

## November is gratitude month!

"I'm a grateful alcoholic..." is how I start my shares; what I am is more important that who I am, or my name. I remember in my first year of sobriety how I felt "a part of" when the basket came around and I was able to drop a contribution in. Now that most groups have started to use a virtual basket, my heart sings for the newcomers who are like I was, feeling separate from, and less than. A virtual basket is any way a group chooses to collect the Seventh Tradition at online meetings.

Did you know that if you are an AA member, you can make recurring contributions on <u>aa.org</u> starting at five dollars a month (as long as it totals no more than \$5000/year)? The contribution limit is decided on by the General Service Conference, where the voice of the groups with an active GSR are heard. There is no limit as to what an AA group may contribute.

One question that's been coming my way via GSRs is the question, "Is the \$5000/year limit still a realistic one?" I invite you to click on the <u>From the Delegate page</u> and see the Financial Update where you can become more informed, for example, one dollar in 1935 was the equivalent of \$18.84 in 2019.

Some AA members who are able to, choose to express their gratitude in the basket; others who have more time and less money choose to express their gratitude with time; probably most choose to express their gratitude through a combination of these. Bill reminds us in the Ninth Tradition, "How I do my Twelfth Step work is my business. Who are you to judge?" (Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, p. 173).

Since the pandemic began, 4.5 million dollars was withdrawn from the prudent reserve to continue operations for AA as a whole (US/Canada) in 2020. When physical meetings stopped, our literature sales dropped significantly. The result is a gap between our income and our costs of roughly \$700,000 each month. We have never been fully self-supporting through our own contributions. Is it time for us to stop relying on the sale of literature to make up the shortfall? Additional questions come to mind: "Will we embrace 'I am responsible' and finally become fully self-supporting through our own contributions? Will members grow in love and tolerance of those members who cannot give of time, but can give generously of dollars? Will COVID 19 hold us accountable to our Seventh Tradition? Is there a silver lining here?"

## An Aspect of Service – the Area Inventory

Hello, fellow A.A. Members! One of the things that remains of paramount importance during our service journey, whether in the group or below it, is to remember that our foundation in Alcoholics Anonymous is ultimately based on our 12 Steps. With that in mind, page 64 of our Big Book says that an "inventory is a fact-finding and a fact-facing process." Two paragraphs later we find a vital sentence concerning resentments. Please, bear with me.

On Saturday November 14th, SENY will hold its final Assembly of the Panel 69 rotation. As is our tradition, part of the Assembly will be devoted to our Area Inventory. One of my duties for the past two years has been to serve as Area 49's "steward" of our last inventory, which occurred two years ago on 11/4/2018. Simply put, it has been my responsibility in this rotation to consider how responsive we (the SENY Committee members and officers) have been to the thoughts and wishes of the groups, as brought forth by their GSRs.

You are reading this article (written on October 13) in our November Link. By this time, I will have prepared and posted my stewardship thoughts and observations to our SENY website, using that same "fact-finding... fact-facing process". I will be considering the Questions, Record and Recurring Themes of that last inventory – these three items can be found at <u>https://www.aaseny.org</u> under Resources / SENY-Specific. And yes: it will be in the context of the pandemic.

Finally, as I spend time in 11th Step discernment around our 2018 inventory, I will have an overarching, two-part question in front of me: "Have we made participation in general service both attractive and important to the groups (via their GSRs) over the past two years? And if not, have we created resentments against service, thereby impacting that participation?"

Please, PLEASE attend the Area Inventory on November 14th – your participation will help us be the best trusted servants possible to you and the groups going forward.

**November 28, 1939 - Akron groups withdraw from as**sociation with the Oxford group. Meetings moved to Dr. Bob's and other member's homes.



# WHY WE PAY

There are many AA conferences and conventions held around the world. One of the most common misconceptions of these gatherings is that they are AA meetings and since there are no dues or fees for AA membership, there should be no fees to attend. Conventions and conferences are special events - not regular meetings. They require months of planning, preparations, and money to present. Since most events are held in hotels or conference centers, there is a charge for the use of some facilities. Other expenses include travel and lodging for speakers, printing of fliers, schedules and programs, postage, supplies, and entertainment. A large event requires a substantial amount of money.

The convention is self-supporting. No group monies are used to pay for the event. The cost of the event is paid through registration fees. No baskets are passed. Donations are encouraged to pay for the hospitality room coffee and food. The ideal of any committee is to break even; therefore, the registration fee is nominal compared to a weekend's worth of entertainment anywhere else. Attendance is voluntary and as responsible AA members, we now "pay our own way." developed in Area 30 – Eastern Massachusetts
