

Ash Wednesday

Welcome to Zion Lutheran Church!

As you enter into worship this evening you notice that the colors upon the altar have changed to purple. As we begin Lent the purple on the altar reminds us of penitence. We are reminded that we are sinners in desperate need of a Savior.

Tonight we come forward for the imposition of ashes. As pastor places the ashes upon our heads, he says, "Remember that thou are dust and unto dust thou shalt return." Through these somber words spoken upon us we recognize our own mortality. We recognize that we will in fact die. For just a moment we focus on what our life would be like without our Savior. That without Jesus there would be no life, only death.

In our Old Testament lesson we hear from the prophet Joel. Joel encourages us to turn away from our sins and put our faith in God. We know that this is easier said than done. After all, we continue to sin much and even delight in our sin. Yet, it is the ashes on our foreheads which remind us what this sin leads too, death! Therefore, we flee sin! We turn to God pleading with him to forgive us! Joel tells us that our God is gracious and merciful; slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love. For those who turn to God for forgiveness God will indeed forgive their sins.

As we enter the season of Lent we are reminded that we are sinners in desperate need of a Savior. We rejoice for the next 40 days in Lent as we watch our Savior make His way to a cross to take away our sins. May God richly bless your worship.

The Reading: Joel 2:12-19

```
