

Actions of the 68th General Service Conference From the SENY Delegate - Panel 67

As part of the recent LISTS (Long Island Spirituality Through Service) event, I had the opportunity to speak on the actions of the 68th General Service Conference and wanted to share with you some of my thoughts.

As for outcomes, five of the new or revised pamphlets that were finalized last April are already available and making their way to literature racks in home groups across the Fellowship. A sixth should be available in the coming weeks. It's incredibly rewarding to see them in print.

But some of the actions at the April Conference won't materialize for years, for example the new pamphlet about the Three Legacies and the one for Spanish speaking women. There is a current call for written shared experience to be included (both with a November 19 deadline – have you written anything yet?). The Trustees Committee on Literature will need to review the submissions and then work with the publishing depart to prepare drafts. If all goes well, they may make it to the Literature Committee by 2020. Even then it's often another year before something is in print. (I once heard it takes four or five years for the Conference to have a "knee-jerk" reaction!)

One of the actions I am most excited about was the approval to publish the new publication, "Our Great Responsibility: A Selection of Bill W.'s General Service Conference Talks, 1951-1970" that came through the Archives Committee. It will hopefully be available by the end of the year. It's chock full of experience, history, and tradition--as told by Bill.

Another action of this past Conference included increasing how much an individual member can contribute annually to the General Service Office – raised from \$3,000 to \$5,000. Not many members give at that level, but it may encourage discussion around the importance of self-support.

You can read about all the actions and outcomes in the 68th General Service Conference Final Report. An anonymity-protected electronic version is posted at **www.aaseny.org** in English and Spanish. It's a powerful service tool. Please consider reading through it with some of your service buddies.


Theme of AA's 2018 General Service Conference

Service and Sobriety From the DCMC, Suffolk County

I love being a DCMC. The sense of focus and direction, knowing that we're doing things for the good of AA as a whole, the incredible fellowship and sense of belonging found below the group level – all of these things I treasure. Additionally, active participation serves an important need that I have, which is to keep my ego in check...most of the time. Okay, a lot of the time.

The other side of the coin, I have discovered, is that sometimes I can't see the trees for the forest. In focusing on my county, the area, and AAWS, it's sometimes too easy to lose sight of why I have been given the exquisite privilege of servant leadership, and so many other gifts besides: because I'm sober, and because a number of people looked past the fact that I was arrogant, in denial, and an insufferable dry drunk when I came in, and they loved me anyway until I could learn to love myself.

So I do all the things I'm encouraged to do to stay sober, and I do something else that is my gift to me: once a month, I take a meeting into the local jail. This was never part of my master plan; in fact, I almost backed out before my first prison visit as a speaker seven years ago. I thank my Higher Power that I didn't back out, because this commitment has become a rock in my quest for spirituality and balance.

Through the jail commitment, I have learned that bedrock honesty and un-whitewashed truth are the gold standard of sobriety. I've learned that those who are imprisoned share the same emotions, the same concerns that I do. And I've learned that reaching out to another alcoholic in ANY environment helps to keep me sober that day – even as, going in, the gates clang shut behind me.

Find your passion in AA, as have so many others – sobriety is so much more than not drinking.

What's all this "chatter" about Safety in AA? From the DCMC, Queens County

The hot topic in AA service circles these days is "Safety in the Rooms." Suggested guidelines were published by the GSO in February 2017, and there is also a yellow safety card which is supposed to quickly and simply explain the concept of safety in the rooms. So why is it that members are still confused?

One of the main reasons the safety discussion ignited recently is the law suit that was filed (unsuccessfully) against AAWS and the GSO because a female member in California was murdered (yes, murdered by another "member"). It appears the female was a newcomer and although we don't have all the details and probably never will, she decided to move in with the person and the situation went south. We can only speculate about how they met, who knew what the individual was capable of, were there obvious warning signs, etc.

All we know for sure is we as a Fellowship, must safeguard our members or we could all perish. Do I sound desperate? Hopefully not, but I would really hate it if meetings started closing because members felt unsafe or uncomfortable. We need each other to survive and we must continue this conversation to make sure all members are aware of the significance of feeling safe at a meeting. I was trying to find specific background information before I started writing this piece, so that my words would be accurate. I went to aa.org to see what was in the digital archives. Here are the hits on the word Safety:

Literature matching: safety (20 results)
Pages matching: safety (7 results)
Newsletters matching: safety (30 results)
Press Releases matching: safety (1 results)



"Take me to your humble, trusted servant."

The press release matching safety was a blurb about the 25 millionth Alcoholics Anonymous "Big Book" being given to a non-alcoholic trustee who was a dean at a college with safety in the name.

Based on the other 57 matching results, clearly, safety has and always will be a hot topic in AA. The topic of safety in AA has been in our literature, pamphlets and newsletters for years ever reminding us to be vigilant. Our Fellowship is precious and fragile. So, what can we do to promote safety in the rooms?

Our Common Welfare

Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole.

A.A. must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward.

-Tradition One (Long Form)

It is hoped that our common suffering as alcoholics and our common solution in A.A. will transcend most issues and curtail negative behaviors that could jeopardize the safety of anyone attending an A.A. meeting. Nevertheless, Alcoholics Anonymous is a microcosm of the larger society we exist in As such, problems found in the outside world can also make their way into the rooms of A.A. For this reason, groups and members discuss the topic of safety — to raise awareness in the Fellowship and to seek through sponsorship, workshops and meetings, to create as safe an environment as possible to carry A.A.'s message of hope and recovery to the still-suffering alcoholic.

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There are a number of suggestions and reminders for groups and members listed on page 3 of the "Safety in AA: Our Common Welfare" guidelines (SMF-209):

- Talk about issues of safety before they arise.
- Safety is something each member attending an A.A. meeting can be mindful of.
- Communicate clearly what A.A. is and what it is not.
- Sponsorship plays an important role and sponsors can be helpful in pointing out warning signs or unhealthy situations to sponsees and newcomers.
- A.A. members who are concerned about the words or actions of a sponsor or other member, may find it helpful to speak to someone they trust, their A.A. group, or a professional, as needed.
- Include Safety and the A.A. Meeting Environment as topics for a group inventory.
- Consider developing group guidelines and procedures on safety.
- In all discussions about safety, keep the focus on our primary purpose, our common welfare, and place principles before personalities.

So, what can we as members do to practice Safety in the Rooms? Keep the conversation going, share information, suggest a group inventory and most importantly, pay attention!






