

WHO DO YOU KNOW that needs an invitation to church? We all know people who have either fallen away from Christ, are struggling with their faith, or who have never heard the good news of the gospel. We are going to have a "Friendship Sunday" on May 11th. The music will be all familiar hymns, the liturgy will be very easy to follow, and the sermon will be the simple message of the gospel. We will have a time of fellowship in between the services as well.

Welcome to Prayer and Preaching

This evening we conclude our study of the book of Jude by looking at the book's doxology. After telling his readers that dangerous evils are present in the church that seek to threaten the believers' faith and salvation, Jude concludes the book by reassuring his readers that their God is bigger than their enemies and that they will spend an eternity in His presence.

So what does this mean for us? Jude balances the real threat the wicked people, the devil and our own sinful flesh pose with the mercy and love of an all-powerful God. It is easy to downplay the one and exaggerate the consequences of the other. For example, it is all too easy to think that our past sins and way of life outside of Christ is enough to doom us eternally. On the other hand, it is also all too easy to think that, like a spoiled child who has his parents wrapped around his little finger, we can get away with whatever we want without the possibility of severe negative consequences. Jude balances the two and acknowledges the tension that exists: persistent sin is a threat to salvation; God, who desires our salvation, can do whatever He wants.

And so we too live with the same tension outlined in the book of Jude. We struggle and wrestle with the sin in our life. We do this not to earn our salvation, but because the outcome of sin left unchecked is unbelief. Fortunately, we have the Holy Spirit living in us, and as the controlling influence in our lives, He will continue to lead us to Christ our Savior! He will teach us to say "No" to ungodliness and sinful passions. He will teach us to say "Yes" to God and lead us in a faith that trusts in God's promises and moves us closer to Christ.
