

#### "The Hope of the Resurrection"

"My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me. And I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of My hand." John 10:27-28

Christ is risen! This is an historic fact and the cornerstone of our Christian hope. But it is more than simply a theological axiom. The resurrection of Jesus has real, daily life implications for us. Jesus did not pass from our physical world into some metaphysical realm of ideas. He is risen bodily from the dead and has ascended to the right hand of the Father. He speaks to us daily from His eternal throne, yet not in a far-away voice, but with an ever-present one that we hear and recognize. Whenever His Word is proclaimed, He is in our midst. We hear His voice here, now, in our day-to-day lives. He knows us. He calls to us. We follow Him.

The eternal life that his voice gives is not some far-off, "after we die," promise. It is a real and present gift that we enjoy even now. It is the forgiven life that is lived in the presence of our God. Though this world of sin, and sometimes even our own flesh, would cloud our vision to His presence, the voice of Jesus pierces through the fog, reminding us that He is near and that our redemption is nigh. Even in our darkest days or at the hour of our physical death, His voice is our beacon of hope and the shining light of our eternal life.



#### **God Provides**

All Saints campus ministry believes that God provides all of our needs. Even so, we wondered why God seemed to take so long in answering a very important prayer. We were a bit worried that He might not hear, and that He might not say "Yes."

All Saints Fellowship (ASF) is our student organization which is officially recognized by Slippery Rock University. We have a constitution, a faculty advisor, Doctor Sam Thangiah, and a student president. Having a student president is critically important to our work on campus.

The president of ASF is the link between All Saints campus ministry and SRU. Without a president we cannot attend the several freshmen orientations that are held on campus for incoming students and their families. These orientations give us the opportunity to show incoming freshmen who we are and what we do. Saying hello to incoming freshmen is a marvelous opportunity for All Saints to extend friendship and warm regard for the students. Without a president we cannot officially attend any campus orientations and cannot even post notice of our campus ministry events, such as monthly Korean meals.

In the past ASF had presidents from the Dance Department, Parks and Recreation Department, and most recently from our weekly Bible class. All were Godsends, but this coming year it seemed no one was available to serve as the president. This was a terrible predicament. All Saints needs to meet students and the principal way was to have permission to be on campus.

Orientations, for example, are exceptionally helpful for All Saints' outreach. Several orientations are held to introduce incoming students to the University experience. All Saints is very appreciative that at these orientations we get to tell students about our worship services, Bible classes, and free student meals. We ask the students who stop to talk to us at the orientations where they are from, what their majors are, and if they like to eat. This question makes them laugh. Then we ask them to give us their phone numbers so that we can call them when they arrive on campus to invite them to our delicious meals. This is a major way we have to connect. When we call in September they are ready to say yes.

Since orientations are so important to the future of our ministry, we wondered how we would meet students if we did not have a president. As you might have already guessed, God provided. He brought to our mind that we had a wonderful student available. He is Leif Lotvedt, a member of All Saints and a psychology-counseling major at SRU. We had not thought of him because he has a full schedule and a wife and daughter. When asked if he would consider being the president, he said he would if our current president would show him the ropes to see if he thought he could fulfill the job. After they met where Leif learned what he would be doing, he said that he would take the job. We are so grateful to have a president to enable us to share our faith on campus. We should have asked Leif sooner. He is a student who wants to help others. His goal is to be a counselor. Being ASF president will allow him to help. We are indebted to ASF outgoing president, Chris, because he made the time to show Leif the ropes.

Another need All Saints is praying for is a person to replace Jo Dublin who retires this month. Jo has made a significant difference in our lives by preparing our student meals since 2010. It will be impossible to replace her because she's been more than a cook. She's been a Christian friend to the students, especially the Asians. She herself is a Christian Korean married to an American. We trust God to provide another way to serve meals to draw college students to All Saints this fall. We send Jo to her new life with hearts filled with gratitude.



Houses of Worship By Shirley Freyer

Peace Lutheran Church is one of the more recent congregations in western Pennsylvania, having been chartered exactly 14 years ago on May 15, 2008, through a merger of two congregations: Our Savior in Mt. Lebanon, and Hope in the building where this new congregation is located. But its history is replete with congregations joining together for "the sake of the Gospel," according to Bishop Jamison Hardy, president of the English District LCMS and first pactor of Polymers.

dent of the English District, LCMS and first pastor of Peace.



It all began with the founding of Grace Lutheran Church in Dormont in 1908 when six charter members worshipped in their homes until a new church on Pioneer Avenue was dedicated on April 14, 1912. The nearby community of Rolling Hills was growing, and Grace members – looking ahead – purchased a house in the area to accommodate a Sunday School and regular services. Rev. R A. Plautz was assigned to shepherd the group, and in 1947 formed Pilgrim Lutheran Church. By 1953, they dedicated a new building at the end of Country Club Drive in Mt. Lebanon.

Current Peace member Barbara Martin-Taylor, baptized, confirmed, and married at this location, reveals memories her late father, Gene, shared with her. "My father was a young teenager when he and his younger sisters were attending Sunday School and church services in the basement of Pastor Plautz."

Now two churches were located in proximity, and members of Grace again recognized the changing environment and considered a relocation program. At the same time, Pilgrim was experiencing a pastoral vacancy and studied an opportunity to join Grace. A history, authored by current Peace member John Moessner, stated that "after many hours of hard work, discussion and prayer, both congregations voted to merge and on February 15, 1959, these two sister congregations founded Our Savior Lutheran Church at the former Pilgrim site," served by Rev. Paul M. Kavash until 1964.

John's parents joined Hope in the '60s. As a leader during the Hope/Our Savior merger, he explained that PEACE stands for People Excited About Christ Eternally and suggested that is still a good reason to join this congregation.

Meanwhile, families living in Peters Township campaigned for the formation of a Lutheran congregation closer to home and began meeting at the new firehall at Donaldson's Crossroads. Firemen furnished folding chairs, and the children sat on the running boards and in the driver's seat of the engines until they obtained the Pleasant Valley School in 1954 and formed Pleasant Valley Church. That property, plus the sale of the former Grace Church, enabled the purchase of a farm on Old Washington Road and Carol Drive. Rev. Ottis Sauls was called to serve as Missionary-at-Large, a new constitution was written, and the congregation was called Hope Lutheran Church – the building officially dedicated in May 1963.

By 2006, having been served by five full-time pastors, Hope members found themselves in a vacancy situation. Rev. Jamison Hardy, pastor at Our Savior beginning in 2000, was asked to help with pulpit coverage. Bishop Hardy remembered that while neither church was desperate, attendance was dwindling and discussion among the church leaders – Rande Casaday, Mark Martin and John Moessner from Hope; and Roy Augenstein, Ralph Hauser, and Art Mikoleit from Our Savior – led to a monthly meeting for a full year with a straw poll taken after each meeting. It was decided to call a vicar to assist Pastor Hardy in maintaining separate worship sites and Bible Studies while holding monthly fellowship events together. Several committees were created to investigate all aspects of a merger, and by October 2007, the vote was cast "for the sake of the Gospel," driven by the mission theme, "Excited about Christ."

A final – and perhaps the most challenging – detail remained to come together: one location. Barb spoke to that trial. "During a merger like that, there is a lot of reminding oneself that the church is not the building. I loved the Our Savior building. I knew every inch. I knew the secret steps. I had been in there at midnight finishing up meeting minutes when the only light was the streetlights outside and the everlasting light. I fully expected a deep, loud voice to say, 'Barbara! We have to talk!'"

Bishop Hardy noted that as Lutherans, we have independent autonomy, a culture that doesn't foster collaboration. "I used my pastoral capital in chips and was given the ability to sell what both churches were founded on," he said.

The original leadership team was joined by Ron Grimm, Paul Stanis and Jim Wolf, members of Our Savior, to prepare the specifics of the new church, including the sale of the Our Savior property.

The Bishop believes the youth of the congregations solidified its success. "In January of 2008, Jim Wolf and I took 12 kids to help build a house for a Lakota Sioux family in conjunction with Habitat for Humanity." They also toured Indian land and got to see a herd of buffalo grazing, did a sweat lodge, and went to Mt. Rushmore. When they returned the youth professed, "This is our church."

Jim and his wife Mary are St. Louis natives, having met at the University of Missouri. Recruited to Mellon Bank in 1982, Jim is the great-great-grandson of C.F.W. Walther, who was the first president of the LCMS and its most influential theologian. Jim follows that tradition as he currently serves on the LCMS Board for International Mission, its Executive Committee, and its International Schools Task Force. He has led or participated in 15-20 mission and/or humanitarian trips to Kenya, South Africa, and Vietnam – many with Pastor Hardy – and raised money for the 1001 Orphans Project in Kenya while climbing Mt. Kilimanjaro in Tanzania at age 65, through his work as a board member for Concordia Lutheran Ministries.

Fast forward to 2022. Barb said, "At first, there is a feeling of Us and Them but the longer we go on, the more I have to really think about whether a person was from Our Savior, Hope, or came to Peace without even knowing there was a merger."

President Jeff Reinstadtler has been a member of Hope/Peace for 38 years. He and his wife Sarah joined as a family. The high school sweethearts live in Peters Twp., five minutes from the church, and are pleased that the church is getting back to some normalcy after COVID. As co-chair of the call committee, he had a vested interest in bringing current Pastor Justin Schmidt here. "Pastor and I are always on the same page," he said.

Pastor Schmidt came home to his native South Hills four years ago. A graduate of Upper St. Clair High School, he was a member of Zion in Bridgeville. He began his first year of college at Virginia Tech studying engineering. The following year, he transferred to Concordia College in Ann Arbor, Michigan, where he graduated with a degree in Biblical Studies. While attending college in Ann Arbor, Justin met his wife Marion, who was studying elementary education. Following graduation, Justin continued his studies at Concordia Seminary St. Louis. During his first call to a dual parish at St. Peter's and Grace in Lakota, North Dakota, Pastor Schmidt joined the North Dakota National Guard as a chaplain. He and his wife have two sons, Wolfram and Augustine, and a daughter, Lilia.

He lives by this overarching question to himself, "Would you want this man to be your grandmother's pastor?" He longs for the church to be a kind, welcoming family place and calls himself a slave to Christ and the church.

"What's best for Christ's church is where my heart is," Pastor declared. "This is a family and whatever your family needs, we support.

"It's not about me," he said. "I serve the church. She doesn't serve me." He is pleased with the capital campaign begun January 1 as it has already reached one goal of replenishing the cost of the church's new roof. The rest will be donated to churches in need and community outreach. "We need to stay hungry and bring Christ into the community."

He counted his last Voter's meeting as a success as it was boring and quick. "If you are internally peaceful, that lack of conflict frees you to look outward." He has taken that seriously as he has his mind set on starting a mission in Uniontown. "The Holy Spirit put it in my heart to do," he said. "As an athlete, I learned that I am OK with failing but not OK with not trying." Already he has joined the Rotary in Uniontown and created a Pastor at the Pub event.

Pastor maintains his Tuesday and Thursday virtual devotions, the Wednesday morning Bible study at Concordia of the South Hills, and a men's Bible study breakfast the last Saturday of each month. While he is complimentary of the robust video set-up and is the first to extend his appreciation to Rick Crain and Ron Grimm, he insists that it exists for the sick and the shut-ins only. Fellowship and Holy Communion are necessary for true worship.



"Once we found Peace, we started looking for housing," said Rick Crain, who moved from Colorado Springs for a new job as a software developer about 11 years ago. "Peace is a loving, caring congregation. There is a great sense of family. When new to the area, we visited multiple LCMS congregations. After visiting Peace, we knew that God had led us to Peace and that it would be our new church home." Rick and his wife settled in Bethel Park with their six children, whose ages now range from 18 to 8. "Everyone was super friendly, down-to-earth, and welcoming. We had five young children at the time with two who were in baby carriers, and we didn't feel awkward or in the spotlight. The people were interested in knowing us and our kids."

He is blessed to be able to use his gifts at Peace. The first livestreaming event was when Pastor Hardy became the bishop. "When we solely offered virtual worship services during the beginning of COVID, the Pastors, elders, and organists led worship service and it was one way that we as a church family could stay connected by worshipping together even when apart."

Lifelong member of Our Savior Ron Grimm agreed, "We have learned some things about ourselves during this time and I believe we are now better able to share our faith virtually and keep in contact with folks around the United States," he said. "The challenge is to retain the fellowship, in-person worship and joy of being together in His house praising Him in all we do and strengthen that church family vibe in quantity and quality as we move forward," he continued.

The magnetism of Peace is shared by charter members as well.

"The people of Peace are my family. It is not too small and not too big. I know who everyone is even if I don't know them well. I like the Biblical stance of the LC-MS," said Barb.

"When we were merging, we had a Secret Angel program at Christmastime when the Sunday School students were given a questionnaire as to their preferences and then given little presents from volunteers in the congregation for each Sunday in Advent." This helped people from each congregation to get to know each other.

"I would hope that they feel the same 'hominess' that I feel. Like, when I see people on the news that have lost everything, such as in a fire, and they say they don't even know what they are going to do. I know what I would do. I would go to my congregation, and I KNOW they would help me," she continued. Ron imparted the same attitude about the attributes of this merged congregation. "We are a friendly, caring, diverse group that loves to grow in faith by being in His word regularly.

"The two years of joint fellowship during Hope's vacancy showed that our congregations could put aside their desire to be separate and trust that the good Lord had a plan to bring us together in faith. We were able to work as a team where many committees were entrusted with important decisions and open to prayerfully consider what was best for the new congregation," Ron said.

The experience has impacted him personally. "Working for the English District as a Gift Planning Counselor, I have the ability to share this experience with several churches that have similar opportunities and reinforce that this experience can be a rewarding and God-pleasing endeavor," he revealed.

Of the many components that were shared through the merger, among the loveliest are the stained-glass windows, originally installed and dedicated at Our Savior on Easter Sunday in 1968, and then rededicated at Peace on Palm Sunday 2014. There are six windows, beginning with the first one depicting The Nativity, The Annunciation, the Old Testament Prophesy, and the Baptism of the Lamb of God through Jesus' life, to Window #6 illustrating The Resurrection, The Crucifixion, The Ascension, and The Sending of the Holy Spirit.

Ron, referred to as "The Rock of the Church" by Jim Wolf, remarked that especially the Resurrection window portrays Christ's love for us and "No matter the church building location, God's people gather, pray, praise and give thanks for all He has done for us."

In the same way, the Christus Rex, the wooden cross picturing Christ the King placed at the altar, reminds all who enter the sanctuary that with God as the focus, all things are possible.


