## BACKGROUND ON BACK FROM THE BRINK CAMPAIGN 1-2023



The world currently has over 12,000 nuclear weapons, 90% in the stockpiles of the US and Russia. Most of these are in storage, but approximately 1500 of them in the US and 1500 in Russia are "operationally deployed".

Of these deployed weapons, at least 1/3 are on "launch ready" or "high alert" status (also known as "hair trigger alert"). In the US, these include 400 land-based Minuteman land-based missiles and at least 100 submarine-based missiles (each of which carry an average of 4-5 bombs) which can be launched within minutes. Once launched, they cannot be disabled, recalled or intercepted.

President Putin has stepped back from his threats about the use of battlefield nuclear weapons in Ukraine. But the threat of a nuclear attack remains: if a leader feels cornered and desperate, if cyberterrorists gain control of nuclear command systems, if there is an error in human judgement or a flaw in technology leading to unintended launch of a weapon.

American foreign policy experts such as Henry Kissinger, George Shultz, William Perry and Sam Nunn have said that because of these risks, the safest route is to eliminate all nuclear weapons.

The **Back from the Brink** campaign began after the United Nations voted in 2017 for a Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW). **Back from the Brink** is a nationwide, grass-roots effort to urge the US to embrace the United Nations TPNW and take the following steps to make the world safer:

- Actively pursue a verifiable agreement among nuclear-armed states to eliminate their nuclear arsenals.
- Renounce the option of using nuclear weapons first (China has already done this).
- End the sole, unchecked authority of any U.S. President to launch a nuclear attack.
- Take U.S. nuclear weapons off hair-trigger (high) alert.
- Cancel the plan to replace the entire U.S. nuclear arsenal with enhanced weapons.

The **Back from the Brink Resolution** been endorsed by over 65 US cities and counties and hundreds of elected officials, religious and civic groups.
