CHOREOGRAPHER

BENJAMIN MILLEPIED

Benjamin Millepied is a choreographer, filmmaker, and former Principal Dancer with New York City Ballet.

Born in Bordeaux, France, he performed with NYCB from 1995 to 2011, where he originated roles by choreographers including Christopher Wheeldon, Jerome Robbins, and Peter Martins. As a choreographer, Millepied's own works are part of major dance companies' repertories around the world, such as American Ballet Theatre, The Mariinksy Ballet, Pacific Northwest Ballet, Pennsylvania Ballet, San Francisco Ballet, Berlin Staastsoper, Lyon Opera Ballet, and Dutch National Ballet.

Millepied acted as the choreographer-in-residence at the Baryshnikov Arts Center in 2006, where he choreographed the solo "Years Later" for Mikhail Baryshnikov. His many collaborators include composers Nico Muhly, Nicholas Britell, David Lang, and Bryce Dessner; artists Christopher Wool, Barbara Kruger, Mark Bradford, Daniel Buren, Liam Gillick, and United Visual Artists; and designers Rodarte, Iris Van Herpen, and Alessandro Sartori.

In 2010, Millepied choreographed and starred in the award-winning film "Black Swan." In 2012, Millepied co-founded L.A. Dance Project, and he was appointed Director of Dance at Paris Opera in 2014, where he commissioned new works by William Forsythe, Justin Peck, Jerome Bel, Wayne McGregor, Crystal Pite, Tino Seghal, Nico Muhly, and James Blake. In addition, he created the Paris Opera's first dance medicine program and launched a digital stage. Directors Thierry Demaizière and Alban Teurlari chronicled Millepied's tenure at Paris Opera in their critically-acclaimed documentary "Reset." In 2016, Millepied resigned from his position in order to focus on his own choreography and filmmaking. In 2022, he will make his directorial feature debut with the film musical "Carmen."

Millepied is a recipient of the Mae L. Wien Award for Outstanding Promise, a recipient of the Bourse Lavoisier Scholarship, a winner of the Prix de Lausanne, a United States Artists Wynn Fellow in Dance, and a recipient of the Chevalier of the Order of Arts and Letters by the French Ministry of Culture.



MUSIC ANDY AKIHO

Andy Akiho is a "trailblazing" (Los Angeles Times) GRAMMY nominated composer whose bold works unravel intricate and unexpected patterns while surpassing preconceived boundaries of classical music. Known as "an increasingly in-demand composer" (The New York Times), Akiho has earned international acclaim for his large-scale works that emphasize the natural theatricality of live performance.

The 2021-2022 season features the NYC premiere of Akiho's double GRAMMY nominated work Seven Pillars for Sandbox Percussion and the world-premiere of a new commission for Imani Winds. Equally at home writing chamber music and symphonies, Akiho is the Oregon Symphony Orchestra's 2022-2023 composer-in-residence. Recent engagements include commissioned premieres by the New York Philharmonic, National Symphony Orchestra, Shanghai Symphony, China Philharmonic, Guangzhou Symphony, Oregon Symphony Orchestra, American Composers Orchestra Music@Menlo, LA Dance Project and The Industry.

Akiho has been recognized with many prestigious awards and organizations including the Rome Prize, Lili Boulanger Memorial Prize, Harvard University Fromm Commission, Barlow Endowment, New Music USA, and Chamber Music America. His compositions have been featured by organizations such as Bang on a Can, American Composers Forum, The Intimacy of Creativity in Hong Kong, and the Heidelberg Festival.

An active steel pannist, Akiho has performed his works with the LA Philharmonic's Green Umbrella Series, the Berlin Philharmonic's Scharoun Ensemble, the International Drum Festival in Taiwan, and more. Akiho's recordings No One To Know One and The War Below features brilliantly crafted compositions inspired by his primary instrument, the steel pan.

The physicality of playing that Akiho experiences as a steel pannist is an embedded aspect of his musical practice and naturally extends itself into his compositional output. Music making is inextricably linked to shared human experience for Akiho from inception to performance. Akiho's compositional trajectory has been an untraditional one, he spent most of his 20s playing steel pan by ear in Trinidad and began composing at 28, and these social roots laid the foundation for his current practice. He can frequently be found composing into the wee hours of the morning at coffee shops, nightclubs, bars and restaurants, taking breaks to get to know those around him. Similarly, Akiho develops relationships with his collaborators as he writes for people, not instruments.

Akiho was born in 1979 in Columbia, SC, and is currently based in Portland, OR and New York City.

CAROLINE SHAW


Caroline Shaw is a musician who moves among roles, genres, and mediums, trying to imagine a world of sound that has never been heard before but has always existed. She is the youngest recipient of the Pulitzer Prize in Music for Partita for 8 Voices (Roomful of Teeth), and she works often in collaboration with others, as producer, composer, violinist, and vocalist.

2022 will see the release of work with Rosalía (on upcoming album MOTOMAMI), the score to Josephine Decker's film The Sky Is Everywhere (A24/Apple), the premiere of Justin Peck's Partita with NY City Ballet, the premiere of the new stage work LIFE with Gandini Juggling and the Merce Cunningham Trust, a premiere for NY Philharmonic and Roomful of Teeth, the premiere Wu Tsang's silent film Moby Dick with live score for Zurich Chamber Orchestra co-composed with Andrew Yee, a second album with Attacca Quartet called The Evergreen (Nonesuch), the premiere of Helen Simoneau's Delicate Power, tours of Graveyards & Gardens (immersive dance theater work co-created with Vanessa Goodman), and tours with So Percussion featuring songs from Let The Soil Play Its Simple Part (Nonesuch), amid occasional chamber music appearances (Chamber Music Society of Minnesota, Caramoor Festival, La Jolla Music Society).

Caroline has written over 100 works in the last decade, for Anne Sofie von Otter, Davóne Tines, Yo Yo Ma, Renée Fleming, Dawn Upshaw, LA Phil, Philharmonia Baroque, Seattle Symphony, Cincinnati Symphony, Aizuri Quartet, The Crossing, Dover Quartet, Calidore Quartet, Brooklyn Rider, Miro Quartet, I Giardini, Ars Nova Copenhagen, Ariadne Greif, Brooklyn Youth Chorus, Britt Festival, Vail Dance Festival, and many others. She has produced for Kanye West, Rosalía, Woodkid, and Nas.

Her work as vocalist or composer has appeared in several films, tv series, and podcasts including The Humans, Bombshell, Yellowjackets, Maid, Dark, Beyonce's Homecoming, jeen-yuhs: a Kanye Trilogy, Dolly Parton's America, and More Perfect.





Doug Baum began his dance training in Maryland at Mid-Atlantic Center for the Performing Arts before graduating from the Baltimore School for the Arts in 2006. In 2010, Doug received his BFA from Fordham University in collaboration with The Ailey School, where he apprenticed with Ailey II for two years. Since graduating, he has worked with Bad Boys of Dance, Compagnie Flak, Les Ballets Jazz and most recently Complexions Contemporary Ballet. Doug has completed three seasons with Zhukov Dance Theater in addition to guesting with Peridance, Ezdanza, Thang Dao, and Company XIV.



MARISSA BROWN

Marissa Brown has her BFA in performance and choreography from University of California Irvine and MFA from California Institute of the Arts. Brown performed in Ivo Van Hove's rendition of West Side Story Broadway. She has had the pleasure to work with choreographers and companies such as Donald Mckayle, Benjamin Levy, Brice Mousset, Randy James, Sharp & Fine, The Park Avenue Armory, and Phantom Limb Company. She creates her own dance and film work under the name Lone King Projects.



LORRIN BRUBAKER

Lorrin Brubaker began dancing at age 10 in his hometown of Apopka, Florida. In 2012 he was admitted into The Juilliard School, where Lorrin performed works by Jose Limon, Lar Lubovitch, Jerome Robbins, Mark Morris, Camille A. Brown, Brian Brooks, Zvi Gotheiner, Matthew Neenan, and Peter Chu. Since graduating from Juilliard in 2017, Lorrin has danced full time with BODYTRAFFIC and Jacob Jonas The Company in Los Angeles, CA. Lorrin also had the honor of performing for the Merce Cunningham Trust in the Night Of 100 Solos: A Centennial Event. He also made a guest appearance at The Hollywood Bowl for Romeo and Juliet, a collaboration between the LA Philharmonic and LA Dance Project.





Courtney is an Austin, Texas native, there she spent her early years training in gymnastics and dance. Once graduating high school Courtney went on to further her education at Conservatory of Dance at Purchase College SUNY where she performed works by Jie-Hung Connie Shiau, Doug Varone, Annie Rigney, Roderick George, and Rosalind Newman. During her time at Purchase she was selected to study abroad at the London Contemporary School of Dance for a semester. In 2020 Courtney performed for Marc Jacobs in New York Fashion Week, directed and choreographed by Karole Armitage. She has worked closely with SoulEscape for numerous years, performing as a company member for Justin Giles. Courtney is currently finishing up her BFA degree at Purchase college where she is expected to graduate in spring of 2022 while recently joining L.A. Dance Project for her first season with the company.



OLIVER GREENE CRAMER

Oliver Greene-Cramer was raised in southern Vermont receiving his early training at the Brattleboro School of Dance and Burklyn Ballet Theatre. After obtaining his BFA from SUNY Purchase in 2013 he joined the Lar Lubovitch Dance Company with whom he performed until 2016. Oliver was a member of Ballet Austin from 2014-2021. He has also had the privilege of performing in the Galas of the Jacob's Pillow and Danza in Arte a Pietrasanta festivals.



DAPHNE FERNBERGER

Daphne Fernberger, born and raised in NYC, began her professional career with Cedar Lake Contemporary Ballet before moving to Europe to join Dresden Frankfurt Dance Company. As a freelance artist, she danced for the Merce Cunningham Trust in the Night Of 100 Solos: A Centennial Event, Ersan Mondtag, Margie Gillis Legacy Project, among others, in both Europe and the United States. Daphne graduated from American Ballet Theatre's Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis School and received her BFA from The Juilliard School. During her time at Juilliard, Daphne had the honor of performing a lead role in Pina Bausch's rarely seen work, Wind von West; also traveling to Germany to perform in celebration of Tanztheater Wuppertal's 40th anniversary. Her own choreographies include Hellerau is Female, WHOLE, a short film for the fashion brand Rentrayage, the dance film Environment as Self, and The River Within. On her path she discovered the potent power of transformation through dance. Believing it needs to be shared now more than ever, she hosts livestream movement meditations weekly.





David Adrian Freeland, Jr. from Jacksonville, Florida, received his early dance training at LaVilla School of the Arts and at Jacksonville Centre of the Arts. In 2012, David was invited to join Ailey II, the second company of Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, where he danced for three years. During this time, he performed seminal works by Alvin Ailey, Judith Jamison, and Robert Battle. In 2016, David joined L.A. Dance Project where he has both created roles and danced in important stage and film works by Benjamin Millepied, Kyle Abraham, Justin Peck, and Ohad Naharin. David is the proud recipient of a 2018 Princess Grace Award in Dance.



MARIO GONZALEZ

Mario Gonzalez started dancing at the Marya Kennett School of Dance in Goshen, NY. He received his preprofessional training at Walnut Hill School for the Arts under direction of Michael Owen and went on to attain his BFA from the Conservatory of Dance at SUNY Purchase College. While on scholarship Mario has attended summer intensives with the San Francisco Ballet, The Juilliard School, Nederlands Dans Theater, M.I.P., The Cunningham Fellowship Workshop and Springboard Danse Montreal. Prior to joining LADP Mario danced with Visceral Dance Chicago and American Repertory Ballet. During his career he has danced in works by Danielle Agami, George Balanchine, Nicolo Fonte, Mark Godden, Madboots Dance, Stephan Laks, Paul Lightfoot & Sol Leon, Jose Limon, Matthew Neenan, Kevin O'Day, Kirk Peterson, Erica Sobol, Doug Varone and Yin Yue.



SIERRA HERRERA

Sierra Herrera, originally from Long Beach, CA, has trained at various studios across the Southern California region. She studied at the Orange County School of Arts, graduating with the Director's Achievement Award in 2013. Following her graduation from the Conservatory of Dance at SUNY Purchase in 2017, she then joined DanceWorks Chicago under the directorship of Julie Nakagawa in 2018. From 2019 through 2020, Sierra joined Madonna's Madame X World Tour as a dancer and assistant choreographer. Sierra has also studied at the Korea National University of Arts in Seoul, Korea. Sierra's additional training includes the American Ballet Theatre, Alonzo King LINES Ballet, Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, San Francisco Conservatory of Dance, and BODYTRAFFIC LA.



DAISY JACOBSON

Daisy Jacobson is from Manhattan Beach, CA. She earned her BFA from The Juilliard School in 2017 and joined LA Dance Project soon after. She has performed in new works and repertoire by Benjamin Millepied, Justin Peck, Kyle Abraham, Ohad Naharin, Shannon Gillen, Bobbi Jene Smith and more. Daisy has been featured in Dance Magazine's "On the Rise" as well as Honolulu Magazine's "Breaking the Ballet Mold". Daisy is a National YoungArts Winner and a Presidential Scholar.



PAYTON JOHNSON

Born and raised in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Payton began her formal dance training at Jean Leigh Academy of Dance. She made her professional performance debut at the age of 8 as a ballet student in the major motion picture, "The Curious Case of Benjamin Button" and followed that in the role of "Clara" in the Radio City Christmas Spectacular at 11. Payton graduated with a BFA in Dance from The Juilliard School in 2021 where she performed works by Bryan Arias, Nelly Van Bommel, Andrea Miller, Matthew Neenan, Bret Easterling and Ohad Naharin as well as repertoire from Martha Graham and Jose Limon. Since graduating, Payton has had the good fortune to work with Kyle Abraham on creating his newest work for The Royal Ballet and the opportunity to perform in Dubai for the 2020 World Expo. She is excited to join LADP, and looking forward to performing with this exceptional group.



SHU KINOUCHI

Shu Kinouchi was born in Yokohama, Japan. He began his training in his early age under his mother, at Mayumi Kinouchi Ballet Studio. Co-founded by choreographer Benjamin Millepied in 2012, L.A. Dance Project (LADP) has become an incubator for possibility. The company has found a true home in downtown Los Angeles with the opening of the 2245 performance space in 2017, for audiences and artists alike.

LADP engages a public that comes from 62% of LA County zip codes, measured by the collection of ticket sales demographics. The community is diverse in age, race, gender, and economic status.

Expanding its size since 2012, LADP is now composed of eighteen full-time dancers, ten staff including Executive and Artistic Directors, and thirteen members of the Board of Directors. LADP programming includes daring new commissions with an emphasis on cross-genre collaborations, revivals of choreographic masterpieces, new works from local emerging artists, and educating young dancers from LA's most economically under-resourced communities.

LADP is committed to reaching a broad audience and making dance accessible to the communities it serves. LADP keeps ticket prices low, offers student discounts, and hosts free-of-charge dress rehearsals with the goal of ensuring members of the public are not excluded due to their economic status.

Throughout the year, LADP provides free behind-the-scenes access to its rehearsal process through open rehearsals and question-and-answer sessions with the artists. These initiatives, plus the company's core programming, help LADP fulfill its mission to inspire, create, educate, and change perspectives through the transformative power of dance in Los Angeles and around the world.
