# NEW ZEALAND – BLACK CAPS – 2018/19 & ICC CRICKET WORLD CUP 2019

The Club was honoured to have two members selected to represent New Zealand in the past 12 months.

**WILL SOMERVILLE**      Born in 1984, Will, an off spinner, made his 1<sup>st</sup> Class debut for Otago in 2004/05 for whom he represented till 2007/08. Then, whilst in Sydney, for NSW from 2014 to 2018. Will returned to NZ later last year, accepted a contract with ACA and joined Parnell. Selected for the Black Caps' series vs Pakistan in the UAE in December, he took, in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Test on debut, 7/127 (4/75 and 3/52). This enabled NZ to win the Test by 123 runs and so take out the series. Will's appearances for Parnell were limited but he did well for Auckland and was awarded Cricketer of the Year – the John Bentham Morris Memorial Trophy, the first Parnell player to be so honoured since Ross Morgan in 1978/79. Another Test for Will?

**LOCKIE FERGUSON**      Every boy's dream is to be the fastest bowler in the World and our Lockie has achieved that dream! New Zealand's and, perhaps, the World's fastest Bowler, Lockie grew up at Parnell, first as a Junior and, later, represented EDCA. For Auckland Grammar's 1<sup>st</sup> XI he shared the new ball with Jimmy Neesham. He played for Cornwall in his late teens and for a couple of season after leaving Grammar but returned in 2011 to spearhead our attack with Mike Ravlic. Lockie debuted for Auckland in 2012/13 and for New Zealand, in ODIs, in 2016/17. Now 28, Lockie's pace is fearsome – he has been clocked at 155kph and, prior to the ICC CWC19, was averaging 146 with the next fastest under 142. At the CWC, his 21 wickets were second only to Mitchell Starc's and he played one less game. Lockie's economy and strike rates of 4.88 and 12.66 were better than Starc's 5.43 and 20.51. His dismissal of du Plessis in the South African game was classic – a 149k bouncer followed by a 148k yorker, the batsman, completely beaten by pace, had his stumps shattered! Yes, the fast bowler's dream!

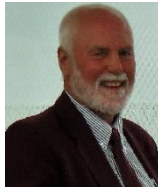

# CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



The 2018/19 financial year and cricket season was another successful one for PCC as it seeks to become (or otherwise remain) the leading cricket club across the Auckland region, as stated in the Club's 3-year Strategic Plan. I summarise the year as follows:

## 1. Overview

The 2018/19 season started with junior playing numbers down after the Club had achieved a 19% increase over the previous 3 seasons. However, one junior girls' team had transitioned to senior status, plus with the arrival of a further men's senior team this meant that overall, juniors and seniors, the status quo in playing numbers was maintained at almost 900.

The Club had two players chosen for the BLACKCAPS during the season - Lockie Ferguson and Will Somerville - while two others represented the Auckland Aces consistently over the summer - Ben Horne and Mark Chapman. Will Somerville was further honoured by being awarded Auckland Cricket's "Player of the Year".

Our Men's Premier team won the Jeff Crowe Cup (50 over cricket) in a thrilling final at Eden Park, the 3<sup>rd</sup> time PCC has won this trophy since 2009/10. The re-emergence of women's cricket within PCC continued successfully with the completion of our second season back in ACA's Premier and Premier Reserve competitions after a 7-year gap, our Reserves winning the ACA one-day title, another very pleasing result.

In addition to the above our Men's Premier team finished in the top 4 of the Hedley Howarth Trophy (2 day cricket), our Men's 2<sup>nd</sup> XI came 3<sup>rd</sup> equal and 4<sup>th</sup> from 8 teams in their respective competitions, our 3<sup>rd</sup> XI won its 2-day competition resulting in promotion to a higher grade for next season, and our 4<sup>th</sup> XI came midway on their competition points table.

Our Junior rep results were also very pleasing with representation at EDCA level up on prior seasons with 48 PCC rep players chosen in total making up 40% of EDCA's total numbers across all 7 grades (boys and girls).

Our financial results were a little disappointing with a small loss of \$5,562 being recorded, our first loss since 2012/13. Revenue was down by \$13,281 on the prior year due to reduced junior subscriptions, reduced trust grant funding and donations, while fewer junior members undertook our Winter Academy and Cricket Max tournament. ACA affiliation fees increased by \$3,670 and staff costs included the full year for our Director of Cricket while the prior year included only 10 months of his employment as he started with us early July 2017. In addition a new position was created in December with Alex Smith as paid barman which contributed to increased costs however operationally Alex was a very welcome addition. In terms of cash the Club has \$125,576 in its bank accounts (current and fixed term deposits) at balance date.

PCC's performance in meeting a wide range of targets as set by ACA in our Partnership Agreement with them was very good with 90% of targets met and one of the leading clubs across the Auckland region involving 16 clubs.

Volunteer relations were positive overall, this reflective of the efforts and experience of our Junior Committee, Junior Grade Co-ordinators, and Board.

Finally, the Club benefitted from the services of its Director of Cricket (Phil Horne) in his second full season with us, ably supported by Steve Hurdley as Club Administrator in his 10<sup>th</sup> consecutive year with us.

## ACA District Tournaments

In terms of Auckland Districts junior rep cricket EDCA came a very close second to North Harbour in competing for the Peter Badley Shield across all 7 grades, this contested across the 5 Districts that make up the Auckland region. EDCA was expertly led by PCC's James Dudson as Chairman while the quality of coaching and general administration remained at a very high level.

These impressive results are also reflective of the quality and quantity of the Club's professional coaching. PCC was able to secure the following trophies within the JTS Super Series: Grades 3A, 5A, 6A and 8A, all 4 handsome trophies now on display in our clubrooms.

- Jeremy Boucher for his strong commitment and efforts as Junior Chairman, now in having completed his 3rd year in this important role.
- All volunteers who give up their time to see the Club and their team(s) enjoy a happy and successful season.
- All Grade Coordinators (Year 1 to Year 9/10) and Members of the Junior Committee.
- James Dudson and Jon Tierney for their respective roles in representing PCC on the ECDA Committee, selecting EDCA teams, appointing coaches, arranging winter trainings, and ensuring EDCA performed well across the range of ACA District tournaments (boys and girls).

Apart from winning the Jeff Crowe Cup our Premier Men's team finished in 4<sup>th</sup> place from the top 8 teams in the ACA Hedley Howarth 2-day competition, while being knocked out of the T20 competition in the quarter finals. The team performed admirably once again and was a credit to the Club, always playing within the spirit of cricket under the inspirational captaincy of Brad Rodden and coaching of Ian West, both in their first year at PCC with their respective roles. Brad went on to win the Auckland Cricket Umpires and Scorers Association's vote for Premier Captain of the Year, a testament to his strong leadership while always promoting fair play.

This team also won the Grosvenor Cup for the third time in four years, this trophy also awarded by ACA's senior umpires for such team and club attributes as discipline, fair play, dress code, scoring, hosting and lunches. Winning this award was also a result of the efforts of John Fisher (Team Manager), Jocelyn Goodger (Scorer), Phil Horne and Bryan Haggitt.

As mentioned, our Men's 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> XI's all performed admirably with the 3<sup>rd</sup> XI promoted to a higher grade for next season, the following contributing significantly to the coaching, management and leadership of these teams:

The Club's President's Grade team continued to compete strongly in this very successful and popular competition, flying the Club's flag and good name with pride while producing a strong camaraderie over recent years. The team won the President's Grade Plate Competition.

I would like to thank Peter Hickman (Club Captain) for his untiring efforts in welcoming newcomers to the Club, keeping tabs on the availability of players, aiding in the team selections process each week and managing the Club communication network via Facebook across the season. In addition I would also like to thank the small group of the Men's Premier team supporters for their very loyal following of the team across the season: Phil Horne, Bryan Haggitt, Craig Speakman and Marc O'Gorman come to mind along with many of the respective parents and supporters of the players.

**3. Female Cricket:**

The Club competed for the second year running in ACA's Women's Premier and Premier Reserve competitions, a tribute to the determination and focus of PCC director Dominic Drumm ably supported by Jonathan McInroy and Shannon Carr (coaches), Stephanie Carr (captain/player coach), Gemma Lord (Premier XI manager). A highlight was seeing our Premier Reserve team win the Emily Drumm Trophy and be crowned as ACA one day competition champions.

PCC remains very committed towards the development and growth of girl's / women's cricket and we are well placed to take advantage of the new strategic direction of NZ Cricket in also focussing strongly on female participation and high performance in the sport. ## **5. PCC Board of Directors**

The 2018/19 year saw a continuation of the same Board that was in place during the prior year. In addition, Rod Smith has remained as PCC President over 2018/19, a role which he has held since 2014 while also being Club Chairman for 8 seasons prior to that. Our Director of Cricket, Phil Horne and Club Administrator, Steve Hurdley, have had active roles to play across on all 10 workstreams. Phil has attended all Board meetings.

I would like to thank PCC's hard-working Board, Rod, Kelly, Bryan, Phil and Steve for their dedicated efforts and commitment, and absolute passion for PCC and the game itself over the past 12 months. The level of knowledge and experience, as well as ability and willingness to roll their sleeves up and makes things happen, has been impressive.

From this year's AGM we have decided to increase the size of our Board from 6 to 7 members in order to achieve better representation from women's cricket while we have 2 vacancies to fill following the resignations of Simon Wood back in February 2019 and Dominic Drumm at this years' AGM. Our Board recommends that the following new Board members be appointed at this year's AGM:

## **6. Strategic Plan, 1<sup>st</sup> August 2016 to 31<sup>st</sup> July 2019**

In July 2016 our Board, Rod, Bryan and Steve agreed upon a 3-year Strategic Plan after conducting a SWOT analysis across each of the above 10 workstreams as well as seeking feedback from Club Members. As part of this 3-year plan we have set priorities for our resources (time and \$ funds), while this plan has been summarized as a one-page document that sits on display in our clubrooms during the season. We will be reviewing this plan and updating it for the next 3 years in August / September once our 3 new directors are on board.

## **7. Financial Results**

Our financial results were a little disappointing with a small loss of \$5,562 being recorded, our first loss since 2012/13, the main reasons covered above. In terms of cash the Club has over \$125,576 in its bank accounts (current and fixed term deposits) at balance date, this around \$6,000 down on prior year.

Capital expenditure included new bowlers run ups laid in the TJC last winter.

The Club was prudent in its spending throughout the financial year while capital expenditure was targeted at areas of need, some of this covered by The Peter Badley Trust. PCC invested 30% of its revenues directly into coaching and another 32% into administration, both resulting in a high level of service and value provided to our playing members, parents and volunteers while our subscriptions have remained competitive with neighbouring clubs.

Our collection of subscriptions, TJC hiring fees, bar takings and event revenues has been diligent.

## **8. Sponsorship**

PCC remains very grateful for the support from its key commercial partners in Ascot Radiology, Player Sports and Megan Jaffe Real Estate (Ray White Remuera). A big thanks to these local businesses for their valued and ongoing contributions which enable the club to provide its high level of coaching and support for its players. We could not provide the same cricket experience for our Members without this funding. Ascot Radiology, in particular, has been very loyal to PCC since 2011/12 and we have so much to thank this organisation for.

Other sponsors supporting PCC over 2018/19 were: Brittain Wynyard, Crowe Horwarth, Kumeu River Wines, OMF, Electrix Ltd and Unichem, Mt Eden Chiropractic, The Corner Bar, Sals Pizza, Tasty Pot.

#### 9. Schools

We have worked hard to strengthen our relationship with all schools in our catchment including the addition of signed Memorandum's of Understanding with each school outlining the respective commitments, scope of coaching services that PCC provides, use of respective facilities etc. Of particular note would be the close association which the Club has with St Kentigern Boys School through the efforts of Jonathan McInroy as one of PCC's professional coaches, and Mr Grayson Aspinall, Deputy Head of the school, along with St Peters College via link we have with Simon Wood. King's School, too, is closely associated with PCC. Phil Horne has worked hard on building relationships with each school along with providing effective coaching as part of ACA's Cricket Blitz Program.

#### 10. Coaching

Ian West became PCC's new Head Coach in May 2018 and proved to be a popular, hard-working and successful appointment for the Club. The remainder of our coaching staff included Roy Goodyear, Jonathan McInroy, Cam Rope, Ollie Pringle and three capable young English player / coaches in Jack Crace, Hugh Teesdale and Jack Marston. All 8 coaches listed proved to be effective and well-respected across our senior and junior players, parents, volunteers and supporters.

#### 11. Facilities

PCC is planning to upgrade its existing pavilion by adding a bar, women's and men's toilets, and an outside deck (at ground level), this project in conjunction with Grammar Juniors Rugby. Greg James is currently leading this project.

In terms of the development of the Shore Rd Reserve itself, PCC is now considering the option of significant land reclamation across the area essentially taken up by mangroves on the edge of Hobson Bay. We have been in discussion with the Orakei Local Board, Auckland Council, Ngati Whatua and several environmental and town planning consultants on this long-term project which would see a new full-sized cricket oval being added with our proposed new pavilion overlooking it and facing to the north.

#### 12. Final Thanks

Finally, I would like to thank Phil Horne for his outstanding contribution to the club in his second year as Director of Cricket overseeing the entire operations of the club. Phil has been ably supported by our Club Administrator, Steve Hurdley, over 9 months of the financial year - Steve now in his 10th year with the club. The 2018/19 season was a challenging one across junior cricket in particular with the Age and Stage project being driven by NZC / ACA resulting in changed playing formats, match rules and strategies in a quest to modernise the game for our younger players. Phil and Steve led the way with this implementation combining well together and communicating with our playing members, parents and volunteers effectively throughout.

I am confident that PCC is one of the best administered cricket clubs across the Auckland region if not nationally. Well done Phil and Steve.

We look forward to the season ahead!

The 2018/19 season was another ground-breaking one for Parnell Women's Cricket with the second year of participation in the Premier Women's and Reserves grades in recent history. The Premier Women's team continued to fight hard and secured early victories performing better in the longer form of the game.

The Premier Womens Reserves dominated most teams ending up 1<sup>st</sup> equal in the T20 Competition only separated by NRR and won the final of the 35 Over Competition by comprehensively beating Cornwall at Cornwall Park. ## OBITUARIES

DAVID JAMES GORDON

1944 – 2019

Whilst not a member of Parnell, the Club has a great deal to thank Dave Gordon for. As a Master, and Coach of Auckland Grammar School's 1<sup>st</sup> XI for many years, Dave developed a great number of very promising Parnell Juniors into very talented cricketers. Many came back to our Senior ranks to perform marvellously for us – Tim McIntosh, Brad and Doug Winger, Mark and Ryan Turner, David Goddard, Lockie Ferguson, Kirk Bunting to name just a few. Dave Gordon would come down to Shore Road to see them play. Jimmy Neesham didn't return to Parnell but his tweet sums it up:

*"Dave Gordon, my High School teacher, coach and friend. Your love of this game was infectious, especially for those of us lucky enough to play under you. How appropriate you held on until just after such a match. Hope you were proud. Thanks for everything. RIP"*

Yes, Jimmy said it all. Since reinforced by Tim McIntosh who told your Editor that Dave, particularly, ran tough fielding sessions for the youngsters at Grammar – tough, yes, but his fairness and encouragement gained him huge respect

Apparently Dave Gordon died, with his family present, whilst watching the ICC CWC's Super Over aware that two of his proteges, Lockie and Jimmy, were playing out of their skins for the Black Caps.

The Club extends it's condolences to the Gordon family

## R.B.L. (Richard) KERR



It is with sadness to report the sudden passing of Richard Kerr who played for the Club as a junior and went on to play for our Premiers during our Ōrākei Domain years.

Teammates Chris Turner and Peter Speakman both recalled Rich. Chris wrote:

*“I recall that he was a very enthusiastic trainer. He would be at all the practices and always back to the bar for a beer afterwards. If there were any hijinks or banter Richard would be in the thick of it. Latterly, I saw him most years at a cricket test somewhere or other in NZ. He would have a massive hat on, zinc-ed up to the max, with a bright shirt on and a wide grin.”*

Peter who was our Senior A (Reserves) captain recalled “First and foremost Rich was someone who enjoyed his cricket and tried his absolute hardest. No matter how trying the conditions (heat, slow pitch at Ōrākei, poor umpiring, poor fielding), Rich kept coming in ball after ball eager to take wickets, create pressure on the batsman and bowl as fast as he could. He was the same in the nets. In this sense he was a captain's dream. Captaincy material on the other hand, he was not. Rich was archetypal of a fast bowler - being vocal towards opposing batsmen whom he made play and miss and towards fielders who dropped catches off him were all part of his strong competitive spirit and evident each time he played. Those features were what made him the excellent cricketer he was.

Two performances stand out, one with the ball and one with the bat (he was a useful bat, around number 8 but it was as a bowler that he really excelled, and he was a very good opening downwind bowler).

The first was a bowling return of 6-40 down at Ōrākei on a flat track. I bowled him unchanged and he just kept charging in from the city end bowling fast. It was the best exhibition of fast bowling I witnessed by anyone I played with. Batsmen were hurried with their shots, hit and stunned. This set up a win for us against Birkenhead and made us title challengers.

The second was a quickfire innings of 33 not out against Eden Roskill at Keith Hay Park, playing for senior A. Chris Turner had smacked 70 odd in the first innings and an 80 odd in the second with his exquisite cover drives and long reach. Those innings put us in the game with a chance at an outright win, but we still needed quick runs. Yours truly got a few but couldn't up the run rate enough, a wicket fell and in walked Rich to join me with about 50 needed in 5 or 6 overs. Rich always had a good eye and lots of shots, coupled with very ordinary shot selection. This was one of those days that his shots came off. His innings won the game for us against fancied opposition, set up first by Chris T.

I also played golf with Rich a few times, he was on a 14 handicap then-pretty handy and with a Phil Mickelson attitude of going for gold whatever the odds.

Rich was a good friend and I will always remember him that way.”

Rich playing Premiers between 1986/87 to 1990/91 scored 133 runs at 14.78 and took 18 wickets at 32.78. For all senior grades Rich scored 611 runs with a highest score of 54 not out and took 101 wickets with a best of 6/40. He also took a hat trick.

Rich also picked up the R C Schnauer Trophy while playing in the junior grades and the F E Hemmingson Cup in the senior section.

Rich was a grandson of former NZ Captain Jack Kerr.

Brian Neal came to Auckland, and Parnell CC, in 1961. Previously, along with all of his 5 brothers, Brian had played representative cricket and rugby for Marlborough. A quite remarkable sporting family, his nephews, Ross and David, carried on that tradition of dual representation for that province.

Tall, Brian was an aggressive fast medium bowler of the old NZ school. He had played Hawke Cup cricket and regularly for Marlborough against Nelson and other Minor Associations – tough competition, especially from Nelson!

1961/62 - District cricket in Auckland in those days. Brian played for Eastern 2nds, a strong team of former Senior hands (stalwarts Peter Elliot, EK Smith, Frank Fenton) and the promising Ross Edwards (his later Test figures for Australia, 1171 runs at 40.37, considerably better than for our 2nds that season – 232 at 25.77). Brian then added his experience. Bowling – Brian's 131.1 o 37m 348r 27w 12.88 ave placed him 3<sup>rd</sup> in the averages – behind John McGregor, 9 wickets at 11.22 and Jim McLean, 32 at 12.00 and ahead of Peter Elliot, 27 at 13.77, EK Smith 27 at 15.80, Dave Whiting 13 at 16.31 and Rex Tisch, 10 at 16.31. The Team finished 2<sup>nd</sup> in the Championship – all 2 day games in those days.

Brian didn't turn out for us again – he moved out west to set up an orchard but then played a very considerable part in the development of cricket in those parts and Auckland in general. I hand over to Mike Simpson to add further:

*“Brian had a background in orcharding through family property in Marlborough. The Neals moved to an orchard in Trigg Rd in Kumeu in the sixties and commenced a 50 year association with the Kumeu Cricket Club – where he initially played and then held nearly all positions from Groundsman to President to Life Member*

*He was a driving force in Kumeu Cricket's rise to top level grade cricket in Auckland and, eventually became the Club's President and a Life Member*

*Brian also became heavily involved with Auckland Cricket – as Kumeu's delegate on the ACA's Board of Control between 1980 and 1991 and was Deputy Chairman for five years.*

*Brian was a cricket enthusiast who remembered his Parnell days with fondness whenever one spoke with him”*

#### ELAINE SIMPSON and MICHELLE SIMPSON



Late last year double tragedy struck our Patron Mike Simpson. Not only did his wife Elaine die just as she seemed to be recovering from a long illness but his daughter, Michelle, only days later, was lost and, eventually, found dead.

A very close family, Craig Speakman reflects:

*“Elaine always had Michelle in tow, they were inseparable. They both always had a smile, regularly ‘popped in’ to watch (It was an hour drive each way). Elaine knew all the players and could always answer the cry ‘bowlers name’.*

*I have known many cricketers who stopped playing when they had children because it was too hard, despite living 5 minutes away, having both sets of mums and dad's nearby, and other family members close. Mike and Elaine, on the other hand, were an hour away, had no parents nearby, no family members close. Yet Mike still came to cricket, served in every role possible in the Club, coached his sons' teams, served on the Board of Auckland Cricket, a huge time commitment. Yet Elaine and Michelle still turned up with smiles.”*

Echoing Craig's words, Mike's wholehearted commitment to Parnell, from the late '60s, Eden Park days, the time at Orakei Domain and then, since 2001, at Shore Road, would not have been possible without the complete support of Elaine and, of course, Michelle. Mike, and the rest of your family, our thoughts continue to be with you.

Over to Ronald Cardwell of Sydney – author and publisher, and very good friend of Bill's:

#### They Called Him Buckets

Name the Cricketer: Born in Palmerston North on 1 December 1938 played cricket and captained Auckland Grammar, cricket for Auckland, New Zealand, Western Australia and along the way Eastern Districts (Orakei and Parnell CCs), Clarendon – Cottesloe and Northern District.

#### Answer:

William Rodger Playle. His nickname was 'buckets' first given to him in his early days because of the magnificent hands that he possessed. He caught everything near where he fielded in the gully or short cover. He was again anointed with the name in Australia but for other reasons.

It was this game in Hobart, when Playle was in Australia, which saw Bill Playle be anointed for a second time with a nickname. With the first day delayed by rain the scoreboard attendants put up the names of WA's two openers, Kelly and Payle. It wasn't long before Terry Jenner spotted the mistake and with all the rain about Payle soon became "Buckets" – and it's been "Buckets" ever since.

Such is the cricketing journey of a cricketer who represented his country with passion. As a young man of 18 the Auckland batsman was the youngest selected for New Zealand colts against the touring West Indian team in March 1956. The West Indian team was full of talented players. Sobers, Smith and Atkinson shone for the tourists who showed the young colts what cricket was all about. The Gisborne student, he had not yet attended Auckland Grammar, was overcome by the occasion and did not reach double figures in either innings. The fact that the New Zealand selectors name Playle in the side indicated that he was a player of promise.

His talent had earlier been spotted when he was part of a colts' coaching programme under the guidance of Merv Wallace, the noted Auckland, New Zealand player and coach. Also, in the squad were future Test players John Sparling, Bruce Morrison and Frank Cameron.

After only six games for Auckland Playle was selected for the fourth visit by a New Zealand team in England in 1958. In the trial games prior to the tour Playle had impressed the New Zealand selectors in the final trial game with 48 runs. Under the captaincy of John Reid, the sixteen players and the 19-year-old Playle embarked on the tour.

Playle had a top score of 96 against Leicestershire but found the wet English conditions not to his liking. He made his Test debut at Edgbaston but was unable to display his wide range of strokes in his five tests on tour. His defensive efforts on tour saw him bat for long periods. John Arlott said of the young tourist in the match at Leicestershire 'His footwork was neat: almost casual to the eye, but never late: his back lift was a model of exaggerated straightness, and the down stroke equally so'. In the third Test at Leeds Playle occupied the crease for three and a quarter hours. Eighteen runs were scored but that was not important. He was seeking to prevent England from winning, only producing one four in his innings. He was defence personified.

Playle returned to New Zealand and set out building on his experiences in England. He had, as have many players, developed a nervous disposition when batting. It was disappointing to Playle that with his gifted stroke play he had to deal with this tendency. He was a superb fielder, with a keen eye and a strong arm. He had boundless energy and when batting exhibited strokes with grace and power. He developed what was described as the 'Auckland prod', also known as the forward defensive stroke. It was a shot designed to stop the ball breaching Playle's defence, nothing else. Unfortunately, he was remembered for his defensive play and not for his attacking strokes. Solid seasons in club and Plunket Shield cricket failed to draw selectors' attention to Playle's desire to wear the black cap again.

The MCC toured New Zealand in 1958-59 and 1960-61 with an Australian Second X1 visiting in 1960 but there was no call up. Playle was incensed that the New Zealand selectors failed to pick him for the tour to South Africa in 1962. He had scored 369 runs at 61.50 in the season and was the leading run getter, bar one in New Zealand.

In March 1962 Playle's long wait for a return to representative cricket saw him selected in Auckland to play for the President of New Zealand Cricket Council's X1. The determined Playle top scored with 96 against the calibre of Adcock, Meckiff, Benaud and Ramadhin. The following season England toured and Playle played in all three Tests with a top score in the second innings at Wellington. This series was his last wearing a black cap.

In 1963 Eddie Edwards, the former Western Australian batsman, was living in Auckland with his family, which included his son, the future Australian batsman Ross Edwards. Playle developed a close relationship with Edwards and he was being encouraged to move to Perth to play cricket with the prospects of playing for Western Australia, albeit there were no guarantees.

The seed was sown in Playle's mind and with no likely prospect of further Tests for New Zealand the twenty-six-year-old packed his bags and moved to Perth. With work guaranteed and the opportunity of a new cricket life the outlook was bright.

Playle joined the Claremont – Cottesloe club in Perth at the commencement of the 1965-66 season, the club where the Edwards were associated. The season started well for Playle and he was selected for the tour match against Mike Smith's 1965-66 English side. The fast wickets and bounce suited Playle's strokes and he scored well against the Englishmen. The season was a resounding success. He scored 642 runs in 17 innings at an average of 42.62 with a top score of 122 against Queensland at the WACA in January 1966. Western Australia finished second in the Sheffield Shield competition, their best result since 1947-48.

In all he played three seasons for Western Australia scoring 802 runs at 25.87 including two centuries.

Marriage followed for Playle and work commitments started to move in on his cricket. He was a significant captain, player and coach at the Claremont Club leading them to a premiership. As a coach and cricket mentor he was highly regarded. There was a move to Sydney with his employer where he found time to play with the Northern District Club where Ross Edwards later joined him when he too relocated to Sydney to work with Kerry Packer.

Following retirement Playle continued in coaching, firstly with the Northern District Cricket Club and then the North Sydney Cricket Club. He was regarded in the manner he worked with young cricketers between 12 and 16 encouraging them in their batting and seeking to instil in them details of the history of the game and where they could go with their cricket if they worked hard and applied themselves with their given talent. As Playle would often lament 'young players tend not to be as keen as I was when I was coming into the game. There are many opportunities for your people and cricket tends to miss out'.

Business life was not kind to Playle and in later years he struggled. Sydney cricket friends supported him in many ways. His three children did not play sport at any significant level however his daughters' son has shown batting promise with Bill telling this writer that he has a good 'Auckland push'.

I saw Bill some 18 months ago in Coffs Harbour. It was in many ways the end of a friendship that wound back to my days in grade cricket in Sydney. I had played against the former NZ Test batsman after he came to Sydney in 1974. The mind was gone, so were the stories. He had always dined out on his 96 in 1958 and I could tell the story to the extent that people could believe that I was at the game. It was no more. The infectious smile was still present, and the hand shake ever so firm. He held my hand for what seemed an eternity, perhaps reflecting on a catch taken many years earlier

Bill Playle died aged 80 at Coffs Harbour, on the NSW mid North Coast, on 27 February 2019. Of those that toured England in 1958 only Reid, Sparling, D'Arcy and Ward now survive.

#### FOOTNOTE:

1961-62 – Bill had a great comeback season, selected for the NZ Cricket President's XI vs Ron Robert's Commonwealth XI at Eden Park, Bill, facing an attack of Ritchie Benaud, Neil Adcock, Sonny Ramadhin and Harold Rhodes, top scored with 96 not out in the 2<sup>nd</sup> innings. He batted beautifully early but, in the 80s, froze and Skipper John Reid declared 8 down for 301 leaving Bill 6 short of his ton. The Commonwealth XI, set what looked a tough task – 292 to win in 4 hours – scampered home, 8 down but Tom Graveney 112\*, with just 3 minutes to spare.

1961-62 Bill Playle played just six 1<sup>st</sup> Class games and in 11 innings scored 514 runs at 72.85, highest score 116\*.

Bill came to Auckland Grammar from Gisborne High in 1956. Immediately was appointed a Prefect and Captain of the 1<sup>st</sup> XI – succeeding John Sparling. And he didn't disappoint – runs flowed, he joined Orakei CC/Eastern Districts. He made his Auckland 1<sup>st</sup> Class debut in 1956/57 and against the touring Australian XI Bill made 28 (2<sup>nd</sup> highest to Johnny Hayes' 29 after Geoff Rabone had taken 8/66). Then selected for NZ's 1958 tour of England – 18 in 194 minutes in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Test was highly praised as Bill had withstood Laker (46 wickets against the Aussies 2 years previously), Lock, Trueman Loader and Bailey. But his confidence was lost. He joined Parnell (nominal change – still part of Eastern Districts), still a most elegant bat but nothing came as easily as before. A couple of comebacks and a Test 65 but West Australia called.

This at a time that Judith was researching that history for the Hull Council in preparation for the celebration of the 200<sup>th</sup> Jubilee of the Abolition. Judith was in her element - that Parnell CC had this connection to her research was remarkable! Working with her, we learned a great deal more of our first members and the early history of the Parnell CC.

A retired headmistress, Judith made many trips here, to see her sister Lillie and others from Hull, who emigrated to NZ in the 1950s. Her very vocal support of Parnell, Auckland and ND will be greatly missed and our condolences go to Judith's son and daughter, Simon and Sarah and to her sister, Lillie Fowler and their families.

## JUNIOR CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



The 2018 – 19 cricket season will be a season remembered both for the magnitude of change in playing formats as well as for the cricket played and it gives me great pleasure to present the Club with my report.

The game we all love continues to evolve at all levels and whilst those in charge at the top end of the game concern themselves with how the formats of Test, ODI and T20 all play out for professionals, we administrators at the grass roots level remain ever focused on participation. Cricket operates in a very competitive environment with tennis, sailing, summer football, touch rugby and perhaps most significantly basketball luring potential cricket players away from our game. In a world where children and parents have so many pressures and demands on their time, playing long format games of cricket – or in fact any cricket - is a concept and a threat that parents can find challenging to embrace. Add to those other sports the peril of boredom whilst playing cricket puts us squarely in a battle for participation that we need to rise to if we are to ensure the future health of the game and the future pipeline of talent for our Club, District and Country.

It is with this in mind that New Zealand Cricket rolled out their innovative age and stage platforms to drive stronger levels of participation into the junior game. The changes rolled out across the country over the course of this season. These changes included:

- Fewer players in teams to ensure greater levels of participation
- Shorter games with an upper limit of T20 cricket being the norm. Games should have been able to be completed comfortably in 2.5 hrs.
- Shorter wickets across most age grade ensuring that bowlers have a stronger chance of keeping the ball in play and hitting the batting strip
- Shorter boundaries ensuring that batters have the opportunity to hit more boundaries and perhaps even more sixes.
- Fielding restrictions ensuring that no fielder could get close enough to the batters to cut off a quick single. The desire to provide batters with a greater opportunity to run quick singles keeps the game lively and keeps the batters moving.
- Lastly the grace period or angel rule so well used in girls cricket for a number of years found its way into boys cricket with good results. For most junior cricketers at any level a zero return with the bat can be a humbling and saddening experience. If multiple zero returns are registered over a period of time, the player can be left with a very bad experience from the game at a stage in their development that might lose them from the game forever. Minimising this risk is to be applauded.

These new playing conditions were met with some positive feedback both through and at the end of the season which we have all enjoyed reviewing and have found rewarding given the work that was required to bring them to life.

There are of course areas where these new playing conditions can evolve to cater to the broad ability of players of the game. The more experienced and capable players of the game have challenged some of the age and stage conditions through the season and this has led to a strong debate and discussion around the common ground and the distinctions that playing conditions should display for 'participation' cricket and for perhaps more 'performance' oriented cricket. In our discussions towards the end of the season and over the past few months, I am encouraged to report the openness and willingness of Auckland and New Zealand Cricket to take the learnings from 2018 – 19 and roll them into a further set of evolved playing conditions for the 2019 – 20 season. These playing conditions are not yet available but we will of course share them broadly across the Club when they are.

It is likely that some readers of this report will lament the loss of a more traditional format of cricket. I would encourage them to reflect on the changes that have been driven into the game as a very positive development. I would also ask them to consider cricket in the context of the challenges referenced already in this report. It is an exciting time for our game and we must all work hard with the experts in charge of the game to deliver a product that encourages participation and enjoyment above all else. If it isn't quite right the following season offers the opportunity to tweak and improve where needed.

As a PCC Board, we want our Club to be the 'preferred' cricket club across the Auckland region and we aim in all that we do to provide an inclusive cricket experience, full of opportunity for everyone to develop their own skills and most importantly to create an environment of fun and enjoyment. Our Club Mantra enshrining equal opportunity for all players summarises this well and guides us in our approach. I am delighted to report that whilst playing numbers in the Junior Club have reduced slightly over the 2018 – 19 season, the quality of play has remained high and we have some silverware in our trophy cabinet to accompany the wonderful achievements of our Premier Men and Reserve Women and their silverware.



At the youngest end of the Club we have a great festival atmosphere being delivered on a Friday night for our Grade 1 (age 4-6) players. Phil and Steve with the help of our young pros from the UK have produced a fun and enjoyable session where young players are given the opportunity to develop some foundation skills and work towards a game environment. The sessions finish with a sausage sizzle and the bar is open for parents and caregivers to socialise whilst their charges hopefully develop a love for the game. The passion involved in this product even saw Steve dress up as a cricketer Santa on the last playing day in December. I commend this Friday evening experience to all of you and ask that you spread the word powerfully across your networks to ensure the PCC playing numbers at this age remain robust.

Grades 2-8 all saw many teams participating in Saturday morning and some Saturday afternoon cricket. The levels of enjoyment witnessed both first hand and relayed second hand were high. Additionally we saw the introduction of midweek T20 cricket for Grades 7 and 8 which was a positive experience for most of the players and parents. We will work hard again in the upcoming season to put more teams on the park and ensure the enjoyable experience happens for everyone.

We continue to remain committed to the development and growth of female cricket at PCC. Our programme has again been well led by Dominic Drumm and Sally Woodfield. At both Junior Prizegiving sessions I asked parents to give their daughters a try at cricket and to get them to perhaps participate in the Friday night or Grade 2 / 3 levels if they have daughters of the right ages. Cricket is a great game for both boys and girls and we are blessed with world record making role models for our girls in NZ and with a strong White Ferns side to inspire. Please do what you can to give more girls the chance to play our wonderful game. Congratulations to Emma and Kate Irwin for their selections for Auckland U15s – a strong outcome from a good season.

As far as results go, we secured 3 wins in the Auckland Cricket Competitions: Well done to the players, coaches, managers and parents of the following teams:

- Parnell Hadlee (Grade 6 Premier Championship)
- Parnell Maroon (Grade 7 Midweek Championship)
- Parnell Horne (Under 14 Club of Origin)

Our representative cricket programme has also again been successful this year with our participation in the 2<sup>nd</sup> iteration of the J.T.Sparling Super Series. The Series sees Parnell, Cornwall, University, Grafton and Howick Pakuranga all compete for the J.T.Sparling Shield awarded to the Club who amasses the most points from all the representative fixtures through the season. Points are awarded for each win achieved at all age grades and consolidated into a final tally for each fixture. Each club played all the other clubs, with league tables being created for each of the age grades and at a total club level. The Super Series culminated with a 'Finals Day' on the 17<sup>th</sup> March where those clubs in 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> place in each of the age groups played off for the age group Cup.

Our representative results were as follows:

3 wins from 4 fixtures is a very pleasing result. Well done to all our players and coaches involved.

This year we had 4 of our A grade Rep teams in contention for silverware at the JT Sparling Series finals day with 3A, 5A, 6A and 8A all heading to HPCC on a good day for cricket. I am delighted to confirm that all four PCC teams walked away victorious. This is a good build on last year where we secured just the one cup with Grade 7. Cornwall again won the overall J.T.Sparling shield and we were in 3<sup>rd</sup> place just behind AUCC. Work to do no doubt as we head into 2019 – 20.

These results in our representative season also resulted in many of our players being selected for the Eastern Districts Cricket Association (EDCA) which is the step up from the J.T.Sparling Super Series. We accounted for approx. 40% of the selections for EDCA with 48 players being recognised at this level across the 7 grades of participation. My thanks go to James Dudson and Jon Tierney for their representation of the Club as part of the EDCA committee.

I would like to make mention of our grade coordinator team who have been instrumental through the course of the season in making the season a success for each of their grades.

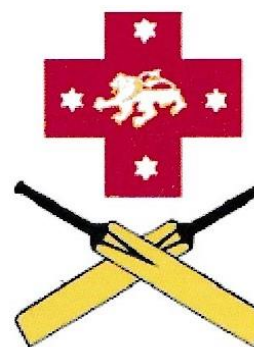

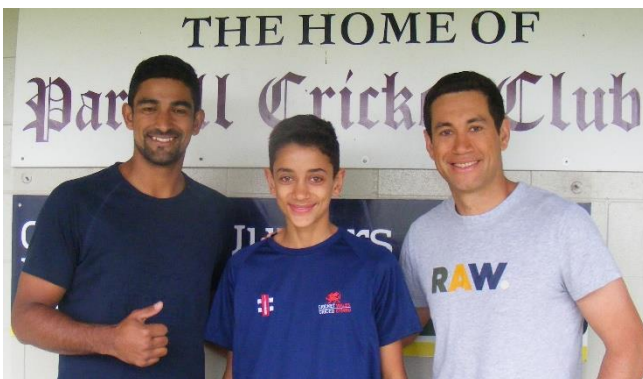

A new look – no David Goddard, no Mike Ravlic, no Coach Ian Trott but a warm welcome to Aniket Parekh, Will Somerville and Ollie Pringle and the newly appointed Head Coach, Ian West. Black Cap and Aces duties prevented Lockie Ferguson taking the field for us, and Will Somerville, Mark Chapman (hindered by an injured shoulder) and Ben Horne could only play on odd occasions but invaluable and hugely appreciated when they were able to play.

#### JEFF CROWE CUP – Limited (50) Overs Championship – THE ROAD TO THE CUP:

The season started on 20 October, two weeks later than previous, but straight onto grass, not artificials. First game was at Home vs North Shore – not good, we failed dismally being all out for 101 chasing 182. Next week, vs Cornwall, also at Home. Ben Rae hit a dazzling 105 off 134 balls and Ben Rainger 62 – 139 for the 1<sup>st</sup> wicket and 268/6 at 50 overs. But rain and the game was abandoned after 24.3 overs with Cornwall 134/5.

Then a break till 4 December (Two Dayers intervening), again at Shore Road vs Papatoetoe and we rattled up 319/4. Flynn McGregor-Sumpter 84 and extra quick 50s from Ben Rae, Andy Lane and Ben Rainger –impressive! Papatoetoe only responded with 186. Henry King, back from Karori, took 4/40 and Ollie Pringle 3/43.

Next, away to Birkenhead – just 172/10 off 47 overs, Henry King again dominating with 3/32, We let loose knocking off the runs in just 24 overs – Ben Rae scintillating with 78 off just 44 balls

Break till 12 January - at Home, we only sneaked in by 2 wickets against Grafton – 132/8 to their 131/10. Bowlers did well – Henry once more (3/34), and Ollie, Ganesh 2 apiece but the batting was shaky.

19 January at Colin Maiden - AUCC piled up 278/2– Beecroft 102, Anand 52 and Allen 75 and whilst we started well – 89 for the 1<sup>st</sup> wicket (Ben Rae 41 and Ben Horne 80), we were all out in the last over 27 short.

A further loss - to Suburbs, our 254/7 (Andy 68, Aniket 59\*) was made short work of by the Aces' pair of Raval and Barry (72 and 64\*) and others – 258/3 with 11 overs to spare. Time to rethink!

Despite those setbacks we scraped by a whisker into the Preliminary Semi Final and met old foe Takapuna at Onewa Domain. Ben Horne and Mark Chapman were available for us as was Henry King and, with another spinner needed, 16 year old Nikith Perera made his Premier debut. Takapuna had both O'Donnell brothers.

Sensational start – Henry had a wicket in his first over but Takapuna recovered somewhat to reach 258. Our bowlers had done well - Henry 3/43, Ollie 1/54, Josh 2/47, Nikith 1/54 and Aniket 3/58. The chase – wickets fell from the outset. At 128/5 all seemed lost but Ollie and Ben took us to 180 when Ollie was caught. Ben, playing the innings of his life was in control, Aniket stuck with him to 223 – Ben had reached his 100. 7<sup>th</sup> out, Aniket was caught behind of LH spinner Jones then Josh was caught at slip first ball – 223/8 and 36 still needed. Cometh the 16 year old debutant – but Nikith showed no visible nerves and helped Ben through to victory. Ben Horne 136\*!!

**SEMI FINAL:** vs Howick Pakuranga, Sunday, 17 February at Lloyd Elsmore with all “names” playing – Parnell batting first struck immediate trouble from the Aces' full pace attack – McClenaghan, McEwan, Ferns and Grobbelaar (another Ace, Jamie Brown, was their 12<sup>th</sup> man) – 2/1, 3/2, 17/3 – but Mark Chapman fought back aided by Andy. Mark left at 87 having scored 52 but Andy (60) and Brad (44) kept the runs coming. Then Will, Ollie and Josh also chipped in usefully leaving HP to chase our 263/8.

Henry led the way having Glen Phillips caught behind -16/1. Same again – 47/2. Enter Barnard, ten 1<sup>st</sup> Class games, 143\* highest score and averaging 94 for HP this season. Nikith, 16 year old LH spinner comes on – Barnard clean bowled. Sensational –Will Somerville, fresh from his Test exploits, then took the ball and HP disintegrated. Will's 6/10 dismissed HP for just 117. Henry King 2/25 (6), Ollie Pringle 1/29 (5), Josh Fisher 0/17 (5) Nikith Perera 1/34 (8) and Will Somerville 6/10 (7) – amazing! And Parnell to meet Suburbs New Lynn in the Final!

**FINAL:** vs Suburbs New Lynn, Sunday, 3 March at Eden Park No.2 – weather fine, Toss won by Parnell Our batsmen hit their straps in this game. At the outset, Ben Rae cut loose but was held up early by top fielding but it was Andy Lane (84), Ollie Pringle (74) and an extraordinary cameo from Aniket (54\*) that took us to 363/5.

A tough task for SNL but their openers took it to us and only an outstanding catch at deep backward square leg by Ganesh off Henry turned the tide. And turn it did – from there our bowlers tightened the screws and then it was just a matter of time – full marks in particular to Ganesh 3/63 (10), Henry King 3/35 (9) and Aniket 2/34 (7). SNL, all out for 211 after 38.2 overs, to give Parnell it's third winning of the Jeff Crowe Cup since 2009/10.



### **HEDLEY HOWARTH TROPHY – Two Day Championship**

This series started with a resounding 9 wicket outright win vs Auckland University -with Ollie Pringle outstanding with 10/100 in the match (7/37 and 3/63). Sadly, further successes didn't follow – the Cornwall game washed out with no result, then poor batting allowed Papatoetoe a 1<sup>st</sup> innings win. Two outright losses came in February when minds were turning to the One Dayers but then, vs Takapuna, 100s to Andy Lane and Ollie Pringle brought a 1<sup>st</sup> innings win and though the ECB game was rained off with no result, another 1<sup>st</sup> innings win, vs AUCC, allowed the season to end on a more positive note and Parnell in 4<sup>th</sup> place of 8.

### **T20 CHAMPIONSHIP**

A resounding 9 wicket loss to Eden Roskill and game 2, vs Cornwall, abandoned without a ball bowled set us back dreadfully. We recovered extremely well. Two excellent wins at Cornwall Park on 22 December – Will Somerville, back from Test duty, bowled well but took no wickets but our other two offies, Aniket and Razin had success. **ELLIOT JAFFE and PETER HICKMAN REPORTING**

Going into the 2018/19 season, the thirds were tasked with gaining promotion to the upper echelons of grade cricket. With many changes in personnel especially in the batting department, this prospect seemed all the more difficult. However, the tale of the season was truly one to remember.

With the disappointment of losing a close promotion race in the 17/18 season all but forgotten, the thirds began 2018/19 — their second season in the fourth tier of grade cricket, under new captain Elliot Jaffe. What better way to start than with a one-dayer grudge match against last years champions, Grafton United CC. A rollercoaster of a game resulted in the PCC 3rds narrowly losing by just 2 wickets. A washed out game against East Coast Bays followed by an ugly win over Suburbs New Lynn CC epitomized an inconsistent start. However, we began the two-day competition strong, demolishing Auckland University CC, narrowly missing out on a crucial outright by just one wicket! However, a shock PCC batting collapse from 60/1 to 109 all out against a weaker Takapuna led to a crucial first innings loss. In the following two dayer, we once again narrowly lost to Auckland University CC. Switching back to the one-day format, we visited the Takapuna team which had embarrassed us a few weeks earlier. However, this time it was PCC's turn to show the strength we possess, with a commanding 156 run win. Reflecting upon the 2018 stage of the season, it was an extremely stuttering start with extreme ups and downs in our form. From a batting perspective, we seemed to struggle to display consistency.

With a well earned Christmas break, the 3rds returned to action against the fearsome Birkenhead CC, who has a big reputation for runs and controversy. However, it was to be PCC's time in the limelight, as a 2 wicket win secured vital points in the race for the one-day competition title. Little did we know, this game proved to be a catalyst for the rest of our season. Following this, Kumeu came to Orakei Domain for the final one-dayer of the season. With a win required, and a Birkenhead CC loss needed to win the limited overs title, the day proved to be a thriller. Despite fierce Kumeu resistance, the 3rds won by 1 run — a runout off the last delivery of the match ensuring the points. However, we ended up missing out by 1.5 points to Birkenhead, to finish a commendable 2nd in the one-day competition. Turning back to the two day competition, the 3rds found their stride. With a decimation of Grafton United CC, PCC picked up outright points to stamp our title intentions. Following this, a comfortable first innings win against Kumeu CC kept us on Birkenhead CC's tail in the race for the two-day title. Going in to the final three games, there was to be significant drama. Matching up against the top of the table Birkenhead CC, the thirds were humbled to a 114 run loss, which severely dented our hopes of promotion. At this point due to injury, Mehul Chhagan took over captaincy duties from Elliot Jaffe. It proved to be an inspired change, as Mehul led the 3rds to glory against our bitter rivals, East Coast Bays with a 27 run win. Going into the final fixture of the season against already relegated SNLCC, PCC sat 3rd in the table. However, first and second placed Birkenhead CC and East Coast Bays were to play each other during this round. With many calculations attempted, we conceded there was a glimmer of hope to win two-day day title. With the comforts of home in Shore Road, the 3rds delivered one of the performances of the season, going on to remarkably win outright by 8 wickets. With many a prayer delivered, and phones in hand, we waited eagerly to hear the results from the other games, to find out the Birkenhead CC game had been abandoned, with points shared.

All this to say, a rupture of cheers and screams began as we learnt of our fate as two-day champions, beating Birkenhead CC by 0.8 points. As a result, we had remarkably achieved our goal of promotion to the 3rd grade of men's cricket, where a season of sheer thrill will hopefully be relived once again.

While this summary only provides a snapshot of a quite frankly remarkable season, there were many players of note who deserve mentioning:

- **Luke O'Toole** – Our top run scorer for the second season in a row, amassing 474 runs at an average of 33.9 with the blade. 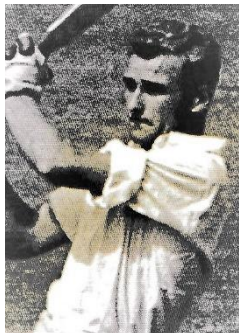

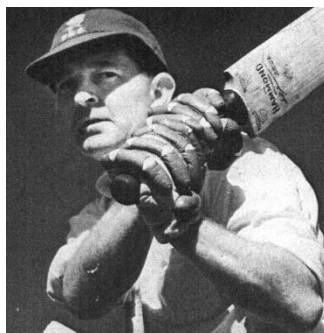

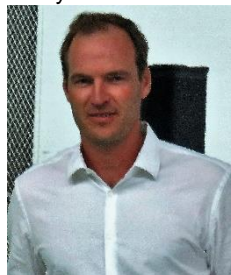
