"The Praying Church - The Serving Church"

"They [the Church] continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers ... now all who believed were together, and had all things in common, and sold their possessions and goods, and divided them among all, as anyone had need." - Acts 2:42,44,45

It is of our sinful nature to want to be told what to do. Whether seeking a program to increase giving, a method to "grow" the church, or just a system of self-improvement, to some degree we all are children of those who asked, "Lord, what must I do to inherit the kingdom?" The sinful flesh does not want to die. Rather, it wants to be reformed, to be "better." But Jesus took our sin to the cross. It died with Him. St. Paul confesses that "it is no longer I who lives, but Christ who lives in me." The Christian is not simply a better-educated sinner. The Christian has died with Christ and is raised with Him to walk in newness of life.

So it is not the way of the Church to seek yet another program, another method to improve itself. The Church as the Body of Christ turns to the Lord for Her life and journey in the faith. The Church finds Jesus where He has promised to be - His Word (the apostles' teaching) and Sacraments (the breaking of bread). Gathered in communion with Jesus the household of faith naturally engages Him in holy conversation (the prayers). Following the voice of our Good Shepherd, we walk with Him to the places where He leads us.

Jesus leads us to places yet unknown to engage with people, both the faithful and unbelievers, in mercy and love. The praying Church is the serving Church. The Church turns first to Her Lord in Presence and prayer. This forms Her life and journey in the faith. The Christian is exhorted first to the prayers, then to good works. The wonderful gift that is found in this rhythm is the focus to act upon what is said in the Word of God and prayer rather than simply reacting to circumstances. The prayers of the Church give perspective to our concerns and desires and help us to see the needs of others in the context of God's will for the salvation of the world.

It is a noble thing to want to help one's neighbor (as anyone has need). It is a blessed thing to receive the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation from Jesus in order to be equipped to do so. Go to where the Lord is found in the Divine Service and He will lead you to your neighbors in need.



Members of All Saints Lutheran Church and Student Center have made an evening of the event and are now watching the Call Night service on a big-screen in our undercroft. We don't know whether or not we have been granted a vicar, so



we are watching intently the service taking place in the seminary church. We know that thirty-seven vicars will be chosen. So, after thirty seminarians had been chosen as vicars to various congregations around the country, it did not look good for All Saints. As it turned out, the vicars were given their assignments in alphabetical order and the vicar chosen for All Saints had a last name beginning with "W."

But then it happened! Right there on the screen as large as life were the words "All Saints Lutheran Church-Slippery Rock, PA." We were all thrilled to see our little town mentioned on a national broadcast. But more than that, it meant we were going to receive a vicar! Then the vicar's name was announced: Zachary T. Wessel, from northern Minnesota, would be our vicar.

Church members felt like shouting for joy. Everyone was thrilled to have a vicar at All Saints. He will learn from campus pastor Rev. Jacob Deal. And he will meet the members of All Saints: we can hardly wait. Is he coming to Slippery Rock tomorrow? Surely at the very latest next week! No, it will not be until June 11! Weeks away! The ladies are already planning a luncheon to let him know how glad we are to have him with us.

All Saints has a lot to offer our new vicar. We will give him our support and encouragement so that he will finish his vicarage feeling he will want to do this for the rest of his life. We will also joyfully introduce him to the ministry of working with our college students who attend Slippery Rock University and Grove City College.

Vicar Wessel will arrive in time to attend new-student orientations on Slippery Rock University campus this summer. Orientations are an especially satisfying time because All Saints Fellowship, our student organization, is allowed to have a table advertising All Saints' activities so that we can attempt to attract students to come to All Saints and participate.

Most importantly, incoming freshmen often are stressed out by what they are facing in the fall. Absolutely everything will be new: a stranger will become my roommate! What will he-she be like? HOUSES OF WORSHIP SERIES

Even though St. John's marks August 10, 1864, as Founder's Day, a definite Lutheran presence in what is now Garrett County, Md., has been found as far back as 1842, according to research done for the church's 150th anniversary. A log meeting house is believed to have been built in the Cove around 1848, and a second church developed in Accident in 1851. Both locations were known as the Evangelical Lutheran Church served by one pastor.



Three years later, though, language became an issue, as did the proper teaching of the Catechism, explained Rev. James Oester, retired pastor of St. John's and its sister congregation, Zion, in Accident (to be featured in the August issue), along with the great-great-grandson of charter member Adam Oester. And the English-speaking group retained the original building while the Germans built a new church down the road and became known as the Lower church, and the present-day St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church.

"Consequently, there are two LCMS congregations and two ELCA congregations within four miles," said Pastor Oester. "We need to remember that in the 1860s everyone walked to church."

The first section of St. John's was the 30x40 foot sanctuary with an altar in the center of the west wall. A school room was added on the east side and the bell tower was installed in 1891 (rebuilt in 1979), and after several renovations, in 1948 it was moved from its original site south to its current location with the addition of a basement.

Ruby Margroff, who calls herself a "trustee forever," remembers cleaning and painting the parsonage and taking the church apart and remodeling it in 2005. "The only place I haven't been is the bell tower," she bantered. She and her husband James have lived next door to the church since 1971. He and his brother Denny were born and raised in this small country church, where everyone who lived here were members, recounted Ruby.

"Jim, the current treasurer, has held every office," explained Ruby, who served as president of the Ladies Aid in the 1990s when membership was up to 30. One of her favorite times was hosting the LWML Fall Retreat. "I roasted five turkeys and made tetrazzini for 180 women," the 80-year-old shared. "I have fed every pastor since 1972 (the year she became a member) and we still prepare funeral dinners."

Helping her to continue this tradition is her best friend, Kathy, who happens to be her sister-in-law. Married in 1961, Kathy belonged to the Lutheran church in nearby Grantsville. "When my son was born, my husband (Denny) wanted him to be baptized here (where generations of his family were confirmed, married and buried)." It was then that she made the decision to join St. John's, where she currently serves as secretary.

"It was a very active church at one time with more than 100 members," she recalled. "My four children were confirmed here. We had family night at the church, a Disney movie for the kids, white elephants to bid on, and game night for adults."

Like her husband, so many have joined the Church Triumphant. As Ruby quipped, "Our best members are in the cemetery."

On the other hand, St. John's current president is most likely the youngest chairman in the area congregations. At 36, Joshua Smith, who was confirmed at St. John's, returned to Garrett County around 1995. His mother was the church organist until her passing in 2020, and his uncle and godfather, Pastor Oester, served from February 2013 until his retirement in October 2020.

Josh lived in Washington, D.C., prior to the pandemic and worked as a CPA. "The pandemic was a blessing for me since now I work from home, needing only to be in D.C. four times a year."

He is candid about the status of the congregation. "It is aging, attendance is dropping, people are passing and not a lot of new people are coming in." He has two ideas in mind - try to create an outreach, look at the core group, and become more of a family.

"This is a close group of people who have known each other for a long time," he said.

While many are related, what he and Rev. Benjamin Hertel, the pastor of three years, intend, however, is an opportunity to spend a couple of hours rather than a couple of minutes after worship service to fellowship. A soup supper before Lenten worship service was the first step.

Within this last year, a novel approach to Sunday School has been introduced. A member volunteered to teach and has up to six students from Pre-K, 1st and 2nd grade plus a 6th grader she has assigned as a teacher's assistant. She individually texts parents during the week as a reminder and commitment so that she can prepare print materials. She began with the free online Lessons for Lambs curriculum by Heidi Sias, a children's bulletin that follows the one-year historic lectionary. Presently, she is using the One Room Classroom Enduring Faith curriculum from Concordia Publishing House. It is inexpensive and access is non-stop. Encouraging the participation of children is a compelling avenue for outreach to the community.

"One of the struggles in our community," Josh explained, "is the lack of the visual element." The Deep Creek Lake community is located in a county of less than 30,000 with a transient population. Not only are there two LCMS churches within four miles but the non-denominational CrossRoads and the Mennonite/Amish churches are also challenging.



"Part of what we grapple with," Pastor noted, "is what we want and where we want to go. This is a typical country church where people used to do a lot of things, but not anymore. The introduction of the soup and sandwich before Lenten worship we want to expand and continue as it is an opportunity to bring in our neighbors to Eat, Pray and Love," he described. His thinking is, "If you want more people to come, give them more church." He continued his weekly Bible study throughout Lent and Holy Week and looks forward to Advent for a repeat performance of the light supper practice.

He and his wife Brittany and their five children live in the St. John's parsonage, a four-square farmhouse that was totally renovated by the church family. Genevie, named after her great-grandmother, is just 5 months old. Two boys, Benjamin, Jr., and Jacob, and two girls, Dorothy, and Katherine – also named after family members – range in age from 5 to 11 years. Pastor's wife is from Maryland, so this second call brings them closer to family.

But he doesn't look at the past three years in accomplishments. "The church needs a pastor, and the Holy Spirit, through many means, piloted me to the place we should go, and this is where I am, and this is where I should be. This is God's call, and any accomplishment would be through Word and Sacrament."

Having been raised in Wisconsin, serving a vicarage in the inner city of Baltimore, and having his first call in Indiana, he recognizes that every new pastor faces a new culture and new people. "A big part of being able to be effective is gaining trust," he said. "I am still that new guy." People are here and they want to be here. Both churches are welcoming and receptive, he continued. It took a lot of the work to get St. John's where they are, and a lot of work should be what he is handing over to the next guy. "I almost feel bad for having it so easy," he confessed.

Pastor Hertel credits Pastor Oester with bringing St. John's and Zion together, as it was in 2018 during his seven-year tenure that a formal agreement created the dual pastorship.

"The future is the past," said Pastor Oester. For it was from 1864 until 1907 that one pastor served both locations.

Both pastors were educated and worked in the secular world before entering Ft. Wayne Seminary, and they share a good sense of humor. "Facing this world, you either gotta laugh or cry and I prefer the former," laughed Pastor Hertel. The greatest joy of his ministry here, noted Pastor Oester, was the celebration of its 150th anniversary.


"Our ministers preach the true Word of God and do it well," said Kathy. "I like our pastor a lot. I attend his Bible study and enjoy his explanations." Josh agrees. "Contemporary - that's not us; we have a firm foundation on the teachings and traditions of our forefathers."

So, what about the future?

Those who are faithful continue. "The same families have been here as long as I have been here," Kathy reminisced. "We think of our forefathers – people like Esther Opel, Pastor Oester's Sunday School teacher, who in her last days made Concordia Lutheran Ministries her home; and Bill Kolb, who served as chairman of the Board of Directors at Concordia for nearly a decade. Roy Harman, who described the first school room, and Rev. Art Bicker, who came from his ministry in Pittsburgh in the 1960s and died the evening of Easter Sunday after preaching a sermon at Trinity in Glen Savage - our ancestors who are buried here and land that we own that hasn't been developed. Even the beautiful pavilion with the stone fireplace," she cited.

Her sister-in-law Ruby credits her longstanding love of this church to advice Pastor Mueller provided in a sermon she has never forgotten. "If you are wallowing in your problems, tap your neighbor on the shoulder and ask what problem they might have, and you will forget what yours is!"

The future is easy for the church, Pastor Hertel pointed out. "We do what we have always done. We baptize, we commune and let God do what He is going to do, and we will be a part of it."
