From the SENY Delegate - Panel 69

I’ve received my General Service Conference (GSC) committee assignments, the primary one being the Conference committee on Treatment/Accessibilities. This committee covers underserved and remote communities, including the armed services. In 2016, the words “Special Needs” were removed from the name of this committee. I’ve been at events where people who were concerned about accessibilities shared that the words “special needs” were insulting and condescending.

This exciting assignment reminds me of something I’ve been thinking about for a while: Accessibilities in terms of digital fluency (or lack of it) and AA. How do we get the message to people who communicate mainly through digital media? How can we “step up” as AA members in carrying the message? Do we really mean it when we say, “I am responsible . . . When anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA always to be there. And for that: I am responsible”?

I’ve been assigned a secondary committee: International Conventions/Regional Forums (not all delegates get to serve on two and I’m really excited). A decade ago this committee asked that when planning events, districts, counties, and groups be mindful not to schedule them for a Forum weekend. May 31-June 2 is the Northeast Regional Forum, and we’re hosting it!

I’m asking for your help. The Delegate’s Day of Sharing will be held on March 16. Once I receive the final Conference agenda items, I’ll be a very busy delegate preparing the Delegate’s Questionnaire. Yet, it takes the actions of every one of us to be a fully informed area. *The Link*, Box 459, area email updates, and other correspondences sent to the DCMCs (who, in turn, share with the counties) are some of the ways in which information will be shared with you. I invite you to join me in reading all of them. This will lead to a better-informed conscience.

To all new trusted servants: welcome. We love you. When I was sober a bit over a year, I was told at a service workshop that “97% of the people involved in service below the group level stay sober.” I liked the odds.

I’m absolutely thrilled to serve as your delegate.

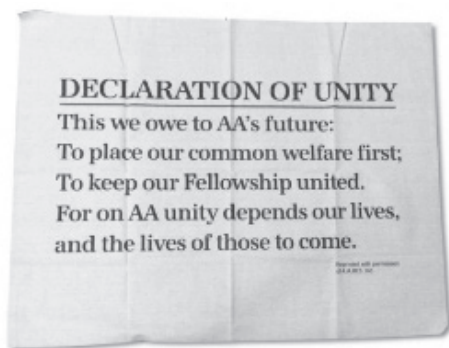
Theme of AA’s 2019 General Service Conference

The Spiritual Nature of the SENY Calendar From the SENY Alternate Delegate

Greetings, fellow trusted servants! As of January 12, 2019 at 6:35 PM, there are exactly 169 individual listings on the SENY Calendar for the period 1/13/19 to 12/31/19. This might seem like a lot or a little, depending on your perspective. However, there is a quite a bit that is NOT yet on the calendar: some county meetings; most SENY Committee meetings; most district meetings and events; most of the Spiritual Breakfasts; the Joy of Service workshops; and other special events that haven't yet been conceived.

Therefore, this is a request for everyone with a SENY, district or county event (or series of meetings) to get it on the calendar right away. Because, inevitably, there will be conflicts. And with all such conflicts, one way or another, multiple events will suffer as regards participation. In the same way that starting a new meeting (same day, same time) across the street from an existing meeting is contrary to the Traditions, the same is true for scheduling events in our Area. And while "dueling meetings" are usually avoidable, scheduling conflicts will sometimes happen. But most of them can be prevented simply by checking the calendar before choosing a date and posting the event as quickly as possible.

Why is this important? Each event will be valuable to a number of people and may well be a labor of love for the presenters. The fewer scheduling conflicts we have, the better; and the more ways we have to carry the AA message. It's one more manifestation of the Unity we seek in Alcoholics Anonymous.



So get your meeting and event information out to the Agenda Chair (agenda@aaseny.org) as soon as possible – give us all a chance to participate with you!

Pass It On From the SENY Chair

February A.A. History:

- February 11, 1938: Clarence S. (Home Brewmeister) had his last drink.
- February 13, 1940: Jim B. (The Vicious Cycle) moved to Philadelphia and started the first Philadelphia AA group.
- February 2, 1942: Bill W. paid tribute to Ruth Hock, AA's first paid secretary, who resigned to get married. She had written approximately 15,000 letters to help carry the message.
- February 18, 1943: AAs were granted the right to use their cars for 12th step work in emergency cases, despite gas rationing.
- February 12, 1945: World War II paper shortage forced a reduction in the size of the Big Book.
- February 14, 1971: AA groups worldwide held a memorial service for Bill Wilson.

I have always been interested in the history of the Fellowship: the miracles, sacrifices, faith, and unwavering commitment to serve others that the early AAs had.

I cannot speak for others but I am excited and anxious about the upcoming two years in South East New York. I had the privilege of being the Staten Island DCMC for the past two years, and got warmed up for this opportunity to serve at the area level. I have been helped and guided by my service sponsor (if you don't have one, get one), and by our new delegate Jane E., past SENY Chair, with amazing experience and love for AA.

SENY now has a new office in the Bronx, where standing committees can have their meetings. The office should be up and running by our next assembly.

We have many exciting events coming up this year: NERAASA (February 23-25), Delegate's Day of Sharing (March 16), SENY Convention (March 22-24), Northeast Regional Forum (May 31-June 2, and hosted by SENY).

The Regional and Local Forums were started in 1975 by Dr. Jack Norris, then-chair of the General Service Board (GSB). They were to be weekends for sharing and informational sessions designed to help the GSB, AA World Services, the AA Grapevine's board and staff, and the General Service Office staff stay in touch with AA members and trusted servants throughout the service structure. Regional Forums are held alternate years in each of the eight Regions of the U.S. and Canada. There is no registration fee for the forums.

And...more will be revealed to us as we move forward in our new roles of service to this amazing Fellowship. Thank you for allowing me to serve. Pass It On.

Even though I've participated at many levels of service, I am still confused at times. But I know that with the help of county and area trusted servants my confusion will lessen. I love being of service, I love feeling useful.

This past year I argued with my dear friend and service sponsor Cookie, recently passed away, insisting that my life had become very busy, that maybe I would not be able to continue to attend all of my service meetings. Cookie was passionate about AA service and dedicated her life to it. She looked at me with her sparkly eyes, smiled, and in a soft assertive voice said: "You should stand as your county's DCMC."

Cookie's passion for service and her dedication to AA has given me the ability to show up for life and to trust that my higher power sees the bigger picture. I am now the new DCMC for Manhattan County.
