

Welcome to Prayer and Preaching

As we continue our study of the book of Jude, we come across a difficult passage. Jude teaches us that the ungodly will be judges severely. This should not frighten us, after all, it's not too easy to see plenty of ungodly people and ungodliness going on in the world around us. From the safe environs of this holy house, it is all too easy to wish judgment on those who openly promote all kinds of ungodliness and vice.

But Jude does more than announce a judgment on people out there; he makes the shocking claim that ungodly people have found their way into the church and are polluting the church with their false teachings. In doing this, Jude also teaches us what to look for when it comes to identifying ungodliness in the world and in Christ's church.

And this begs the question: does ungodliness bother you? Sure, it's easy to express righteous indignation at the culture and world around us that has little room for Christ and his word. It's easy to criticize people who visibly suffer the consequences of poor decisions and lack of obedience to Christ: the drug user who can't handle a job and paying the bills; the prostitute who cannot free herself from the cycle of abuse, dependency and fear; the corrupt politician, discharging his sacred responsibilities to the highest bidder. What's not so easy is to realize that the same seed of ungodliness that clearly manifests itself in the lives of others lives within each of us. There is no evil we are not capable of doing, in church or out of church.

Thanks be to God, who sent us the Holy Spirit to guide and govern our lives to make them more like that of Jesus, who allows us to say "yes" to God and "no" to sin, who gives us the privilege of participating in God's work here on earth as we wait for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ!

The Reading: Jude 14-16

It was also about these that Enoch, the seventh from Adam, prophesied, saying, "Behold, the Lord comes with ten thousands of his holy ones, to execute judgment on all and to convict all the ungodly of all their deeds of ungodliness that they have committed in such an ungodly way, and of all the harsh things that ungodly sinners

have spoken against him." These are grumblers, malcontents, following their own sinful desires; they are loud-mouthed boasters, showing favoritism to gain advantage.

The Nicene Creed

I believe in one God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth and of all things visible and invisible.

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God,

begotten of His Father before all worlds,

God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God,
