This case study in four sessions will use the Harley-Davidson turnaround to illustrate how radical concepts of factory management, communications and worker participation were able to save an American icon from bankruptcy. About to go

under in the Eighties, Harley-Davidson turned itself into an all-American success story by developing totally unorthodox approaches to manufacturing and workforce utilization.



Presented by Lee Ozley, a Hilton Head resident and organizational psychologist who served Harley-Davidson as an adviser, coach and external resource for 15 years. He and recently retired CEO of Harley-Davidson, Rich Teerlink, chronicled much of this turnaround in: "More Than A Motorcycle, The Leadership Journey at Harley-Davidson," published by Harvard Business School in September 2000.

Teenagers in 1960 probably saw the decade ahead as a kaleidoscope of opportunity and change. Ten years later, that dream had been violently transformed by assassinations, protests, riots, war, and a moonwalk. It seemed that the country had gone through a cultural chain reaction that was out of control. The decade of the Sixties saw years of terrible and memorable moments that transformed the psyche of America. "The Good Old Days" were gone forever.

America in Transition offers an opportunity to open our memory books and revisit a truly tumultuous decade. The course will be led by Joe Fletcher, who has led several programs on this era of our history. Upon retiring as Superintendent of Schools in Westchester County, NY in 1992, Joe and his wife Fran became founding members of the Creative Retirement Center, which was a forerunner of today's Lifelong Learning of HHI. He recently completed terms on the CSA and ASPPPO Boards of Directors at Sea Pines.

* Investing at the Next Level

Tragic Era or Social Revolution?

*** Reconstruction: 1863 - 1877**

This period in American history determined the course of the nation for the next century. It included: the struggle between Congress and Andrew Johnson, which led to the first impeachment of an American president; the controversial radical reconstruction state governments of carpetbaggers, scalawags, and freedmen; and the rise of the Ku Klux Klan.

One class will feature reconstruction in Beaufort County, which was a rehearsal for later efforts elsewhere in the South to deal with land issues and former slaves (the first freedmen's' community in the USA was Mitchelville, established in 1862 on Hilton Head Island.) The course concludes with the disputed election of 1876, which ended Reconstruction.

Excerpts from D. W. Griffith's 1915 classic (and controversial) film "Birth of a Nation," which presented the "tragic era" view of reconstruction, will be integrated into the classes.

The presenter is Dr. George Sykes, who has taught many well received courses in history and other subjects on Hilton Head Island since arriving here in 1997. Before moving South, he taught high school history and social studies in Connecticut for 30 years.

When Paris replaced Vienna in the world of music

*** Classical Music in 19th Century Paris**

This course will explore musical movements from Romanticism through Impressionism to Modernism in French music – most of which took place in the 19th century, and in Paris.



It will cover the innovations and experiments in tonal color and nuances of this "new" sound, showing how they differed from the Austro-Germanic tradition. Musical composition during the period broke away from Vienna and its traditions.

The course will feature the music of Berlioz, Chopin, Bizet, Franck, Saint-Saens, Debussy, Ravel and Stravinsky in many forms -- ballet, opera, symphony, concerto, and chamber music. In the process, it will raise and answer some questions, such as:



- What political/historical/cultural influences led to the search for a new kind of musical language in Paris?
- How did emigres from Chopin to Stravinsky -influence musical development during their self-imposed exiles in Paris?
- What were the attractions and lures of Paris?
- Was there a cross pollination between visual art and music when impressionism flowered?

Jane Davis Sine has provided us with music appreciation courses for five years, and our appreciation for Jane has grown exponentially. She started giving adult courses at Marymount College in New York before settling in Hilton Head during fall and winter months. For 18 years she represented classical musicians and conductors, and at one time she played double bass in orchestras.

* Life Weaving: A Class for Women

This workshop offers women an opportunity to explore the questions: "What do I want to do with the rest of my life?" "How can I live with a greater sense of well-being and peace?"

Using the metaphor of weaving, participants will examine life's patterns, textures, and changes. As the past and present are viewed with greater clarity and wisdom, women can choose to weave old dreams or new possibilities into their lives. Some may wish to eliminate areas, shift focus or explore the merits of "doing vs.being". The workshop is informal, interactive and promotes mutual support and friendship among the participants. Experiences may range from profound to playful. A special focus on fun is woven into each session.

Presented by **Linda Archinaco**, a trained facilitator who has conducted workshops across the country. As a management consultant, she worked with people at all organizational levels and now conducts workshops that address issues affecting women. Ms. Archinaco has a Master's degree in human resources and is a certified Qigong instructor.

Part I of Old Time Radio explored vintage comedy shows in depth. Part II will tune in on radio dramas of the 30's and 40's, including The Shadow, Inner Sanctum, Escape, and Grand Central Station.

Another session will feature two "hard boiled detectives" of the era -- Sam Spade and Philip Marlowe. We will hear the always clear-cut conflict between good and evil, and get an appreciation for the sensibilities and foibles of the period. Each class will feature an hour of recordings, followed by a discussion of the shows and their relevance, then and now.

Presented by Jim Van Cleave, a 37-year veteran of Procter & Gamble. After heading a variety of positions in advertising and marketing, he spent the last ten years as Vice President of Media and Programming. In that capacity, he oversaw production of all P&G's soap operas, specials and madefor-TV movies.

- Migration. What are the pros and cons for countries affected by mass migration?

Born in Damascus, Syria, he was educated in Lebanon and the United States, and is a retired urologist with a lively interest in current world events. He is active in Rotary International and a frequent participant in local Ethics discussion groups.

* The Supreme Court and Equal Protection

The 14th Amendment to the Constitution, ratified in 1868, provides that no state shall "deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws". While its original intent was to guarantee the rights of citizenship to freed slaves, the 14th Amendment has figured in the Court's decisions on a great many other issues as well – discrimination in education and its financing, voting rights, gender and sexual discrimination, welfare benefits, and other areas besides racial discrimination. The Court has held that actions of the Federal government that classify individuals in a discriminatory manner violate the due process clause of the 5th Amendment.

The course will examine classifications established by the Supreme Court and review some of its decisions, many very recent, that apply to the idea of equal protection. In addition, the first full term of the Roberts' Court will be evaluated, and the class will be asked to "decide" one or two cases, after which its decisions will be compared with the actual results in the Court.

LLHHI President Andy Greenstein and Charlie Sanders, both retired attorneys, will present the material and lead the discussion. They promise to challenge and stimulate you as they did in their Bill of Rights class last year.

Comparing Scott and Ernest:

* Stories by Fitzgerald and Hemingway

The focus in this course will be on a dozen or so stories by the two writers who, with Faulkner, occupy the most prominent places in the pantheon of American fiction of the Modern Period. Fitzgerald's lyrically stylized tales of "The Jazz Age" and of (usually troubled) high-society folk; and Hemingway's spare, impeccably constructed evocations of "The Lost Generation" and of people behaving well or badly in extremis, afford provocative contrasts in both form and content.


Emphasis will be placed on these differences by alternating between the two writers, thus illuminating the distinct ways in which each employs the basic "elements of fiction" to portray vivid moments of human experience.

* A Genetic Map of Human History.....

The explosion of tools for genetic analysis and the National Geographic's "Genographic Project" have served to fill in gaps in the anthropological history of human evolution. After reviewing some basics, the course will follow the genetic path of humankind from Africa through global dispersion. Insight into the identification of the first "Americans" will be provided by the forensic anthropology of "Kennewick man", a 9600 year-old skeleton found in Kennewick, Washington. Material will be drawn from the WEB and from "Mapping Human History" by Steve Olson [2003], "Before the Dawn" by Nicholas Wade [2006], and discussions with Dr. George Gill, Professor of Anthropology, University of Wyoming.

Presented by **Dr. Harold Hauer**, who retired as a Research Fellow after a 34- year career at the Hercules Inc. Research Center. He has taught Chemistry classes -- "Understanding Science in the News".-- at the college level and for LLHHI. He has a B.S. in Chemistry from City College of New York and a Ph.D. in Analytical Chemistry from Purdue University.

Would the Puritans who helped settle America in the 17th century still think of it as a "city on the hill"? Or have we moved in a different direction? Looking forward, what values should guide us and how will we measure our nation's success in the years ahead?

These and similar questions will be examined by a distinguished panel of speakers whose backgrounds in philosophy, history, international business, and military leadership will guide us on a mission of discovery. Who are we in the America of today? How did we get here, and where are we headed in the 21st Century?

Moderator **Marion Conlin**, who initiated the Saturday programs of exploration for LLHHI, has put together an outstanding group of speakers:

Jan. 20 – Dr. Howard Radest – "The Founders and the New Republic: How We Got Where We Are." Adjunct Professor of Philosophy at USCB, Dr. Radest is a PhD graduate of Columbia University. He founded Columbia's University Seminar on Moral Education and continues as a leader of moral and ethical inquiry in numerous Island study groups.

Jan. 27 – Dr. Howard Radest – "Where Ought We Be Going – Will Enlightenment Values of Liberty, Equality and Community Get Us There?

Feb. 3 - William T. Pendley, Rear Admiral (ret) – "Crafting Foreign and National Security Policy Today in a Democratic System" – Since retiring from a 33-year military career, Admiral Pendley has held numerous government posts and professorships. He was recently placed on the World Affairs Council of America's list of recommended speakers.

Feb. 10 - John Shkor, Vice Admiral (ret) – "U.S. Power In Chaotic Times: Unexplored Assumptions" – After 35 years of service in the U.S. Coast Guard, Admiral Shkor became Chief Operating Officer of Homeland Security's Transportation Security Administration, where he served before retiring to Hilton Head. This is his second lecture for LLHHI.

Feb. 17 – Dhan Gopal Mukerji – "World Government and Globalization" - As an international businessman with ongoing ties to European business and foreign policy spokespersons, Mr. Mukerji brings his expertise to many Island institutions, including the World Affairs Council and LLHHI.
