Wednesday of Holy Week Apríl 1st, 2015

Welcome to Zion Lutheran Church!

Palm Sunday. Maundy Thursday. Good Friday. Easter Sunday.

Notice something missing? Anything at all? Monday. Tuesday. And Wednesday. Jesus comes into Jerusalem on the Sunday before he is crucified, institutes the Lord's Supper on Thursday, is tried and executed on Friday, rests in the tomb on Saturday, and is raised to life on Sunday. But what about Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week? What did Jesus do then?

This evening, we are going to take a look at what Jesus did during the first half of his week in Jerusalem, giving special attention to the devotion of an un-named woman who prepared his body for burial.

I hope that, as we unpack what Jesus said and did during the first three or four days he spent in Jerusalem you will see why the authorities thought it best to put him to death. After all, Jesus had some pretty incredible things to say about those who opposed him, as well as for those who demonstrated faith in him. His teaching during the week leading up to his death mirrored that of his first public sermon to his disciples, the Sermon on the Mount: allegiance to him is the deciding factor on the Day of Judgment.

We'll take a look at what Jesus did Monday-Wednesday of that first "holy week," as well as answer several questions from last Sunday. And, just a reminder, we'll have services this Thursday and Friday at 7:00. We will have Communion at tomorrow's service, and Friday will be a "Tenebrae" service. Invite your friends and bring your family as we celebrate and remember the death of our Lord Jesus Christ.

When Jesus had finished all these sayings, he said to his disciples, "You know that after two days the Passover is coming, and the Son of Man will be delivered up to be crucified."

Then the chief priests and the elders of the people gathered in the palace of the high priest, whose name was Caiaphas, and plotted together in order to arrest Jesus by stealth and kill him. But they said, "Not during the feast, lest there be an uproar among the people."

Now when Jesus was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper, a woman came up to him with an alabaster flask of very expensive ointment, and she poured it on his head as he reclined at table. And when the disciples saw it, they were indignant, saying, "Why this waste? For this could have been sold for a large sum and given to the poor." But Jesus, aware of this, said to them, "Why do you trouble the woman? For she has done a beautiful thing to me. For you always have the poor with you, but you will not always have me. In pouring this ointment on my body, she has done it to prepare me for burial. Truly, I say to you, wherever this gospel is proclaimed in the whole world, what she has done will also be told in memory of her."

Then one of the twelve, whose name was Judas Iscariot, went to the chief priests and said, "What will you give me if I deliver him over to you?" And they paid him thirty pieces of silver. And from that moment he sought an opportunity to betray him.
