PALM DEVOTION

We are afraid and that is precisely when Jesus comes to bless us.

"Then, the same day at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled, for fear of the Jews, ...

Shut into a building in fear. Sound familiar? The fear that the disciples were experiencing was of a very real threat. Their master teacher had just been executed by the most powerful men in Jerusalem cheered on by a willing crowd. No one could help him. Jesus had warned them repeatedly that "you will be hated by all for My name's sake." (Luke 21:17) The disciples were hiding in fear because they quite reasonably assumed that they were to be next.

The Coronavirus pandemic has spawned all sorts of fear. Fear of a real yet invisible virus that is highly contagious and insidiously preys upon our elderly loved ones. Fear of a perceived threat of people with nefarious motives looking to take advantage of our society's weakened state of isolation. Fear, real or perceived, of loneliness, joblessness, and poverty. We are still Jesus' disciples and we find ourselves once again locked in an upper room, afraid.

The Impact of the Pandemic on Campus Ministry

As soon as the news became definite that Slippery Rock University students would be going home to study online due to the coronavirus, the question became: how could campus ministry continue to help students?

When I first heard of this situation, I thought we would have to close up campus ministry work until students returned to campus in the fall. Just as quickly a thought occurred to me: "Why not see what can be done to help students in this new situation?"

God brought good out of bad when two students from South Korea called All Saints campus ministry to ask if they could store two pieces of luggage at the church while they went home to study online until Labor Day. Cho is part of All Saints' church family. He attends church every Sunday and comes to student meals regularly. His friend had luggage he wanted to store as well.

While we unloaded the luggage, Cho's friend saw the Sunday School room where I teach young students on Sundays. He smiled as he looked at the room nostalgically, noting the Ten Commandments posted on the wall and the Lenten materials lying on the table. He remarked to me that he had attended Sunday School when he was young, but that he had quit going some time ago. He said he no longer comes to church because friends don't, but mostly because his mother, who had been a Christian, had been converted to Buddhism by her best friend.

I thanked him for sharing his story and told him I would be very glad to talk more about his situation when he returns. He indicated that he might do that. He willingly took "The Gospel of_John" which I offered to him to read on his trip back home. He proudly told me that he still remembers John 3:16, and he happily recited it to me.

I feel great joy that out of this awful virus pandemic, something very good has happened: a student has been reminded of the faith he once held. He has been shown that the door to faith is still open.

I don't know what campus ministry will look like this summer, since most students are gone. A few internationals are here in Slippery Rock. We are letting them know that we are here to make their lives easier. Reverend Larry K. Loree is an excellent cook and has volunteered to prepare meals for those who are eager for home cooking – meals that could be boxed and given to students so that no one would be affected by the virus.

Campus ministry continues to help students even though they are studying online, often thousands of miles from SRU. We are helping with our prayers and our many phone calls. Daphne, who has come to study the Bible, wanted her family to see her church before they took her home to study online. Later, I called her.

I let her know that she would be missed and that I would pray she would get the internship she wants at Disney World. I pray she'll continue growing in faith by reading the Bible.

I phoned Cho just before he flew home to South Korea. He is shy, but is glad to be assured that we at All Saints can't wait for him to return.

Eefa is not a student. Her husband is a professor at SRU. She is from Bangladesh and had lived in North Dakota while her husband earned his PhD. While there, she told us, she discovered that Christians are very kind. We call Eefa often to talk to her and her daughter. We use these calls to help ease her loneliness, especially during these days of being indoors due to the virus. Campus ministry hopes the calls will make her life happier. She is a Buddhist, but we hope she'll become interested in Christianity.

Also, we call the son of a Christian mother. He was born in India, grew up in Africa, and now works in New Jersey, after graduating from SRU. He is a pantheist (God is everywhere and in all religions). We call him so he will know that we care about his life, which consists of twelve-hour work days and now excruciating pain due to wisdom teeth extraction which has become infected. We tell him we are praying for him.

All Saints campus ministry is excited to see what God will give us to do during this crisis. The students will never forget that at a time like this, God was there for them. And also that campus ministry stands with them. We will never stop calling and praying for them.

Mileposters News

During a family movie event for Mileposters, the quad stoker team and their mother viewed the Japanese animated film 'My Neighbor Totoro' with two prospective riders and their parent. Response was enthusiastic, and generated several pictures drawn after the showing was over. Twelve unchurched individuals have attended events since November 2019, eight of them more than once.

Starting in March, using the original Mileposters tandem (pictured at Milepost 19, Boston), there were three exploratory and training rides on the Youghiogheny River Trail, between Milepost 18 (Dead Man's Hollow) and Milepost 29 (Douglas Run), plus one with the triplet on the Steel Valley Trail, for a total of 323 miles since the first of the year. Despite a lot of rain those weeks, trail conditions were good; generally March and early April are not favorable for riding because of the soft surface. By April 8, the area was starting to turn green--pictured is the campground entrance at Dravo Landing, where there were hundreds of spring peepers (frogs) singing. Because of the warm winter, trilliums at Mile-

post 23 are in full bloom, about three weeks early.

CLM Coronavirus Update

Concordia Lutheran Ministries is monitoring the COVID-19 situation daily to remain educated about and prepared for whatever challenges may come our way, which involves implementing new best practices, changes to policies and much more. As we adapt to tackle each new day, protecting the health, safety and wellness of our residents, patients and staff members will always remain our top priority.

The situation is in constant fluctuation. Concordia's leadership teams are constantly checking on the CDC's latest guidelines for all three states where we have locations: Pennsylvania, Florida and Ohio.

New Admissions Will Be Isolated. As an extra precaution, Concordia facilities will isolate all new admissions who have not been tested for COVID-19 in private rooms (when available) for up to 14 days to better protect our residents and patients.

Concordia has developed a multi-part program to lift our residents' and patients' spirits:

A card/video campaign from the community to our residents and patients. To send a card, community members will need to contact the Activities Department at the location they're interested in (the phone numbers for our locations are on our website, www.ConcordiaLM.org). To send a video message, community members, family members or staff who are interested can email us at SendASmile@concordialm.org to get specific instructions on how to send a video, which will then be shared with residents and patients.

A shopping service for all Concordia retirement living residents. Concordia is coordinating a shopping service for our retirement living residents, in which Giant Eagle will prepare residents' orders to be delivered to the retirement living buildings. The immediate expansion of Concordia's Tele-CareGiver Program. Established in 2001, Concordia's Tele-CareGiver Program is a free service that utilizes volunteers who make daily phone calls to home-bound individuals to ensure that they are able to answer the phone – a daily "check-in" and friendly voice every day.
