

On September 12 we held our first ever virtual SENY elections for our Panel 71 Area Officers!

Our Panel 71 Officers are: Delegate- Tom B., Alternate Delegate- JoAnn M., Area Chair- Nisaa A., Technology and Communications Officer- Mike O., Treasurer- Rich S. I wish them the kind of loving support I've experienced as a SENY Officer. (I'm misty eyed as I type this; thank you, SENY).

"What is a Panel?" Great question! The first General Service Conference was in 1951 and was of the first Panel, Panel 1. Each year thereafter a new Panel was seated and numbered representing half the then existing delegate areas. I'm a Panel 69 delegate; all delegates (like GSRs) serve for two years. I served during 2019-2020. About half of the delegates of the 93 Areas of the General Service Structure of the US and Canada "rotate in" on an even year, and the other half, on an odd year.

Our Service Manual (p. S111) includes which Areas start on an odd year, and which start on an even year. This assignment assures that every General Service Conference has second year delegates, and new first year delegates. It's just like at our homegroups: we have members with experience, and new people, with fresh ideas. SENY's is an odd year; our delegate-elect Tom, will rotate in on January 1, 2021. I will remain a delegate through 11:59 pm on December 31, 2020. Promptly at midnight, Tom B. becomes the delegate. The spirit of rotation. I will rotate on, as will the officers I serve with. Many off us prefer to say rotate "on", and not "off".

Former and seated (current) delegates often introduce themselves with their panel. One can tell which years they served by their panel. For example, I am a Panel 69 delegate which means I serve 2019-2020. Tom B. will be a Panel 71 delegate, serving in 2021-2022; one can count from 1950 to know.

There were so many meetings prior to our first virtual elections to ensure the veracity of our elections! We created a virtual equivalent of SENY past delegates looking people in the eye (as is done in real life), with the "Serenity Sentinels" rooms. Our special workers were given countless SENY customs and standards to implement virtually. I appreciate them, and other SENY members who joined in and worked hard to assure our elections would run as smoothly as possible (especially considering this was our first virtual implementation of a process we've used since the 1950's).

I'm deeply grateful to each member who made themselves available and stood for office. I'm thankful to the members of SENY for living the Fourth Concept by attending and participating in our elections.

I'm incredibly grateful and expect that I will be for the rest of my life (one day at a time) for the incredible experience of serving as your Panel 69 delegate.

An Aspect of Service – Serving

Hello, Friends. No, the title is not a typo. I suppose it's a variation of what I heard early on, that "you're either in AA or you're around AA." Those who are in AA and serve our fellowship tend to be the ones who stay sober, at least from what I've seen; and while this article is for all of us, it's particularly written for the GSRs, and for those who will step up as GSRs in the next rotation.

2020 has been a challenging and sometimes brutal year. For AA members it has been a time of upheaval, sudden and enforced change, new frontiers, sickness, and sometimes death. Doors have been closed and opened – a perfect example are virtual meetings, which for some are a source of annoyance (or worse), but for others are an incredible blessing. Money issues for individuals, groups and all other aspects of AA are pressing. The list goes on.

There is a Solution; and it starts with all those who serve.

For the past few months, I've referred you to Concept IX, the "Leadership Concept", and its four touchstones: tolerance, responsibility, flexibility and vision. Perhaps at this time, as trusted servants we can get behind another principle of leadership, one that is necessary (and critical) in times of crisis, loss and even disunity, and one that all of us need to give AND receive. That principle is healing.

For those of you who will stand as your group's next GSR, remember: you will carry your group's voice and its heartbeat to the service structure. You will be the messenger of AA's information and evolution back to your group. You will be the guardian of its Traditions. Additionally, you will be a leader in your group as it moves in whatever direction it chooses to go. Because you will be serving, and a healing influence.

When that load gets heavy, go to Bill W's final sentence in Concept IX: "We thank God that Alcoholics Anonymous is blessed with so much leadership in all of its affairs." Because in AA, leadership is serving.

October 10, 1988 - Lois is buried next to Bill in Manchester, Vermont.

October 20, 1928 - Bill wrote a promise in the family bible to quit drinking. By Thanksgiving he added a second promise.

October 1949 - Florence R, AA's first sober woman starts drinking again; commits suicide.

October 1951 - The Lasker Award is presented to AA in San Francisco.

October 1954 - "The Alcoholic Foundation" was renamed "The General Service Board" of AA.
