OCTOBER 2015 PROGRAM Donna Robertson, Fabric Café

Donna and her husband Bob have inspiring stories of life after retirement. Donna started two companies after retiring as the editorial director of a needlecraft company for 20 years. And Bob, the CEO of Fabric Café (Carry Everything Out, that is), is using his years of education and experience as an aerospace engineer to be an imminently qualified sewing machine mechanic.

In 2001 she and her daughter opened their first venture, Chenille By The Inch. Then in 2008, when the economy tanked, she realized that quilting is economical, so she devised the Amazing Economy Quilt that uses only three yards. And she frugally used the Moda fabrics in her shop that were not moving.

Her kits were an instant success, and she's now up to 38 designs and three books on the three-yard quilts, plus lots of others on different products.

Donna gave several tips to use her patterns:

- > There must be no less than 42" of each of the three yards after the selvages are trimmed.
- > Fabrics should be light, medium, and dark; big; medium, and small.
- > Fabrics should be prewashed, after zigzagging the raw edges, and then squared up before cutting.
- > Pieces should be put in plastic bags labeled with Sharpies.
- > Totally different looks can be achieved by changing the position of the fabrics.
- > Don't use shortcuts; follow her directions exactly.

 Each three-yard kit can make a generous lap quilt or a baby quilt, 45" x 60" or up to 50" x 64". Depending on the pattern, two kits are needed for a twin and four for a queen or king. The kits have enough fabric for borders that aren't mitered and for binding if her single-fold method is used.

Donna showed examples of the importance of a consistent scant quarter-inch seam, with the same pattern resulting in a quilt that was 2" shorter because of a bigger seam. She sells a Stitch Calibrator and the Purple Ledge to ensure the correct seam allowance.

We were treated to a quilt show that featured two versions of 17 patterns to see the difference fabric selection makes. We also saw the WIPs of the members who had taken the afternoon class Donna taught. Pretty fast work!

Three lucky AQG members won books, but everyone got a free pattern.

Donna has several helpful tutorials, as well as her patterns and other products, on her website: www.fabriccafe.com and lots of interesting stuff at www.fabriccafe.blogspot.com – and Facebook, of course. Be sure to visit her website in her birthday month of June, because she gives everyone a free pattern then.

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM by President Donna Toombs.

Committee Reports

Membership – Debbie Spinks

We now have 134 members. Welcome to new members are Agnes Ross, Tamara Burdette, and Andrea Fuss.

AWOL - Leah Sample

Leah explained that AWOL is "Arkansas Women (and men) on the Loose." The next sit and sew retreat will be held at the C.A. Vines 4-H Center in Ferndale on March 18-20, 2016. There are both 'quiet' and 'loud' rooms so everyone's preferences are met. It is an excellent opportunity to see what others are working on, get help from experienced quilters, and possibly see demonstrations. Registration is now open. There is information and forms on the website also. We usually also have some form of entertainment on Saturday night which in the past has included Bingo, Fat Quarter Craps, or musical entertainment. There is no curfew; attendees can sew all night if desired.

Quilt Exhibit - Mary Jane Beard

The quilt exhibit is up at the Terry Library in Little Rock. The library is doing a Viewer's Choice contest. Please go and see the exhibit and vote for your favorite! The library is open until 6:00 PM on Wednesday and Friday and 8:00 PM on other weekdays.

Programs – Liz Ketcherside

The class held the day of the meeting by The Fabric Café was fantastic! Liz had all participants hold up what they had made in the class and all were beautiful. There were 19 in attendance at the class.

The December meeting will be our annual party. We will play bingo and bingo cards will be purchased with Fat Quarters. If you want to play multiple cards, bring lots of fat quarters! There will be prizes in addition to the fat quarters brought for the game. Those with last names

Finally, Donna Toombs mentioned that while we have elected our new officers, help is needed to staff committees. Please volunteer as this is a good way to get acquainted and make new friends.

At the end of the meeting, Liz Ketcherside gave our guest speaker, Donna Robertson, a copy of our guild's cookbook.

Show and Tell

Marilyn Weaver showed us two gifts for her friends in Branson. The two quilts used the same pattern, Embroidery Christmas Tree (OESD-Swirls) and were called Merry Christmas. She also showed us the two quilt tops she assembled from the fabric bingo cards used for the Quilt Arkansas bingo games. Wanda Cockrell displayed Triangle Frenzy, a Christmas table-topper. She got the idea for it at a retreat. Wanda also showed us 3 quilts that she made in the class on the day of the meeting; one was from the Sew Quick pattern, the second from the

Byzantine Door pattern, and the third was a Pinwheels Plus 1 which will be a donation quilt for hospice. Robin Tyler quilted the Pinwheel Plus 1. Pam Wells also quilted the Sew Simple donation quilt at no charge.

Elaine Green showed us a quilt that she received as a gift from her quilting group that makes quilts for CARTI. It is a Signature/Friendship quilt and is now a treasured possession! The quilt was designed by Delorse Richards. Elaine also brought a quote to share: "Cooking is for those who don't know how to quilt!" One of our visitors, Jo Dumas, brought a quilt that she purchased at the National Quilt Show; it is from a pattern called Stepping Up. Melissa Landreth brought the culmination of her 4-year effort. It was a project she started at Mickey Dupree's class and it has mitered borders. Riley Middaugh showed the group the raffle quilt she made for the Grace Lutheran Craft Show that will be held on Saturday, November 14th. She has tickets if anyone would like to purchase one.

Sammye Harrill brought the Diamonds are Forever quilt that she started at Judy Rickard's class at Quilt Arkansas. Patty Harris showed us two quilts; one was called Tulip Quilt and it uses flying geese blocks. This quilt is for her 10-year-old niece and was made by Patty and her sister, Peggy. It was machine quilted by Shelly Blair. The second quilt was for her 7-year-old niece and it is called Happy Puppies. Her niece just loves dogs. This was also made by Patty and her sister, Peggy, and was quilted by Patty herself!

Eddie Landeth showed us 9-Patch Pizazz that he made in Leah Sample's class at Quilt Arkansas. He pieced it on Thursday, quilted it on Friday, and bound it on Saturday. (Yes, we are amazed.) Eddie also brought William Morris "Friends," a pattern by Michele Hill. He started the quilt in 2011 and it is finally done! The final quilt Eddie showed us was a Batik Jelly Roll Quilt that he made to try to use up some of his stash.

Judy Bowers was next with three items. The first was a quilt she found on her porch when returning home last Saturday. It is a velvet scrap quilt made by her grandmother which is a Victorian scrap quilt with embroidery. Judy said her cousin has had the quilt for many years and she asked long ago that if he ever wanted to get rid of it, she wanted it. The second one was from a pattern called Rocky Mountain Bear Claw, a Judy Niemeyer pattern. Judy Bowers is a certified Quiltworx instructor and they send her quilts to display for her lectures in the Hot Springs area. The timing was right to share them with our guild as well! The third quilt was also lent from Quiltworx and was called Sunburst 2015.

Liz Ketcherside showed us the Mondo bag she made at Quilt Arkansas in the class offered by Carol Mosley-Flowers from the Stitchin Post. Liz also showed us the wool journal cover she started at Quilt Arkansas. It is called Lavender Lambs. The journal cover will also be her Out of the Box challenge as she has never worked with wool before. Tamara Brown brought two quilts to show. One was a beautiful appliqué quilt called Applique Garden and the other was called Midnight Colors. Donna Toombs showed us a table runner that she is making for her mother. It uses 30-degree triangles. Donna told us the project went much better after she broke down and bought the ruler recommended for the project! If anyone needs to borrow the ruler, let Donna know. The table runner is made with strips from a jelly roll.






