" program, much like delegates have "Conference buddies" at the General Service Conference.

[COMPLETED] Area officers have been attending and will continue to attend various county/district events to do a better job of inter-connecting the area (Share-a-Days, Breakfasts, Workshops, etc.). One way that SENY is considering how to better involve GSRs more is to figure out ways to engage them in execution of area events. Having more GSRs lead area workshops at assemblies is one thing SENY is looking at. SENY believes involving GSRs is vital to increased engagement and is open to any suggestions that members of SENY may have. SENY is encouraging counties to develop transportation options that will facilitate getting GSRs to area events (carpools, buses, travel reimbursements in their budgets, etc.).

[COMPLETED] Starting in 2016, SENY is going to add a component to all area assemblies (time restraints permitting) for a "GSR Q&A Session" allowing GSRs the opportunity to ask questions that are on their mind about any topic that will help them with their service position.

[COMPLETED] Area Chair has created a Robert's Rules "cheat sheet" and will begin distributing it at all area committee meetings and assemblies (starting 02/6/16).

[COMPLETED / ONGOING] Our area chair will work on doing a better job of using Robert's Rules POINT OF ORDER to help principles prevail over personalities. The Ad-hoc Publications Review committee will be working on revising the SENY Service Handbook and will be presenting proposed revisions to the Area Committee for its review/approval no later than November 2016.,

[IN PROGRESS] Our area chair will appoint a task force to include our delegate, alternate delegate, and at least one other trusted servant who has experience in this area to review our leaders' job descriptions and our bylaws to identify any changes that need to be made to better meet the needs of Area 49.

[COMPLETED] Regarding better meeting the needs of the Hispanic community, at the April 2016 assembly, the body voted to allot funds for a Spanish translator at all SENY assemblies and committee meetings. We have also secured a volunteer to assist us with written translations.

[IN PROGRESS] Area chair is appointing a task force to develop an area communications srategy that will cover all forms of communication SENY will use (e.g. print, email, website, etc). This task force will include the area registrar, Web chair, *The Link* committee members, the Ad-hoc Publications Review Committee and the area chair.

[COMPLETED / ONGOING] SENY will take steps to develop better relationships with area intergroups.

[IN PROGRESS] While SENY is not currently in a position to be able to do anything financially to help groups, districts or counties who are in need of insurance, we'll ask the Web chair to consider incorporating helpful information on the website.

Synergies: Step Five, Tradition Five, and Concept Five From the SENY Chair

Integrity (Step 5), Primary Purpose (Tradition 5), and Democracy (Concept 5) are the foundation principles of our three legacies. I have found it difficult at times to see the connections between the Steps, the Traditions and the Concepts, but when I look closely I can see that there are some very basic synergies between them. The Fifth Step helps me to see the exact nature of my wrongs and to stop being God by sharing them with someone else rather than analyzing them myself. The Fifth Tradition helps me to see the exact nature of what is best about me - my willingness to honor my primary purpose of carrying the message to the still suffering alcoholic. The Fifth Concept reminds me of the exact nature of what the spirit of democracy is all about - allowing the minority opinion to be heard (which is vital to the unity we profess we must have in Tradition 1).

What is meant by the phrase "exact nature"? One of the definitions of the word "nature" is "having the character or innate qualities of." Is it my nature to always want to be a man of integrity? No. I'm a drunk with a propensity to pitiful and incomprehensible demoralization. Thankfully though, I also have a fairly constant desire to experience that personality change Bill W. talks about in his spiritual experience on page 567 of our basic text. Reaching out and allowing somebody else to hear those character defects that block me from God's grace through listening to my Fifth Step is a great way to effect the change I am constantly seeking. Is it in my nature to always want to take action by carrying the message to the still suffering alcoholic? No. Because I'm a selfish and self-centered person, my first instinct is always to do what I want to do when I want to do it - and not to think of others first. By God's grace, that is changing also. Is it my nature to want to listen to those who don't agree with me? No, it is not. But as a result of a better understanding of Concept Five, I recognize there are times when the minority can be right and it is my responsibility to listen to their views. I have seen many examples where a well stated minority opinion can change an outcome entirely (as well as my opinion). That is what true democracy is all about - letting all voices be heard.

The exact nature of these three foundation principles lies in my willingness to become the spiritual example of them at all times, and not just when it's convenient for me. I continue to be grateful for that willingness, and recognize that I still have much to learn about all three.



The First General Service Conference

"OUR first General Service Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous gathered at New York City in April, 1951. It was composed of thirty-seven U.S. and Canadian delegates plus AA's General Service Headquarters staff and Trustees. The single purpose of our Conference was: to serve AA throughout the world.

This unexciting statement now carries a deep meaning for all who were there. We came to believe that AA's future had been made secure. We became certain that AA could live for so long as God might need us.

...The Conference scene that Sunday afternoon we last met will always be a precious memory in the annals of AA. For in that historic assemblage we could all hear the Voice of Alcoholics Anonymous. These were the words: "To serve AA is to live. We gladly accept our Third Legacy and may we guard it well and use it wisely. God grant that the Legacy of Service remain ever safe in our keeping.

In that fine hour the torch of Service did pass from the hands of us who are older to yours, which are younger; it passed to every oncoming generation of those Children of the Night whose darkness, God willing, shall be banished within the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous all through the bright years which Destiny surely holds in store for us."



Letter From the AA Grapevine Editor

Once we become free of what co-founder, Bill W., called that "merciless obsession" with alcohol, why do some of us return to drinking in the face of such serious consequences? Our Big Book describes it as a "peculiar mental twist." But one thing is for sure—whether or not we have a difficult time getting or staying sober—the hand of AA is always there for us. 
