


Correlated Indicator Options

A. School success is a reality for all children and youth	1) % of children ages 0-5 enrolled in high quality early care and education 2) % of SFUSD students ready for Kindergarten 3) % K-12 SFUSD students attending school regularly 4) % of SFUSD students (gr 3-8 and 11) proficient or above in English Language Arts and Math in elementary and middle schools

Gradients of Agreement

1. Fully support (I like it)
2. Endorsement with minor concerns (Basically, I like it)
3. Agree with reservations (I can live with it)
4. Abstain (I have no opinion)
5. Stand aside (I don't like it, but I don't want to hold up the group)
6. Disagree but willing to go with the majority (I want my disagreement noted, but I'll support the decision)
7. Disagree, with request to not be involved in implementation (I don't want to stop anyone else, but don't want to be involved in Implementing it)
8. Block (I can't support the proposal)
