### "Let us look to Jesus"

*Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. - Hebrews 12:1-2*



After a difficult 2020 and a bumpy start to 2021, in February the Church turns her attention to the season of Lent. A markedly penitential season, Lent carries with it many opportunities for Christians to transcend the currents and trends of the world. Fasting comes to mind quickly as a Lenten practice and this can be helpful for both body and mind. An intentional fast from certain habits, be they health or activity related, can assist in evaluating whether these behaviors merit permanent change. Intentionally examining ourselves according to the Ten Commandments leads us to a healthy penitence in which we cry out "Lord, have mercy!" Such penitence reminds us that we are not the masters of our destiny nor are we to trust in ourselves for our well-being. Likewise, at a time when circumstances have amplified the voices of politicians and scientists, which are intended to be helpful, humility before God reminds us that "It is better to trust in the Lord than to put confidence in man. It is better to trust in the Lord than to put confidence in princes" (Psalm 118).

Lent is a season for positives, not just negatives. If we were only to give up things for Lent, our lives would be left cold and diminished. Lent directs the Christian toward the positive. We turn away from the negative only insofar as we turn toward that which truly gives life and salvation. The weight of the cares and pleasures of this world are replaced by the hope and joy of our Lord, Jesus Christ. The will and energy that is lacking in us is taken up by Him who endured the cross for us. The drudgery of the world's problems are replaced by the swift feet of one running by faith. Our separation from God is replaced with being seated at the right hand of the throne of God in Jesus.

Advent turned our attention to our Lord, exhorting us to lift up our heads for our redemption draws near. Lent reminds us that we are not alone, that we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses, that our Lord is near, and that we can look to Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith. The Lenten Spring of the Church year is a time to remember that we have the Christmas gift of Jesus throughout all the days of our lives.



**The Five-Minute Gospel**

Does a warm, friendly welcome make a difference in becoming a successful campus ministry? All Saints Lutheran Church and Student Center has found that it does.

All Saints member Linda Domanski has been an example for everyone in our congregation by how she has made college students feel so welcome with her warm greetings. As far back as 1984 she and many other members were hard at work landscaping the hillside in front of the church. As she worked she darted away and then quickly returned to work. She explained that she had just shared a friendly hello to a college student who was walking across the parking lot. She had shared, as she put it, the "five-minute gospel" with him. She had shown the student that he was welcome to All Saints.

Linda and her husband recently moved to live closer to their youngest son and family in Maryland near DC. All Saints misses them terribly. We especially miss the friendly way she makes college students as well as all others feel very welcome.

The proof is in the pudding. On Christmas Day we received a phone call from Japan from a former student who had come to study at Slippery Rock University. This call is a testimony to what Christians who are friendly can do.

The student who called Christmas Day is Sam (not his real name) from Pakistan, whose family is Muslim. Sam loved being in Slippery Rock where his sweet attitude earned him many friends. He attended our Korean student meals when he could make time. He accepted our invitations to attend Sunday worship, where we sat close to him to explain to him the service. Although we might believe that a Muslim might not be interested in friendly invitations, he was. It was pure joy when he attended two worship services. Everyone was glad to meet him. He enjoyed the service very much, especially the hymns. He wished he could be in Slippery Rock so that he could worship again. He especially loved the hymn "Immortal, invisible God only wise" (802).



Sam went on to study for a master degree in Japan. He loves the Japanese language and would like to live there. But this is not the end of the story. All Saints Fellowship stayed in touch with Sam letting him know that we would pray for his sick sister at his request and for him after he had suffered a bad bike fall. We told him about two dear Japanese students who had attended SRU and urged him to contact them. He did so and has become friends with them.

**Five Minute Gospel (cont.)**

On Christmas Day Sam called to say Merry Christmas and to tell us he'd be listening to the Christmas story online in Japanese. How did this happen? Kenzaburo, a Japanese student who attended SRU and who had been baptized at All Saints, has a mother, father, sister, and nephew in Japan. Sam accepted our encouragement to visit Kenzaburo's family. They had a great time eating together in their home. The relationship flourishes. Kenzaburo's sister Michiko is a Christian. She is the one who offered to send him her church's Christmas presentation as he is in Osaka and she is in Kyoto. Sam's voice was filled with joy as he told us he'd be listening to the Christmas story.

The point of this story is that friendliness opened the door to friendship so campus ministry could eventually share the names of people like Michiko with Sam.

Even though we may believe that God cannot break through to Muslims, or Japanese, or Americans, He can and does. Linda Domanski's approach is right. It is one All Saints extends to students. It is one we all can use. Being friendly helps all students to realize they can trust what we share with them. We have a great and wise God who helps us tell His story.

### MILEPOSTERS NEWS

The Miles to Go 2020 campaign to raise support for LCMS ministry in Puerto Rico concluded after 3,046 miles by 18 riders, and appeal letters were mailed out. Contributions will help to fulfil the commitment by LCMS Disaster Response to supply \$1.3 million in aid to the island by 2022.



"In Christ alone, My hope is found" – reads the title page on the website of Christ Lutheran Church, Forest Hills. It is further described as a community of people who strive to know Christ Jesus and minister to the people in the Woodland Hills community, a member of the LCMS, the global leader in conservative protestant theology and education. Conveniently located nine miles east of downtown just off Route 30 in Forest Hills.



"A community of very faithful people, "Rev. Ron Breight affectionately calls his congregation. His clever sense of humor coupled with fathering four boys provides a strong foundation to pastor the diversity of its members. "Christ has become a new home for many who have lost their former church homes through closures." After nearly 14 years, Pastor Breight refers to them as eclectic. It is not just people who have grown up in the church. It is different walks of Lutheranism. Christ claims members who belonged to Concordia in McKeesport, Epiphany in Penn Hills, Immanuel and St. Paul in Braddock.

The newest members, Rev. Reholma and Johnnie McCants have joined since his retirement and the closure of Unity in Homewood. Pastor McCants currently serves as emeritus minister.

Why Christ Lutheran? What is it that draws folks to visit and stay?

President of the congregation for the past two years, Jim Law and his wife, Dee reflect on the last 50+ years they have been members of Christ from their home, isolated for the Christmas season due to contracting COVID. Jim and Dee moved to Gilmore Acres from Somerset after he graduated from Pitt and began teaching in the Pittsburgh Public Schools. "Our congregation cares for each other; the friendliness and comradery are a priority," he said. "During these days of our sickness, members are calling or sending cards every day."

"It's quite easy to fit in, according to Jonathan Breight, Pastor's oldest son, now responsible for outreach ministry. "There are so many types of people who have membership," Jonathan said, "You always can find more substance to a conversation than a hello, how are you?" "I found my own way at Christ." he confessed. "A way of making individuals feel like they belong; someone will make them feel wanted," he assured.

In addition, there are so many different groups and activities – music, cooking, service. When the pandemic hit, a cluster of folks assembled and began to sew masks to donate. Hundreds were collected for Concordia Lutheran Ministries residents and staff. The practice of Welcome Cards also helps leadership to stay connected to those visitors and practice follow-up, one of the many duties'

"Barb is our back-seat tail gunner," Jonathan noted.

"I began working here in August of 2010 because I needed a key to the church," Barb explained. "I came from Epiphany which we closed in 2009. The congregation was fortunate enough to sell and give the profits to many local LCMS groups. I had been the pseudo secretary there. I called myself pseudo because we couldn't pay anyone, and I did what I do here on a much smaller scale." She said, "This is my dream job. I loved teaching but was able to retire after 30 years." Barb continues, "Many people say that we are a friendly congregation. I think we have a great Women's Service Guild who make prayer shawls and lap robes, cookies for shut-ins and people at the Sonshine Kitchen whom they also service with sandwiches a few times a year," Barb M. said.

Eight women established The Women's Guild in 1951 to further Christian fellowship among the ladies of the congregation and to be involved in Christian service. It is one outreach that has been successful throughout the church history as the group continues to support the congregation financially through missions – quilts for the homeless ministry at First Trinity in Oakland for example, as well as items such as a new stole for Pastor Breight.

The 75th Anniversary commemorative book, written in 2008 reads ... On March 8, 1931, the Lutheran Church Extension Society (LCES) opened a mission church with Rev. William Dale, pastor at Trinity in Mt. Oliver. Followed by a three-week survey of the neighborhood in Forest Hills. Three months later, in June the LCES called Pastor Oliver Graebner to serve as a missionary for the Pittsburgh area. He and Pastor Eric Malte opened the Ardmore Lutheran Mission on August 30 in a rented storeroom at 103 Sumner Avenue. Sunday School began that Fall with three teachers and a dozen students who were met by church members at Braddock Hills Elementary School and transported to the "church."

By 1933, 28 adults were confirmed, and the name Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church was adopted, and the congregation was formally organized. That same year, a Ladies Aid Society was formed, Vacation Bible School began, the first young people's society was organized, and 125 members attended the first church picnic. The next year the cornerstone for a new church located at 514 Atlantic Avenue was laid. An adjoining parsonage was dedicated on March 31, 1940. Pastor Graebner was called by the Lutheran Laymen's League to organize the newly acquired Camp Pioneer in Angola, NY. Rev. Walter Sommerfeld began his tenure at Christ on May 6, 1945 having served Christ in New Castle.



The church was outgrowing its location and in July of 1949 the purchase of the current site was approved at a cost of \$6000. Current member Charles Koenig was the church council secretary at that time. (He now resides at Concordia of Monroeville.) The present sanctuary was dedicated on May 4, 1952. Five years later a parsonage was dedicated to house Pastor Sommerfeld and his family who served the congregation until his retirement on June 30, 1974. Rev. Ron Johnson served from 1974 -81. And on July 11, 1982, Rev. Ernest Knoche Jr was installed. His passion for golf prompted the creation of the annual golf scramble in 1983 which has continued, thanks to the efforts of Susan Robatzen until this year.

## HOUSES OF WORSHIP SERIES

Education was always a mission focus for the people of Christ Lutheran. The history is riddled with constant opportunities for seminary students and vicars in addition to the school expansion. The school began under the tutelage of Pastor Knoche and operated in the existing Sunday School space. An educational wing was opened in the fall of 1989 and by 1996 a modular building was added to house grades 7 and 8.

"We also had a thriving after-school program which grew to be a babies to grade 6 all-day program in addition to the school." Barbara Peterson, long-time member of Christ who has made her home at Concordia Haven 3 retirement living community since 2007. She assisted the pastor (Knoche) with Confirmation instruction, and he called her the "full-time lay volunteer." A graduate of Wilson College, Barb also led a Women's Bible Study group of 25 to 30 women for 25 years.

Most likely the longest standing didactic outreach was Vacation Bible School. According to an article in the February 24, 1948 issue of the *Lutheran Witness*, it was the largest in the Eastern District.

Barbara remembers the years when Christ hosted 270 children in the two-week program." I began as a helper at age 13." She eventually taught preschoolers and 6<sup>th</sup> graders. From 1973 until she retired in 2006, she served as VBS Director." In those days, we had a staff of 100 volunteers," she remembered. "It was our big mission push each year and members scheduled time off from work or moved their schedules to accept this call," she said of the team. "I was involved in committee work and stewardship but found my niche for serving the Lord in teaching and directing education."

In 2006, a new 2 manual digital Allen Quantum organ with the capability of reproducing sounds of 132 voices was commissioned for building in honor of Pastor Knoche who decided to retire after 24 years of ministry. The next year, Rev. Breight moved from Wisconsin with his wife Linda and their sons Miguel, Jonathan, David and Timmy to shepherd the flock at Christ.

In 2016, grades K through 8 were closed and the following year the Early Learning Center also closed. Although these are no longer operating, Barbara P. said, "We know that hundreds of kids and their families were touched by God's Word from 1982 to 2018 through the school and childcare, and through the nursery school, too. A lot of people came first as members of the community and came to be members of the congregation."

Four classrooms currently are rented to Shanny the Nanny, for day care. In 2019 The Garden of Eatin' was established in the church backyard for the Unity Mission and to supply local food pantries with fresh produce. An Evening of Praise was held featuring the church organist, the handbell choir, and the Barclay String Quartet.

Jim commented on the spiritual transformation over the last several decades. "Our communities have changed, and our congregation, like so many others, has adapted to the needs of retirees." For example, so many years, Christ celebrated Christmas with a 7 p.m. and a midnight service. Last year the times moved to 4 and 7 p.m. and this year it was live streamed in the fellowship hall and recorded on Facebook and You Tube.

"Our congregation has exceeded what was expected as far as contributions during this time," Jim noted. And the Internet has allowed the congregation to renew some friendships and connect with former members.

When looking for its website, Christ Lutheran is the first listing under Worship in Forest Hills Borough. Within the past two to three weeks, Rev. Ron Breight has assembled a full arsenal of video production. "He has gone above and beyond to be Covid friendly, learning how to live stream the worship service and utilize YouTube as well as recording his sermons," Jonathan revealed. "I call him a public speaking introvert, but he has dived headfirst into this technology."

## HOUSES OF WORSHIP SERIES

Barbara M. is equally thrilled about the jump into stay-at-home worship. "Our service on You Tube is published on Mondays. Now we have begun Facebook live which is good because it's on Sunday for those who might like to worship with the congregation at church. We also have the sermon, announcements, and the service on our website each week," she said.

Pastor Breight announced that this week they will have "packaged" Holy Communion for those who may be able to make home visits or for those who are not comfortable at in-person worship. He also assured all that "we will never again close our doors to worship ... and we will continue to use the internet to broadcast our Bible studies and services."

In a message at the church's last anniversary celebration, Pastor Breight writes, "Tempus Fugit Latin for "Time flies." If we think time has passed by quickly, the future is changing even faster. Compare today with life 25 years ago. What changes and challenges will the next 2 years bring? We give our triune God thanks and praise for His grace this far along our way, the work we have been able to do in His name and the memories we have collected. We pray that His blessing will remain with us that, celebrating and building on the foundation of the past, we may forge ahead into a future full of unknowns obeying the Great Commission to make disciples of all nations. Whether the time is past present or future, we know and believe the promise of Jesus Christ to be true that, "I will be with you always, to the very end of the age."


