"We Believe in the Resurrection of the Body and the Life Everlasting"

But what things were gain to me, these I have counted loss for Christ. Yet indeed I also count all things loss for the excellence of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord, for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them as rubbish, that I may gain Christ and be found in Him, not having my own righteousness, which is from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ, the righteousness which is from God by faith; that I may know Him and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings, being conformed to His death, if, by any means, I may attain to the resurrection from the dead. (Philippians 3:7-11)




The Easter greeting, "Christ is Risen!" and its response, "He is risen, indeed!" (or, "Truly, He is Risen!") is our joyous confession of faith in the season when we celebrate Jesus' victory over death and the grave. Lest we confine this confession to the status of "once upon a time," let us remember that this is our victory also. Jesus did not rise from the dead simply to prove that He could. Nor did He do so as some cosmic theological exercise to beat the Devil. Jesus rose bodily from the dead for us! As much as He gave His life as a sacrifice for our sin, He also rose from the dead in the flesh as the assurance of our hope in His promise of life everlasting.

While the world without Christ hopes, at best, for some spiritual afterlife as an angel or disembodied spirit in an ethereal "heaven," Christians have the full and hearty hope that Jesus's life, death, and resurrection restore and reconcile all of creation to the Father. For it pleased the Father that in Jesus all the fullness should dwell, and by Him to reconcile all things to Himself, by Him, whether things on earth or things in heaven, having made peace through the blood of His cross. (Colossians 1:19-20) As human beings, God created us with a reasonable soul and human flesh subsisting and so Jesus also took upon Himself the fullness of our humanity to redeem each of us entirely, in body and soul. Jesus rose to be the "firstborn from the dead" (Colossians 1:18, Revelation 1:5) to assure us that we, too, shall rise from the dead with our bodies, cleansed from every taint of sin and made perfect forever.

When we exclaim "Christ is risen!" and respond, "He is risen, indeed!" we are rejoicing and saying that Christ is risen and we shall rise, indeed! *"For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so God will bring with Him those who sleep in Jesus."* (1 Thessalonians 4:14) Jesus' resurrection reduces death to little more than a sleep for us. We fear it no more than we do going to bed at night. Each night, we expect to rise from sleep in the morning. In Christ, we expect to rise from death on the last day. How can we be so bold and face death with such bravado? We do so in the sure and certain hope of human life, body and soul, in Christ Jesus, who died for us, forgives us all our sin, and is truly risen from the dead!



Going Like Hotcakes

Ever since covid hit a year ago All Saints Lutheran Church and Student Center has been searching for new ways to connect with college students attending Slippery Rock University, Grove City College, and Westminster University. Campus ministry continues to make personal phone calls, sends emails, and takes students out for lunch. We've also recently discovered a wonderful additional way to meet students' needs! We are now giving them very readable and very topical Christian books to read and to keep. Who would've thought that books would go like hotcakes?

Campus pastor Rev. Larry K. Loree shares a book called <u>Man Up: the Quest for Masculinity</u>, by Jeffrey Hemmer (CPH). He believes that this book is so worth reading that he may require it to be read by all the men he meets with, especially those who come for pre-marital counseling with their fiancées. He wishes this book had been available when he prepared for marriage. <u>Man Up</u> helps men to "discover what it really means to be a man." Several copies are on our bookshelves to give to men as well as to anyone who might be interested.

The book <u>Ladylike: Living Biblically</u>, by Rebecca Curtis and Rosa Adler (CPH) challenges ladies to think outside the box; to rethink the "me first" culture. <u>Ladylike</u> talks about what comes first for the Christian woman: marriage, career, children. Men might find this interesting, too.

<u>Portals of Prayer (January-March) has a full-sized ad for a book called Speaking Boldly: Sharing God's</u> <u>Word Every Day</u>, by Edward Grimenstein. The author is the father of Anna, who attends Westminster College and attends All Saints worship when a ride is available. Campus ministry ordered several copies to give to students. It is an excellent book because Rev. Grimenstein writes with great enthusiasm in urging students to share the Gospel boldly. He knows just how to encourage students not to be afraid to share their faith in Jesus or to share all the Bible truths about gender, marriage, and the sacredness of life for all ages. He assures students that they should and can speak about God no matter if what they say runs counter to popular ideas held by their peers.

<u>Light in the Dark Belt</u>, by Rosa Young (CPH) is so gripping that even college students, who normally don't have much time to read, will not be able to stop reading her story.

The story is priceless because it shows what was accomplished with so little money, but with inspired effort. Rosa was fiercely devoted to helping children in Alabama who had almost nothing to be able to get an education. They didn't have shoes, running water, or even a comb to comb their hair with. They had hours and hours of work every day, yet could afford very little food. The poverty did not overwhelm this remarkable woman. She did not see poor children, she saw children who belong to God, and she was determined to help them.

Rosa's story is so magnificent because she prayed endlessly; always asking God for His will to be done. The story is very special because she does not play the blame game; she worked endless hours, sleeping very little, and giving all the little money she had to buy books and to build schools. Most of all, she fell in love with the teaching of the Lutheran Church and her pastors. She established schools which taught the ABCs and most of all which taught the Bible and Luther's Small Catechism.

Rosa Young does not waste time with bitterness. She just inspires with her trust in God, love for children, and her passion for pure doctrine which taught her students the unconditional love God has for them.

Many copies of this book will go into the hands of students. And when Covid ends All Saints will continue to encourage college students with books which will build up their faith. What a blessing to pass on such books.

"To beautify the house of the LORD": Holy Cross' Enhancement Project #1 by Vicar Silas Hasselbrook

In the book of Ezra, Ezra himself is not mentioned until near the end. Before he came, the Jewish people had been sent back with King Cyrus' approval. Amidst much work and some opposition and setbacks, the altar and the Temple were rebuilt and dedicated. The Jewish people had returned to their land. They were present in Israel once more.

Ezra was sent, not so much for the sake of rebuilding, but for appointing various people to various positions to govern the people, and to teach the people the Law of the LORD and what obedience to it entails. It is after the letter from King Artaxerxes that commands Ezra to go and lead his people that Ezra says: "Blessed be the LORD, the God of our fathers, who put such a thing as this into the heart of the king, to beautify the house of the LORD that is in Jerusalem..." (7:27).

While the return of the exiles to Israel is not quite the same as our situation at Holy Cross, there are some similarities. There is a strong LCMS presence in Hazelwood where there previously had been none. Part of that burgeoning presence has been the acquisition of a church building on the corner of Second Avenue and Mansion Street. And many efforts and hours of work have gone into beautifying the house of the LORD that is in Hazelwood.

This article will be the first of many that describe such projects of renovation and enhancement. In the final article of the series, I will provide before and after pictures of each project, with brief descriptions. But in this article the focus is the Sunday School room and Nursery area.

During my first week of vicarage, Pastor Spittel assigned me the duty of fixing up the Sunday School room and Nursery area. The walls in both rooms were painted yellow and needed another coat, not to mention that many areas had a bubble-effect going on due to water damage. The small Sunday School area was partitioned into even smaller portions by a divider. More space was needed, and the walls needed new paint and repairs. Further, other projects in the church started to find their temporary storage area in the Sunday School room. Large pipes from a pipe organ I found were stacked along the walls. Then the organ blower and its motor found a home. Then the Christmas Toy Drive overflow was placed in that area.

It was in February, a week before my wife and I took vacation, that things in my schedule and space in the rooms cleared up enough for us to start work. Before I describe all this work, I need to thank my dear wife, Moira, who helped me with most of the work, and knows quite a bit more about painting than I. Without her help and careful eye, the project would not look half as good. And without her will-ingness to help, it would have taken twice as long.


In my first month of vicarage, I had recruited John, our expert maintenance man, and our acolyte, Tyler, to assist me in tearing down the partition in the Sunday School room. We did that in short order, sanded the places on the walls where the wood had been and applied primer. We put primer on other parts of the wall that needed it. Then the project stopped for a few months. I was still getting acclimated to vicarage, then Advent and Christmas came.

With the walls complete, we started to rearrange the room. Old bulletins boards were thrown out, and a big new one was ordered. The old chalkboard, that had gashes in it, was tossed and a large, new whiteboard was ordered. We are also going to purchase a television and mount it on a wall, not just for educational content for kids (when needed), but also for congregational or Adult Bible Study instruction. Our Sunday School teacher, Anna, has plans of putting some paintings on the walls and books on the shelves.

My wife and I arranged four bookshelves in a corner for a little library. Two of those bookshelves we had stained and glossed. We pulled children's books down from the attic, tossed the bad, and kept the good. If you would like to donate wholesome children's books, religious or otherwise, we still have plenty of room!

The Sunday School room and Nursery area look much better. It is a wonderful setting for our small but growing Sunday School class. Let us pray that it becomes the setting for many generations of children to be nourished in the instruction and admonition of the Lord. Let us pray that it gives our children a place to be formed into the image of Christ, to build upon the foundation that is Jesus so that they may weather the storms and confusion of the world and the devil. Let it be a place where friendships are formed and little souls are edified.

Any project at Holy Cross is a collaboration. Pastor Spittel gave impetus and wisdom; Leigh helped with the paint color; John instructed us how best to stain and paint; Moira was my partner in painting, displayed a keen eye, and would often paint by herself until I could join; Tyler helped with demolition and painting; his sisters Maia and Shay helped paint too; Anna provided suggestions and support for further improving the rooms; and the support of PALM and various donations helped us get it done. I also gained some useful knowledge and experience about staining wood and painting and repairing walls. But in the end, the collaborative efforts of all the people involved had one goal: to beautify the house of the LORD! And this project, with God's blessing, did just that.



It was after months of walking into my office and seeing an unfinished project and pseudohieroglyphics of white primer on a yellow wall that I decided it was time to get going. Initially, we were just going to put another coat of yellow on the walls. However, we decided that a softer, nicer color was better suited to the purpose of the rooms. I consulted Pastor's wife, Leigh Spittel, who specializes in interior design, and she sent me a few suggestions of good, light blue paint to use.



During one of his runs to Home Depot to obtain supplies for other projects, John picked up 3 gallons of the paint, and set my wife and I up with various supplies for painting: rollers, brushes, paint pans, plastic and cardboard to lay on the floor, painter's tape, and ladders.

I would work on my administrative and theological responsibilities during the first half of the day, then after lunch would paint until about 8:30 in the evening with my wife. It was actually pretty enjoyable at first. We listened to music, chatted, and joked around with each other while we painted. But the long days prompted us to finish the project soon. And besides, we had listened to the soundtracks of *Guardians of the Galaxy* and *Momma Mia* a few too many times.

It took nearly a week to complete. We removed all the boards from the walls, taped the edges, and laid down the plastic and cardboard. We scraped the water damage puckering off the walls, applied Plaster of Paris to all the holes, and applied primer. After running out of the 3 gallons of paint, we bought one more in order to have put two coats of paint on all the walls in the Nursery and Sunday School. My wife repainted the floor trim

and door borders white. I touched up any persistent yellow edges that showed near the ceiling.

It felt good to look around at the room. The color was soft and gentle to the eyes, not as piercing as the previous yellow color. This certainly complements the intended use of the rooms as areas for little children to learn, or maybe sleep and nurse. I half-jokingly hoped that the color would make the kids in my catechesis class a bit more calm. That didn't quite pan out. But we did get them to help us with a little painting!

Our Houses of Worship *By Shirley Freyer*

Of the 14 pastors who have served Christ Lutheran Church in Oil City, only one other than the beloved Herman Bielenberg has served longer than the current pastor, Rev. David



Oester. Pastor Oester was ordained at Zion Lutheran Church in Accident, Maryland on July 13, 2008, following his graduation from Concordia Seminary in Ft Wayne. Installed at Christ, the following Sunday, he has remained in the area where Edwin Drake drilled the first oil well in 1859 and sparked the petroleum business in the United States.

Little did the son of a farmer and employee of the Oester Brother's Feed Store in Garrett County imagine himself called to do the Lord's work. He had chosen maintenance technology at Garrett College following high school and was ensconced in the operations of his family's two farms as well as the feedstore that was owned by his father and his cousin Jim's father. But the Lord had other plans as He did for his older cousin, Jim who graduated from Ft. Wayne 13 years before. Pastor David was one of the early non-traditional pastoral students.

"How the Lord shapes you in times and events to prepare you to do what He created you for," said Pastor Oester, "well, it's amazing." Much like Moses, he admits, "I can't do it; I can't stand up in a pulpit and preach but here I am."

He has developed a ministry where he can use his knowledge as "Mr. Fix-it" to help his elderly members. Former organist Adeline Kay said he helps everybody. At 94, she still lives in her own home of 60 years. Although she no longer drives, she remembers how the pastor came and fixed her car. Or late one Saturday night he was called when a furnace pilot light went out.

"The Lord places you where He needs you to be and gives us gifts to use for our fellow men," Pastor said. "I remember the song I learned from my Sunday School teacher, Velma Bicker, wife of our pastor as a young boy, "They Will Know We Are Christians By Our Love."

And the community in Oil City is learning more every day about Christ since the pandemic. Quickly they developed a Facebook page and are working on building a new website. Plans for a men's group were put on hold. But the congregants have always been mindful of outreach. The women's group continues a blanket and quilt ministry as well as a quarterly mission project for the Pregnancy Crises Center in Franklin and the Christmas collection of gift cards for seminary students and deaconesses at Concordia in Ft. Wayne.

Adeline, one of the oldest current members, was baptized by Rev. Bielenberg who has a special place in the church's "Hall of Fame" having supervised the production of LCMS's first sound motion picture, *The Call of The Cross*. His son is one of five other "sons and daughters" who served in the Christian ministry. Others are Rev. Rudi Lenser, Rev. William Kay (related to Adeline's husband), Rev. Michael Heckathorn and Deaconess Brenda Gold Olson,

HOUSES OF WORSHIP SERIES

After 50 years on the bench, Adeline retired as organist and choir director at age 80. Her grandfather helped with the original church on Seneca Street. It was a busy place in 1898 with Pennzoil and Quaker State refineries developing. A group of German Lutherans met in a former armory building until the new church opened in April of 1903 and all services and confirmation classes were conducted in German until around 1915 according to the published church history. By 1936 however, only English prevailed. A committee was established in 1959 to relocate as growth was so rapid, expansion was necessary. Property was purchased on Hasson Heights above the city and the cornerstone was laid on Reformation Day in 1965. Architect Moll built the church in the shape of an ark with a free-standing altar. The statue of Christ in the original building was brought to the new church despite damage to his fingers. Coincidentally, his lost fingers were restored by a local art teacher.

Christ Church added a pre-school in 1995 which is currently closed.

About 70 percent of the current members are third and fourth generation relatives of early church parishioners. Adeline noted that the church was "our main thing. Our lives were wrapped around the church." She laughed, "At one time I was practically related to everyone." She and her late husband Chuck went to confirmation together, belonged to Walther League and sang in the choir. (He also belonged to a barbershop quartet.)

"The one big plus is how much we care about each other," concluded Adeline. While Adeline lives in Rocky Grove, ten miles from the church, one of the families picks her up each Sunday so she can worship in person. "They are my church family and I love them all," said the great-great grandmother of 4, great grandma of 35 and grandmother of 12, who still plays 500 in the church card club.

Current organist Cathy Kluck played the pipe organ for 53 years, she related, having started by playing a postlude when she was 14. In addition, the retired Speech-Language pathologist has been a Sunday school teacher and the church gardener. Cathy was delighted to mention that, "My grandchildren, children, parents, grandparents, and great grandparents have attended Christ Lutheran." Adeline said, "She's the best organist in this area!"



Built by contract in 1910, the organ was electrified in 1966 and remains a prized possession along with the large stain glass window according to recording secretary, Karen Holquist. A legacy member, she grew up in the church and is part of the family of original founders. In addition to the strength of family focus, Karen believes Christ Lutheran Church's strength is the "preaching based on Scripture and what we stand for. I feel the greatest blessing is to be a part of a church that is active."

Members are looking forward to Sunday

School reopening as well as "Cookie Sunday." The first Sunday of each month, members enjoy cookies and fellowship after worship. Sometimes Pastor even makes ice cream. "It's a time to build relationship and strengthen the already existing bonds," he said.

A favorite memory shared by all is the Fish for Fun event. Members built a pond. "People from the community planned their vacations around it. One year, Pastor McCants from Pittsburgh also attended the event and marveled at the wonderful memories this event would leave in the minds of the children," Pastor Oester reminisced.

Oldest member, Betty Hoover is homebound but to keep her involved, this family-oriented congregation takes the weekly bulletins to her so she can fold them before the pandemic. Betty served for many years taking care of office duties, preparing worship bulletins, and ordering the special flowers for Christmas and Easter. She had also been a Sunday School teacher and a member of the Ladies Aid group. As a long-time resident of Hasson Heights, Betty recalls when the current church property was part of a large farm.

"Our mission is to proclaim Christ to the community around us through word and deed and to advance the mission of proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ to the world," said president Tom Flinspach. To that mission, Tom has been instrumental in updating the church's sound system and website in an effort to expand online outreach.

"Our members are very supportive of church events, outreach, and financially." Tom noted.

"We have established quarterly mission outreaches that we support through member giving that vary from year to year. The Church sets aside 10% of our budgeted receipts for mission work, in which 4% goes in support of our district and 2% goes in support of various needs in our surrounding committee. The remaining 4% is used as matching funds in support of our quarterly mission outreaches," he explained.

As a result of tithing our budgeted receipts, we have been able to meet and exceed our expenses. It is truly amazing what trusting in the Lord will do, as it says in Malachi 3: 10. It is truly amazing in that even through the trials of dealing with Covid 19 we were able to exceed our budget needs, and this was a blessing from God," he said.

Already, plans are formulating for the 125th anniversary in 2023 continuing to further the theme "Present Christ to All People," according to Karen.

As you can see from the pictures, our students are hard at work and play. As we approach the month of March we are getting closer and closer to the end of the year. In many ways, this year has flown by, and in many other ways it has been a long year, but all in all a fantastic year!

We have been so fortunate to have had in-person instruction since September... since July if you count our summer camps. But now its time for parents to decide whether or not to send their 5 year old child to Kindergarten. Each February we assess the children who are being considered for Kindergarten so we can give parents an accurate picture of their progress and readiness.

We use an assessment from "Get Set for School" which is part of the Handwriting Without Tears program we use in all of our classes . It teaches developmentally appropriate pre-writing and prereading techniques for ages 3-5. The assessment is divided into two sections: Language and Literacy and Numbers and Math. The Language and Literacy sections include recognizing both upper and lower case letters, describing and comparing objects, rhyming, and language progression development. The Numbers and Math section includes naming shapes, rote counting, identifying numbers, object counting, positions (top, middle, bottom), ordinal numbers, size, patterning, and measuring. Once the assessments are completed and scored, the results

are then reviewed privately with parents to help them make the best decision for their child...to send to Kindergarten or stay another year at Zion for one of our transition classes.

As we continue to make preparations for the next school year, and as we evolve as a school to meet the needs of all children, please keep us in your prayers.


CLM Golf Classic



Thursday, November 4, 2021 - US Departure for our connecting trans-Atlantic flight to Israel.

Friday, November 5 - Tel Aviv / Tiberias: On arrival in Tel Aviv in the afternoon, we'll be greeted by our professional tour manager and begin our journey through Galilee to Tiberias, our home for three nights. The hotel is located directly on the Sea of Galilee. (D)

Saturday, November 6 - Tiberias and the Sea of Galilee: This morning we cruise on the Sea of Galilee to Capernaum, Jesus' home for two years. We then visit the Mount of Beatitudes where we will have devotions, Tabgha, the Church of the Primacy, Chorazin (a curse on Chorazin), and Bethsaida. Following our special lunch on the Sea of Galilee, we'll continue south through the Jordan Valley to Bet Shean where the Biblical history covers the Canaanites, the Philistines, and the Romans. Later this afternoon, we'll renew our Baptismal commitments along the Jordan River. Overnight Tiberias. (BB, L, D)

Sunday, November 7 - Tiberias - excursion to Mount Tabor, Cana, and Nazareth: Our journey today takes us by the Horns of Hattin where Saladin defeated the Crusaders en route to Mt. Tabor, the site of the Transfiguration. Later, we continue to Cana where Jesus performed his first miracle and we'll have the opportunity to renew our wedding vows before continuing on to Nazareth, the boyhood home of Jesus, where we visit the Church of the Annunciation. Overnight in Tiberias. (BB, L, D)

Monday, November 8 - Caesarea-By-The-Sea / Mount Carmel / Megiddo / Jerusalem: Today, be prepared to travel back at least 2,000 years, where every mile will tell at least one Bible story as we motor along the coastal plain to Caesarea-By-The-Sea. This ancient city was built by Herod the Great in honor of Augustus Caesar and was the capital of the Romans in the Holy Land for nearly 500 years. Caesarea serves as the backdrop for the Book of Acts, including the many visits by the Apostle Paul, his two-year imprisonment, and the commencement of his journey to Rome. En route to Jerusalem, we will also visit Solomon's Chariot city at Megiddo - the site of epic battles that decided the fate of western Asia that dates back to the 15th century BC. Overnight in Jerusalem. (BB, L, D)

Tuesday, November 9 - Bethlehem / Herodium / Jerusalem: Today we highlight the events surrounding the birth of Jesus by first visiting Bethlehem. Here we'll visit the Basilica and Grotto of the Nativity, the Church of St. Catherine, the Cave of St. Jerome (Latin translator of the Bible) and to the Field of the Shepherds. Our afternoon tour will take us to the Herodium, the fortress-palace, built by Herod the Great in 40 BC. Overnight in Jerusalem. (BB, L, D)

Wednesday, November 10 - Jerusalem: Our morning walking our of the Old City begins at the Dung Gate. From here we'll visit the Western Wall, the Dome of the Rock, St. Stephen's Gate, and St. Anne's Crusader Church with the Pool of Bethesda where Christ healed the crippled man). We then begin the Via Dolorosa - the Way of the Cross. There are fourteen stations along Christendom's most sacred route - each one marks an event that ook place during the last walk before the Crucifixion. Nine of hese stations are actually along the Via Dolorosa, including the Chapel of Flagellation, Arch of Ecce Homo (Behold the Man), ilate's Judgment Hall, the Lithostrotos, and the remaining five re inside the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. Later, we plan to visit the Garden Tomb en route to our hotel. This evening we'll enjoy a special wine tasting and dinner overlooking the beautiful Old City of Jerusalem. (BB, D)

Thursday, November 11 - Jerusalem / Bethany / Dead Sea / Oumran / Masada: Today we visit the small village of Bethany (home of Mary, Martha, and Lazarus) and the church near the grotto in which the Tomb of Lazarus is located. Later, we'll continue south via the Judean Desert to the Dead Sea, the lowest spot on earth (1,300 feet below sea level). Among our stops will be Qumran, site of the Essene Community where the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered, and Ein Gedi where a precipitous cliff filled with caves rises some 2,000 feet. It was here that David and his men took refuge from King Saul and here also that David spared Saul's life. Arrive Masada in the late morning. Our tour will include a visit to the remarkable ruins of the Fortress built by Herod the Great where Jewish zealots made their last stand in revolt against the Roman legions from 70 to 73 A.D. During our return to Jerusalem, there will be time to float in the Dead Sea. Overnight in Jerusalem. (BB, L.D)

Friday, November 12 - Jerusalem: Our morning begins on the Mount of Olives where we'll visit the Church of the Pater Noster, the Church of Dominus Flevit where Jesus wept over Jerusalem according to Luke, and the Garden of Gethsemane and the Church of All Nations. Later, we cross the Kidron Valley passing the Tombs of Absalom, Zechariah, and St. James. On Mount Zion we'll visit the Church of St. Peter's in Gallicantu (Caiaphas' House), and the 'Upper Room. Our afternoon tour will include the Shrine of the Book and the impressive scale model of the ancient city of Jerusalem as it looked during the Second Temple period - 516 BC to 70 AD. Dinner and overnight in Jerusalem. (BB, D)

Saturday, November 13 - Jerusalem (Western Wall Tunnels): Today we will enter the Old City to visit the Western Wall and its tunnels ... one of the most popular tourist sites in Jerusalem. These underground tunnels connect the Western Wall prayer area to the northwest side of the temple mount. Along its path are remains from the second temple period, as well as structures from later periods. The experience of walking along the tunnels is like taking a time machine back to the time of the second temple. Later, we'll visit the Cardo, a Byzantine road, roughly the equivalent of an eightlane highway that ran through the heart of the city, and we'll enjoy some free time in the Old City. This evening we'll enjoy a special farewell dinner in Bethlehem before returning to our hotel for our overnight. (BB, SD)

Sunday, November 14 - Tel Aviv / US: We bid farewell to our tour manager and begin our journey home.
